HOUSTON - When the flag dropped at the Feb. 19 performance of the 1990 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the scramble was on, as 28 students and 14 unruly calves covered the 2.75 acre Astrodome arena with excitement.

'Ole Rip' an Item for **County Commissioners**

During the County Commissioners meeting Monday Judge Scott Bailey announced that on Wednesday, Feb. 28, at 9 a.m. there will be a program in the Courthouse lobby (or outside, weather permitting) to observe the anniversary of Old Rip's removal (alive) from the cornerstone of the 1987 Courthouse.

"Old Rip" was released from the old cornerstone on Feb. 28, 1928, when the construction began on the present courthouse.

"We just want to commorate an occasion probably in the national news more than anything that ever happened in the county," the Judge remarked.

He mentioned that Boyce House, Eastland newspaper writer, was told by his publisher to "Forget the Bible, newspaper and bottle of whis-"concentrate on that horned never graded?

Judge Bailey said that all people who witnessed the original removal of Old Rip from the cornerstone had a special invitation to attend Wednesday's program.

Another event scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 28 drew the Commissioner's attention. Inspection of the County Jail by the State Jail Standards Commission was expected on that day, having been postponed from last

Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that everything was ready - he expected the Jail to pass. He said that 22 prisoners were currently in the facility, "with six of these for TDC and one on a 'blue warrant' for Dallas." That would make 15 prisoners for the county - well under the limit of 24.

On another agenda item, Commissioner Richard Robinson reported on some details on the replacement of the current elevator with an automatic one. The company doing the work was requesting more information before beginning construction. Some of this information was needed about the old elevator shaft (now closed). Motors and pumps for the new elevator will be placed in the unused shaft.

The topic of county roads came up briefly. Pete Noska of Olden asked Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2, why he, Noska, couldn't have some gravel for key" that was in the corner- a short road near his home in stone with Old Rip, and Olden, and why the road was

Christian replied that the House, like the symbolic small road didn't show to be a county road, and didn't appear to need it (gravel and grading) as bad as some other roads. He also said the road was narrow, with grass on either side, and graders would tear the grass up.

Noska answered that the road was very bad after a rain, and he had seen some other dead-end roads that were graded. The discussion ended when Christian said he would haul some gravel to the road, with Noska saying he would see that it was spread.

The session ended with payment of routine bills. The Commissioners said it must have been one of the shortest meetings on record - Court adjourned before 11 a.m.

The concession stand will be packed with lots of goodies, so do come and enjoy!




After the picnic, the department had a three-hour planning meeting and the wives went sightseeing in Sedona, looking at new homes.



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

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

ASCS News

Sign-up periods for the annual Agricultural Conservation Program have been abolished and replaced by a contiuous sign-up. Request for cost-shares will be reviewed for approval periodically throughout the year. The committee will review all applications accepted in February at their meeting on Mar. 1. Additional approval periods will be announced.

The committee has determined that planting grasses and underground irrigation systems are high priorities during this sign-up.

Requests for cost-shares under the Long Term Agreement program (LTA) will be accepted through Feb. 28.

The LTA concept of solving conservation problems is to concentrate on a particular area with a contract for conservation work to be done over a 3-5 year period. Cost-shares are generally based on 50% of the average cost and are limited to \$3,000 per person per year.

Program benefits subject to a limitation cannot be paid until necessary information and supporting documentation is provided to the committee and a determination is made. Entities earning a payment are required to furnish names, addresses and ID numbers of its members to the committee and inforits members of the requirement for designating "permitted entities." Producers submitting false or erroneous information will be ineligible to receive payments. The committee is required to conduct end-ofyear reviews on a spot-check basis to determine compliance.

Program yields for wheat. feed grain and cotton are frozen under the current farm program. Public Law 101-220 allows producers to submit production evidence for these crops for 1989 and subsequent years. A determination will be made whether to use the actual yield for future farm programs

Producers may submit production evidence for program crops and soybeans for 1989 and subsequent years. A \$15 service fee will be charged for each crop, practice and farm.

Thermostat Options For Saving Energy

Setting back your thermostat for 12 or more hours during the winter is an easy way to save a substantial amount of energy. Depending on where in Texas you live, the savings will be 9 to 15 percent of your heating costs if you set the thermostat back 10 degrees at night and when your home is unoccupied.

Unfortunately, most people forget to set the thermostat back on a regular basis. One way to ensure the thermostat is always set back when appropriate is to investin a programmable thermostat. There are many programmable thermostats on the market with a variety of features. The cost effectiveness of a particular type will depend on the type of heating system you have and how much you are willing to set back the thermostat.

For instance, programmable thermostats save more energy when used with a gas-fired system or conventional electric resistance furnace than with a heat pump system. With any type system, the more you are willing to set back the thermostat at night and at other times, the more energy and money you will save.

One recently introduced thermostat involves the innovative concept of comfort control rather than temperature control. With this thermostat, the occupant touches a control button when comfort conditions need adjusting. This helps the thermostat controller account for the environmental factors of humidity and air motion in addition to just temperature when occupants are not present, thus conserving energy.

When shopping for a programmable thermostat, the Texas Energy Extension Service recommends that you carefully compare several features. These include price, compatibility with your heating and cooling system, temperaturesetting and programming options, type of display, and warranty.

PRICE: Manufacturer's list prices on programmable thermostats range from about \$50 to \$250. A "comfort controller" thermostat likely will cost more.

YOUR SYSTEM TYPE: A thermostat that is compatible with the type of heating and cooling system you have is the first criterion for choosing a thermostat. Separate heating and cooling systems connect to the thermostat with two or three wires; combination heatingcooling systems use four or five wires. Heat pumps draw on multiple heat sources that require eight or nine wires, and are more difficult to connect. If you have a heat pump, select a programmable thermostat that is specially designed for use with heat pumps or avoid nighttime setback. SETTINGS AND PRO GRAMMING OPTIONS: For heating, the typical unit has one higher comfort setting and up to three lower

ones. These the thermostats can be set back in 3-degree to 15-degree increments. The more flexible models offer four to six independent temperature settings.

The most convenient programming option is to define four to six different timeand-temperature set points for each day of the week. The next best option is to set the same time and temperature program for five consecutive days, allowing for an alter-

Drug-resistant epilepsy can be cured by surgery in 50 percent of cases, the Southern Medical Journal reports. Operation requires removing parts of the cerebral cortex that trigger seizures.

Although a keypad with lots of buttons might seem overwhelming at first, it is really easier to program than one that assigns several functions to only two or three buttons.

DISPLAY: Although a few units still use a mechanical needle to show the actual room temperature, most programmable models use a digital display for a continuous display of time, room temperature, and set point. Others show day of week and operating mode (normal or setback). These are all features that help you verify all is working proper-

REPUTATION: Typically, programmable thermostats have one- to four- year warranties that cover repair or replacement of defective units, but not the cost of installation. Be sure to purchase a thermostat from a reputable dealer; a warranty is worthless if the manufacturer will be out of business in a few months. As with the purchase of any product, you should check out retailers or manufacturers that are unfamiliar to you, by calling your local Better Business Bureau.

WARRANTY

One last warning about thermostat purchases is to be cautious about buying a thermostat in conjunction with another energy-saving product. Not all homes need both products, and huge utility bill savings will not necessarily occur from installing both. For example, one company sells a thermostat along with a radiant barrier.

Many products are available that will save energy, but installing them all at once will not provide cumulative savings. For instance, if you have three products, each designed to save 20 percent of your energy bill, you will not see a 60 per-SAME CHARAMET S.M. M.

cent savings by installing all three. The savings actually will be much less because the products are working together.
