





This notice concerns 1990 property tax rates for City of Rising Star. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Requests for cost-sharing of conservation practices are continuously being accepted. The County Committee will consider requests at the August 23 meeting. Additional approval periods will be announced as funds become available. Practices applicable at this time include reorganizing irrigation systems, water impoundment reservoirs and diversion terraces. Practices started prior to approval by the County Committee are not eligible.

Producers with an approved **Conservation Reserve Pro**gram (CRP) contract are reminded that no harvesting, having or grazing is allowed during the 10-year period of the contract.

Progress on completing measurement service on peanuts and other crops is on schedule. Producers will be notified soon that the measurement service is complete and of the final date to report their crop acreage.

Gordon Spot

This has been a most unusual August. I don't think I can ever remember having this much soil moisture on August 12th. Normally we can predict that the pecan weevil will emerge from the ground and start puncturing pecans in last August or early September, usually after a good fall rain. However, with the wet soil and cooler than normal temperatures the pecan weevil has been fooled. Two different pecans growers have called to report see-

ing a pecan weevil on a pecan tree during the first week of August.

This means that control of the weevil should begin now. Pecans punctured now will fall and the eggs deposited by the weevil will not hatch. After the pecan matures from the water stage to the dough stage the eggs will hatch and the white grubs will feed on

the kernels. The pecan weevil can be one of the most devastating pests of pecans in some areas where chemical control is neglected.

Adult weevils emerge from the soil underneath the trees. The adult weevil is 3/8 inch long and is dark to medium brown in color. It has a snout as long as its body. With its snout it punctures a hole all the way through the pecan shell and deposits eggs in the

pecan kernel. Creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads hatch and feed inside nuts during late summer and fall, completely consuming the kernel and ultimately attaining a length of about 3/5 inch. Upon reaching maturity, grubs chew a hole about 1/8 inch in diameter in the shell, emerge from the nut and drop to the ground in the fall or winter. The grub spends one or two years in the ground before emerging as an adult weevil.

Weevils must be controlled in the adult stage. Preferably, control is obtained before the adult weevil has laid eggs in the nuts. Once the eggs have been laid the grower has lost his chance to control that portion of the population until 2 or 3 years later.

Weevils may be seen on the nut cluster, but it is necessary to examine many clusters. Another method of detecting the weevils is to jar limbs with a padded pole or hook and catching the weevils that fall from the tree on a light colored ground cloth spread underneath the limb.

Sevin is still the most effective insecticide to control the adult weevils. Repeated spraying may be necessary if weevils continue to emerge from the ground. It is important to read and follow the label on the insecticide.

Ah yes, "Rising Star" I came to your 100th birthday. However, things were not quite the same as when I worked at the "Record."

You really should have been located around the corner on the lower floor of a two-story building; the second floor housed Dr. Frank Payne's office and some hospital rooms. "Doc" Sellers would greet callers at the Record office with a warm handshake. He was a quiet man, full of business. He hired me in the fall of 1935 after I had finished at RSHS in the spring. I worked five and a half days a week and made three dollars and fifty cents a week, and was glad to get that! At that time many men worked for a dollar a day and there were not many jobs in town available for girls. I remember one worked for West Texas Utilities, one at the bakery and perhaps a couple more elsewhere. My job was to gather local news, help address and mail the papers, get some of the ads and do some of the typing, plus other duties. The clickety-clack of the press in the back was a pleasant sound as I worked. Walk down memory lane with me as I gather news and ads. If I took a walk around the corner north, I would be greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Clark at the General Mercantile store, and next a friendly greeting and encouraging word from Hugh Childress at his men's store. Ashel and Cecil Joyce had the Piggly Wiggly store, where I had sold eggs for six cents a dozen! "Mac" Gibson had a drugstore on the same block and there was a cafe operated by the Vaughns. Hamburgers were a dime, pie fifty cents and coffee a nickel. Across the street Jay Koonce was the manager of the Higginbotham store. The Hortons had a drug store and at Agnew grocery, operated by Ray Agnew, you could get a big sack of groceries for five dollars. Frank Robertson had an insurance office on the street leading east; you could also get your social security card and driver's license there. both new programs back then. I got my driver's license after





The high school superintendent was E.T. Dawson. I believe the students of those depression years of the '30s had a closer bond than any other decade. The great depression will probably go down in history as one of the big events of this century,
