Roads Again A Topic At **Commissioners Court**

County road conditions and Mineral Wells on Wednesdamage from recent flooding were again discussed at the County Commissioners Court meeting Tuesday, May 29.

At the meeting May 14R.E. King of the Nimrod/Sabanno area of Pct. 3 told the Court that a county road and his driveway were flooded with water diverted from a Big M Oil Company lease.

On Tuesday Miles Moore of the Big M Company and Hershell Wagley, consultant and Dozer Co. operator, came to Court to review the matter.

Moore told the Commissioners that he had not divercted the water from his lease - that he had built two tanks and spent a lot of money to keep the area from flooding.

He stated there were several things he felt caused the problem: There were no ditches on the County road between his oil location and Mr. King's house, and the natural contours of the land caused excess rainfall to run into the area of the King home.

In early May an eight in. rain fell there on top of wet ground, creating an unusual situation, the oil operator said. 'I don't feel like it was my fault the water ran down Mr. King's road,' he added.

Moore also stated that his Company was not running salt · locate nay law prescribing a

L.T. Owen, Commissioner of Pct. 3., said he really didn't want to get the county involved in a private dispute between the Oil Company and Mr. King. But he was concerned about anything that might affect the County road in the area, he stated.

'We didn't have that problem (of flooding) until a fence' row was pushed down,' Owen told Moore.

Moore replied that it also hadn't rained a lot at one time in a long while. He said he thought a ditch along the sioner Billy Bacon for the roads in that area - he had 'inherited' them. He had made some improvement, they said, but conditions were really terrible right now.

They said the school bus cannot pick up children, and then they are counted absent. The mail is often delayed, sick people cannot get to the Doctor, and emgerency service personnel cannot get in.

Bacon said he agreed the road was bad, but it would take all of his budget for 165 miles of road in Pct. 4 just to fix the worst part of the road they were talking about.

'We've helped it some, but it's not fixed,' the Commissioner said. 'When I took over three or four years ago, you could fish in the road - there were perch in it!'

Bacon said he would bring equipment to the washed-out roads as soon as water stopped running down the ditches.

This discussion naturally led to talk of the need for more funds and equipment to take care of the damaged county roads. The Commissioners said they were afraid they wouldn't get near what they needed in Federal Disaster Funds, although Eastland County has been declared a

Disaster Area. They made plans to go to

day, May 30 to meet with Federal Disaster authorities and let local needs be known. County Auditor Ray Pruitt and personnel from his office also planned to attend this

Record Keeping

Eastland County Commissioners Monday learned more about the extensive recordkeeping they must do in order to obtain Federal Emergency Disaster Relief funds.

Frank Ewell, head of the Stephenville Disaster Field Office, held a workshop telling how to meet the Division requirements on daily reports and records. He gave a number of pages of instruction to each Commissioner.

The guidelines stated that each project over \$36,500 will be audited, and final payment will not be made until after the audit. Projects of less than \$36,500 may be randomly selected for audit. 'Project' refers to work done at one

Ewell urged the Commissioners to document all disaster work, since auditors will not approve work that cannot be traced to daily time sheets. These sheets must lists personnel, equipment and mate-

The maximum the government will pay on disaster expenses is about 75 percent, Ewell said. The time period

covered in the disaster declaration is April 15, 1990 to May 29. When documents are in it will take at least two weeks to receive money even on small jobs, Commissioners were told.

On other business, the Commissioners approved a request by Sheriff Dee Hogan to reserve two parking places on the east side of the Courthouse Square for the Sheriff's

Department. These will be used to park and remove prisoners who are scheduled to appear in Court.

The Sheriff told the Commissioners he was experiencing problems in finding a reliable place to park. He said it was a matter of security to bring these people in the Courthouse through a leasttraveled area such as the east ramp of the basement.

Weather

Unsettled weather continues to plague the countryside, with hail, damaging winds and electrical storms wreaking havoc in nearby areas.

Thunderstorms moved across the area during the night of May 29, with .3 inch of rain reported in Rising Star.

Thunderstorms deposited .6 to .7 inch of rain here the night of May 31, followed by others which gropped an additional small amount of rainfall during the day Friday. North of Rising Star .4 inch was reported from those storms. Small hail was re-

ported in some areas. Rising Star got lots of lightning and a trace of rainfall from a storm that bombarded Byrd's Store and May with large hail, causing considerable damage Sunday evening. Limbs were reported twisted from trees in the Sipe Springs area, with a small amount of large hail fallling. Several miles to the north of Rising Star .5 inch of railn fell and .2 inch fell a few miles to the west of town.

The Texas Water Department Board today approved \$319,305 in regional planning grants for areas of the state identified as having critical water supply, wastewater, or flood control problems for which water and sewer plans should be developed.

Projects selected as grant recipients include the following: a \$55,000 regional wastewater planning grant to the Upper Leon River Muniicipal Water District in Comanche, Eastland, Erath and Hamilton counties; a \$134,250 flood protection

Victoria for preparation of a joint city-Army Corps of Engineers feasibility-level flood protection plan; a \$48,055 research grant to the Texas General Land Office to set priorities and build consensus in cooperation with Texas A&M University on beach erosion control, wetlands protection, and public beach access-issues covered by the Texas Coastal Management Plan; and a \$24,000 grant to the Texas





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

Gordon Spot

We have had a number of calls this spring concerning problems with fleas in and around the home. The unusually wet spring is causing rapid increases in flea populations, which were already larger than usual because so many survived the winter.

Fleas tend to be more of an itching nuisance than threat to human health, primarily because the worst diseases they carried have been eradicated.

The chief sources of flea infestation in the home are family pets, but once indoors fleas thrive in floor cracks, carpets, unholstered furniture and pet bedding. Fleas, of course, are abundant outside; larvae burrow into the top surface of the soil.

If flea problems are occurring in the house, the yard, and on the pets, all three must be treated at the same time.

Use only approved products for treating animals. Dusts are preferred because they are generally effective longer. The newer products containing an insect growth regulator can reduce subsequent egg and larval production and can be applied directly to the animal.

Outdoors, treat areas that pets frequent. Use only approved products to thoroughly cover and saturate soil and grass areas. Make sure that application equipment is carefully calibrated to measure dosages exactly.

In the house, thoroughly vacuum or sweep carpets, rugs, furniture, cracks and crevices. Be sure to reach under furniture and along baseboards. Discard the vacuum bag afterwards.

Use a coarse spray (large droplets) in treating likely infested areas. It is always more effective to treat all carpets, furniture and baseboards at one time. After spraying, use total-release aerosal applications to reduce adult fleas.

Additional applications may be needed about three weeks later when populations build from eggs that hatched since the first spraying. Insect growth regulators used with other sprays will inhibit flea growth in early stages and extend control measures.

Insect growth regulators (IGR), such as methopreme, are synthetically derived harmones similar to those found naturally in insects. When applied to the early flea larval stage, IGR inhibit growth and maturation. Insecticides, on the other hand, kill larval and adult fleas by direct poison-

Extension Service publication L-1738 carries a listing of approved insecticides for flea control.

An almost Fairy Tale win came to Bobby Maynard and myself at this past weekends Anglers Choice Team Tournament at Lake Brownwood. This win was probably one of sweetest tournaments for us this year. The final results with the top five finishers were: Bobby Maynard and Terry Wilson five fish 15.92; 2nd Ben Villapando and Luupe Cisneroz three fish 11.55: 3rd McJimsey and Sullivan four fish 9.12; 4th James Fullen and Tom Maynard four fish 8.59 and 5th Robert Brown and Herschal Duncan two fish 7.50. Big bass was won by Bobby Maynard with huge 7.76 lunker. And folkks she was a skinny fish. Had this bass been in normal shape she could have easily weighed 8 1/2 or 9 pounds. Second place big bass another monster went to Ben Villapando with a 7.17 lunker. Some excellent fishing despite adverse condi-

Also from our area the team of Bob Moore and Chuck Burgess came in with one fish 2.62 pounds for 14th place. Giving Eastland County four teams in the top 30 of a very tough field of 63 teams. Way to go guys let's all keep up the good work and make it to the classic in October at Falcon Reservoir. The team of James Fullen and Tom Maynard make a big leap with this event

from 46th all the way up to 25th, a mere 49.71 points away from the classic spot of

'The Big Boo Boo' could and I feel probably will be what the new 10 inch minimum length for crappie in all Texas lakes will be remembered as. Effective September 1, 1990, all crappie must measure 10 inches or larger to be retained. Avid crappie anglers from across the state meet with Parks and Wildlife Department officials in an attempt to head this move off, but to no avail.

The primary argument the T.P. & W. gave was to allow crappie to reach spawning size, which according to officials is normally around 10 inches. As most of your crappie hounds have seen crappie in the 5 to 7 inch range will normally poses eggs. If the rapid reproduction of the crappie could be slowed other than harvesting smaller fish a 10 inch limit would be nice. But these fish if left to spawn till 10 inches or longer I fear will eventually over populate

our lakes with stunted fish. One example I can use is Lake Leon, during a past drought anglers harvested a lot of very small crappie 5 to 8 inches during the spring. That fall and winter and all next year Leon experienced some of the best quality crappie fishing in the state. A one pound crappie was average in the annual river runs. Anglers became selective about the size of fish they would keep, not removing any small fish and now we are back to a lake full of runts or wonder fish. A wonder fish is one that it's a wonder he wasn't big enough

Hopefully myself along with a lot of Texas anglers are wrong and this program will be a big boost. With a track record as good as the T.P. &W. has they must be doing something right. The past 10 years Texas has been brought to the front of the pack in wildlife resources and its thanks to our Parks and Wildlife Department's fine work.

Till next week remember its National Fishing Week, let's all introduce a friend to the Outdoors especially 'Fishing Outdoors.'

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
