Proper timing through coverage of spray on the trees and recommended insecticides are all important in the control of this pest.
The best insecticides for yard trees include Sevin, Malathion and Zolone. Commercial producers may use Zolone, Sevin, Guthion, Malattiion or Torak P. Malathion gives a quicidual lasts for only a day or two. Both Zolone and Sevin will leave a residual for about one week. It takes Zolone about two days before it affects the insects.
