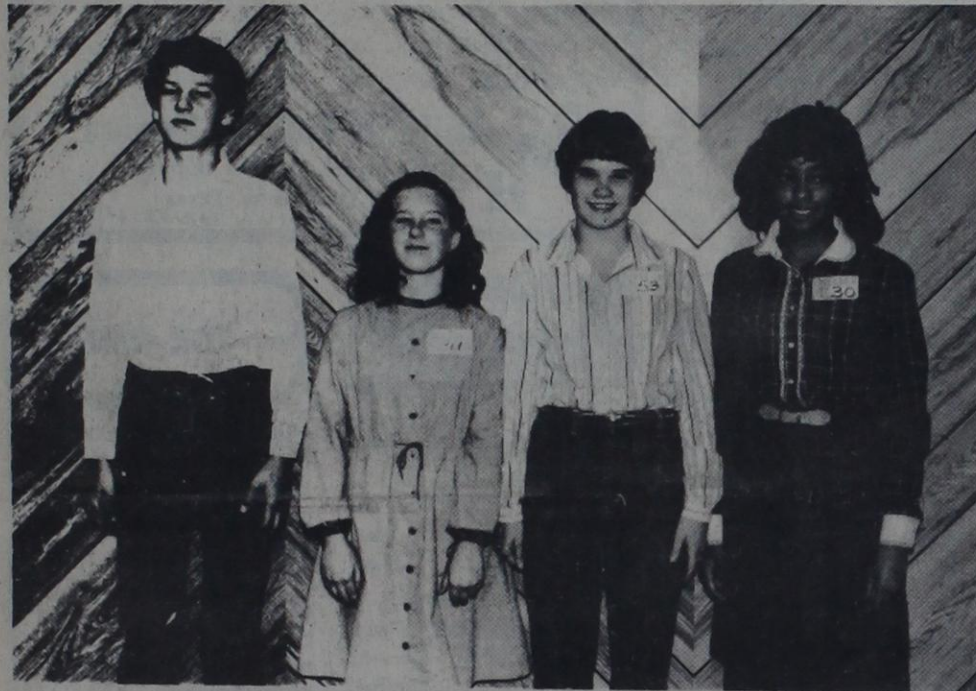


## Brown County 4-H Food Show

# Firemen Find Missing Woman Near Old Abilene Highway

## Autopsy On Body Is Ordered

The body of Mrs. Debra Garcia, the object of a wide search since her disappearance from work at Quickway Grocery in Cisco about 5:56 a.m. Sunday, was found near a road-side bridge on the old Abilene highway, 3 and a half miles west of Cisco at 2:35 p.m. Tuesday.

The body was found as eight Cisco Volunteer Firemen began searching area roads early Tuesday afternoon.

Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie and Fireman Joe Jarvis composed the team that located the body.

Authorities were notified by radio and District Attorney Emory Walton and Deputy Sheriff Ben Sancillo soon arrived to direct an on-the-scene investigation.

Mr. Walton said an autopsy would be held to determine the cause of death. He said Mrs. Garcia was fully dressed and that there was no visible sign of injury. The body was not moved until Justice of the Peace Carlton Holder conducted an inquest.

The inquest result was not immediately released.

Cisco Funeral Home was to transport the body to Dallas where the autopsy was to be conducted.

Mrs. Garcia's whereabouts had been sought by Cisco Police and others for about 60 hours before the body was found.

Other firemen in three other radio equipped motor vehicles included Gerald Jackson, W.T. Eaton, Kenneth Boyd, David Gill, Bobby Ingram and Bill Webb.

Mrs. Garcia, 29, was on duty alone at the convenience store at 1104 W. 8th St. Police Chief Larry Jernigan reported that his department received a call at 5:50 a.m. Sunday to report that Jeff Cathey of Cisco had been in the Quickway and found nobody on duty.

Roy Dennis, owner of the store, posted a \$2,500 reward Monday for information leading to finding Mrs. Garcia. Mayor Eris Ritchie Tuesday added a \$500 reward on behalf of his firm Southwestern Enterprises and encouraged others to do likewise.

Police went immediately to the Quickway. Mrs. Garcia, who had been on duty during the night, was not present. Her sweater and

purse were there and her car was parked outside. Bread that she had been eating and an open carton of milk were on a counter. A bread oven that she was using was on.

Mr. Dennis, summoned by police, determined that \$102 was missing from one of the store's two cash registers. Contents of the other was intact. There was no evidence of a struggle, police said.

One theory was that Mrs. Garcia might have stepped outside to empty trash, as workers do near the end of their shifts, and returned to find someone robbing the cash register. The robber might have forced her to accompany him, police said.

Mrs. Garcia lived at Fontaine Apartments No. 9 with her three year old son, Issac. She is the daughter of Mrs. L.E. (Slim) Booth of Cisco. A search of her apartment turned up nothing unusual, police said.

Mr. Jernigan said he asked Texas Ranger Gene Kea of Eastland to assist with the investigation. Sheriff Johnny Morren and his staff were also assisting. Area television stations and daily newspapers were using Mrs. Garcia's picture and asking anyone with any information to contact authorities.

Cisco Policewoman Rebecca Mendez reported that a dozen or more calls had come to Cisco police headquarters as a result of media telecasts and all were checked out with nothing of value being learned as of Tuesday morning. Police questioned a 42-year old man who reportedly had made advances to Mrs. Garcia. The man was released.

Area hunters were requested by police to be alert as they walked over pastures and wooded areas in this region and to report anything of interest they might encounter.

Mrs. Garcia had lived in Cisco more than a year. She worked for Quickway for nearly a year and resigned recently to seek a daytime job. She rejoined the Quickway staff two weeks ago while waiting for a day job to open at Thrift Mart where she was to begin work soon.

A native of Snyder, Mrs. Garcia was born Sept. 30, 1952. She married Willia Garcia some ten years ago and was divorced from him about two years ago. Mr.

Garcia, an oil worker living at Giddings, arrived in Cisco Monday. Mrs. Garcia is a member of the IH-20 Church of Christ.

Two of Mrs. Garcia's sisters, Susan White of Fort Worth and Carolyn Tuttle of Sanger, were here with her mother at the Booth home. Two other sisters were due from San Antonio. Two brothers live in Fairfield.

Mrs. Tuttle, speaking for the family, told The Press that "we appreciate the thoughtfulness and help of friends and neighbors. We hope that anyone who might have been on the streets near Quickway between 5:30 and

6 a.m. Sunday will call and report anything they might have seen. We never know when something insignificant will be helpful."

Police would like to talk to anyone seeing a light green Dodge pickup (white male driver) or a four wheel drive two tone suburban type vehicle (two white males) in the Quickway area early Sunday.

Mrs. Garcia, who weighs about 110 pounds, has freckles and red curly hair that she wears shoulder length. She wears glasses. Mr. Dennis described her as "a very dependable and alert worker."

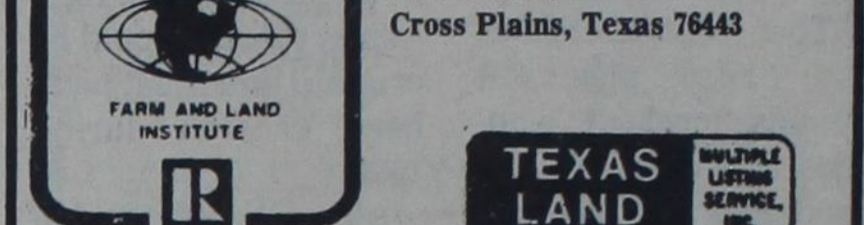

The Pecan Bake Show features an adult and youth division.

The entry classes are cakes, pies, nut breads, cookies, candies, and snacks. All food entered must contain pecans in the recipe ingredients. No refrigerated items or any food made with a mix will not be accepted.

The entries must be registered and entered on Friday morning, December 11th from 8:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. Judging begins at 11:00 a.m. Recipes should accompany all bake show entries.

Entries in the adult pecan bake show division will be returned to their owners between 4:00 and 5:00 p.m. on Friday, December 11th. Entries not claimed will be sold to the public and money will go to the Extension Homemaker Council treasury fund.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the awards for the bake show.

There will also be a Pecan Centerpiece division. This division will consist of centerpieces and arrangements made with pecans or some part of the pecan plant. There is both adult and youth divisions.

The Pecan Grower's Association sponsors these awards as follows in the centerpiece division: First Place: \$5.00, Second - \$2.50, and Third - \$1.50.

Entries need to be entered by 11:00 a.m. on Friday morning, December 11th and remain in place until noon, December 12th. Centerpieces should be original and must have been created during 1981.

Also, the Extension Homemakers members will be sponsoring a coffee and bake sale in the courthouse on Friday, December 11th. This will be an excellent opportunity to purchase some top quality homemade pies, cakes, and other baked goodies.

## RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

The holiday season is here which means parties and family get-togethers. Chicken Nut Puffs are a delicious party treat.

### CHICKEN NUT PUFFS

- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 2 teaspoons seasoned salt
- 2 teaspoons worcestershire
- 3/4 teaspoon celery seed
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne
- 4 eggs
- 5 oz. can chicken, drained & chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped, toasted almonds or pecans

In saucepan, combine chicken broth and margarine; bring to a boil. Stir in flour, parsley, salt, worcestershire, celery seed, paprika and cayenne. Cook, beating rapidly, until mixture leaves sides of pan and forms a smooth, compact ball. Remove from heat. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition, until mixture is shine. Stir in chicken and nuts. Drop by teaspoon onto ungreased baking sheets. Bake at 400 degrees for 15-18 minutes or until brown. Serve hot. Makes about 60.



Agriculture is moving in new directions with increased use of modern technology for innovative and productive ways of farming - both on land and in water.

Youth enrolled in the 4-H agriculture program already are exploring new concepts in aquaculture and hydroponics. The program is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and supported by International Harvester Co.

In a pilot 4-H project, youth are experimenting with aquaculture or "fish farming". Using small, drainable, fresh water systems like family ponds, 4-Her's are raising catfish, bluegills and trout. Ponds are stocked with fingerlings in early spring and fish are harvested in September. At the season's end, 4-Her's sell fresh fish to area

restaurants, neighbors and friends, and keep some for family consumption.

4-H agricultural program members also are keeping abreast of new farming techniques on land. They are actively involved in agricultural innovations to increase efficiency and economy of farm management. One such project is integrated pest management, where 4-Her's study and survey fields to determine the necessity and most feasible time to spray.

International Harvester provides incentives and awards for 4-H members who excel in the agricultural program. These include medals of honor to four members in each county, an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago for one 4-Her from each state, and six \$1,000 scholarships for national winners award during Congress.

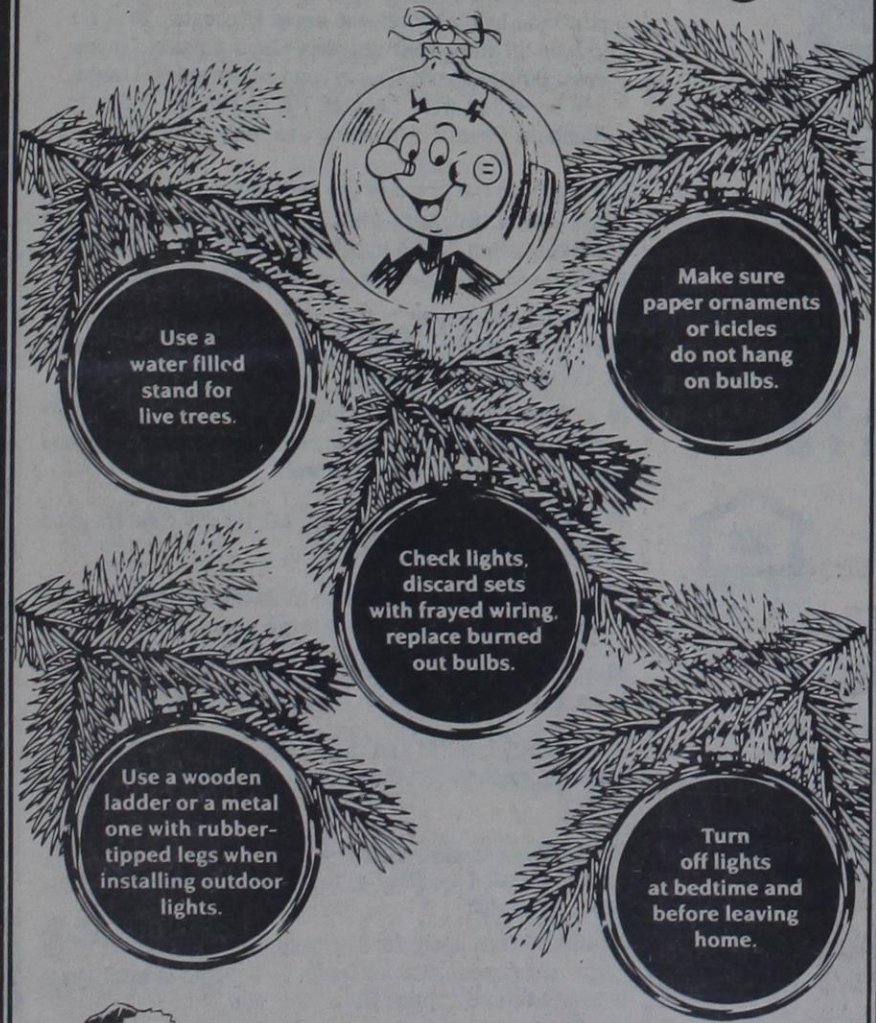

## "Management" Critical For Forage-Fed Beef

"Management" is the key to a forage-fed beef production program -- management of cattle and grazing.

This emphasis on management was a key part of the recent South Central Texas Cow-Calf Clinic here which dealt with forage-fed beef and attracted some 300 cattlemen.

"Because forages are seasonal, management of grazing and cattle is critical in a forage-fed beef production program, said Dr. Bill Turner, head of the Department of Animal Science at Louisiana State University. "To gain weight, cattle must graze forages that are highly digestible. That means forages must be young and growing vigorously.

"The concept of forage-fed beef calls for a 365-day-a-year grazing program and keeping cattle on forage longer," said Turner. "Feeder cattle must be in the 800-900-pound range before going on a short-term feeding program while slaughter cattle must be kept in the 900-1100-pound range.

"You will have to select the type or cattle that will do the best on forage," Turner emphasized. "There is no one best breed just like there is no one best type of grass to grow.

"The main thing is to produce lean, meaty carcasses. We still have to produce beef that is tender, juicy and flavorful whether we do it on grass or through the feedlot,"

Turner said. Regarding breed selection, he noted, "You can't beat a Brahman-British breed (Hereford or Angus) crossbred cow. You want each of your cows to have a calf each year, to be a good milker and to give her calf good potential for growth.

"Pick those breeds with traits important to you," Turner emphasized. "I think in this area (South Central Texas) you need a crossbred cow with some Brahman in her. The choice of bull depends on the market you're shooting for. If the market changes, change your bull."

While advocating crossbred cows, Turner emphasized that good purebred cattle are still essential because they provide a base for the industry.

Another speaker, Dr. Dennis Stiffler, emphasized the need for cattlemen to provide consumers with the kind of product they will use. Stiffler, a meats specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, advised cattlemen to consider a production

system oriented to providing leaner beef.

While forage-fed beef meets this objective, there are other things to consider, said Stiffler. These are that forage-fed production systems have greater variability, the growth rate of animals is reduced, animals have a lower dressing percentage, and total production costs are greater because animals must be kept longer. However, carcasses from forage-fed animals tend to have a higher cutability.

"Feeding grain to forage-fed animals for at least 60 days can make for a more desirable meat flavor and will improve the color of the animal's body fat," said Stiffler. "Grain feeding also can provide a little more fat covering on the outside of the carcass which reduces cold-shortening of muscles that can otherwise lead to toughness."

He also cited such techniques as electrical stimulation of the beef carcass, cooler aging, pelvic suspension (tenderstretch), and blade tenderization as improving beef

tenderness. "We can use science and technology to produce a more consistent beef product that today's consumers demand," Stiffler said. The Cow-Calf Clinic was sponsored by the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System and beef committees in Austin, Brazos, Burleson, Fayette, Grimes, Harris, Lee, Waller and Washington counties.

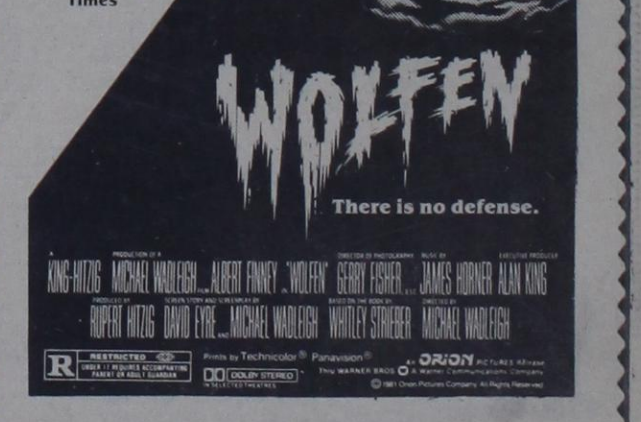

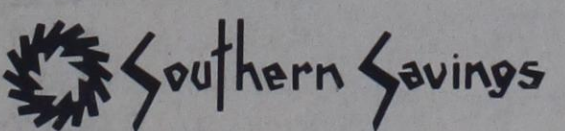

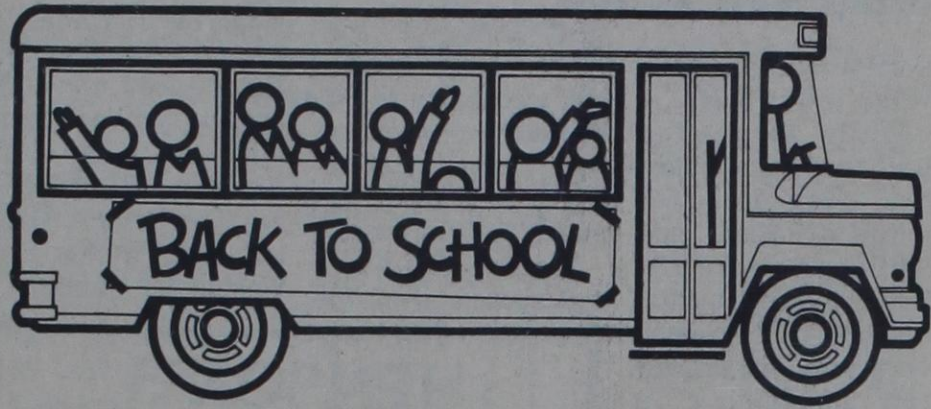

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# Growing Child

## TOYS ARE A CHILD'S TOOLS

Play is a child's work. Toys are a child's tools. And having the right toy is like having the right tool: it makes the job a lot easier and much more satisfying.

This is the philosophy that guides the selection of toys, books, and records offered in the Growing Child Store, a monthly mail order catalogue produced by the Growing Child organization in Lafayette, Indiana.

The Growing Child concept is that every child needs certain specific development experiences early in life in order to develop the skills and abilities needed to be successful in school and later life.

But good developmental experiences do not just happen. Parents can do things, and fairly simple things, to make sure their child has the right experiences at the right time. Some of these things are playing simple games, loving and cuddling, personal interaction.

Another is providing good, age-appropriate developmentally challenging learning tools.

In the first year of life, a child's physical development starts at the head and gradually moves outward and downward. Good toy selection can strengthen and deepen this normal development process.

For instance, in the first few months, a baby is emerging from nearly continuous sleep. If there are enough interesting things to look at and stimulating things to listen to, the baby will remain alert more and use his eyes and ears. The more he looks and listens, the more skillfully he will use his developing senses. Growing Child recommends unbreakable mirrors, rattles, bright pictures and mobiles for this age child.

Then at four to six months old, a baby is able to participate more actively in the world. Her head, neck, and shoulder muscles have become strong enough that she can now sit up (with support) and see things from a different perspective. For her, Growing Child recommends toys to touch, squeeze, grasp, pull, push, and handle in many different ways.

From the seventh to the ninth month, babies go through a tremendous spurt in motor activities. This is the best time for playing with safe household items, and Growing Child recommends these and other items that can be easily improvised. Good toys for this age do two things: they invite hand explorations and tempt the baby to move along the floor.

The development pattern is clear. The first few months the

eyes and ears were developing. Then the neck and arms, then the trunk and hands.

As the child approaches the first birthday, the major areas of development move out to the legs and fingers. So Growing Child recommends toys for the one-year-old that encourage finger-control and suggests clearing the floor for that momentous milestone of walking.

Growing Child has a rigorous testing procedure for all playthings before they go into the catalogue.

Toys must first of all be safe and durable.

Playthings being tested get twisted, banged, picked apart, tasted, stepped on and generally treated as roughly as a child treats a favorite toy. If the tots break, chip, crack, peel, or taste bad, they don't pass muster.

The toy must actively involve the child.

Children learn by doing, not by watching. So Growing Child's toys do nothing in themselves: it takes a child's imagination, action, and involvement to bring them to life.

Each toy must serve a purpose.

Each plaything contributes something to one or more kinds of development: physical competence, finger control, visual perception, and other necessary preschool skills.

The toy must be simple and versatile. This encourages children to use their imagination.

The toy must be attractive to look at. Gaudy, cheaply-made and badly designed

toys have no place in a child's life. An appreciation of beauty begins in the crib.

And finally, a toy must be fun. Because a child certainly doesn't get any benefit from a toy he doesn't play with.

Growing Child, the original child development newsletter, has been published for 10 years. The newsletter is a support and learning system for parents that is received in monthly installments. The newsletter format follows a child's development month by month—each issue matching the exact age of the child.

As the child develops, the Growing Child newsletters provide insight and reassurance for parents about the normal physical and cognitive growth patterns of children. And in every third issue, a select few toys especially chosen for that age are presented along with explanations of how the item will aid in the development of the child.

The pecan crop this year will be one of the largest in many years and the quality will be very good according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

Anyone producing pecans in 1981 may enter the pecan show. An entry consists of 43 pecans of one variety and native from one tree. All entries should be sacked and labeled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans. These entries may be entered at the County Agent's office up until 5:00 p.m. on December 10.

On Friday, December 11, ten pecans from each en-

try will be weighed, shelled, and kernels weighed to determine the number of pecans in one pound and percent kernel. These two factors are important along with appearance, color, uniformity and texture.

Plaques will be given for the champion in-shell, champion shell-

native pecans. Ribbons will be awarded to the first, second, and third place entries of each variety.

Childress hopes to have 200 entries representing over 40 varieties in the show.

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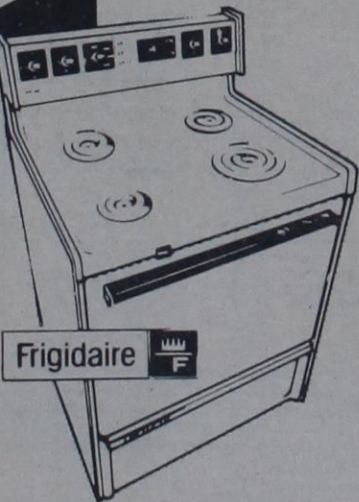

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — I suspect that no one was particularly proud of Congress this week — either the House or the Senate — after they failed, one more time, to meet their responsibilities in the budgetary process.

It is perhaps time to take a serious look at the burdensome procedure of passing a federal budget, as, for the second year, we as a body have failed to meet our deadlines and have all the appropriations bills on the President's desk by October 1. All federal agencies have been operating since that time under a continuing resolution that carried over funding at last fiscal year's levels.

After the first continuation ran out on November 20, a House-Senate conference committee worked through the weekend to come up with a solution acceptable to both sides and to the administration. Their proposal, voted upon by the House late Sunday, was over the budgetary level the President had already warned would be unacceptable and was, consequently, vetoed by the President Monday morning.

That action brought Washington to a standstill, with government agencies literally "going out of business." So-called "non-essential" personnel were sent home and the House immediately set about to pass still another continuing resolution, this one to expire on December 15, that would allow the federal government to continue its operations uninterrupted.

My colleague from the 10th District of Texas, J. J. (Jake) Pickle eloquently and accurately presented the problem to Congress that day, as he introduced a bill that would require a two-thirds affirmative vote before any continuing

resolution could become effective, with an exception in case of certain national emergencies.

"The underlying problem this week and in the last few Congresses is that we have come to rely on the passage of a continuing resolution to do our work for us, rather than to face up to the tough issues through our regular committee appropriations process. This 'continuing resolution' is a bad practice; it is an abdication of legislative responsibility and it will literally destroy the committee system unless we put a stop to it. Requiring a two-thirds vote would simply mean it would be very difficult to use this regrettable stopgap measure except in extraordinary circumstances. Thus, the responsibility for Federal appropriations would return to the committee system where, philosophically, historically, and traditionally, it belongs.

"The House has passed its appropriations bills, all but foreign assistance, and House Members can say rightly that the other body has failed to produce. I certainly have no criticism of my House Appropriations Committee, and particularly not in connection with this continuing resolution. The chairman of that committee, and the House conferees, have done a responsible job. The fact remains, however, that we are in this jam today because of an over-reliance on the continuing resolution. If we continue in this way, it will undermine the authority and the reputation of Congress."

I have joined Congressman Pickle in co-sponsoring this legislation and believe it would be an important means to shut this irresponsible "backdoor" that has allowed the Congress to ignore its budgetary responsibilities.

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In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.



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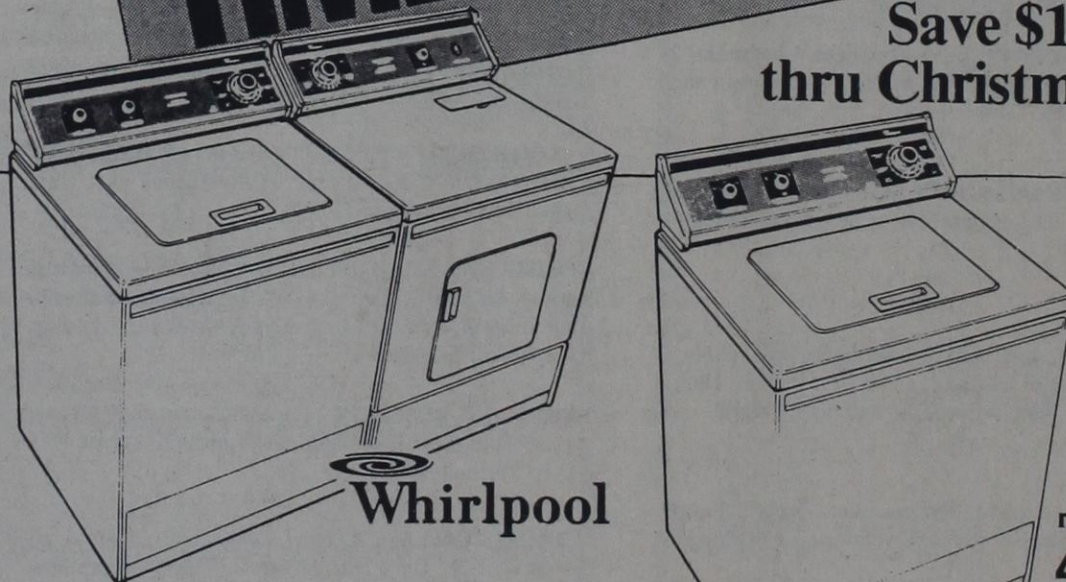
