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

Fire School Lessons Will Be Shared

The six members of the Rising Star Rural Fire Department sent to Abilene Area Fire Prevention School last week plan to share what they learned with other members of the department at upcoming training ses-

Those attending the training school, sponsored by Abilene Fire Department, State Firemen & Fire Marhals Association of

Texas and Midwest Texas Firemen & Fire Marshals Association, were Ted Murphree, Willie Vandivere, Donnett Nall, Bruce Rivers, David Curtis and Billy Nall. The local firefighters at-

tended three-hour courses for four nights last week. Studies and training inlcuded hose handling, incident

command, airplane crash

and rescue and extinguishing pit, transport tanker, butane, liquified petroleum gas, natural gas, Christmas tree, car and house fires. They were told how to deal with accidents involving hazardous materials being transported and learned to operate and work with beathing apparatus.

Both firefighters interviewed felt that the school was well worth the time they volunteered. They agreed they learned much that could be shared at the monthly training sessions here.

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

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State Treasurer Ann W. Richards Turns Over \$40 Million To State Agencies

State Treasurer Ann W. Richards Friday turned over \$40 million in unclaimed money to state agencies to pay for schools, highways and other general state government services.

The money is from aban-

doned checking accounts, uncashed cashier's checks, unclaimed utility deposits and the like for which no owners could be found.

"This is one of the best sources of non-tax revenue for the state," Treasurer

Lifestyle Change In Fire Ant Colonies Makes A Tough Job

Fire ants are increasingly difficult to eliminate because of a change in the life histories of fire ant colonies. They are appearing with multiple queens instead of single queens, according to a study conducted by the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

These new colonies house as many as 200 queens per mound compared to singlequeen mounds. When the queen in a single-queen nest dies, the entire nest dies; but when of the multiple queens die, the workers scatter. In

multiple-queen nests, fire ani workers have no loyalty to a single queen. This make eliminating the colonies even more difficult.

The study, which found 30 to 40 fire ant mounds per acre back in the days of single queens, now reports that there are up to 5,000 mounds per acre. Entomologists are still trying to determine whether the multiple-queen ants are a hybrid or a different species altogether from single-queen ants. They hope that with more research, they'll be better able to understand and control - fire ants.

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

Richards said that while she was proud of the amount of unclaimed property collected and turned over to the state, she was even more proud of the fact that the State Treasury had been able to find

owners of \$30 million in lost property during the last year.

"We have found more lost property for the citizens of Texas this year than the total found for all previous years prior to 1983, the first year I was in office," Richards said.

"So far this year we have written checks returning lost property to more than 16,000 Texans and we are finding more each day."

The Richards Administration has collected \$273.5 million in unclaimed property in the past six years, or 86 percent of all unclaimed property collected since the unclaimed property law was passed in 1962.

Of the S114 million returned to owners during the past 27 years, the Richards Administration returned \$110 million or 96 percent.

In order to find owners of lost property, state law requires the Treasury to publish a statewide listing of those persons with \$50 or more of unclaimed property each March.

This year, the Treasury published a list of 110,000 names of persons with more than S60 million in lost money.

The state can use any money that remains unclaimed for general state expenses and for education. This year \$20 million went to the General Revenue Fund and \$20 million to the Foundation School Fund.

While the state may use money while it remains unclaimed, the owners or the owners' heirs may claim their property at any time in the future.

Highly erodible cropland that was planted to an annual crop in prior years is exempt from the CONSER-VATION COMPLIANCE provisions. This exemption expires on Jan. 1, 1990. It is the producer's responsibility to make sure that all land he operates that has highly erodible cropland has a conservation plan developed prior to Jan. 1, 1990. Failure to follow these provisions will cause the farm on which the plan is not obtained and all other farms in which the producer has an interest to be ineligible for any USDA benefits.

Provisions of the 1990 WHEAT PROGRAM include: target price of \$4.00 per bushel; weighted national loan rate before reduction of \$2.44 and \$1.95 after reduction; 5% acreage reduction requirement and an ACR requirement of 5.26% of the planted and CU payment acreage; The 0/92 provisions will apply; No paid land diversion; Signup will begin Jan. 16, 1990.

Transferring Farm: A FALL PEANUT QUOTA TRANSFER can be approved only if the transferring farm planted a sufficient quota on the farm.

Receiving Farm: The amount of quota pounds that can be received is limited to the estimated ungraded pounds yet to be marketed plus the graded Seg. 1 peanuts less the quota balance on the marketing card for the receiving farm. A fall transfer to cover peanuts that grade Seg. 2 or 3 may never be made after the peanuts are graded.

County Office Listing: We are maintaining a list for producers to indicate their need to transfer quota or receive quota under the fall transfer provisions.




