# Rep. Hanna To Seek Re-election

Joe C. Hanna, state representative for the 54th district, announced today that he will be a candidate for that seat again in 1974.

Hanna is chairman of the House Rural Energy Crisis Committee, and representated Texas at a national conference on the energy crisis situation. He is also serving as chairman of the State Vocational -

Education committee. He. represented Texas at the Conference of National Legislators, and is also a member of the transportation and natural resources committees of the House.

Democratic primary elections will be held in May, with the general election in November. State representatives must run for that office every two years.

# Off-Election Coming Up

According to the Constitution of the state of Texas for 1973, the signatures on a nominating petition must be equal to two percent of the entire vote cast for that party's candidate for Governor in the last preceding election. For districts, counties and precincts this must not be less than 25 nor more than 500. However no person shall sign more than one petition for a

candidate for public office. Under the constitution, the primary will be held on the first Saturday in May.

There will be primaries for parties that garnered 20 percent or more of the vote in photographed by man, un- the last election for governor of the state.

Parties whose candidates received from two to 20 percent of the vote may either nominate by primary or convention.




