The Cisco Junior College spring schedule of Community Service courses includes a wide variety of classes.

SATURDAY COMPUTERS FOR KIDS (grades 3-5) is a basic course that includes "hands-on" experience. Class enrollment is limited to 16 students. Cost, \$17. (Registration deadline March 28.)

TUESDAY CAKE DECORATING teaches techniques for frosting, scroll work, lettering and flowers. Cost \$10. (Registration deadline March 17.)

Welding is designed to teach the basics of oxy-acetylene and electric welding. Students must furnish their helmets, goggles and gloves. Cost \$50. (Registration deadline March 17.)

SMALL ENGINE REPAIR covers the repair of small engines - lawn mowers, tillers, etc. Cost \$40. (Registration deadline March 17.)

Sheriff's Dept. News

Sheriff Dee Hogan wasn't in his best mood Monday. After being notified by T.D.C. last week that if ten men prisoners and one woman prisoner were brought to their receiving facilities Monday morning, they would be accepted. And since taking the prisoners to T.D.C. would save Eastland County a large amount of money, Sheriff Hogan was determined to have them there early Monday morning.

Sheriff and Mrs. Hogan left Eastland early Monday morning on hazardous ice and snow covered roadways in the freezing cold in order to have the woman prisoner at Gatesville when the unit opened. And a little later, Deputy Frank Saylor left Eastland with the ten male prisoners, heading for the men's facility.

After arriving at the Gatesville unit at opening time, the Hogans and their prisoner stood out in the cold for 40 minutes, waiting for the prisoner to be processed. Sheriff Hogan even loaned his coat to the woman prisoner, who didn't have one. They weren't invited in out of the cold and wind, but finally they were told that the units would not open to accept prisoners that day and that they should come back the following Monday. Hogan then called back and Deputy Saylor was radioed to turn around. The frustration at having to wait in the cold and waste most of a day when they might have been solving a local crime must have been as discouraging as the weather.

Back in the county, the Dept. officers then cleared up an antique furniture burglary with two suspects arrested, charged and arraigned. The furniture was

located in storage where the owner was to reclaim it.

Notice was received that Melvin Wilcoxon Sr. is to be released from the mental hospital in Vernon, and that officers will need to transport him to Eastland for a hearing.

Early Tuesday morning it was reported to Ranger Police and the Sheriff that the Food Fare Grocery had been burglarized. The front door had been broken in and 250 cartons of Winston and Marlboro cigarettes were missing.

Officers have been serving papers and getting the jail ready for the inspection set for last Tuesday. The trustees have been working hard and taking a lot of pride, reports Sheriff Hogan, in getting the jail spottless and shining for the inspection. He praised their willingness to work and their interest.

Gordon Spot

Now that March is here many vegetable gardeners in Eastland County are preparing for spring planting. The first step should be to control soil insects if they are present.

producers are making plans for establishing new pasture grasses in the spring. There are a few pointers that might need consideration before establishing grasses.

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled.

First, decide what you want the grass to do. There isn't a single grass that stays green 365 days a year, grows well during drought and cold weather, produces good forage all year long, and provides a high yield.

For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden is planted.

Be realistic in selecting the grass for your new pasture. Consider if you want the grass strictly for grazing or if hay will be harvested during times of lush growth. Also, consider root growth and its effect on conserving soil and water resources. Response to fertilizer and drought tolerance are important factors, too.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

While costs are important consider long-term benefits of production and persistence before opting for the least expensive pasture to establish.

Most soil insects can be controlled with Diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or 5 percent Diazinon granules or Spectracide 6000 applied as a 5 percent granule. Granules usually give the best control and are easier to apply. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Seven bait over the soil surface.

Some of the popular grasses being planted are bermudagrasses such as Coastal and Brazos. Kleingrasses such as Verde and Kleingrass 75 are still popular. Lovegrasses such as Ermelio, Renner, Morpa, and Wilman are well adapted to Eastland County.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of 5 to 6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

For establishing stands, growers should prepare the seedbed well in advance of planting. This permits soil to settle and become firm before planting. Weeds can be controlled and fertilizer should be applied before seedbeds settle. Early soil testing is important for determine what nutrients are needed.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow the label instructions.

Most failures of new plantings results are short term plants and last minute decisions to prepare seedbeds. Remember that grass seeds are small and seedlings are weak, so conditions must be favorable for germination and establishment.

Bullock Reminds Businesses That Items Bought With Food Stamps Are Non-Taxable

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Monday reminded Texas businesses that items bought with food stamps are not taxable.

"We're not going to take advantage of folks who are already having a difficult time financially by making them pay sales tax on groceries they buy with food stamps," Bullock said.

According to Bullock, the Texas Legislature exempted food stamp purchases from state and local sales taxes in 1987. The exemption went into effect in October of that year.

Only items that can be legally bought with food stamps are exempted from the sales tax, Bullock said.

For example, federal law prohibits applying food stamps towards alcohol or tobacco products, Bullock said.

However, items that would normally be taxable, such as gum, candy and soda, aren't taxable when they're paid for with food stamps.

Bullock said his agency has mailed more than 24,000 notices to grocery stores, specialty food stores, bakeries, and convenience stores statewide to remind owners and managers of the exemption.

Taxpayers who want to know more about the tax exemption on food stamp sales or about any other state tax may call the Comptroller's

office toll-free at 1-800-252-5555 for assistance.


