To the Citizens of Rising Star

When are you going to need the ambulance to get you to hospital care in a hurry? The ambulance is one of the most vital and important vehicles in this community, and is used at any given moment when called. However, the ambulance is a motor vehicle just like your own car, and it does need to be kept in the best care and repair possible because of it's necessity in serving the sick and injured. The maintenance of the ambulance and the supplies needed to care for the ones being transported are paid for strictly by donations from people in this community, there are no set charge nor is there any bills sent to people or families of people transported. This is a very important service to this community because none of us know at

what time we will need to call for the ambulance. Donations are needed badly and we are reminding you, the residents of Rising Star community, to please remember to help where help is really needed. More than 50% of the people transported have never made any donation toward ambulance service, yet, most of the donations received have come from people, many of them elderly, who have not used the ambulance service--isn't that amazing! No one wants to think about having to use the ambulance service for themselves or their families, but keep these things in mind: liability insurance costs \$50 a month, a repair bill for the air conditioner was \$208, there is still \$200 owed for the ambulance itself, our supplies are

short and many things are needed immediately, the oxygen tanks must be kept filled, as about one-third of the transported persons require oxygen. We desperately need a one-man cot (stretcher)-one that can be operated by one person, so that two people can make a call-a driver and an attendant. Last, but not least, the ambulance uses gas and tires in order to run, just as your own cars do and this, as you well know, does not come cheap. We have made 42 ambulance calls since January, 1981 and the year is just half over. 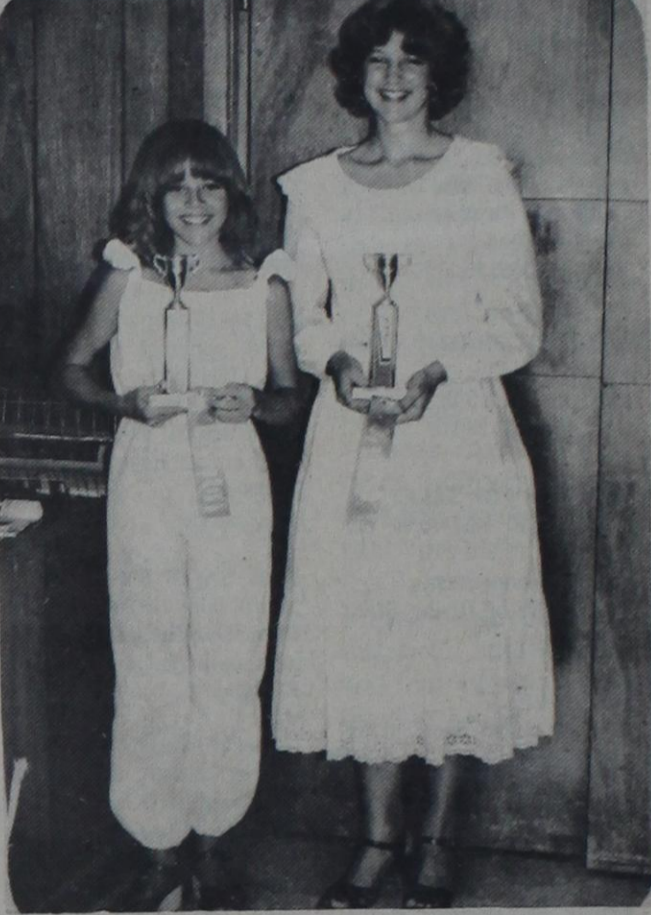

Hammock Class Begins Monday

Beginning Monday June 22 through Wednesday June 24th, there will be a lazy day hammock workshop in the Homemaking cottage. Classes will begin at 9:00 a.m.

For ease of completion, the following materials should be collected before that time for each double hammock: Braided cotton clothesline No. 6, 600 ft. (found at Sears or other large stores), two 1" dowels 3-4 feet long; 2 staves 1x1x65" hardwood such as oak works best. (If unavailable, a 2 x 6 yellow pine 65" long can be ripped for the staves), 2 metal

rings 2 1/2 inch diameter, cadium or zinc-coated if available, large hardware or marine supply stores), one piece 6" x 25" piece of beaverboard, plywood or equivalent, nails, one 6" to 8" several 2" medium sandpaper, one sheet, chisel, hammer, tin or plastic cup 2" diameter at bottom and larger at the top, 2 hammock hooks with screws attached; Tie ropes for installing, 1/2 inch drill for making holes on the staves.

Failure to Change Address a "Hidden Cost" of Moving

"Americans are receiving more mail-important mail-than at any time in postal history," says Rising Star Postmaster, Don Boyett. "Yet, when it comes time to call the movers, one of the most overlooked of all procedures is notifying the proper parties of the change of address. In addition to the personal expense and inconvenience to the homeowner and mailers, undeliverable as addressed mail has become one of the hidden costs of mailing."

Postmaster Boyett says the Postal Service spends about \$550 million a year to handle an estimated 4.5 billion pieces of mail that is undeliverable. "This is expense that ultimately ends up within the price of postage stamps, and worse, it is unnecessary. Change of address is a simple matter today."

The Postal Service has been urging its customers to inform all correspondents promptly of address changes at least 30 days before a scheduled move. With an assist from moving companies, real estate agents and others, the Postal Service distributes from ten to 16 million change of address kits every year to make it easier to notify correspondents and publishers.

"The primary strength of this program is that everyone benefits from it," says Postmaster Boyett. "The family that is moving benefits because their mail continues to arrive promptly, stores and other business correspondents can avoid

billing problems, and the Postal Service is able to process the mail more efficiently and at less cost."

Postmaster Boyett says the Postal Service is now launching a new effort to get change of address kits into circulation. A direct mail campaign is asking commercial organizations such as truck rental firms, moving companies and real estate firms and others who deal with people on the move, to help distribute the Postal Service's handy Change of Address kit.

The kit contains convenient cards for notifying the postmaster, publishers, businesses, doctors, state and local agencies and utilities. The kit also includes a checklist of groups and individuals to be contacted prior to a move.

The direct mailing campaign to commercial organizations includes a two-part reply card which firms can use to order supplies of the kits from their local post office.

"We know that peak moving dates fall between June and August, and as we approach this season, it is important for anyone planning to move to use one of the kits. All they have to do is ask for one, either from one of the participating service companies or at the post office," Postmaster Boyett says.

"We are all aware of the need to economize and seek more efficient ways to use our resources," Boyett says. "Well, here's a place where the effort can start at home. The movers can help themselves, their correspondents and the Postal Service save more than \$550 million

a year that we simply don't have to waste."

Dumping Trash Illegal

Article 4477-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, "Dumping Solid Waste on Property or into Water" is one of several statutes which may be used in cases of unauthorized dumping. This statute states that any person who dumps or disposes of trash, junk, garbage, refuse, unsightly matter or other solid waste on public highways, rights-of-ways, on public or private property, or into any inland or coastal water of Texas without the consent of the owner, his agent or public official in charge, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$15.00 nor more than \$200.00. Every law enforcement officer of this State and its subdivisions shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this statute.

Paragraph A-2.5 of the enclosed Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations covers Article 6674v-2, VTCS, "Dumping of Refuse Near Highway," which may also be used. This statute states that no municipal corporation, private corporation, firm or person shall dump, deposit or leave any refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on or within 300 yards of any highway in the State.

As indicated in paragraph H-1.1, it is the policy of the Department to encourage local enforcement where effective, however, the Department will initiate enforcement action when local efforts have not caused compliance within a reasonable

period of time. Paragraph H-1.2 of this Department's regulation covers Section 8 of the "Solid Waste Disposal Act" which could also be used if necessary. This act states that no person may cause, suffer, allow or permit the storage, handling, or disposal of solid waste, or the use or operation of a disposal site in violation of this Act or the rules, regulations, or orders of the Department. The penalty for offenders convicted of violating this Act is not less than \$50.00 or more than \$1000.00 for each act or violation and for each day of violation. The use of this Act would be of a civil nature and could require that this Department be a party to the suit.

Local law enforcement officers stated that this has become a real problem within the last few months. Please be advised that this is an unlawful act and individuals can be fined or jailed.

DISEASE ATTACKS ST. AUGUSTINEGRASS By Gordon Woolam

Recently a St. Augustinegrass lawn was investigated and found to be infected with Gray Leaf Spot. This is an important leaf disease of St. Augustinegrass caused by a Fungus, *Piricularia grisea*. This disease will also less frequently attack Bermuda grass. This is a particular threat due to all the recent wet weather.

The disease is recognized by irregular brown to gray

spots on the leaf blades. The common symptom is the depressed blue-gray centers of the spots that have irregular brown margins surrounded by a ring of chlorotic tissue. Lesions may also occur on the sheath and spike of infected plants.

The disease develops rapidly with abundant moisture and temperature from 70 degrees to 80 degrees F. Disease severity increases with increased Nitrogen fertilization. Newly sprigged or rapidly growing grass is more susceptible than well-established.

Gray Leaf Spot control includes watering during the day so foliage will not remain wet overnight and avoiding excessive Nitrogen fertilization. Effective control of Gray Leaf Spot can be accomplished with applications of Fungicide, including Maneb, Captan, or Chlorothalonil (Daconil).

Home Gardeners need to be more aware of diseases because of the unseasonably late rains in conjunction with the warmer temperatures. Tomatoes are particularly susceptible to several diseases.

In addition to disease problems, Tomatoes grown in less than ideally drained soil may also be suffering from weather related problems. Dry weather in the early growing season forced the root systems deep. Recent heavy rains have saturated the deeper soil pore spaces displacing the oxygen. This depletion of ox-

ygen followed by the hot sunny days which succeeded the rainy spell resulted in many wilting Tomato plants. Hoeing or cultivating around the plant base may help to dry the soil out.

Two of the more common fungal diseases which are enhanced by abundant soil are Fusarium Wilt caused by *Fusarium oxysporum* and Southern Blight caused by *Sclerotium rolfsii*.

Fusarium Wilt is characterized by drooping plants with wilted lower leaves.

The plants show a loss of green color followed by wilting and death. Often leaves only on one side of the stem turn yellow at first. The stem of wilted plants show no sign of soft-rot but when cut lengthwise, the stem will show a dark brown discoloration. The fungus is most active between 80 degrees and 90 degrees F.

Control may be obtained by using disease-free

transplants and growing resistant varieties.

Southern Blight, a disease familiar to peanut farmers, begins with the dropping of leaves similar to other wilts. Stems should decay of outer tissues at the ground level. Frequently, they are covered by a white webby mass in which are embedded numerous small, light-brown moisture and warm temperatures for growth. Control may be obtained by granular application of Terrachlor.

There are numerous other small, light-brown structures about the size of a cabbage seed. The fungus requires abundant moisture and warm temperatures for growth. Control may be obtained by granular application of Terrachlor.

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NEWS OF SCIENCE

Life without a heartbeat is now possible, thanks to a new type of blood pump developed by an Austrian scientist.

Professor Johann Navratil has been conducting research in Vienna on the problems of the "artificial heart," for the past 12 years. He recently disclosed his development of a pump which can serve as at least a temporary substitute for the heart.

After a heart failure, medication often is not able to restart the heart. Professor Navratil's mechanical pump can maintain blood circulation, enabling the heart to rest and heal completely.

So far, the device has been used successfully only in experiments with calves. The laboratory animals have lived for up to eight weeks while the device performed the functions of the heart.

Professor Navratil is working with membrane pumps which, he believes, could lead to development of a functioning artificial heart.

An Austrian scientist has developed a new type of blood pump which performs normal functions of the heart.

Sipe Springs Resident Buried

Willie Jeff Price, 77-year old resident of the Sipe Springs Community, Route 5, Comanche, was fatally shot Monday night, June 8th at a De Leon residence, and his 35-year old son-in-law, Keith Southerland, is reported by officers in a guarded condition from a gunshot wound in the abdomen. Sutherland is being treated at the De Leon Hospital.

District Attorney Leslie Vance said Price and Sutherland were both shot at 305 W. Ayers in De Leon, where Sutherland and his wife, Juanita Joy, daughter of Price, had been residing for a few weeks. The woman and her children, Vance said, apparently were moving out of the house when what he described as a "family squabble" ended in gunfire.

District attorney Vance reported Price was struck in the forehead by a Magnum bullet from a 22 calibre rifle, allegedly fired by Sutherland, while Sutherland, Vance said, was struck in the abdomen by a short

bullet from a 22 rifle supposedly fired by Price. Price was pronounced dead shortly after he was carried to the De Leon Hospital. His body was sent to Dallas for autopsy by order of the Justice Peace Precinct No.5 L.T. Lewis. Nowlin Funeral Home, De Leon, transported the body to Dallas. The District Attorney said statements from several friends and relatives who were present in the house and on the premises when the gunfire erupted.

Vance said he filed a charge of murder against Sutherland Monday night in Justice Lewis' Court. Judge Lewis set bond for Sutherland at \$100,000. On Tuesday the District Attorney withdrew the murder complaint and filed a capital murder complaint against Sutherland, asking that bond be denied the defendant. The capital murder complaint alleges Sutherland committed murder in the act of burglary.

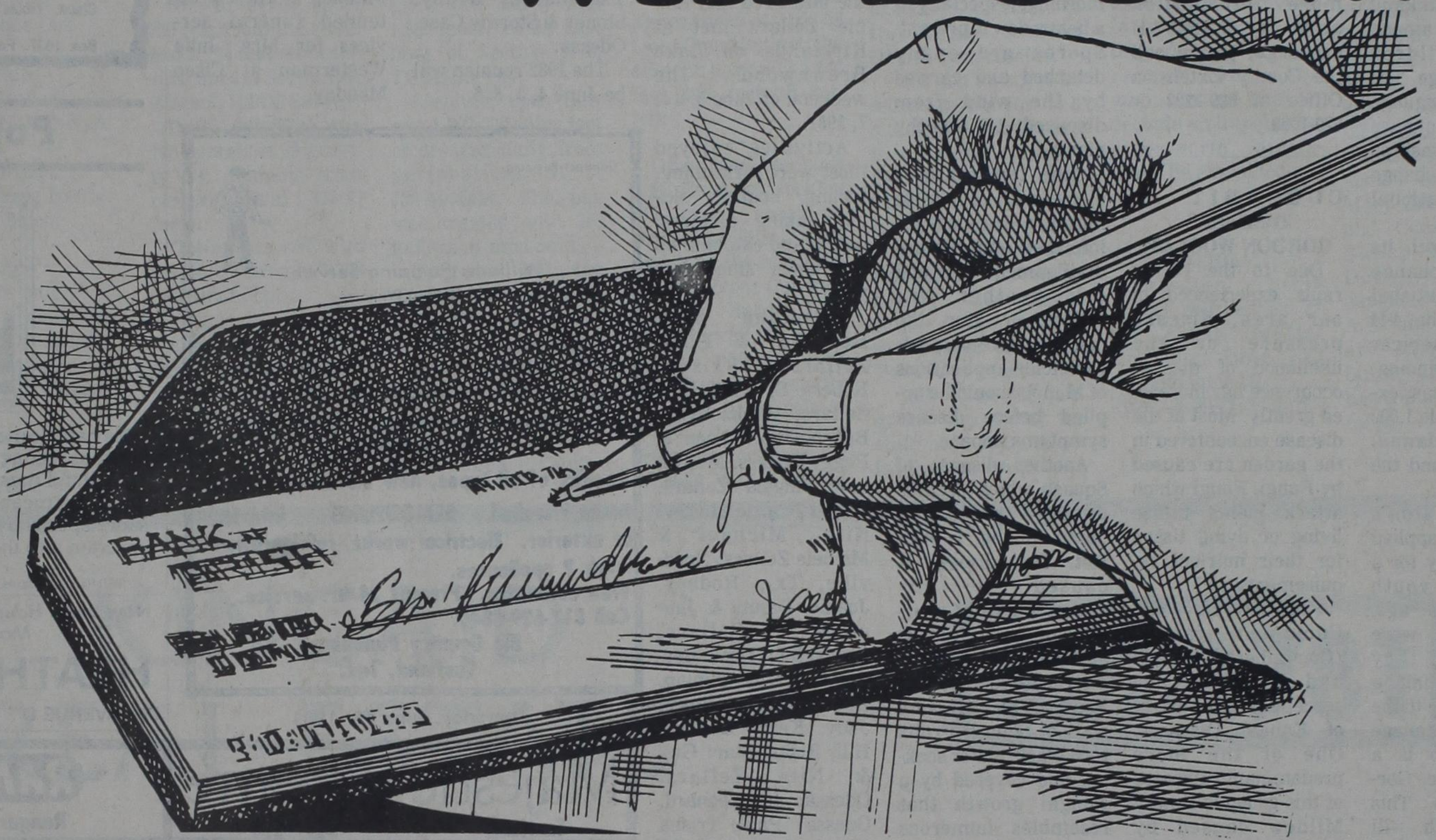

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JAPANESE YOUTH TO VISIT GORMAN

The R.C. Harrington family of Gorman will have a special guest in their home this summer - a teenage Japanese youth. This young man is part of the 4-H/LABO exchange program established in Texas several years ago.

In April of 1966, LABO Teaching Information Center was organized with the purpose of creating an awakening of international understanding and awareness among Japanese children through language. The goal of its language education is to enhance human relationships and cultural exchange in the international community.

In keeping with its goals, an exchange program was initiated in 1972 with the 4-H Clubs of America. From this beginning, the program has expanded to include 1,000 people from Hawaii, Korea, Japan and the U.S.

The Harrington's from Gorman applied as a host family for a Japanese youth several months ago. Recently they were notified that they would be hosting a young man close to the age of their teenage son, Olin, who is a member of the Gorman 4-H Club. This Japanese youth will stay approximately a month (from mid-July to mid-August) with this local family.

This will not be Eastland County's first experience with the LABO program. In 1979 the Ronnie White and John Kidd family hosted three Japanese youth. Last year, Robin White, from Eastland 4-H, traveled to Japan for a month to stay with her LABO exchange, Tomoko Uchida. Eastland County is fortunate to have this international experience with Japanese youth for the past few years. CUCURBIT DISEASES

GORDON WOOLAM
Due to the recent rains experienced in our area, disease pressure or the likelihood of disease occurrence has increased greatly. Most of the disease encountered in the garden are caused by Fungi. Fungi which attack plants utilize living or dying tissue for their nutrient requirements.

Plants in the Cucurbit family (Cucumbers, Squash and Melons) are susceptible to a variety of Fungal Diseases. One of the more predominant diseases of this group is Downy Mildew caused by *Pseudoperonospora Cubensis*. This disease is characterized by angular yellow spots

appearing on the upper side of the leaf. During periods of high moisture, the under side of the leaves, opposite of the yellow spots, becomes covered by a grayish white mold.

This mold is actually the fruiting structures and spores of the Fungus. The spores are the reproductive structures or "seeds" of the Fungus. The spores are more noticeable early in the morning, especially if a heavy dew is present. Spores are easily detached and carried by the wind from diseased to healthy plants.

Cool temperatures along with available moisture are ideal for infection and disease development. Hot and dry weather will reduce or stop the disease development. Fungicide applications of Maneb should be applied before disease symptoms appear.

Another disease of Squash which occurs during prolonged damp weather is *Wet-Rot*. This disease is caused by *Choanephora Cucurbitarum*. The Fungus is usually confined to the Blossom end of the Fruit. The Blossom ends of Squash Fruits turn black, water soaked, and covered by a Fungal growth that resembles numerous black-headed pins. Under favorable conditions the Fungus may destroy the entire

fruit. Diseased Fruits should be removed and Benlate Fungicide applied.

Always follow label instructions for rates and time between application and Harvest. For additional information regarding this and other pests, contact the County Extension Office.

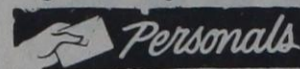

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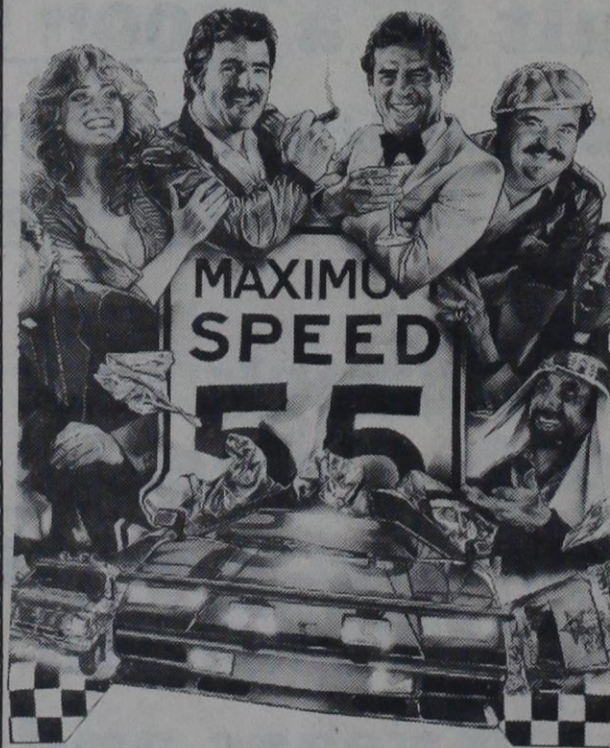

Screwworm Cases Found in Sheep

Two screwworm cases have been confirmed in sheep in the Marfa area, reports Dr. John Holcombe, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

"We don't want to be alarmists but this is a situation that will need to be watched closely," Dr. Holcombe said. The two cases were found in lambs on a ranch between Shafter and Marfa in Presidio County. This makes four confirmed screwworm cases for Texas this year.

"All livestock producers throughout the state need to be mindful that we could have

problems again with screwworms. We all need to redouble our efforts to be on the watch for suspected screwworm cases. Producers need to submit suspected samples to the fly lab at Mission," Dr. Holcombe said.

A variety of measures are being taken in the Marfa area to contain any further outbreaks.

This is the normal time for screwworms to make their northward migration, and recent rains and warm, humid weather provide an impetus for screwworm infestations, he explained.

1980 Texas Crop Sales Generally Stable

College Station—While the 1980 drought devastated crop yields in Texas, cash receipts remained generally stable due to higher prices.

Although final figures are not yet in, Texas Agricultural Extension Service estimates show cash receipts from crops at about \$3.8 billion, down only slightly from 1979. Total receipts from all agricultural commodities for 1980 are pegged at just over \$10.1 billion, almost the same as the previous year.

"These cash receipts, however, don't show the severity of damage that production levels underwent or the squeeze on net income," says Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist in marketing.

"Drought and higher production costs have placed serious financial hardships on many farmers. Young farmers and those depending heavily on credit for capital are under considerable financial strain. Record-high interest rates have added to the burden."

According to Anderson, hot dry conditions severely damaged crop production and caused subsequent price increases.

"Prices went up because of the small amount of crops that were available after the summer," explains

Anderson. Despite weather problems, last year's crop receipts should have an agribusiness impact of about \$16 billion on the Texas economy, he says.

As far as receipts from different commodities are concerned, cotton alone brought in \$1.4 billion.

The South Plains of Texas brought in the bulk of cotton receipts with an estimated \$665 million. South Texas (mainly the Rio Grande Valley) had the second highest cotton receipts at \$163 million.

Wheat and grain sorghum ran a close race for second place among crop sales at about \$450 million each.

Wheat, a winter and spring crop, generally escaped the drought's wrath. The Panhandle area led the state in value of wheat produced with \$164 million while North Central Texas was second with a wheat crop of more than 185 million.

The Panhandle also boasted the highest cash value from grain sorghum in 1980 at \$174 million. Second was the Coastal Bend with a sorghum crop valued at \$116 million.

Corn ranked fourth on the list of estimated cash receipts from crops for 1980, totalling about \$349 million. Top producing areas were the South Plains at \$213 million and the

Panhandle at \$76 million.

Rice ranked fifth in estimated cash receipts, totalling more than \$274 million. The Upper Coast is the state's major rice-producing area with receipts of \$260 million. The remainder of the crop is grown in the Coastal Bend.

Other crops that contributed much to 1980 agricultural receipts were vegetables, about \$250 million; nursery stock, \$225 million; soybeans, \$104 million; peanuts, \$83 million; and hay, \$45 million.

Promising Blessing: Unfortunately, many Christians of all ages have avoided reading or studying the book of Revelation because they have felt it was too difficult to understand. Comparatively few preachers teach from it, and it really has been, as Daniel the prophet said so long ago, a "sealed" book. This reluctance to plumb the depths of God's great prophetic plan is the work of the enemy of believers, Satan himself. He has more to lose than anyone else by people learning about the details of his demise. He doesn't want anyone to know more about the heaven to be gained and the hell to be shunned. Twice this revelation of Jesus promises its readers and "heeders" a special blessing. No other book in the Bible does this. The fact that you've read this book means that God is promise-bound to bless you in a special way. And this blessing is compounded in the proportion that you heed and respond to the message of the book of Revelation. The revealing angel spoke to John with the words of Christ so often that John, in a

moment of impulse and honest confusion, falls down at his feet and begins to worship him.

But the angel, recognizing the true motivation behind John's gesture, admonishing him not to do it and then does a very gracious thing, He puts himself on the same level with John, calling himself a fellow servant of John and his prophetic brothers, and then he magnanimously includes in that prestigious company everyone of every era who reads the record of this vision and heeds it. The angel made an obscure statement to John that carries an ominous message. He said, "He who is unjust, let him be unjust still; and he who is filthy, let him be filthy still; and he who is righteous, let him be righteous still; and he who is holy, let him be holy still, Revelation 22:11). The point here is that a person who reads this prophetic revelation and rejects its warning confirms his alienation from God. If he's unjust now, and dies that way, he will remain so throughout eternity. If he's morally filthy when he checks out of this life, he'll be filthy for eons and eons to come. There is no second chance to repent or reform after death. IF the love and grace

of God doesn't produce a changed heart in this life, even a sampling of the horrors of eternal damnation won't cause men to repent. Even if someone could come back from the dead to warn men of hell, it would not produce a change of heart, Jesus made this very clear in the true story He told about a beggar named Lazarus and the rich man. There is a Heaven and a Hell, the rich man was tormented in those flames of an eternal Hell.

FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

At the end of World War II my home town of Gatesville, Texas had five motion picture theaters, but within one year there were only two theaters open. Today there is only one. What happened? The population of Gatesville did not decrease, but increased. You know what happened! Television became a reality for most people, and they stayed at home to watch Television. The movie theaters had to close because of the lack of people buying movie tickets. There is no comparison between and movie theater and the Church, but it is true that many people contribute to the ministry of the Church only when they attend worship services. The non

attendance and non support of the Church raises two very important questions. First: Why are you being unfaithful in your ministry? Secondly: Why are you being unfaithful in the ministry of the Body of Christ, the Church? We Methodists believe in the Protestant belief of the Priesthood of all believers. That means that each member of the Church is a minister. The Apostle Paul wrote in Ephesians 4:11 & 12, "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets, and some evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." You the members are the Ministers and you have many different functions to fulfill according to the talents God has given to you. I am called to be a Pastor and I try to the best of my ability with the talents that God has given me to fulfill my ministry. May I look for you in Church Sunday? May God depend on you to be in Ministry each day within our community?

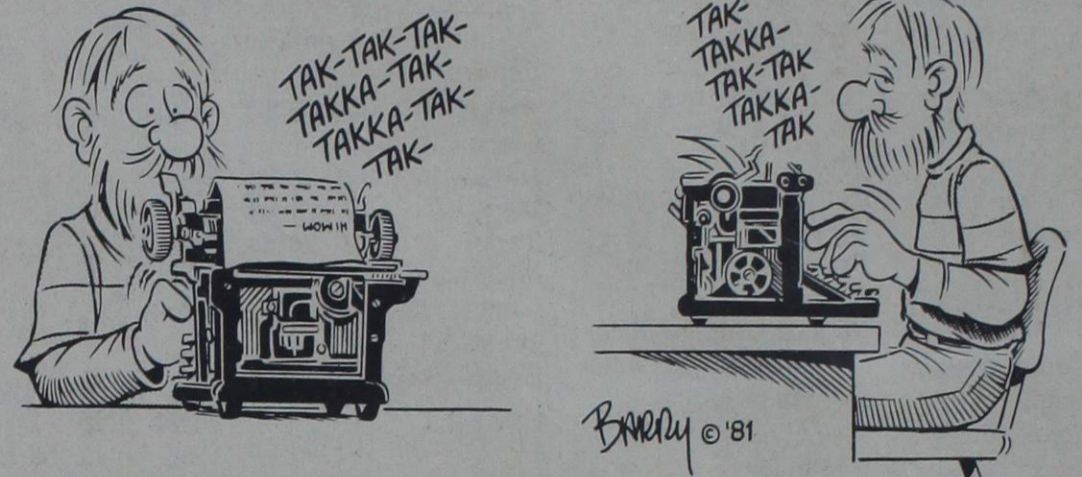

Long Branch Homecoming

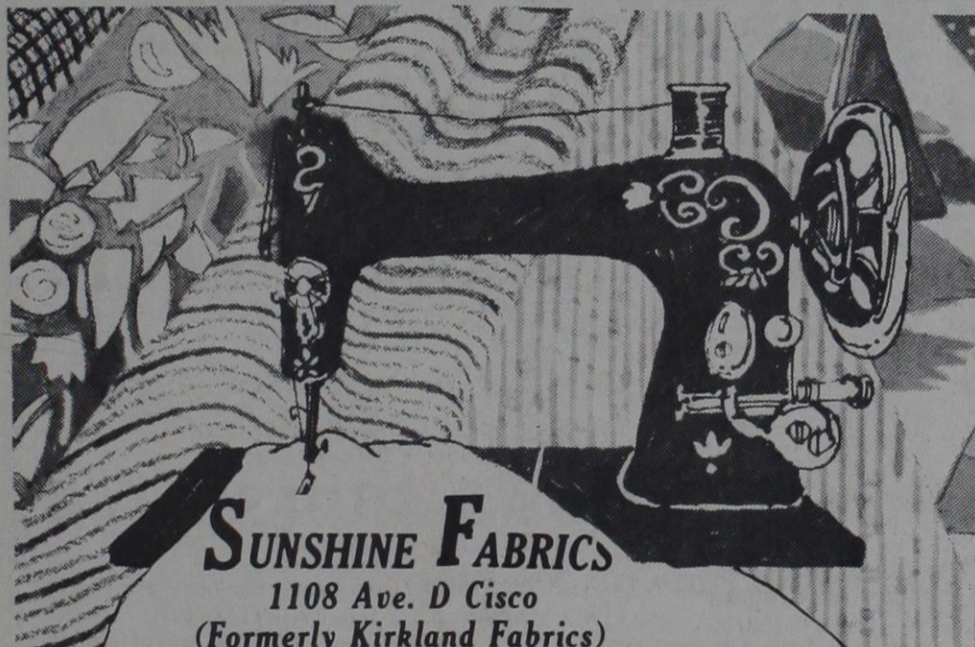

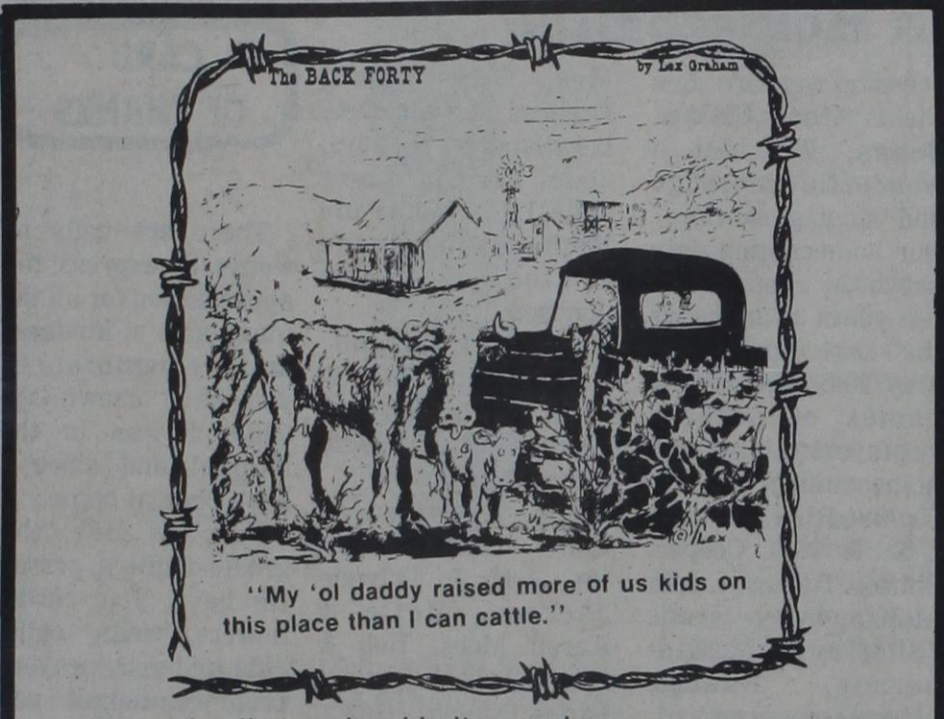
