

Students of Rising Star High school will have an opportunity at 1:00 p.m. Friday, May 8, 1981 to see for themselves distance required to stop a car in an emergency, while participating in a Farm Bureau sponsored traffic safety program, according to Frank Gray, Drivers Education Instructor.

The program, in two parts, will be given under the direction of Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau.

Mr. Bullard rides in his specially equipped car with each of the drivers. The safety belts are used during each test. During each test, the equipment signals to driver to make a panic stop and marks that exact spot on the street. Two more spots are marked; (1) where the brakes are first applied and (2) where the car comes to an exact and complete stop. Students and teachers will get a "panorama view" from their safety vantage point. Student assistants, using a steel tape, measure the reaction and braking distances in exact feet and inches. CONTROL OF CUT-WORMS

This time of year insect problems seem to come along one right after another. One current problem which is troubling Homeowners is Cutworms. Cutworms are larval forms or caterpillars which develop into a variety of moths. Several species exist in Texas.

Cutworm larvae usually appear as dingy, grayish-black smooth "Worms" that curl into a ball or tight "C-shape" when disturbed. The larvae have chewing mouth parts and damage plants by their feeding activity.

Cutworms attack almost every garden vegetable, fruit tree, lawn grass and ornamental plant in the home garden and landscape. Seeding plants be turned under and

particularly vulnerable to Cutworms since the main steam is tender and can be easily severed.

There are four distinct groups of Cutworms based on habitat and feeding habits: 1) Subterranean Cutworms, 2) Tunnel Dwellers, 3) Surface Feeders, and 4) Climbing Cutworms. Subterranean Cutworms feed almost entirely below the soil's surface on roots or underground stems.

Tunnel dwellers build and live in tunnels. This Cutworm cuts tender plants at the soil surface and pulls them into the tunnel to devour them.

Surface feeders are most active during the night when they cut off small plants at or near the soil surface and feed on the plant. During the day the worms either hide in the soil or under mulch or surface trash.



Check Seeding Rates, Skip-Row Planting

Due to the increased cost of planting seed, peanut growers need to give particular attention to identifying optimum planting rates as well as evaluating skip-row planting.

"Many peanut growers are concerned about the high cost of planting seed," points out Dr. Ashley Lovell, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Planting seed prices at \$1.25 per pound represents 20 percent of the projected total cost of production per acre, assuming a 45-pound per acre planting rate for dryland Spanish peanuts. That's double the percentage cost for

seed last year." With these high seed costs, Lovell encourages growers to take a hard look at "Traditional" planting rates to determine if optimum yields could be achieved through adjusting planting rates. "For instance, if 45 pounds of seed per acre is sufficient for optimum dryland yields, then planting the traditional 60 to 70 pounds is economically indefensible," notes economist. However, the final decision must include numerous factors, such as germination,

which determine the stand of mature peanut plants.

As far as solid vs. skip-row planting (two rows in and one out) is concerned, Lovell says limited research by the Texas Agricultural experiment Station at Stephenville shows lower yields with skiprow plantings, which also implies lower production costs. These reduced costs result from reduced planting seed rates, foliar fungicides, insecticides, allotment lease, custom drying and interest on operating capital. "Skip-row Spanish

peanuts have a projected preharvest cost of \$158 per acre compared to \$188 for solid plantings. This lower preharvest cost as well as a potentially higher income over variable costs from skip-row peanuts offers possibilities for Central Texas farmers, who may at least wish to evaluate the practices on a small-scale basis," believes Lovell.

Adjusting economic optimum seeding rate per acre and evaluating the skip-row planting pattern can help growers cut costs without sacrificing profits, contends economist.

Grain Embargo Lift Good For Texas Farmers

Lifting of the U.S. grain embargo against Russia is good news to Texas farmers, maintains an economist in marketing and policy

Dr. Ron Knutson pointed out that with the wheat harvest less than two months away, this move should provide added market

price increases in the range of 5 to 7 percent. The longer term impacts, while more important, are more uncertain," Knutson, who earlier had served as a member of President Reagan's transi-

tion team, he said. "Under the longterm agreement, if the Soviet Union wants to buy over 8 million metric tons of wheat and feedgrains, it must consult with U.S. officials." he added.

This process of consultation or negotiation will now begin, and involves:

1. Additional quantities of wheat and feedgrains that we will allow the Soviets to purchase through Sept.

2. Development of a new long-term trade agreement specifyng minimum purchase by the Soviets over a period of up to five

3. The quantities the Soviet Union is advised it can purchase after Sept. 30, over and above the minimums specified in the longterm agreement.

"Another uncertainty is just how much grain the Soviets might want to buy from the U.S. after the embargo experience. Feedgrains and soy-

beans should be no problem in this regard. World supplies are tight, and we supply about 80 percent of this market," he said.

Wheat is more uncertain. Argentina, Australia and Canada already have trade agreements with Soviets. The French also want to sell. The wheat market will like-

SSI Resources

There has been an important change in

the law concerning the resource rules for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program.

Before passage of Public Law 96-611 there was no legal restriction against a person transferring ownership, or giving away, a resource to become eligible for SSI payments.

The change in the law requires that the market value of any resource disposed of without appropiate payment be counted for 24 months following the transfer.

SSI is designed for the aged and disabled needy. There are needs tests for both income and resources.

The rules resources can exclude the value of the home, personal effects, and an automobile. After

the exclusions, an individual is allowed \$1500 in resources; a couple is allowed \$2250. Those above these limits are ineligible for

Before the change in the law the otherwise eligible might find themselves qualified for SSI because they owned a resource such as a parcel of land. Ineligibility was overcome by giving the resource away or selling it at a greatly reduced price. These transactions most often involved the applicant's child or another close relative. Now, the market value of the resource will continue to be counted for 24 months following this kind of disposal.

It is very important for people potentially eligible for SSI to

understand this change in the law. Disposal of a resource to gain entitlement to SSI could result in the loss of the resource, ineligibility for SSI and, as a result, extreme financial hardship.

The Social Security Administration advises any person who is considering transfer in ownership of any resource in an attempt to qualify for SSI to call the Social Security office for a complete explanation and understanding of this law before doing so. 

By Viola M. Payne The Windfall Tax Seminar held by the West Central Oil and Gas Association in Abilene on the afternoon of Apr. 29th was unique in several ways. For one thing, this group was not discussing how to obtain money from the Government - quite the opposite. This meeting was concerned with information as to how citizens could attempt to recover some of their own funds which had been taken from them by legislation. For W.C.T. Oil and Gas is one of several organizations in the southwest which has opposed the Windfall Profit Tax since its first inception by President Carter and the National Congress. And the Tax

like Ol' Man River, just keeps rolling along - into another Administration.

About 300 Oil Company operators and workers (mostly from Independents) and Oil Royalty owners gathered in the Civic Center for this two-hour program. The audience represented a cross-section of persons from a wide area of North Central Texas, with almost as many women attending as men. Although the material presented was often complicated, the audience was very attentive.

Glen Mitchell, President of the W.C.T. Oil and Gas Association, opened the program by introducing a panel of financial experts from the Firm of Ernst and Whinney. This included analyists, accountants, and persons experienced in oil and gas audit work. Most of these men had come from Dallas, Austin, and San Antonio.

This Firm had prepared two comprehensive books (more than 100 pages) on the Windfall Profit Tax, and these were available to the attendees without charge. The material in these books was amplified and explained by films and talks from the auditorium stage.

The main speaker from Ernst and Whinney was a person around 40 yrs. old named Francis Durant, who deciphered facts and figures with quite a bit of zest. Mr. Durant occasionally broke away from his text to tell a good Cajun joke from his home state of Louisiana, or to express his opinion on the unbelievable complications of he Windfall Profit Tax.

"You would have to call the Windfall Profit Tax an Excise Tax," he remarked. "There is nothing else to call

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it! We have lived with it, through many trials and tribulations for one year, and all of us are more confused than a year ago! The Tax is a computation based on four figures - that sounds simple - but it is a monumental task to get the four figures!

'So all we can do is orient ourselves toward practical problems, such as what is being overlooked when we file for refunds.

'Some people say that a little knowledge is a dangerous thing. But I think even a little knowledge is better than none!"

He went on to explain how difficult it is for the I.R.S. to administer this Tax law, and how requests for refunds may be impacted upon this Agency.

"What I say this afternoon may sound unreasonable," Durant commented aside, "But this ---- law is unreasonable to start with!"

He explained that much extra record keeping had been imposed on Independent Operators by the complications of the Law-record keeping which is causing the cost of energy to go even higher. It also puts the producers in someone else's hands, with the ball (and money) in the oil purchasers courts. The result is that millions of dollars are being drained away from oil pro-

ducing areas - up as high as 45 per cent of what the Independent Operator makes, and from 30 to 70 per cent of the Royalty Owners checks. Some of the purchasers are increasing the tax in 1981, and the manner in which they compute it is often erratic.

After much discussion of what the oil operator could do to apply for his refunds, the Speaker turned to the plight of Royalty Owners. Their oil, along with that of the Operator's is classified into three Tiers:

1. Commonly called "old Oil", 70 per cent taxation.

2. "Stripper Oil", taxed at 60 percent.

3. Newly discovered oil, heavy oil, and incremental tertiary oil, taxed at 30 per-

Oil which is exempt from Windfall Profit Taxation falls into five types: production from qualified governmental, or charitable interests, exempt Indian oil, "Front-end" oil, and Alaskan oil.

For the year 1980 a stopgap measure of \$1,000 credit to individual Royalty owners is in effect. Those who owe income taxes have probably already filed for this credit against their taxes. Those who do not owe any income tax still have until June 15, 1981 to file a claim for a refund. Unless this claim is filed, the overpaid taxes will not be returned to the owner. So all the burden is on the citizen to reclaim his money Anyone filing for a refund must secure proper forms from the I.R.S. or the Company which purchased his oil. The purchasing Company should also furnish an accounting for the oil bought during 1980. Some Companies have been lax on this matter, while others have been quite detailed.

The persons conducting the Seminar had no information on what might take the place of the \$1,000 credit allowed for 1980 anything. The only hopeful possibility centered around two bills pending in Washington one in the House and one in the Senate. The House Bill is sponsored by Charles Stenholm, Kent Hance and Tom Loeffler, and the Senate Bill is sponsored by Lloyd Benson and John Tower. These Bi-Partisan Bills are very similar, and each would exempt an Operator 1,000 barrels a day. This would also assist the Royalty owners, for only a small percentage of Royalty holders draw checks of more than \$500.00 per month.

The Seminar closed with the thought that a difficult time lies ahead concerning the Windfall Profit Tax. And Illustration:


Be careful, and proceed with caution - or create your "work-at-home" business, advises Linda Mc-Cormack, a family resource management specialist.

In many "work-at-home" cases, the potential 'employee" or "investor" (you) is asked to send a membership or registeration fee to a company "for more information" or "to obtain the materials necessary to start the job," Mrs. McCormack notes.

Too often, these "job materials" and "investment secrets" turn out to be simply promotional literature not work, she says.






