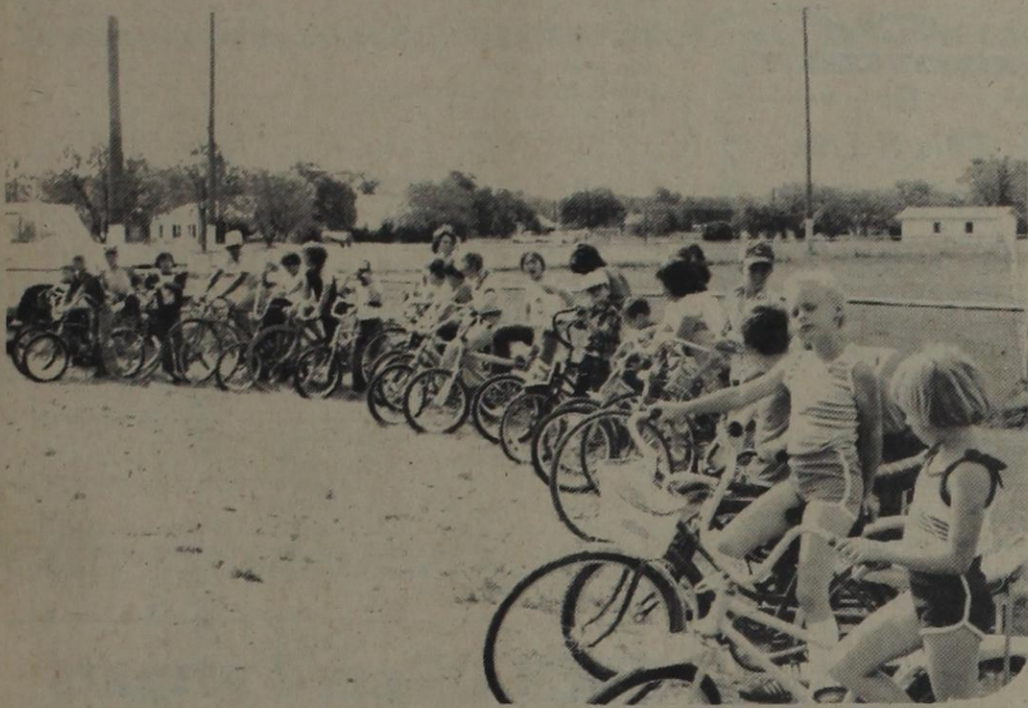


Over \$500 Raised For Cystic Fibrosis Drive

The Association's logo, used in conjunction with the slogan, "Citizens Who Do Make A Difference" stresses strength through unity, while making full allowance

The logo depicts a group of people standing with hands joined, forming an unbroken circle. In the center is the Mental Health Bell.

The changing shades of people, overlaid on the changing shades of the world in which they live, suggests the power of different individuals united to change conditions. The unbroken circle of people suggests togetherness and unity of organization.

The circle of people hands toward the bell suggests the many heads concentrating together through an organization trying to find solutions to problems.

That mental health is a full-time, year round activity is suggested by the fact that there are 12 people forming the circle.

During May citizens here can "make a difference" by contributing to the Mental Health Association.

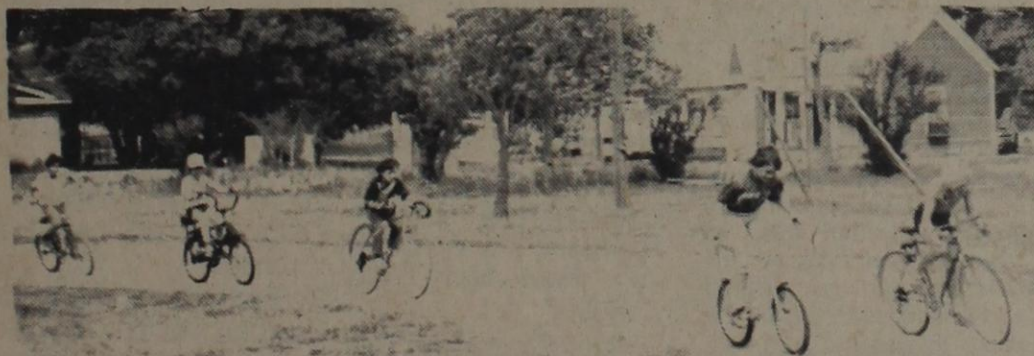

ASCS Offers Farmers Two Program Options

All farmers are eligible to participate in the 1980 wheat and feed grain program and may choose between two price support options, according to David W. Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation.

The program contains higher target prices for feed grains and wheat for all farmers who file an accurate acreage report and plant within their normal crop acreage (NCA). Farmers who plant in excess of their NCA and accurately report their acreage will also be eligible for program benefits based on lower target prices for these crops.

The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1980, recently signed by President Carter,

establishes the two-level target rate for corn, grain sorghum, barley and wheat. The lower target price level for wheat is 13.08 per bushel, and the higher rate is \$3.63 per bushel. The bi-level target prices are \$2.45 and \$2.50 for grain sorghum and \$2.29 and \$2.55 per bushel for barley.

These rates will be used to determine any deficiency payments made. The new act also extends disaster protection for corn, barley, sorghum, wheat, cotton and rice through the 1980 crop year. Combined payments made on crops are limited to \$1000,000 per person.

The ASCS official said no set aside or diversion is required for 1980 to be eligible for program benefits.

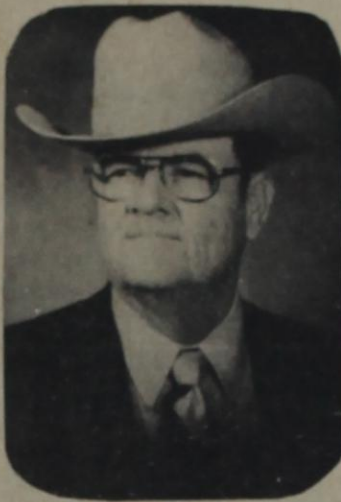

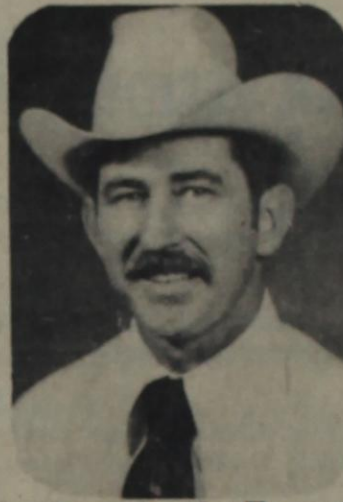

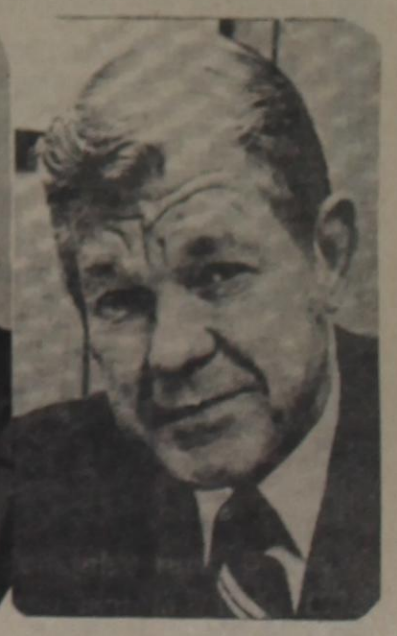

4-H: A LASTING EXPERIENCE

4-H is a rapidly growing youth organization in Eastland County according to Mrs. Donna White, Assistant County Extension Agent. 4-H has a lot to offer young people. "After reading our state 4-H newsletter, I felt I had to share with you some of its contents," says Mrs.

White. Recently, a group of former 4-H members were interviewed in an attempt to learn first-hand about the long-term benefits of 4-H membership. These south Texas citizens ranged in age from early twenties to early thirties. Most had completed

their 4-H membership five or more years before. They were teachers, medical technicians, businessmen, housewives, students and an olympic athlete in training. They also represented farmers, government employees, military personnel and a host of other professions. Many were married with children now in 4-H. One was a foster parent to almost seventy children. These appeared to be ordinary folks, the kind we meet every day. Yet, to a person, there was something intangible which set these apart from the crowd. One had a feeling that these people had a sense of

urgency, a sense of decency, a sense of purpose in their lives. They were definitely not the stand-bys; they were obviously the motivators and the doers in their communities. A series of questions were posed to each of those interviewed. Among the questions were, "Do you feel that your 4-H experience has influenced what you have done with your life?" and "What was the most important benefit of your 4-H experience?" The answers to these questions provided some insight to whether or not 4-H programs have any long-term benefits to the participants.

To the first question the response was a unanimous, "Yes". The comments which followed varied from those who said they first became interested in their vocation or avocation through 4-H to those who voiced a feeling about attitudes and values gained. The second question attempted to identify the skill or attitude gained in 4-H which is most often used by the former member. Skills in sewing were mentioned by both men and women. Skills in agricultural production, mechanical skills, horsemanship skills and many other were cited as being important. A great number of

persons mentioned record-keeping skills as important. Others mentioned the ability to organize tasks, to allocate time and to manage resources. There was, however, a common element which emerged from the answers given to the second questions. That element was "people skills." Almost every person mentioned the ability to meet, to interact and to relate to others as the skill gained through 4-H which is most valued and utilized. Many of the former 4-H'ers specifically mentioned their public speaking, method demonstration, committee member, club officer or other 4-H

responsibility roles as experiences which better equipped them to deal with other people effectively. Is 4-H a lasting experience? According to these former

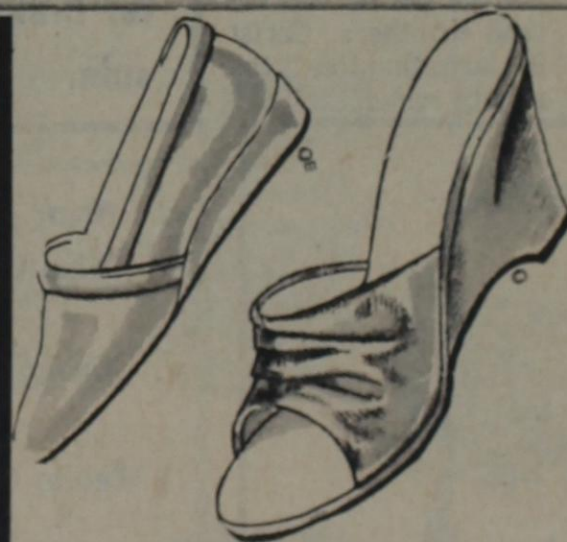

Church Of Christ

QUESTION: Does Jesus Christ desire unity among his followers?

ANSWER: The Lord Jesus definitely desires unity among all those who believe in him. The New Testament teaches that it is the responsibility of everyone who believes in Jesus to also strive for perfect unity within the body of Christ.

The very night before Jesus was crucified he prayed for unity among all his disciples. After praying for those who were with him then, he said, "Neither for these only do I pray, but for them also that believe on me through their word; that they may all be one; even as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be in us: that the world may believe that thou didst send me. And the glory which thou hast given me I have given unto them; that they may be one, even as we are one. And the glory which thou hast given me I have given unto them; that they may be one, even as we are one; I in them, and thou in me, that they may be perfected into one; that the world may know that thou didst send me, and lovedst them, even as thou lovedst me" (John 17:20-23). We who believe in Jesus must seek to fulfill this prayer for unity.

The apostle Paul made a strong plea for unity when writing to the church at Corinth. To this church divided by worldly wisdom, human philosophy and factions centered around men, the apostle wrote "Now I beseech you, brethren, through the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions

among you; but that ye be perfected together in the same mind and in the same judgement." (1 Cor.1:10). For believers to eliminate division and be united together they must "speak the same thing" in all areas of religion. We must believe, practice, preach and teach only the revealed word of God. Only upon this objective standard of truth can men be "perfected together in the same mind and in the same judgement."

The Holy Spirit revealed a plan for unity in Paul's letter to the Ephesians. Paul admonished those Christians to give diligence "to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph.4:3). Seven essential principles upon which true unity can be based are then set forth:

"There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye were called in one hope of your calling' one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all, and through all, and in all" (Eph.4:4-6). In contrast to this clear teaching, religious leaders defend and even advocate numerous religious bodies, various hopes, different faiths, diverse baptisms, etc. We under obligation to "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace", yet we can do so only by following the plan for unity revealed in God's word.

First, Israel is eternally identified with the Sabbath day (Exodus 31:13) and Matthew 24:20 warns: "...pray ye that your flight be not in the winter, neither on the sabbath day." Second, the victimized during

this horrendous period of time are delivered up to the synagogues and prisons (Luke 21:12). Jews meet in synagogues.

Third, we are told in verse 20; "...when ye shall see Jerusalem compassed with armies, then know that the desolation thereof is nigh." Jerusalem is certainly identified with Israel. Fourth, the message during this era of time is "The gospel of the kingdom" (Matthew 24:14). "Gospel" means "good news" and it is the "good news" concerning the coming Kingdom that 144,000 Jewish messengers are disseminating on a Worldwide scale. This is the prophetic sign about the King of Kings (Rev.20:4). When one insert the Church into Matt. 24, great confusion reigns. Therefore, as thoroughly explained in the first chapter, the signs in Matt. 24 definitely point to Christ's Second Coming to earth. None of these prophetic utterances have to be fulfilled before the Rapture (or the catching away to meet the Lord in the air) they are pre-Revelational signs, or signs indicating that Christ's revealing or revelation of Himself to earth's billions, is near. Behold, He cometh with clouds; and every eye shall see Him, and they also which pierced Him: and all kindreds of the earth shall wail because of Him. (Rev.1:7).

It is their part, no doubt, to humble their hearts by repentance and confession; but we are to have a spirit of compassion toward those who who have trespassed against us, whether or not they confess their faults. 6 4-H'ers Advance To Stare Competition

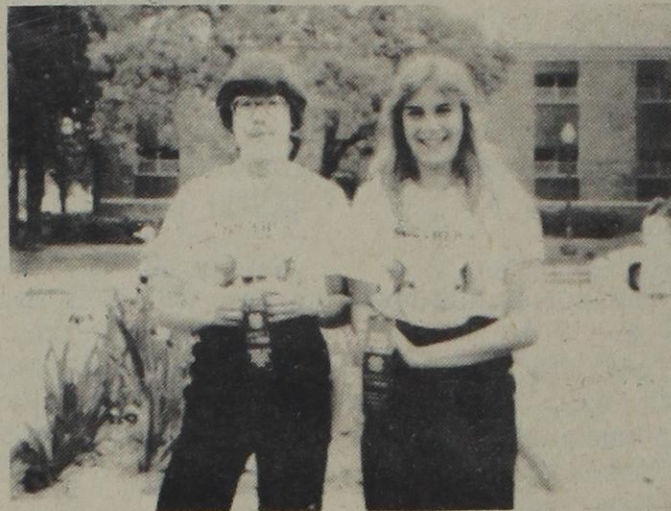
