## Meeting Slated For Oil Operators And Royalty Owners In Cross Plains

Glen Michel, Executive Vice president of West Texas Central Texas Oil and Gas Association, will be in Cross Plains, Texas, Thursday Morning, Feb. 14th, at 10:00 a.m., at the Multi Purpose Center to brief the oil operators and royalty owners on state and federal matters pertaining to the oil industry. Primary topic for the meeting will be the current matters concerning the voting records of the Texas delegation and regulations affecting the oil operators regarding environmental matters, Occupational Safety and Health Administration matters and will touch on the current natural gas regulations.

On the state level, Mr. Michel will visit those attending on matters concerning the present possibility of the State Highway

Commission leasing right-of-ways for oil and gas, the possibility of a new statute mandating a time limit on covering of pits, and new changes in some Railroad Commission rules.

The windfall profits tax is of prime importance to the oil and gas operators. However, all royalty owners, both land royalty owners and overriding royalty owners, will be affected very much by the new law about to go into effect and it would be to the benefit to everyone in the area to find out how this will affect their pay checks that they receive from the purchasing companies who purchased their oil. At the conclusion of Mr. Michel's remarks, there will be a question and answer period and he has agreed to stay as long as there are those in the audience that need to have questions answered.

## Two Local Young Men Named To Honor Roll At Tech Peanut Overmarketing Penalties Reduced

More than 5,500 students at Texas Tech University qualified for the dean's honor rolls in the six colleges during the 1979 fall semester.

Among them were two from Rising Star: Dirk Murdoch, Rt. 2; William Murphree, Rt. 2.

To qualify for a dean's honor roll a student must have a grade point average of 3.0 or more on a 4.0

scale and must have taken as many as 12 semester hours of work.

Texas Tech University has an enrollment of more than 23,000 students in six colleges: Agricultural Sciences, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering and Home Economics. There are also the Graduate School and School of Law.

County Committees of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) have been authorized to reduce the penalty for unintentionally overmarketing peanuts by 92 percent for the 1978 crop and by 84 percent for the 1979 crop, according to ASCS Administrator Ray Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald said the current 25.2 cents per pound penalty for peanuts unintentionally overmarketed may be reduced to 2.1 cents per pound for the 1978 crop and to 4.2 cents per pound for the 1979 crop. The 25.2 cents per pound penalty will continue to be assessed producers who the county committees determine circumvented peanut market quotas, he said.

The reduced penalty

for unintentional peanut marketing is authorized by recent legislation.

Fitzgerald said unintentional excess marketing occasionally occurs during harvest season when warehouses and other marketing spots are crowded with farmers waiting to dry and market their peanuts. he said that most excess marketings are the result of mistaken bookkeeping or other paperwork errors.

A change in the method of establishing peanut quotas for farmers who marketed less than the poundage quota for their farms was also announced by Fitzgerald. Under the new regulation producers may not accumulate undermarketing credit but must use it the first year following the undermarketing, he said.

Rainfall during the week had been good and the ground was generally soaked and some good, tank-filling run-off was reported in some areas.



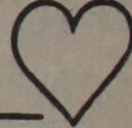

WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES? QUESTION: What is repentance?

ANSWER: "Repentance", as it is used in the scriptures, is defined by Joseph Thayer in THE GREEK-ENGLISH LEXICON OF THE NEW TESTAMENT as, "The change of mind of those who have begun to abhor their errors and misdeeds, and have determined to enter upon a better course of life, so that it embraces both a recognition of sin and sorrow for it and hearty amendment, the tokens and effects of which are good deeds" (p. 406). The scriptures themselves clearly teach that repentance is a changing of one's mind and a

turning to God produced by consciousness of and sorrow for sins.

John the Baptist commanded men, "repent ye, and believe in the gospel" (Mark 1:15). This repentance demanded a changed life for he also commanded "Bring forth therefore fruits worthy of repentance..." (Luke 3:8).

True repentance which leads to salvation includes more than simply feeling sorrow for having done wrong. "For godly sorrow worketh repentance unto salvation, a repentance which bringeth not regret: but the sorrow of the world worketh death" (2 Cor. 7:10). Obviously the sorrow of the world goes no farther than grief. Godly sorrow for sins, however, produces true repentance, which in turn leads unto salvation. This true repentance that leads unto salvation is always joined with obedience to God.

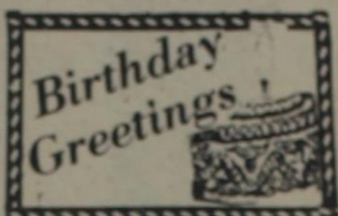
When men were pricked in their hearts with grief, Peter commanded them, "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins" (Acts 2:38). He also said, "Repent ye therefore and turn again, that your sins may be blotted out" (Acts 3:19). Paul preached that men should, "Repent and turn to God, doing works worthy of repentance" (Acts 26:20).

Everyone man must repent and turn to God, for God "Commandeth men that they should all everywhere repent: inasmuch as he hath appointed a day in which he will judge the world" (Acts 17:30-31). Jesus himself said, "Except ye repent, ye shall all in like manner

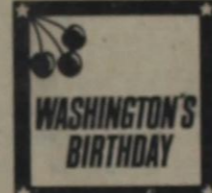

an environmental impact  
statement (EIS) is not being  
prepared for the Lake Leon  
Critical Area Treatment  
Measure Plan in Eastland  
County, Texas.

The environmental evalua-  
tion of this federally-assisted  
action indicates that the pro-  
posed project treatment will  
not cause significant adverse  
local, regional, or national  
impacts on the environment.  
As a result of these findings,  
Mr. George C. Marks, State  
Conservationist, has deter-  
mined that the preparation  
and review of an EIS is not  
needed for this project.

The measure concerns a  
plan to stabilize three (3)  
acres of critically eroding  
areas below Lake Leon Dam.  
The planned works of  
improvement include excava-  
tion of the existing river  
slope (bank) to a stable slope

and vegetation to a perman-  
ent grass cover; construction  
of a grass waterway above  
the riverbank to intercept  
and convey upland runoff to  
a safe outlet; and construc-  
tion of a fence around the  
treated area for vegetative  
establishment and protection

purposes.

The Findings of No Signifi-  
cant Impact (FNSI) has been  
forwarded to the Environ-  
mental Protection Agency.  
The basic data developed  
during the environmental  
evaluation and the environ-  
mental assessment are on

file and may be reviewed by
