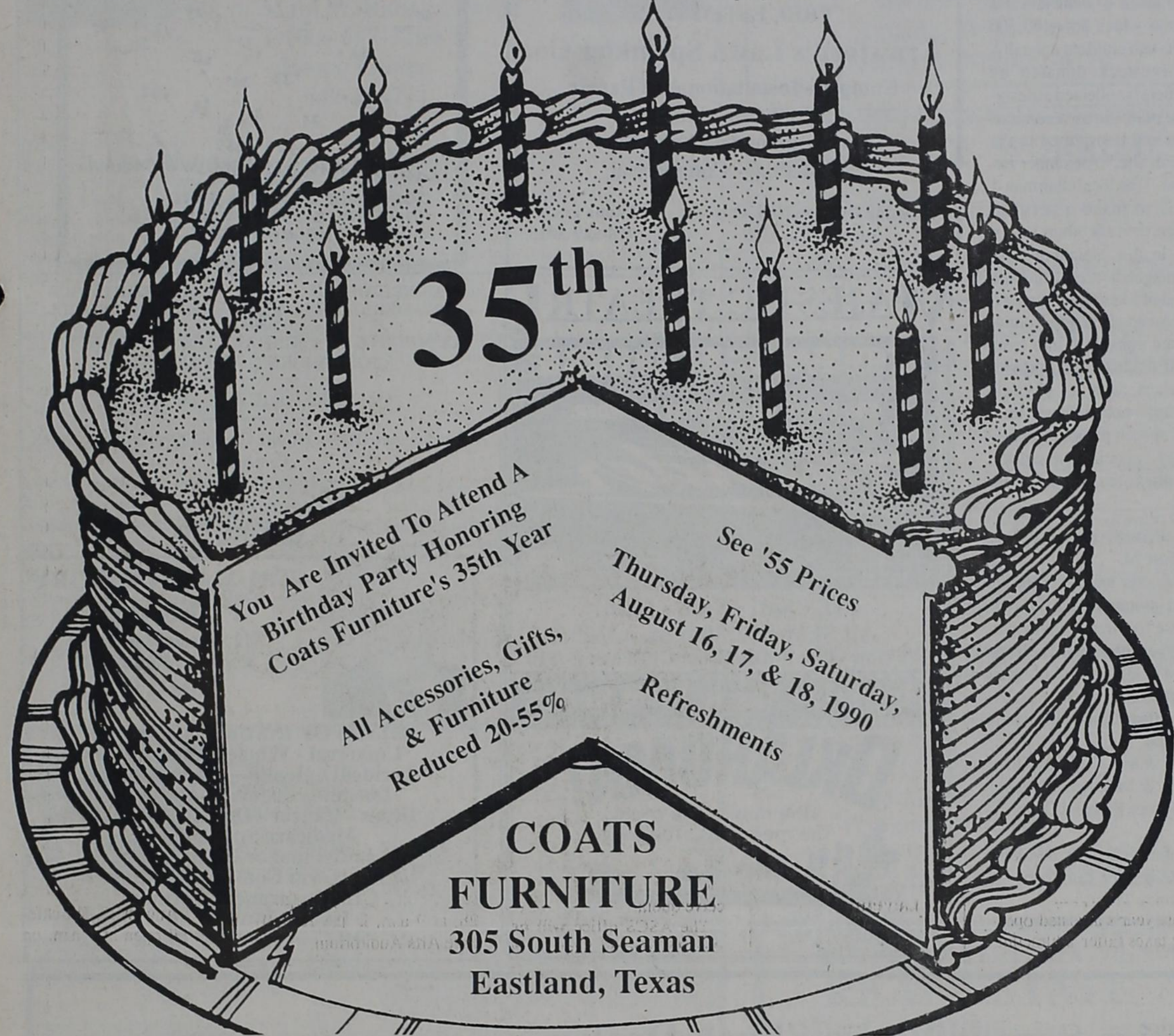

### Texas Water Commission To Hold Meetings

The Texas Water Commission held public meetings this week in four cities that are included in the newly created Colorado-Lavaca watermaster area. The purpose of the meetings is to give each affected water right holder a chance to learn about the watermaster budget and assessments. The Colorado-Lavaca watermaster was created for management of the state's surface water and for protection of water rights in the section of the state located in the Colorado-Lavaca river basin.

Final consideration of the proposed budget will be by Commission hearing on September 12, 1990. Official notice of this hearing will be sent to each water right holder in the area.

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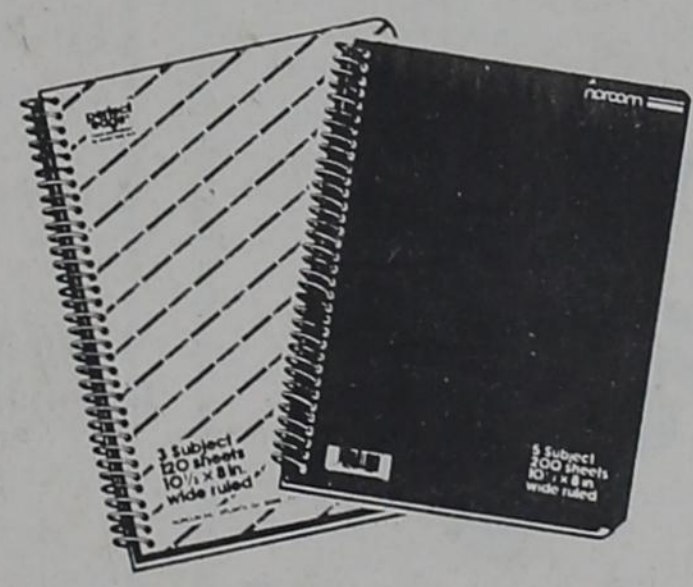
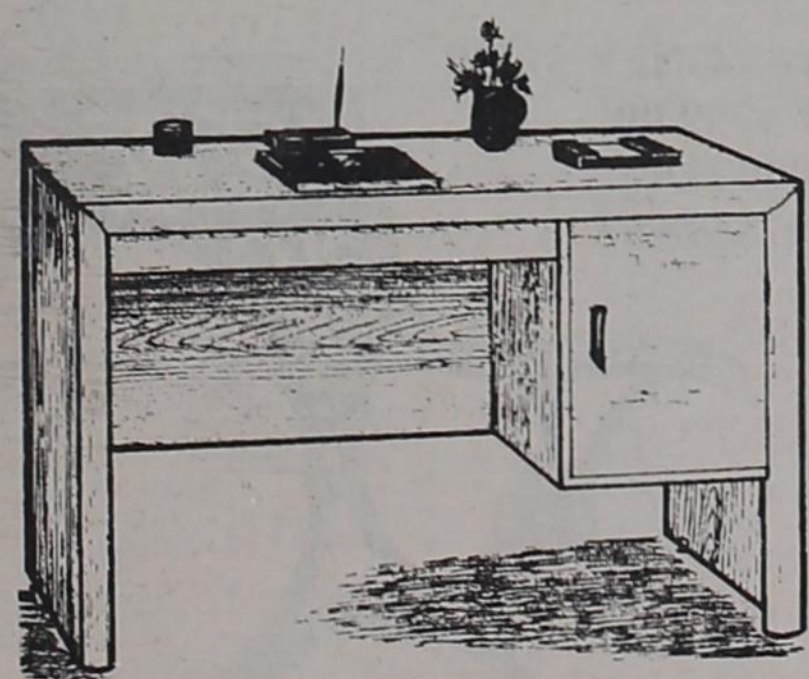

### What it means to sleepwalk

There is a sleep center in your brain, which regulates the sleeping and waking of your body. When this sleep center goes to work, it does two things: It blocks off part of your brain so that it goes to sleep and you no longer have the will to do anything; and, it blocks off certain nerves that bring outside messages to your brain, permitting your body to fall asleep. Usually, the sleep center of your brain and your body are connected but sometimes they become separated. When this happens, the brain sleeps but the body remains awake. People in this situation usually sit up in bed or stand near it. Some actually get out of bed and walk around, but they don't do much more than walk. A sleepwalker doesn't usually remember sleepwalking when he or she wakes up. Sleep walking is far more common in children than in adults.

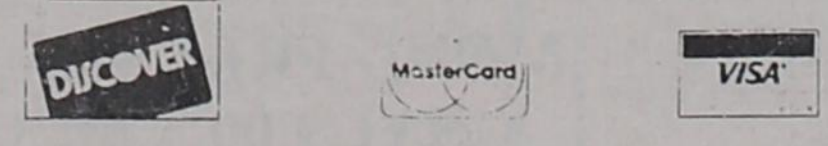

## Eastland County Head Start Child Development Center To Begin Classes August 16

The Eastland County Head Start-Child Development Center will be starting its program Thursday, August 16. Children who will turn three years old by September 1, 1990 or are four years of age can enroll. Eligibility will be determined based on family's income and/or need. Handicapped children and their families receive the full range of Head Start developmental services.

Inquire at the center, 901 West 7th Street, Cisco, for hours of operation. All children will be enrolled in the Child Care Food Program (Texas Department of Human Resources) at no expense to the family, regardless to income.

Typical Head Start services provided are:

- Staff trained in early childhood development.

- Dental Screenings (follow-up treatment if necessary).

- Medical Screenings (immunizations, health problems and follow-up treatment if necessary).

- Child Development Screening (individual education plan designed for each child).

- Handicapped Screening (support services obtained, if necessary).

- Social Services (family needs identified and support services obtained).

- Nutrition Screenings (special diets, if required by doctor).

- Supervised Educational Activities (learning centers, structured and free-play times, spacious out-door playground, rest time).

- Parent Involvement (Parents are encouraged to participate as center volunteers, parent committee members and Policy Council representatives).

Head Start is celebrating this year its 25th anniversary throughout the nation. What once began as a pilot project for the summer months, has grown into a nationwide, well acknowledged and applauded program that is "helping build families." ## Area Chairmen Named For 31st Annual Cattlemen's Roundup

Approximately 225 volunteer chairmen statewide have been appointed for the 31st annual Cattlemen's Roundup for Crippled Children, according to James (Jim) Alexander of Abilene, general chairman.

Area chairmen include Lloyd Coan and Mrs. Austin McCloud of Eastland; Sid Waynick of Carbon; Jim Choate of Cisco; and Fred Rogers of Gorman.

This unique fundraiser benefits West Texas Rehabilitation Center out-patient facilities in Abilene and San Angelo which serve 13,500 adults and children annually.

"Livestock donated by ranchers is collected at designated points in area communities and transported to the auction site," Alexander explains. "The local chairman's job is to make a personal pledge, then ask others to join him in this 'neighbor-helping-neighbor' drive which has a goal of \$183,000 this year."

Proceeds from the Roundup are converted into treatment dollars which provide services such as physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology, audiology, special education, orthotics, and work evaluation.

## Memories....

Ah yes, "Rising Star" I came to your 100th birthday. However, things were not quite the same as when I worked at the "Record."

You really should have been located around the corner on the lower floor of a two-story building; the second floor housed Dr. Frank Payne's office and some hospital rooms. "Doc" Sellers would greet callers at the Record office with a warm handshake. He was a quiet man, full of business.

He hired me in the fall of 1935 after I had finished at RSHS in the spring. I worked five and a half days a week and made three dollars and fifty cents a week, and was glad to get that! At that time many men worked for a dollar a day and there were not many jobs in town available for girls. I remember one worked for West Texas Utilities, one at the bakery and perhaps a couple more elsewhere. My job was to gather local news, help address and mail the papers, get some of the ads and do some of the typing, plus other duties. The clickety-clack of the press in the back was a pleasant sound as I worked.

Walk down memory lane with me as I gather news and ads. If I took a walk around the corner north, I would be greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Clark at the General Mercantile store, and next a friendly greeting and encouraging word from Hugh Childress at his men's store. Ashel and Cecil Joyce had the Piggly Wiggly store, where I had sold eggs for six cents a dozen! "Mac" Gibson had a drug-store on the same block and there was a cafe operated by the Vaughns. Hamburgers were a dime, pie fifty cents and coffee a nickel.

Across the street Jay Koonee was the manager of the Higginbotham store. The Hortons had a drug store and at Agnew grocery, operated by Ray Agnew, you could get a big sack of groceries for five dollars.

Frank Robertson had an insurance office on the street leading east; you could also get your social security card and driver's license there, both new programs back then. I got my driver's license after

one lesson, given to me by Merle Sellers one Sunday afternoon. No test was given - I've never taken a driving test, and never had an accident. Mr Robertson's wife, Lexie Dean, was named Poet Laureate of Texas about that time and the people of Rising Star were so proud of her.

On the south side of that street Mr. Harris had a feed store; the post office was also along there, then Arthur Smith's barber shop where men could get a hair cut for twenty-five cents. Another barber shop was on the corner, owned and operated by the Harris's; Avelon had a beauty shop in the back of that.

On South Main was our great source of entertainment, the movie theater! On the other side of the street Dallas Dill had a drug store and Doctor Dill had his office upstairs. At the bank you would be greeted by Bill Tyler, Fred Roberds and Fred Tunnel.

The high school superintendent was E.T. Dawson. I believe the students of those depression years of the '30s had a closer bond than any other decade. The great depression will probably go down in history as one of the big events of this century, along with the world wars.

I have many pleasant memories of Rising Star and there are many other names I could mention. My roots are deep there. My grandparents, James and Sallie Irby, were among the first settlers. They located on a farm south of town, now owned by Jack Agnew. James Irby taught in the first school.

I married Harlon Lacy of Cross Plains in 1937 and that ended my career with the paper. We spent a few years in Cross Plains and in 1951 moved to Dallas where we lived until 1984 when we retired to Cisco. In Dallas I worked for the accounting office at Ling Temco Vought for 25 years. My husband had his own business, The Lacy Tool Company.

Happy birthday, again, "Rising Star;" my wish for you is that you survive another one hundred years!

## GTE, Contel Agree to Merge

New York - GTE Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, James L. "Rocky" Johnson and Contel Chairman, Charles Wohlstetter, signed a definitive agreement on August 7 that will result in the largest merger in the history of the telecommunications industry.

The definitive agreement to merge GTE and Contel, which was approved by each company's board of directors, "will create a new company with a market value of \$25 billion," said Johnson.

A preliminary agreement was announced on July 12. The merger is subject to approval by both companies' stockholders as well as various regulatory agencies. As previously announced, GTE will issue 1.27 shares of its

common stock in a tax-free exchange for each Contel common share, or about 200 million GTE shares. Both companies will hold special stockholder meetings in the fall, and expect to close the merger around year end.

"We have undertaken a comprehensive review of this merger and have unanimously agreed with our counterparts at GTE that it is clearly in the best interests of both companies," Wohlstetter said. "I am absolutely certain that the new company resulting from this merger will be even greater than the sum of its parts."

GTE's Johnson said, "I am delighted we have accomplished this significant step. It is clear that what we are

creating here is a perfect combination of two great companies in terms of compatibility of core businesses, management philosophy and commitment to our shareholders, customers and employees. It will make the new GTE the largest U.S.-based, local-exchange telephone company and the second-largest cellular telephone operator."

The combined companies will have a total of 18 million residential and business telephone-access lines. The companies' cellular-telephone businesses serve a total of approximately 50 million POPS - the second-highest total POPS served in the U.S.

Contel is a major local-telephone and cellular-service provider. Its telephone operations serve 2.6 million access lines in 30 states, and it operates cellular systems through a 90 percent-owned subsidiary, Contel Cellular, Inc. (NASDAQ-CCXLA), in 36 metropolitan areas and is a limited partner in 31 additional metropolitan areas. Contel's 1989 revenues were \$3.1 billion, with net income of \$287 million. It employs 22,000.

GTE subsidiaries operate in 46 states and 41 countries, with combined revenues and sales of \$17.4 billion and new income of \$1.4 billion in 1989. GTE is a leader in its three core businesses - telecommunications, lighting and precision materials - providing products and service worldwide.

## Developmental Screening Will Be Held August 22

On Wednesday, August 22, a developmental screening for young children ages zero to six (0-6) will be held at Eastland County MHMR Center, 301 Pogue Ave., Eastland, from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.). If a child is found to have two or

more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays has proven beneficial to the child, parents and teachers.
