## County Commissioners More Work On Budget

The Eastland County Commissioners continued work on the County Budget Friday, August 14. There appeared to be hope of having the total budget ready for approval at the next regular meeting August 24. The new fiscal year begins October 1.

At Friday's meeting the budgets of several department heads were approved, but the Commissioners said they would study others before deciding on them.

A few people will be given "salary adjustments", which include raises of .50 cents per hour. They are the two courthouse janitors, the clerk in the the Precinct 1 J.P. office, and the Extension Service secretary.

The Commissioners also agreed that the salary for the chief deputy in the Tax Collector's office should be increased to

\$7.44 per hour, which will be the same as other chief deputies in the Courthouse.

Requests by the county's five Justices of the Peace for salary increases appeared to be denied.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson said, "I think, in order to follow their suggestions we would have to eliminate three of them."

The Commissioners were told that no action can be taken to cut the number of J.P.'s in the County until their elected terms expire.

As they discussed the matter, the Commissioners seemed wary about taking such action. They said the Justices have brought in about \$337,000 in fines and fees this year. Robinson said he knew of other counties where peace justices "got mad"

and lowered fines to \$1.

"If this happened here we could sure be in trouble," Robinson said.

On other matters, the Commissioners agreed to an additional \$15,000 for the Sheriff's Budget to hire an Animal Control Officer from January 1 to October 1, 1993. Fringe benefits will be added to this officer's salary.

Richard Robinson, who leaves the Precinct 1 Commissioner's Office December 31, will be hired to upgrade 911 addressing for about \$9,000 per year. This will include working about 18 hours per week for \$6.50 per hour, mileage reimbursement and a computer and printer.

It is expected to take continuous effort to bring the addressing into line and keep it updated in the county.

## Wayne Calhoun Is New School Superintendent

Wayne Calhoun began work as superintendent of schools for Rising Star Independent School District on July 1. Although an introductory article ran in an April issue of this newspaper, many readers missed it.

Calhoun came to Rising Star from Queen City ISD after serving two years as the high school principal. He has served as high school and junior high principal for the Somerville

ISD and elementary principal for the Hempstead ISD and Conroe School District. He served one year as a Naval Flight Officer for the United States Navy. He served with the United States Marine Corps for four years and had two tours in Vietnam.

Calhoun holds a Master of Education Degree from Texas A&M University and a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Texas at Austin.

His wife, Elanda, has 22 years elementary teaching experience and is teaching the 5th grade here. The couple has two children; Christopher, 13, is in the 8th grade and Lisa, 11, is in the 6th grade. The family attends the First Baptist Church.

Calhoun said he likes to hike and hunt and, he added, he enjoys computer simulations.

The new superintendent also commented that he is happy to have such a good staff. He stated that it was a higher caliber staff than he expected in such a small town and says he enjoys working with them.

Regarding the new high school building, Calhoun said, "I'm glad we have it and that it's paid for. I'm glad that it won't cause taxes to go up." He said it is the intention of the board of trustees to reduce the local tax rate in a like amount to offset any increase voted by the Eastland County Education District (CED) (because of the changes in funding schools by the state). The effect will be no tax increase for Rising Star ISD taxpayers when many other districts are having to vote large increases. The budget hearing is scheduled for August 24.

## Grocery Store Lot Will Be Cleared

Clearing of the remains of the grocery store was to begin Wednesday, said Robert Bostick, co-owner with his wife, Nancy, of The Ole Store which was destroyed by fire last Monday night. Plans are to level the other building also, in order to make sufficient room for a parking lot and new building. Bostick said an additional 1,000 feet of floor space is planned in the new building.

On Monday Bostick said the fire marshal investigator did not expect to get laboratory reports on samples for several days. Both the fire marshal and insurance investigators believed their findings to

point to arson, but Bostick said, "I can't believe anyone would have torched us." Many persons first speculated that the cause of the fire might be due to electrical problems, because many of the store's customers were aware of problems with the ballasts in fluorescent lighting, freezers, coolers and air conditioner. The Bosticks continue to find the idea repugnant that anyone deliberately caused their store to burn.

Fire department volunteers had returned to the scene three times during the last week to douse the smoking remains and smoke could still be seen Monday.

**AUSTIN** - Their backs to the wall, Texas Republicans sparred with Democrats last week over voided primaries and prepared to host the GOP national convention in Houston.

There, they hope their week in the limelight will boost President George Bush back to — or at least near — front-runner status.

After Bush switched Secretary of State James Baker to the White House chief of staff post, both men vowed to salvage the president's reelection by making domestic issues their first priority.

A poll released last week suggested Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton leads Bush in Texas 43 percent to 29 percent, and polls in other states painted the margin even wider.

Bush's allies downplayed the figures released by Richard Murray, a Houston pollster who has surveyed for various Democrats, including former Gov. Mark White.

But Clinton's self-generated political momentum could not be de-

nied, the product of a near-flawless Democratic convention that catapulted him closer to the magic 51 percent.

Republicans, well aware that Bush needs an equally good convention to catch up, were haunted all the way to showtime by threats of staged disunity on abortion rights, gay rights and AIDS policies.

**Sims Joins GOP Lawsuit**

Texas Republicans had an even more worrisome problem to occupy their thoughts: The GOP faces near extinction in the Texas Senate because Secretary of State John Hannah voided the primary elections.

A three-judge federal panel this week was to hear their request for an emergency court order stopping Hannah from imposing new districts that could whittle Republicans down to two or three Senate seats.

State Sen. Bill Sims, D-San Angelo, said he would join the GOP lawsuit; his attorney is state Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo.

Sims, the voice of agriculture in the Texas Legislature, had his hometown split by Hannah's fiat, and his rural district blended into Austin and San Antonio.

**Hannah Lambasted**

Hannah was lambasted in several newspaper editorials last week, and was both roasted and defended in a point-counterpoint between Sen. Ike Harris, R-Dallas, and Sen. Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville.

Glasgow, who faced a strong election challenge under the voided plan, said Hannah was enacting the law of Texas, which is justified because it creates two more minority seats and saves taxpayers money by not holding new primaries.

Harris recalled that Democrats in the Senate drew this plan by "fax transmissions to their party members only, without Senate debate," and accused Hannah of flagrant disregard for the law.

**Less School Money**

A shortfall in state education funds means Texas school districts will get about \$305 million less than promised in state aid for the school year just finished.

In the 1992-93 fiscal year, the shortfall is expected to be about \$540 million, according to State Education Agency officials.

Gov. Ann Richards has promised to call the Legislature into special session on school finance after the November election.

**Clinton/Gore by 14 Points**

The latest newspaper-sponsored poll by Murray suggested the Clinton/Gore ticket is leading the Bush/Quayle ticket here by 14 points, 43 percent to 29 percent. Gore also outscored Quayle 5.7 to 3.75 on a 1 to 10 ranking by respondents.

**Lottery Sales Soaring**

In only 10 weeks, Texas Lottery ticket sales have topped \$500 million, a level state officials originally thought would take six months to achieve, state Comptroller John Sharp reported last week.

He said that since the lottery began at 6 a.m. on May 29, tickets have been selling at the rate of 82 per second.

Based on other states' sales experience, Texas officials expected to sell about \$1 billion in lottery tickets the first 12 months.

**Lawyers Challenge Yeep**

A group of Texas lawyers have challenged Vice President Dan Quayle to debate civil justice reform during or after the Republican National Convention in Houston.

Quayle, who previously criticized lawyers and lawsuits as bad for U.S. business, canceled an appearance before the American Bar Association after learning that bar officials wanted time to respond to his remarks.

**Park Closings Bashed**

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said Texas Parks and Wildlife plans to close 11 state parks are ill conceived.

He said the agency had asked lawmakers to reduce its budget in exchange for budget independence, but promised all parks would remain open.

Bullock suggested they keep the parks operating and make cuts

in their administrative costs, three times larger than the Comptroller's office.

**Other Highlights**

- Bob Neely, executive director of the Texas High Speed Rail Authority, resigned his \$85,680 job after an audit reported his agency wasted money on travel, plants, furniture and bottled water.
- Laredo is second only to Detroit in a ranking of cities with the highest percentage of impoverished children, according to the Children's Defense Fund.





### Texas Oil and Gas Production Continues A Downward Trend

Oil and gas production in Texas continues in a downward trend, according to information from the State Railroad Commission.

The Commission issued a total of 1,238 drilling permits in July, 1992,

compared to 1,111 in July 1991. In July operators reported 220 gas, 416 oil, and 47 service completions, compared to 267 gas, 468 oil, and 57 service completions during the same period of last year. The total of well com-

pletions recorded for 1992 year-to-date is 4,535, a 25 percent decrease from the 6,053 recorded in 1991 year-to-date.

The preliminary Texas Crude production figure for May averaged 1,630 barrels daily, down from the 1,733,966 barrels daily average of May 1991.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 445,227,002 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of

gas in May, down 0.02 percent compared to May 1991's gas production total of 445,315,450 Mcf.

In Eastland County in May 1992 total crude oil production was 70,581 barrels. Total gas production was 810,568 Mcf.

Why does stress seem to trigger heart attacks? According to doctors at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston and Harvard Medical School, stress constricts arteries already narrowed by disease. The more blocked the arteries, the more dramatic the effect.

Women with premenstrual syndrome seem to have low blood levels of magnesium, according to "Obstetrics and Gynecology." Symptoms were significantly reduced in those treated with magnesium -- 350 mg. three times a day -- for the last two weeks of the menstrual cycle.

New, more-sensitive test for glaucoma has been developed at the State University of New York at Buffalo. It measures how long it takes for pupils to contract in response to light.

Biotechnology companies are trying to find a way to utilize hyaluronic acid, the body's natural lubricant. One option would be injecting the substance into arthritic knees; another, using it to prevent surgical adhesions. One drawback: current price is millions of dollars a pound.

## ASCS News

**Limited Office Assistance:** Employees will be attending a state training conference in Lubbock the week of August 24. The county office will remain open but staffing will be at a minimum and we are asking your cooperation in planning your ASCS business around this training week.

**Maintenance of ACR and CU/Pay Acreage:** Farm program participants are reminded that haying or grazing of ACR and CU for pay acreage is prohibited through October 31. Participants are required to keep the acreage free from weeds, insects and rodents, and protected from wind and water erosion.

**1991 Small Grain Final Deficiency Payments:** Producers participating in the 1991 Wheat, Barley or Oat program will not be receiving additional NL (not subject to payment limit) payments due to the 12-month national weight average market price exceeding the loan rate before reduction.

The national weighted average market prices for the 12-month marketing period are: wheat, \$3 per bushel; barley, \$2.10 per bu.; oats, \$1.20 bu.

**Fall Peanut Transfer:** The limitation imposed on transferring farms exceeding fall transfers of peanut quota has been removed for 1992 transfers. The limitation which denied a transfer from a farm producing peanuts in excess of the effective quota minus the effective undermarketings has been replaced with the requirement that a good faith effort be made to produce a normal crop of peanuts on the acreage devoted to peanuts.

Procedure in effect for the 1992 crop year allows the transfer of undermarketings from the farm on all temporary transfers.

The receiving farm is still limited, as in past years, to the pounds needed to market the entire crop of peanuts as quota peanuts.

We have not received any word on a final rule to the interim rules published in the federal register on June 18. The interim rule limits the disaster transfer of segregation 2 or 3 peanuts to the effective quota on a farm prior to any fall transfer of quota.

**1991 Wooland Mohair Rates:** USDA announced the support prices for wool and mohair for 1992 marketings will be \$1.97 per pound of shorn wool and \$4.613 per pound for mohair. Mohair is being supported at 85% of the percentage of parity at which shorn wool is being supported. 1991 rates were \$1.88 per pound for wool and \$4.448 per pound for mohair.

Wool on unshorn lambs will be supported, as in the past, at a level determined by a formula based on the hundredweight of live, unshorn lambs marketed.

**1992 County Loan Rates:** Eastland County Loan rates for program crops are: Wheat, \$2.20 per bu.; barley, \$1.65 per bu.; oats, \$0.91 per bu.; rye, \$1.45 per bu.

**Loose Shelled Peanut Kernels** removed from peanuts prior to marketing and retained by the producer, handler, commercial dryer or sheller must be reported in accounting for the disposition of peanuts.

**Important Producer Reminder:** Producers who have requested or will be requesting any USDA program benefits are reminded that if they bought, leased, rented, crop shared (or are thinking about buying, leasing, renting or crop sharing) a farm or ranch need to immediately check with SCS (Soil Conservation Service) about the conservation plan on the farm or ranch in question. The Conservation Plan was formulated with the previous occupant and stays with the land regardless of the status of the subsequent occupant.

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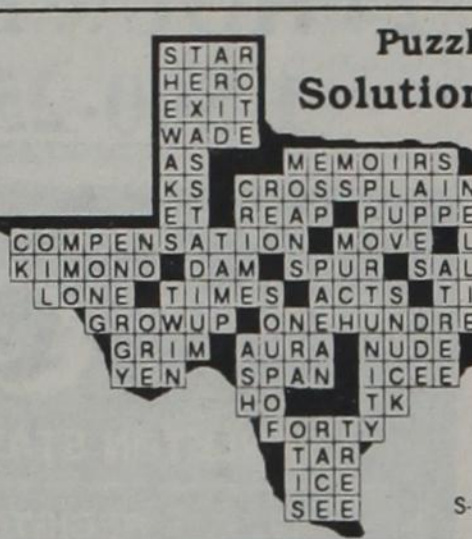

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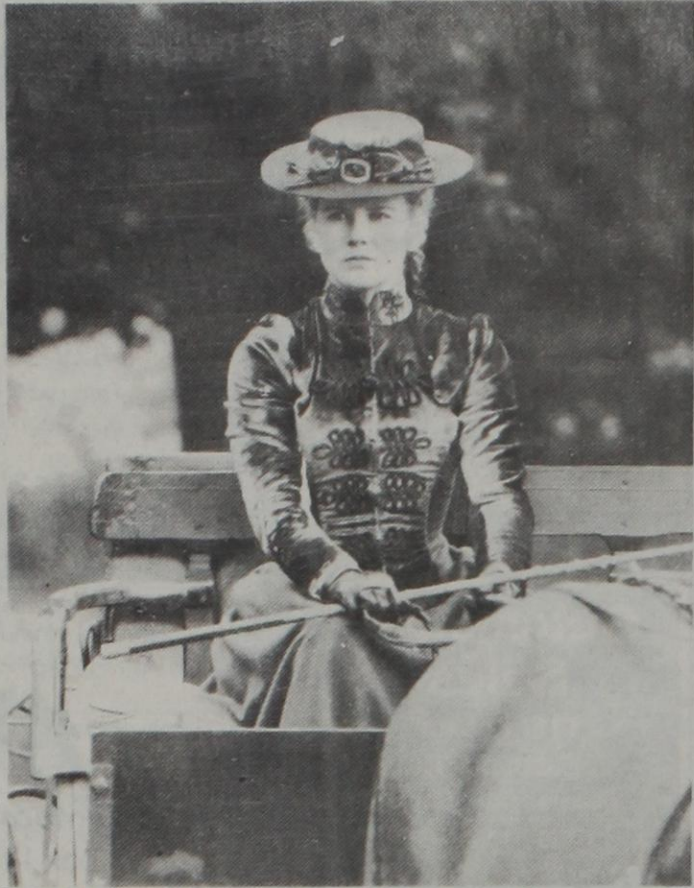

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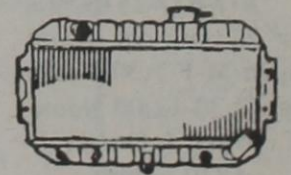

code, a student may call home for proper apparel. If clothes cannot be brought to school, the student will be assigned to in-school suspension for the remainder of the day. Students will not be allowed to leave campus to change clothes. Continual violations of the dress code will result in steps outlined in the discipline management plan.

Any type of dress or personal grooming that is disruptive or distracting to the pupils, teachers or classroom activity or to the school shall not be permitted. The determination of what is disruptive and distracting shall be made by the principal. In order to present the best appearance, it is believed that dress should be neat, clean, simple and that each student should be properly dressed for a proper respect of oneself. Beards and mustaches are not to be worn and sideburns below the ear are not allowed. Earrings for boys are not allowed to be worn during the regular school hours. Boys hair should not be below the bottom of the ear or below the bottom of a normal shirt collar.

The exceptions to the above would be due to medical reasons stated by a doctor.

Cars may be used for the transportation of students to and from school. Under no circumstances will students in grades one through eight be permitted to operate these vehicles at school. Students may lose their privilege through the following misuse of their vehicles:

1. Driving recklessly and sounding off mufflers around the school during school hours.
2. Misuse of the car by enticing students who are

## Indigent Health Care And Treatment Act Rules And Procedures

Eastland County will use the following rules and procedures to comply with its responsibility under the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act.

Application can be requested from/at the County Judge's Office, Eastland County Courthouse. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact the County Judge's Office/Auditor's Office for assistance.

Eastland County will use rules and procedures found in the Department

of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Net income cannot exceed (See chart).
4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1000. The equity value of a car greater than \$1500 is counted against the \$1000 limit. Personal property and homestead

are exempt assets.

5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Eastland County and NOT RESIDING IN A HOSPITAL DISTRICT.

6. Applicants must provide all requested information and documentation requested or applications will be denied.

7. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.

8. Eastland Memorial Hospital has been designated as mandated provider for CIHCP for persons not in a hospital district.

**Tax Rebate**

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered a total of \$157.3 million in August sales tax payments to 1,069 Texas cities and 106 counties, a 4.2 percent increase over the rebates of one year ago.

The City of Rising Star had a net payment for this period in the amount of \$1,777.02, comparable to the prior years' payment for the period being \$2,852.26. This shows a decrease of -37.70%.

The 1992 payments to date to the City are \$12,268.87, compared to the 1991 payment of \$12,868.64. This shows a decrease in payments for the year to date being -4.66%.

asked Chief Wyatt for his recommendation on the best action on the car. Wyatt suggested waiting for the seizure funds to arrive, pay the debt and try to sell the car. Goldston asked about the possibility of using a city truck for back-up vehicle after the trucks are upgraded and was told that it was not feasible due to insurance problems, etc.

Mayor Bible stressed the importance of staying in contact with the D.A. concerning the money taken in the seizure of the past month.

Moore inquired about the warrants shown on the report that had not been served and the reason. Wyatt stated that the persons named in the warrants could not always be located.

Barnes asked if the City PD is responsible for serving the warrants if there is a Constable available. Discussion followed on County responsibility versus local responsibility.

Barnes commented on the 911 delay due to the fact that our exchange

covers such a large area (other counties who have not complied with the identification procedures).

Barnes also inquired as to the feasibility of using the old car and was told it involved too many liabilities.

Mayor Bible asked about the possibility of logging the interaction with other county officials.

Park Report included a letter from the Texas Forest Service granting the variance requested on the planting of the pine trees.

The availability of the pavilion for reservations for private use was discussed. After comparison with other cities' rates and consideration of the upkeep, cleaning, utilities, etc., it was decided to set a rate of \$50.00 for the use of the pavilion for one day, with a \$25.00 refund on finding the facility in good condition after use.

The Animal Control Report was presented. Discussion followed on the need for pens. The City has received the OK from the Texas Water Commission to place pens at the sewer plant. Barnes asked about the possibility of placing the pens at another location. He also commented that all that is needed is a 5x10 concrete slab that slants to accommodate cleaning. The fence is available, but we need to provide a shelter. Barnes moved and Goldston seconded to start building the dog pens with available labor and existing materials, except the concrete. Motion passed 4-0.

The Vineyard Report included discussion about the incomplete computer programming and existing points that need clarification.

Texas Department of Community Development Grant was discussed including the point that Valree Cox is now independently employed and will continue to handle our business. She has agreed to handle the application of our next grant without charge to us. Decision has to be made as to the grant we wish to apply for.

Goldston moved to apply for a grant to assist in the U.S. Highway 183 project (moving the city utilities to accommodate the widening of the highway). Barnes seconded the motion which carried 4-0.

Resolution concerning Flood Insurance was discussed including the fact that if we wish to continue to apply for Federal Emergency Grants, we are required to participate in the National Flood

Insurance Program. The council agreed to take the Resolution and Ordinance (Agenda Item #14) concerning Flood Damage Prevention and study both for later action.

Barnes moved to establish a \$50.00 transfer fee for persons changing location in the city requiring a move of meters. Moore seconded. Motion carried 4-0.

Barnes moved to have the City Secretary ask the Municipal Judge to look into the feasibility of handling the collection of past due accounts due to the city utilities. Butler seconded. Motion passed 4-0. The council expressed a desire to proceed with this action expeditiously.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:25 p.m.

Special called meeting of the Rising Star City Council was held at City Hall at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 28, 1992. All councilpersons were present except Edra Butler.

Council entered into executive session from 7:32-7:50 p.m.

Motion was made by Barnes and seconded by Moore to pass a resolution allowing the City to apply for a loan at Peoples State Bank for operations of the City while the State reimbursements are being processed, in the amount of up to \$25,000.00 as needed, for a period of up to ninety (90) days under the provisions of the resolution. Motion passed 4-0.

Meeting adjourned at 7:54 p.m.

Special called meeting of the Rising Star City Council was held at City Hall at 6:30 p.m., on Monday, August 10, 1992. All members were present.

The Council entered into executive session, regarding police business, from 6:32-7:28 p.m.

Motion was made by Cook to instruct the City Administrator to pursue and press the charges involved in the investigation and confiscation during the drug bust of an earlier date by our police department and to proceed to seek any avenue necessary to achieve a final and just resolution. (Up to and including bringing in the City's attorney and the State Attorney General.) Butler seconded, with the motion carrying 5-0.

**L.T. Coxes to Have 50th Anniversary**



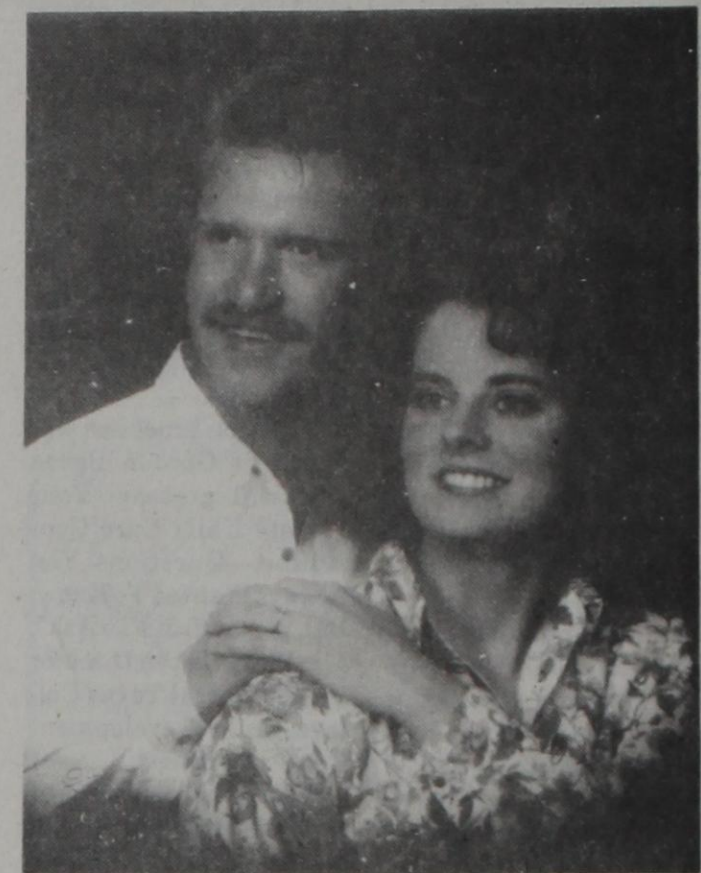
L.T. and Wilma Cox will be celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary August 11, 1992.
