



The Eastland County Jail passed the annual state inspection on Wednesday, March 30, earning a certificate of compliance.

Robert Dearing, inspector with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, listed no deficiencies in the 24-bed facility. The building was constructed in 1980.

During state inspections in 1986 six, and in 1987 nine items were found to be deficient. In December 1986 the county was ordered to remedy overcrowding. Last March the Jail was in danger of being closed because of uerecuve wiring, and the

The Commissioners have allocated money for various repairs, including the electrical system, plumbing improvements, and up-dating of the inter-com system.




### How to Lay out Gurved Garden Beds

Arabesque beds, require an accurate eye for designing them in the best manner; but a graceful and curved outline may be preserved by the use of a rope, the mode of working

"The reason I am supporting the Checkoff is that the money is being spent efficiently and effectively," added Zane Brisco with the Livestock Marketing Association of Texas. "Administrative costs are strictly limited to 5 percent or less of the total collected, so the Checkoff dollars are being spent on programs, not overhead. In fact, only 2.8 percent of the total collected has been spent on administrative

### Meeting on Peacekeeper Rail Garrison Is Friday

DYESS AIR FORCE BASE - A public scoping meeting covering an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the proposed deployment and operation of the Peacekeeper Intercon-Ballistic tinental Missile(ICBM) in the Rail Garrison basing mode has been set for April 8 starting at 7 p.m. at the Abilene Civic Center located at 1110 North 6th Street.

The Air Force invites government agency representatives, interest groups and private citizens to participate in the scoping meeting to identify environmental issues to be addressed in the EIS.

The EIS will be used in the decision making process for base selection, siting and mitigation actions. In addition, the EIS will describe the nature, scope and extent of impacts which may be associated with the deployment and operation of the Peacekeeper Rail Garrison system.

On September 19, 1986, the White House announced the President's decision to develop a Rail Garrison mode for the Peacekeeper ICBM. The Peacekeeper Rail Garrison program responds to the need for enhanced survivability of our missile force and to the Congressional mandate to modernize that deterrent capability.

proposed Peacekeeper Rail Garrison system consists of 50 Peacekeeper missiles deployed on 25 Air Force trains with two missiles per train. An alternative action is to deploy 100 Peacekeeper missiles on 50 trains.

The trains will be parked in secure garrisons on existing Air Force bases, with between four and six trains parked in each garrison. During periods of increased tension, the trains could be directed by higher authority to disperse from the garrison onto the nation's rail network. Once on the rail network, the Peacekeeper trains become virtually impossible to attack.

In addition to Dyess Air Force Base, scoping meetings are also planned for communities adjacent to the 10 other candidate deployment bases. These include: Barksdale AFB, La., Blytheville AFB, Ark., Fairchild AFN, Wash., F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo., Grand Forks AFB, N.D., Little Rock AFB, Ark., Malmstrom AFB, Mont., Minot AFB, N.D., Whiteman AFB, Mo., and Wurtsmith AFB, Mich.

As part of the EIS process, additional public comments will be solicited through a series of public hearings to be conducted this summer, after the publication of the Draft EIS. Those comments will then be used to complete the Final EIS scheduled from late 1988.

### Age 26 Is Milestone for Men

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1988 and who have not registered with Selective Service may forfeit their eligibility for some federal programs.

The law requires that young men register with Selective Service within 30 days of the day they turn 18. Although tardy registrations are usually accepted, Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after a man reaches age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man may permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student aid, job training and most federal employment. Likewise, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.


For those men born in 1962 who have registered, 1988 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a return to the draft. Nearly 20 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstituted in 1980. These men comprise over 98 percent of those required to register.

Men who have not yet registered should do so at any post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in jail, or both.





### **Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted**

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by range and brush fires which occurred on March 10 and 11, 1988 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Eastland, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips said today.

Eastland County is one of thirteen in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover actual physical losses resulting from fire.

Phillips said farmers and ranchers may be eligible for loans of up to 100 percent of their actual losses or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until November 22, 1988 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Phillips

### **County Resources Elects New Officers**

Rising Star Nursing Center

Officers for the Eastland County Resources Association were elected at a meeting on Wednesday, March 23 at Eastland Centennial Memorial

Named as Chairman of the county-wide Association was David Bondurant, Minister of the First Christian Church in Eastland. Viola Payne was designated Secretary and Helen Osburn as Treasurer.

Also present at the meeting were DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Agent, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Owens, Mary Dunn, Peggy Roberts, Mrs. John Rose, Margaret Corbell, and Corrie Cowley.

David Bondurant stated that the purpose of the County Resource Association is to help the needy people of Eastland County by leading out in cooperative action. It will be listed as a non-profit, tax-exempt organization with charitable purposes.

Presently this help includes (but is not limited to) assistance to the County Food Pantry, help for the Ministerial Alliance Travel Fund, and help to a local shelter housing transient people.



### State Department Of Highways And Public Transportation Fight Fires

Highway maintenance men encounter many emergencies in the course of their work, but the workday of Friday, March 11, turned out to be far from routine for 20 employees from the Brownwood District of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Before the day was over, 13 men from Brownwood, five from Eastland, and two radio dispatchers had discovered firsthand what it is like to fight a major range fire. The men worked far into the night in Callahan County in cooperation with Abilene personnel, other volunteers, and firemen to stop the far reaching fire that had been devastating three counties.

A telephone call at 1:30 in the afternoon from Central Fire Station in Brownwood alerted the Brown County Maintenance Office that help was needed to fight the fire taht had been leaping across pastures and highways and was now advancing toward the area between Cross Plains and Baird.

Joyce Reed, Brown County secretary and radio dispatcher, took the call. Since maintenance foreman James Hair was out of town for the afternoon and his assistant could not be reached immediately, Reed called Equipment Supervisor Marvin Garrett, and he radioed District Maintenance Engineer Tom Newbern, who gave quick approval to send men and equipment. Reed radioed the crew leaders, told them what was happening, and asked Crew Leader Ben Mackey to start immediately, ahead of the others, to find out exactly where to send men and equipment once they reached the fire area, and to coor-

dinate their efforts as they arrived. As soon as the other crew members could leave their projects, they either started "roading" or hauling with trailers three maintainers and other equipment to Cross Plains. Mackey had talked with the Cross Plains Fire Department, and they directed him to an area north of Baird.

In the meantime, Eastland Crew Leader Jim Davis and Maintenance Techs Wayne Sharp, Scottie Elliot, Ben Cagle, and Clinton Brown were on their way with two additional maintainers and other equipment to meet the Brownwood group.

When all the maintainer operators had joined Mackey, they cut several firebreaks in different areas "about as wide as the Interstate" by lining up five maintainers side-by-side. One firebreak followed a gas pipeline about 20 miles from State Highway 283 to a coun-

Mackey described the fire as bursting into flames 30 to 40 feet high at times. "Our firebreaks didn't even begin to stop it," he said. "The first one we bladed, the fire jumped it like it wasn't even there." He explained that every time the men bladed a firebreak, they would fall back about a mile and this would give them time to start another one. "Before we would get a firebreak finished, other people would start a backburning operation." He said the intensity of the fire was so great that the men found they could not hold their hands on the window glass of the maintainers they were driving.

Cagle estimated that the wind was blowing 30 to 60 miles an hour in gusts and reported that newsmen at the scene were describing

the fire as "moving faster

than a race horse. "There were two levels of fire coming toward us," Cagle said. "One, higher up among the broomweeds, was the fastest, and following it was a slower moving fire on the shorter grass."

"It was pretty scary in the daytime, but after it got dark so that you could see the fire better, it was really scary," Cagle said. "And it was so smoky, you could hardly see the end of the maintainer."

Jerry Lobstein from Brownwood followed the maintainers in a flatbed truck as they bladed the firebreaks. On the truck he had diesel fuel and gasoline as well as emergency tools, first-aid kit, and something else the maintainers didn't have, a radio. If there were any problems or if a maintainer broke down, Lobstein was there to see that they could either get help or get out, whichever seemed appropriate.

After dark Lobstein noticed three boys walking across the fireguard some distance behind his truck, headed toward the fire. He notified the maintainer operators and doubled back to intercept the boys. He found out they had gone up on the hill north of Baird after school to explore and see the fire. They were chilled from the norther that had blown in just after dark, catching them in shorts and summer shirts. "Evidently, they didn't realize the danger they were in," Lobstein said. He took them to Jim Davis, who drove them back to Baird to the custody of the deputy sheriff. The deputy was explaining the danger in graphic language when Davis left to go back to the firefighting front. Davis, Cagle, Mackey, Lobstein and Clinton Brown all agreed that if the boys had not been stopped, they might very well have been caught in the range fire or been bitten by a rattlesnake. The rattlers were disturbed and moving, trying to get away from the fire, Cagle said.

A deer in its panic to escape got its antlers caught in a fence and had fallen victim to the fire. "A lot of cattle were killed in that fire," Cagle said. "Ranchers were cutting fences and moving cattle across the highways and to other pastures in order to save them," he said.

Back at the Brownwood base station, Joyce Reed was still standing by in radio contact with the men and the Baird maintenance office until 9:30 p.m. when they thought they wouldn't need any more equipment. She From Front Page

The men worked until 11:30 p.m., taking turns operating the maintainers so they wouldn't have to stay in the smoke and heat for too long periods at a time, and were prepared to return the next morning if needed. They all reported feeling bad effects the next day from smoke inhalation and fatigue.


