A little research convinced me that the best print-shop "leftovers"-for shingle use, at least-were .009" thick and measured 24-5/8" X 36". Telephone calls to several local presses proved that such plates vary uite a bit in availability and in price. However, I finally located one smalljob printer who had thousands of the ingles-to-be that he was more than willing to unload for a bargain price. So, I drove to his shop and carefully selected undamaged plates that had a sturdy, 1/8" doubled-over edge (created when the aluminum was locked in the press). In two hours I had oaded 600 of the metal sheets in my truck...and had thoroughly blackened

In order to produce the finished metal "shakes", however, I first had to make a template - 17/" long and 10" high-which I cut from a piece of 1/8" paneling. I then marked two points (4'z"-horizontally-from the upper right and lower left corners, scribed lines connecting these dots to, respec-

tively, the lower right and upper left angles ... and sawed off the two indicated triangles to create the parallelogram form pictured in Photo

Then, after rounding up a table knife, a 16" scrap of steel strap, and a 6" piece of 2 X 4 from my woodpile ... I set to work. HOW TO FOLD 'EM

To fold the shingles, I placed one of the mini-sheets -shiny side down - on my work surface. The 1/8" pressfolded edge was closet to me (furned under), and the sheet protruded about one inch over the table's edge. positioned four inches from the left side of the sheet and six inches from its right edge. The next step is to wrap the exposed triangles of metal up and over the sides of the template. A wooden block (such as the one in Photo 2) is used to press each fold almost-but not quite flat.





In this way, all of the sides of my shingles overlapped, and two roofing nails were sufficient to secure three corners of each of my plates. Finally, any nallheads that-because of nonuniform shingles-were not covered by another aluminum plate received a waterproofing coat of black plastic sealant.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Although Mr. Simmons didn't use them, we recommend rubber-fitted roofing nails for this job.





Home Ventilation Saves Energy

Using outside air wisely can reduce energy use for residential air conditioning, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Applying For Social Security Benefits

Persons who are planning to retire before age 65 should apply for their monthly Security Social benefits no later than the last day of the month they want benefits to begin, Glyn Hammons, Social district Security manager in Abilene said recently.

Generally, benefits payable for months before age 65 can begin no earlier than the month of application. This limitation also applies to widows and widowers who will receive benefits before their 65th birthday. A person who applies for benefits after age 65 can receive benefit payments for up to 6 months before the month of application. Those who want to make certain that their benefit payments will begin on time may apply as early as 3 months before they want benefits to start.

Benefits can be paid only for months a person meets the eligibility requirements throughout the entire month.

plications for Social Security benefits, applicants should bring to the Social Security office their Social Security card; proof of age; a marriage certificate for those applying for wife's, widow's, or widower's benefits; children's birth certificates, where applicable; and records of their earnings during the preceding 2 years. 
