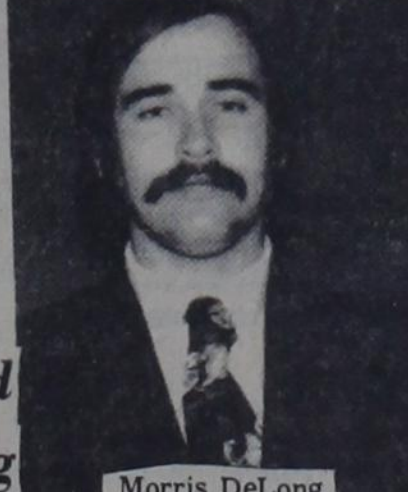

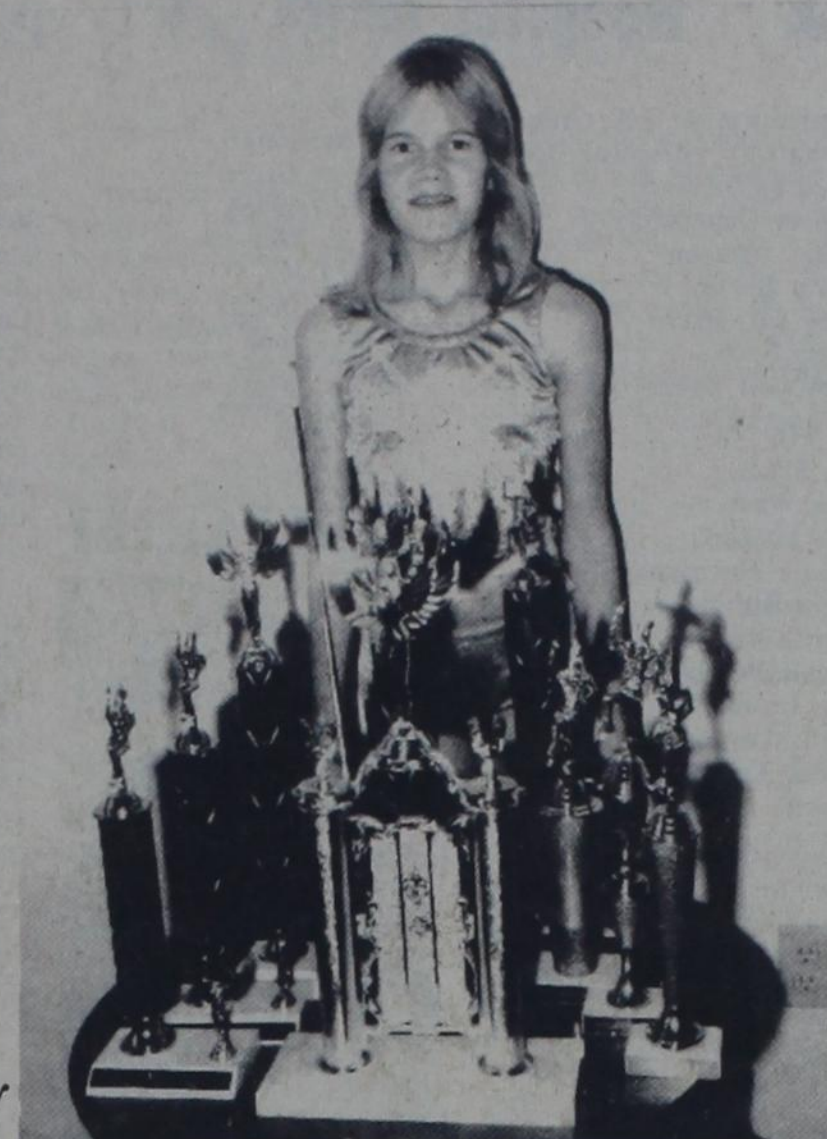

Sale Policy Announced For 1978 Peanuts Sold For Export, Crushing

WASHINGTON, Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland today announced edible grades of 1978-crop farmers stock peanuts acquired by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) through the price support program would be sold by CCC for export at not less than \$420 per short ton, plus costs, for quota peanuts, and not less than \$400 per short ton, plus costs, for additional peanuts. Quota peanuts are those grown within the po udage quota established for the farm for the 1978 marketing year. Additional peanuts for the 1978 marketing year are those sold from the farm which are in excess of the quota peanuts.

On export sales of 1978-crop peanuts sold for crushing only, the CCC sales price will not be not less than \$420 per short ton, plus costs, on quota peanuts and \$250 per short ton, plus costs, on additional peanuts. Peanuts sold for export crushing must be fragmented prior to export.

Sales of quota and additional 1978-crop peanuts for domestic crushing only will be made by CCC at competitive prices. Use of oil produced from these peanuts will be restricted to domestic markets if the price of the price of the peanuts from which the oil is produced is less than the applicable \$420 per or \$250 per short ton loan rate, plus costs.

Mother's family settled finally about three miles north of Rising Star in the Gray's Gin Community.

Her family and my father's family were almost neighbors. To say the least they live d in the same neighborhood.

I have heard Mother say that she and Dad went together for four years before they were married.

For the first few years after establishing the gin and far, Dad and his broth busied themselves in the managment of the family operation.

During the election year of 1912, the year Woodroe Wilson ran for president for the first time, Dad decided to try his hand at politics on the local level. He ran for the Democratic nomination for county treasurer and won; there was no Republican opposition at the general election in November then, as now.

Early in 1913 Mother and Dad were married. L.A. Hightower issued their marriage license in the name of then county clerk, Clyde Garret. And in November of that year I came along to brighten- or brighten- their happy home.

Ole Joe here has been around every since.

Among the earliest of memories I can remember my Mother taking me to church and Sunday School. We are Methodist and our church then was on the site of the present church, but it only occupied a portion of the lot. Behind the white frame building stood the brush arbon tabernacer where held in the warm weather.

Before Dad and Mother were married Dad lived at the Charlotte Hotel, then operated by Mr. and Mrs. Letch Parker, Guy and don's father. He and Don and Guy remained fast friends for the remainder of his life.

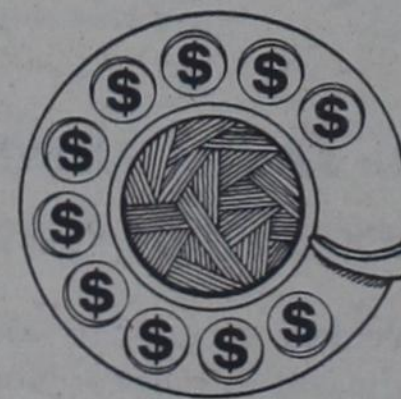

She offers these suggestions for cutting property insurance costs:

- (1) Take advantage of higher deductibles - the higher the deductible, the lower the premium.
- (2) Shop around - shop among the different insurance companies.

- (3) Do not over-insure home or possessions.
- (4) Purchase a three or five year policy, if possible.
- (5) Take Advantage of package policies offered by insurance companies.
- (6) Keep coverage up-to-date - under-insuring may be costly.
- (7) Maintain community protection - participate in fire protection services.
- (8) Professional organization policies - such as teacher unions or for retired military - may be cheaper.
- (9) Take precautions to reduce home fire hazards.
- (10) Vow to up-date policies every two to three years.

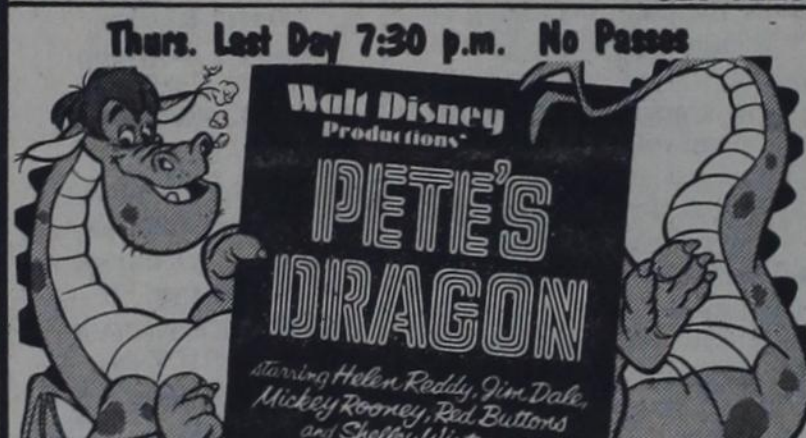

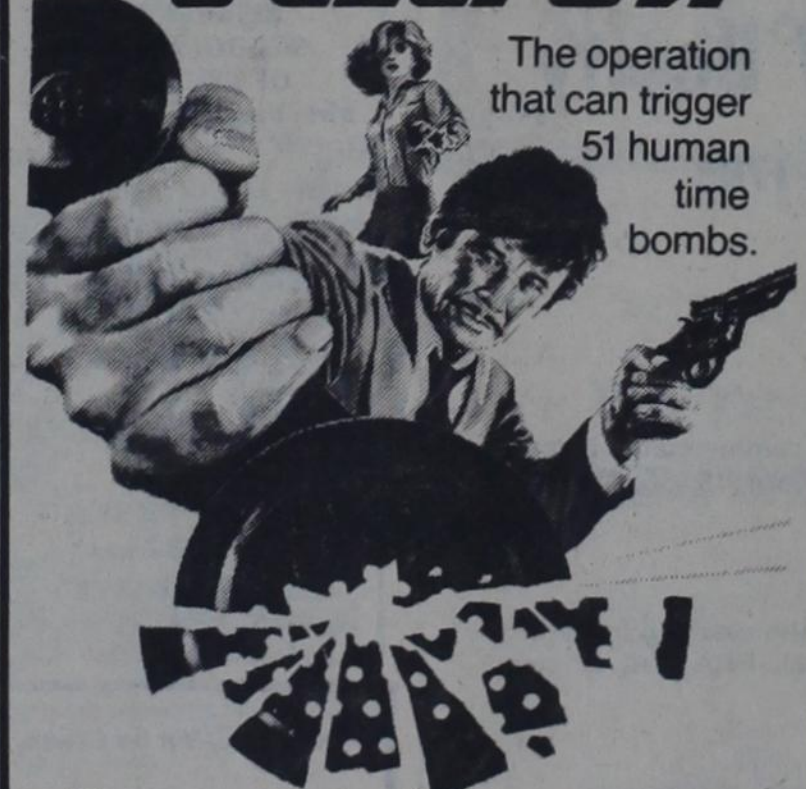

AUSTIN—Attorney General John L. Hill has served notice he will oppose Southwestern Bell Telephone's request for a new \$214.3 million rate increase.

Hill has filed a motion with the Public Utility Commission to intervene in the case.

The commission set March 27 as first pre-hearing date on Bell's latest proposal.

Although the company asked to put new rates in effect April 14, PUC General Counsel John Bell is preparing a motion to suspend the rates for 120 days, until August 12.

If Hill is given permission to intervene, he would have authority to cross-examine Bell witnesses, present witnesses and argue before PUC.

The attorney general told a news conference he is advised the Bell request is "substantially out of line."

Bell said the rates are necessary to give the company an adequate rate of return on its investment and permit expansion of its services to an increasing number of customers.

Hill said he has not ruled out the possibility that the telephone company may be entitled to some additional rate relief.

A \$58 million increase was allowed in rates December 1976, but that was small potatoes compared to the \$298 million requested.

Racing on Ballot

Both Democrats and Republicans will vote May 6 on whether pari-mutuel on-track race horse gambling should be legalized in Texas on a local option (county) basis.

Party executive committees last week certified the non-binding referendum for the May primary ballot along with the list of statewide and multi-county candidates.

Actually, Republicans earlier had agreed to the straw vote. Democrats waited until horse race advocates submitted petitions signed by 96,000 asking for a referendum.

In a surprise move, which irked consumer loan representatives, Democrats also submitted for a vote the question of whether the 1979 legislature should authorize higher interest rates on loans under \$5,000.

Sen. Bill Patman of Ganado guided the latter through the committee. Consumer loan advocates have been pushing for an increase in rates. Since voters are almost certain to vote "no," the

referendum (although not binding on the legislature) is seen as a major obstacle to an increase.

Money News

Money and taxes are making news again in the Capital City.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said it's likely Texas legislators will have about \$650 million more to spend next year over and above the present level.

Meanwhile, Gov. Dolph Briscoe is serving notice repeatedly that, if re-elected, he will urge legislators to devote at least half of any surplus in the state treasury to a tax reduction. If Bullock's figure stands, and if Briscoe wins another term, that means he will be asking a cut of about \$325 million, with priority to relief for homeowners and family farmers. Briscoe said he will also call again for repeal of the state sales tax on utility bills.

Courts Speak

Ending 17 years of lawsuits, the State Supreme Court turned down the latest contest of the 1960 will of Sarita Kenedy East whose estate included 178,000 acres of oil and gas rich lands in Jim Hogg and Kenedy counties.

In other actions, the high court:

Upheld a verdict favoring Gibson's discount firm in a lawsuit resulting from a rattlesnake's biting a customer in the grocery section of a Del Rio Store.

The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a death penalty murder conviction in the fatal shooting of a Mesquite policeman and a highway patrolman.

Sales Taxes Rise

More than 900 Texas cities received checks totaling \$69.2 million as their share of the one percent local sales tax levy for March.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said the soaring collections are an indication times are getting better.

Bullock said the March collections are 17.4 per cent higher than recorded during the same period in 1977.

So far this year, the 915 cities have collected \$101.5 million, an increase from \$89.4 million for the first three months of 1977.

Short Snorts

A record-breaking construction pace continued into 1978, according to the University of Texas Bureau of

Business Research.

A series of statewide tests to see how students are doing in reading, writing, arithmetic and citizenship will be held April 3-May 5 in 2,234 elementary and secondary schools.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby announced interim appointment of Sen. Roy Blake of Nacogdoches to the finance, administrative and jurisprudence committees. New Sen. Blake will also serve on the interim rules sub-committee.

Average calendar day allowable of Texas oil production as of March 15 totals 3,521,070 barrels.

The Texas Department of Community Affairs reported receiving \$178,638 in unexpended funds from the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs for the 1977 contract period.

Highway officials warned that long lines await those who have not obtained new auto registration validation stickers. April 1 is the deadline.

Judges T.C. Chadick and Franklin Spears were winners in the State Bar's lawyer poll in two State Supreme Court races. Judge Jim Vollers and Marvin O. Teague were winners in the poll for Court of Criminal Appeals races.

April 1st Deadline For Registration

Don't plan to wait until April 1 to obtain your 1978-79 motor vehicle registration validation sticker. If you do, you may wind up paying a fine for driving with an expired license.

Bob Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, pointed out today that many county tax offices will be closed on April 1 since that day falls on Saturday this year. In some counties registrations will not be obtainable from Friday, March 31, to Monday, April 3.

Townsley has advised all county tax assessors collectors that "there is no authority in law for anyone to grant extensions." Whether or not they keep their offices open on Saturday, April 1, is up to them, Townsley said.

The deadline for having validation stickers on vehicle license plates is midnight, falling between April 1 and 2. Local peace officers may arrest any motorist driving with an expired validation sticker on April 2.

The state receives no revenue from penalties invoked for driving without a proper license registration.

The Austin headquarters and regional offices of the DHT Motor Vehicle Division will remain open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. April 1 to assist any county tax officials who need information or other services.

Jim Rutherford Solicits Vote

In talking with people around town and reading the statements of the other school trustee candidates, it occurs to me that the main functions of a school board are being overlooked. The school board's main job is not to solve personality conflicts, dress codes, or student and teacher's rights.

These are disciplinary duties which the school board should guide but leave to the school administration for implementation. The main job of the school board is to insure a quality education to each student and to keep the school running on a sound financial basis.

Our school system is one of the largest businesses in

town. It employs 31 people to handle 33 different jobs. The total budget expenditure for the 1977-1978 school year totals nearly \$400,000.

The school system is a very dynamic business. The fixed assets, being the land, buildings, etc., has increased in value the past five years from \$300,000 to \$563,000. In the same period the assessed taxable value of the school district has increased from \$6,000,000 to nearly \$10,500,000. The taxes, although ratios and rates have remained basically the same, have increased from \$123,000 to \$209,000. As these figures reflect the Rising Star school system as a big success business it will be needing a businessman's

guidance to stay solvent.

The next few years we are going to have many wide-sweeping changes in the state and local school systems. A state wide accounting system is being initiated. Changes in school board liability, worker's compensation, unemployment insurance and special education are going to be made. Special consideration for land used in agricultural, veterans exemptions and allowable exemptions for those 65 and older are going to be made. Most importantly the Governor's tax program in connection with Senate Bill 1 and Senate Bill 67 are going to change the rendering of real and personal property

property throughout the state and equalize the school tax burden to all people in the state. These many changes are going to demand a dedicated person to keep up with them and administer them fairly on the local level.

How Grain Dust Explosions

Happen

Understanding how grain dust explosions happen can help prevent them, says a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Gary Nelson explains that before any dust explosion can occur, several required conditions must exist simultaneously.

"First, there must be a combustible dust in a finely divided state. The dust must not only be airborne or dispersed in air as a dust cloud, but the concentration of dust must be within its explosive range. Just like gasoline, a combustible dust will not burn if it is too rich or too lean.

"Next, there must be an external source of ignition of sufficient heat and duration to initiate combustion.

"Finally, the combustion or explosive reaction must occur in an enclosed space or relatively confined volume to allow a buildup of pressure. Only a flash fire will occur if the reaction is not confined," says Nelson.

The devastating destruction of grain storage and processing units occur when an enclosed pressure buildup is sufficient to collapse its container. "Often, this pressure is enough to break through 10 or more inches of steel reinforced concrete," points out the engineer.

Nelson notes that required elements which must be present for an explosion to occur provide clues to the prevention of explosions. Individual methods are available to reduce or eliminate most essential elements of dust explosions. "At any point, it only takes one missing element to prevent an explosion," he adds.

Helpful Hints For Hurried Farmers

You've heard the expression--"The harder I work, the farther behind I get!" Well, most farmers and ranchers can relate quickly to this dilemma. However, a little planning and organizing can help keep the situation in hand.

When faced with more than one operation that should be done at the same time, farmers may be able to save on both time and expenses by following some of the suggestions offered by Cecil Parker an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service:

--Have equipment ready when the time comes to use it. When buying a new machine, get it early enough so it can be checked out, tried and adjusted well in advance of use.

--Increase field efficiency. Reduce time lost in the field by having machinery adjusted as much as possible before starting an operation.

Save time by planning fields for long rows and few turns. Devise ways to fill seed and fertilizer boxes and sprayer tanks with the least possible amount of lost time.

--Change cropping system to avoid competition between crops. For instance, is the hay ready to cut at the time grain should be planted? The choice may be between

lower grain yields or lower quality hay. Even though weather influences farm operations a cropping plan should allow farmers to get the job done in time most years.

--Change production systems. Sometimes changes in a basic method can save time. A chisel plow is faster than a moldboard plow. Fall plowing can reduce the spring workload.

--Increase working hours per day. Farmers may be spending as many hours as possible on the tractor. Reducing the amount of daily chores is a way to gain added field time. Perhaps someone with an 8 to 5 job can be employed several hours each evening. A higher than usual hourly wage could be paid to make the offer attractive and at the same time be a profitable farm expense.

--Use custom operators. Consider hiring a custom operator to help get through a busy season even though a machine is owned that an can do the job. Possible increased yields or decreased field losses can more than offset the cost. Also, using a reliable custom operator rather than owning a large expensive machine will release operating capital for other uses.

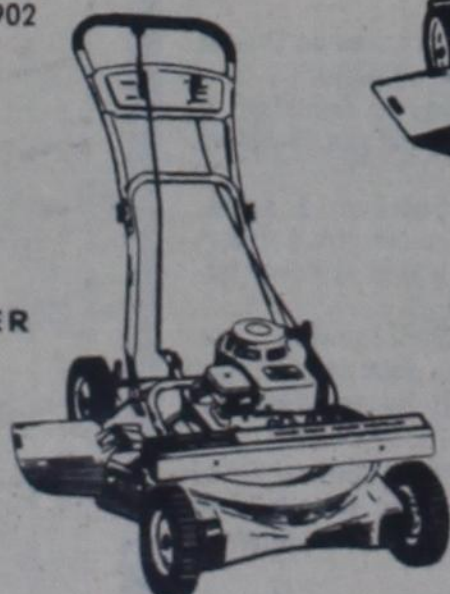

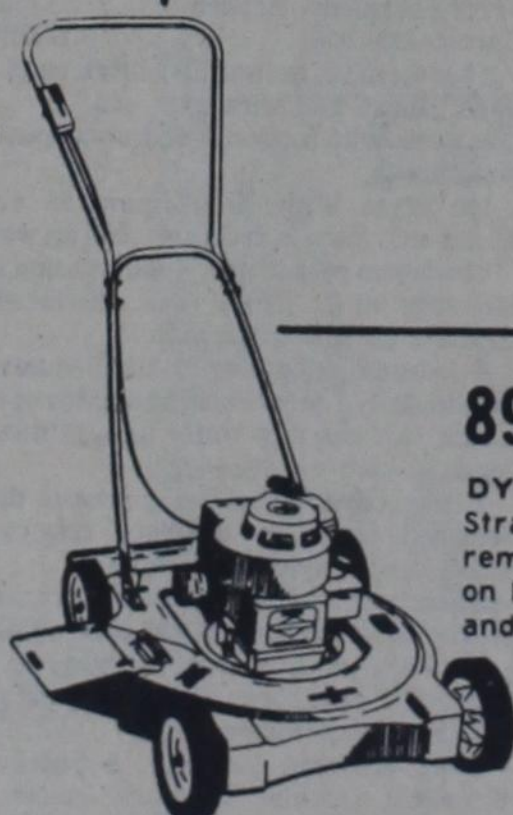
