THE DANGER IN PRICE SUPPORTS. . .

A late issue of the Saturday Evening Post carried a vivid article by Lewis Nordyke, entitled "The Big Cattle Bust of '53." That title is no exaggeration. The savage drought hit the plains country at a time when cattle values were high and the cattle population was very large. The postwar boom had brought men into the cattle business who, in Mr. Nordyke's phrase, "knew no more about a cow than a steer does about biology." Many of these people were deep in debt when the day of reckoning came. Between May, 1952 and this fall the value of the cattle on America's ranches and farms dropped by the incredible figure of \$7,000,000,000.

To make a bad matter worse, government price supports kept the price of livestock feeds at levels which, to the hardpressed cattlemen, were practically out of sight.

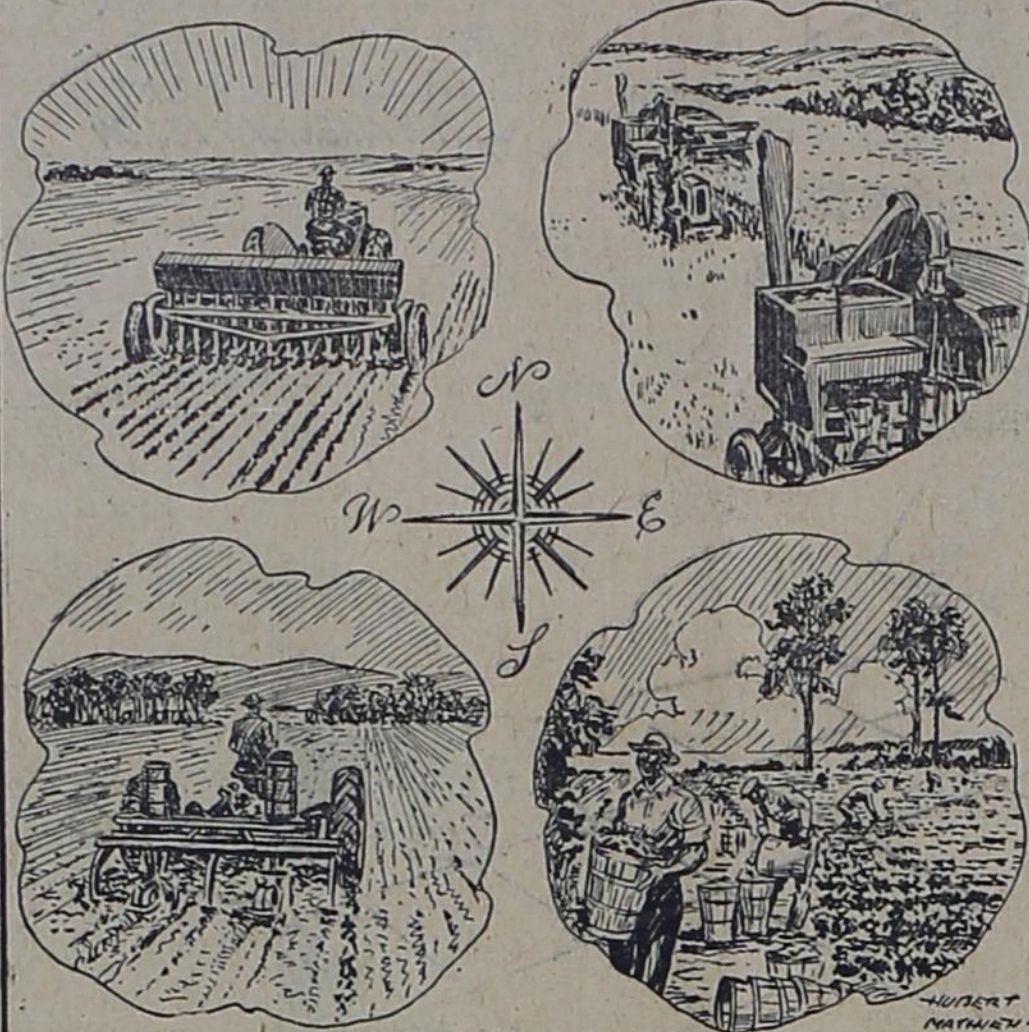
Inevitably, some producers demanded that cattle prices be supported as well. But this was not the universal attitude of the cattlemen by a long shot. For the most part, the experienced old-timers in the business are holding to their traditional attitude that they'll solve their own problems by themselves in one way or another. Mr. Nordyke quotes one leading Texas rancher as saying, "Price support on beef cattle would mean government control of production. It would mean the government would run the cattle business. It would also mean high beef prices for the consumer. The potato subsidy didn't help the potato growers in the long run. Look at the dairy business. The butter subsidy has practically killed the market for butter."

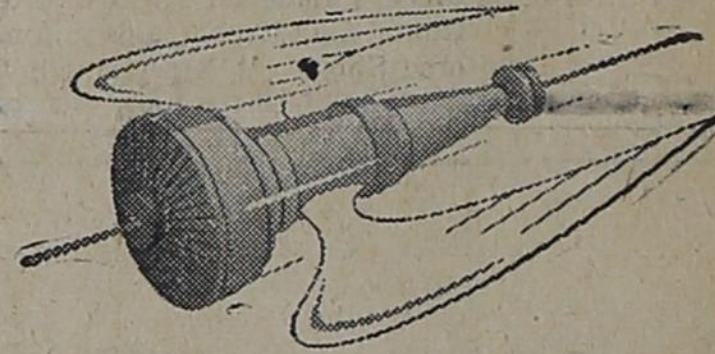
Out of 236 votes cast here last Tuesday in the general election, only two were republican. The east side voting box gave the 2 votes.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday arrangements were made to install Christmas lights in the business

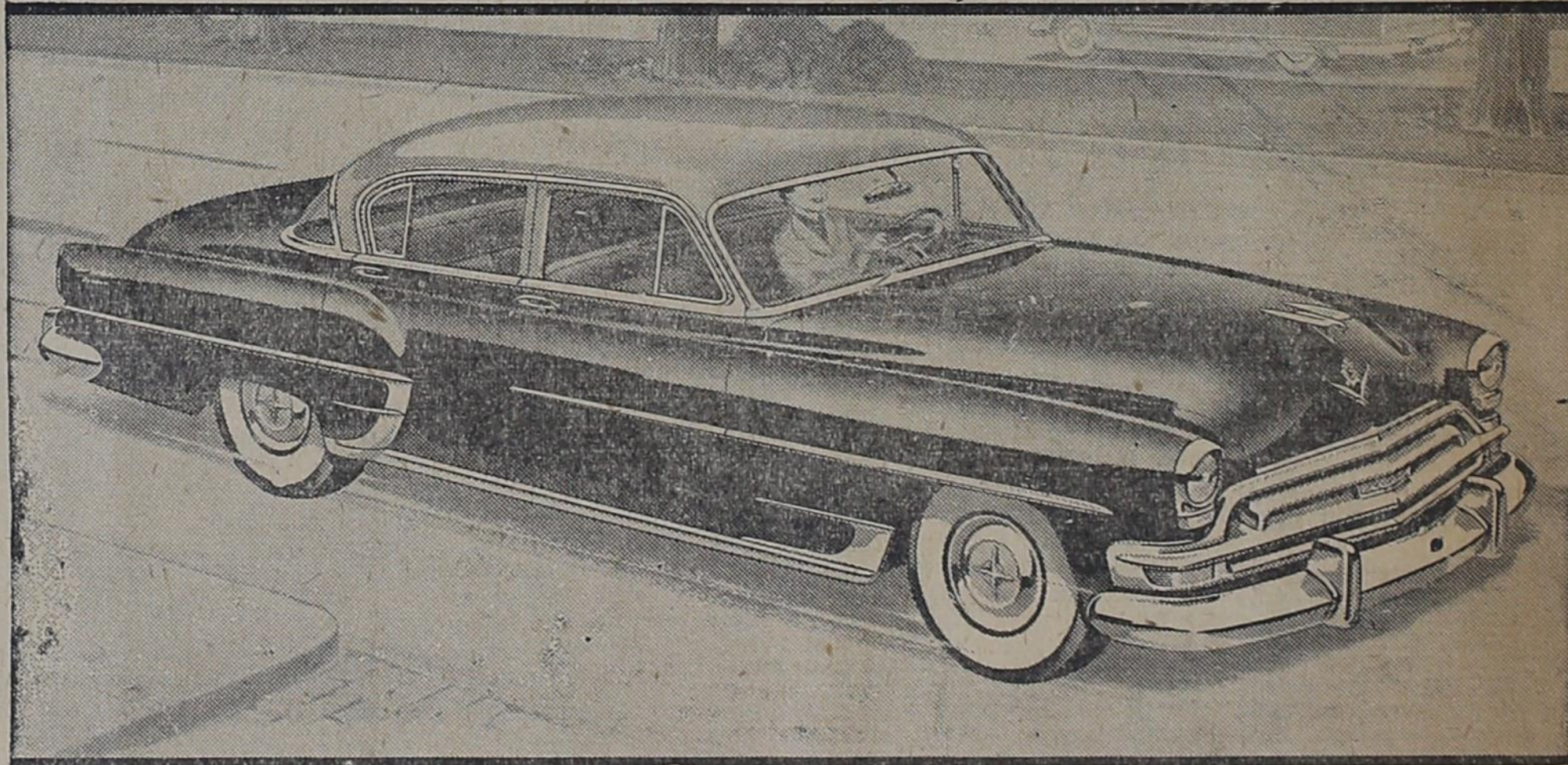

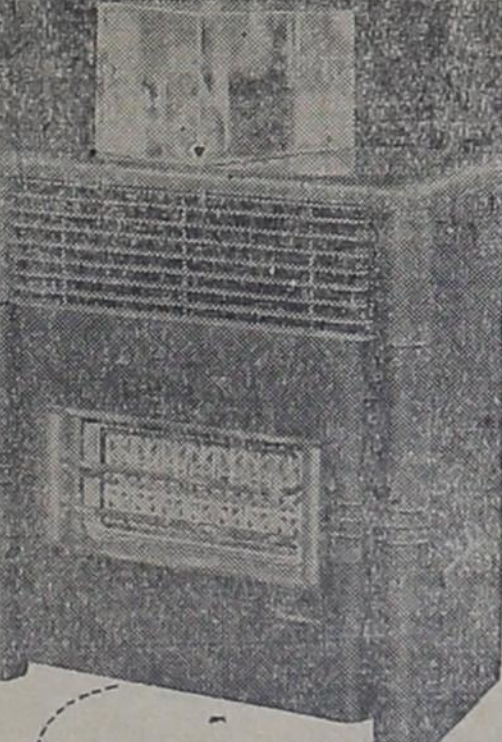

CHICAGO PREPARES FOR BIG LIVESTOCK CLASSIC

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Agriculture's greatest annual event will celebrate its 54th renewal as plans are made for the 1593 International Livestock Exposition and Horse Show. It is scheduled for

November 28 thru December 5 in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago Stock Yards. The continent's top specimens of livestock and crops will be on exhibition to the nearly half

million visitors the management anticipates will attend this year. The 8-day show is officially designated "International Livestock Exposition Week in Chicago" by Mayor Martin Kennelly.

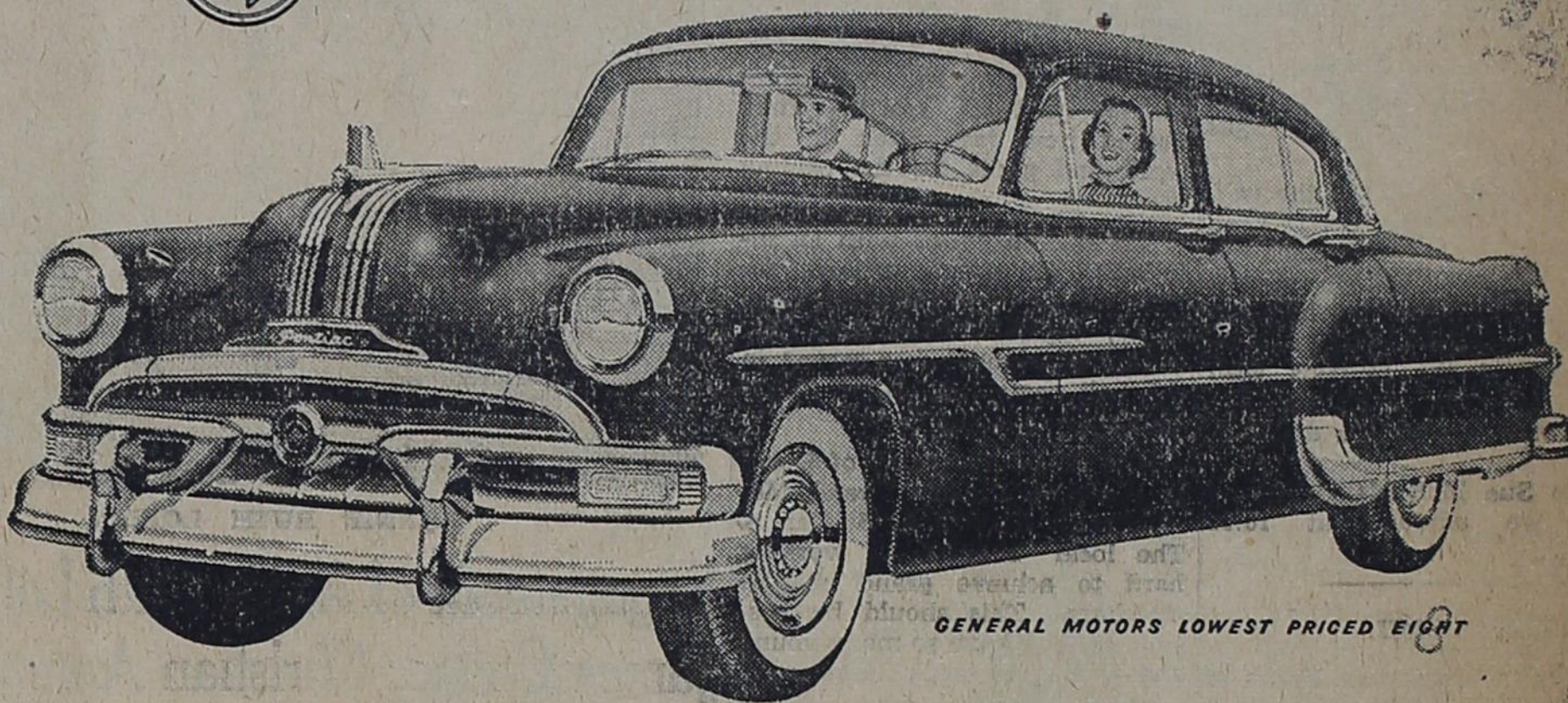

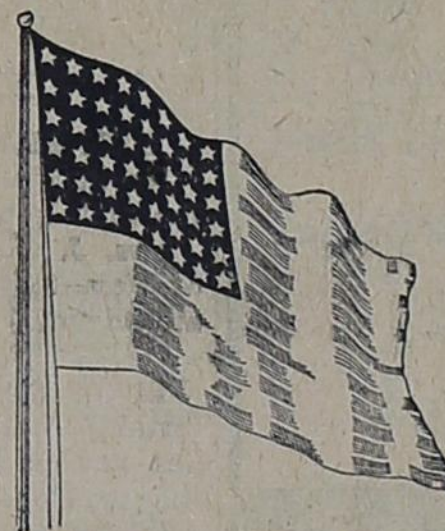

AUSTIN, Nov. 11. — Positive evidence of rabies infection was discovered in 115 animal heads autopsied by State Health De-

partment laboratories in Austin the past month, the Department announced today.

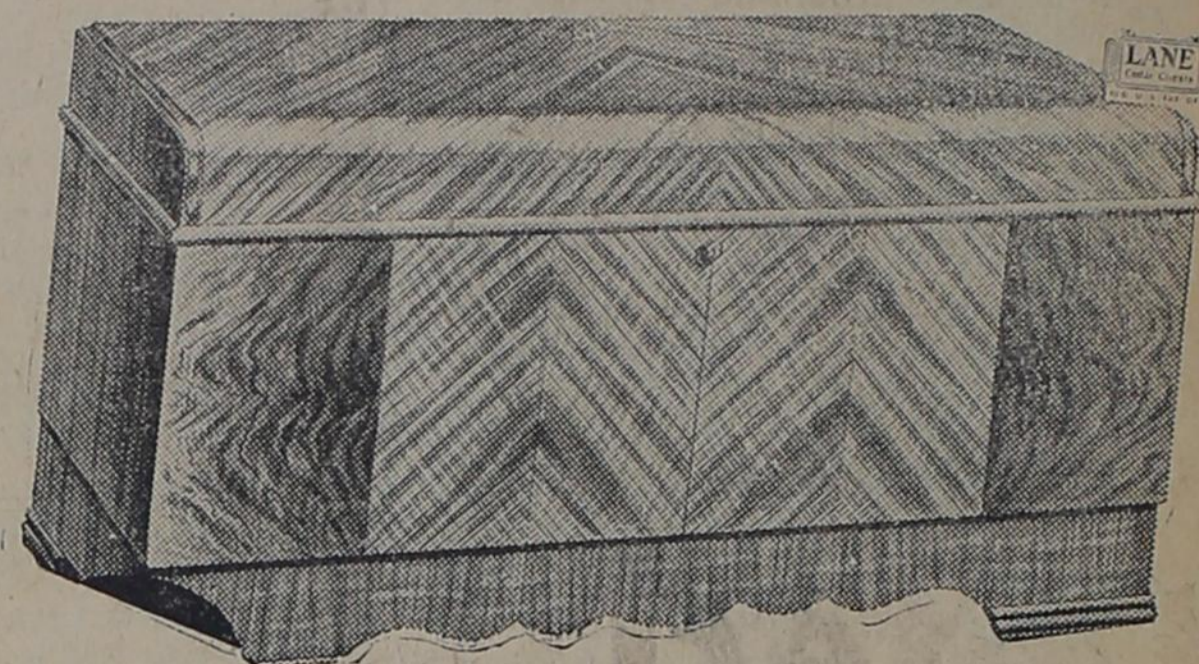
By species, positive heads included 104 dogs, 4 cats, 3 skunks, 2 cows, and 2 calves.

Heads from 27 counties made up last month's tabulation. Har-

ris County was high with 73 submissions.

The tabulation was made in a regular monthly rabies report, a departmental public service which shows rabies incidence throughout the state. It lists the species involved and gives the date and county of occurrence.

It seems only yesterday when forty acres and a mule were all that were necessary to become a farmer. Now that is all changed. About a fifth of our people can now raise more than enough food and fiber to provide for nearly twice the population we had twenty-five years ago at the dawn of the machine age in farming. Had it not been for farm machinery and the people it freed for other job, this country's history since 1940 might be very different from what it is.

To service this resolution in farming farm machinery agencies now handle many items other than new machines and parts for the line of goods they sell.
