church". But, is it really worthwhile to deal with such a subject? Would it not be of greater importance and value to treat of the love and mercy of God, or the social implications of Jesus' teaching, or some other seemingly practical subject? And does not the very stressing of the matter imply a narrowness of view, as if it were necessary for every believer to belong to just one church?

The fact of the matter is that no serious student of the Scriptures can afford to ignore the question of the church: this collection of disciples Jesus promised to assemble (Matthew 16:18) over which he now rules (Ephesians 5:23). Further, the church: not only as an assembly of believers, but believers of all races, social levels and economic conditions, is the very demonstration on the earth of God's "manifold wisdom" (Epesians 3:10) and figures in the"eternal purpose" of God (Ephesians 3:11).

And whether we like it or not, especially with our passion for liberty, the Scriptures certainly let us know that God never intened for this collection of believers to be closeted in an endless variety of religious bodies, most of which give lip service to faith in Jesus but parade under human names which have no connection whatsoever with the Savior. (Ephesains 4:1-6; 1 Corinthians 1:10-17; Matthew 10:32-33; 1 Peter 4:16; etc.). We have to choose whether or not we want to be indeed the "church" of the Lord Jesus Christ, or a "Church" built upon some theological interpretation conccived in a human heart and given permanence through a humanly edited document, generally known as s Confession of Faith or Creed. WASHINGTON, D.C. --THE JUGGLING OF GENES CAN HAVE FRIGHTENING possibilities. Researchers in the field have some agreement among themselves to limit attempts to create forms of life in the test tube but, seemingly, some feel that under some circumstances they can improve upon what the Creator did in the first place. IN THE CASE OF FOOD

PRODUCTION, the genetic engineers have accomplished some remarkable results. Even as far back as 1850, the idea of hybrids came into being through experiments con-M.H. Ferris, et al v. Security ducted by an Austrian monk, Gregor Mendel. Application of genetics for increasing plant yields has advanced considerably in the last five or six years. According to these scientists, chemical fertilizer and complex farm machinery are reaching limits for increasing production to any considerable degree beyond what it is at present. They that genetic reason modification is the best hope for increasing food output to feed an expanding population.

ONE RECENT ADVANCE IS GROWING FASTER, CHEAPER and meatier chickens by breeding them without feathers. Featherless fryers and bare - bottom broilers save time and processing costs by cutting out the plucking, bringing fresher poultry to the table faster.

MORE IMPORTANT, THEY SAY, by eliminating feathers



GOING ON, OTHER EF-FORTS in a brave new world are being made which affect the amount and quality of our food. One such effort is in finding food plants to grow in acidic soils. It has been concluded that enough food for the world cannot be raised on our good soils alone. Research is going into finding the proper plants for the poorer soils instead of trying to fertilize nonproductive land for food plants. In other words, it is changing the plant to fit the soil instead of changing the soil to fit the plant.

ONE OF THE MOST IN-TENSE EFFORTS HAS BEEN UNDER way at Washington State University where different strains of wheat, of which there are thousands, are being tested. Experiments are being made to find strains resistant to certain diseases; to increase volume per stalk; and

increase protein per grain. THE ANSWER TO THE NERVOUS NAKED CHICKEN PROBLEM is not yet available but the experimenters and genetic engineers will likely
