one warm day in the year 1905, there was born a girl child to Mr. and Mrs. R.A. Woods. She was given the name of Velma, and she was destined to bring joy into that rural home, the community of Rising Star, and, eventually, to the Baptist Church, here. For, it could almost be said, she was "born a-singing"

She was the third child in a family of seven children. Hers was a carefree life, as a young girl, filled to capacity with the very joy of living. Oh, there were hard times, for she was brought up in the days of The Great Depression--not to mention a crippling drought which held this area in its grip for about five years. Everyone worked, to eke out a living on the farm. In fact, honest toil became as much a part of her girlhood as did her singing. Early, she learned the truth that singing while working makes the job more pleasant, the finished product better! Velma's school years were quite simple: she attended the rural school of Shrum, in her early years, walking the two and a half miles, each day. Upon reaching high school age, she attended May School, riding her horse there, daily. Hers was a "no-frills" upbringing: Hard work on the farm, long treks to school, and no change to that routine except to attend church. For entertainment, the young people usually got together, after evening services, singing around the piano in one farm home or another. Sometimes, Velma sang soprano, but her is truly an alto voice. In the Autumn, when the hot summer days were winding down, when the year's crops had been harvested, and when there was just a hint of the cold weather ahead, there would be held a singing school. Velma always attended, for they were occasions for happiness for her. She

Kelly Kent knew how to work well with others. He blended. always unassumingly, with those about him ... always going the second mile.



for worship at the temple in Jerusalem. The Temple was to the Jew a lovely dwelling place of God with His people. We are not as the Jews of this Psalm moving toward Jerusalem to worship at the Temple. As Christians we move toward the eternal destiny of all saints, the very presence of God Himself in Heaven. For all who spend time in worship of the Lord there will be much for which we can praise God. I am encouraged by verses five and seven of this Psalm. So often weariness and exhaustion both mentally and emotionally overtake us.

The christian is blessed for he has strength from the Lord. We are able to go "from strength to strength" that is, as stength is used more strength is there to be used.

Who is the truely happy person to whom such strength is supplied? In the Berkeley version this man is he "in whose heart are Thy ways." would like to share with you a very handy use of your hands. When you have little ones in a worship service sometimes they like to play. And that is all right (if it is quiet play). But what can you do with the little fellows that is quiet and at the same time teaching them? Here is a little exercise I got from a man named Jack Exum.


On your left hand ask your thumb, "Who saves?" Then answer that using your fingers: the first one to answer back, "God Saves." (I Timothy 1:1), the second finger is to say "Christ saves" (II Timothy 1:10), the third answers back, "The Holy Spirit saves." (through revealing the Gospel, God's power to save, Romans 1:16, 17), and the little finger says that every man has a part in his own salvation, (Acts 2:40). Now on the other hand, ask the question, "What can save?" Going down the fingers they answer, Grace can save (Ephesians 2:5), Blood can save (Hebrews 9:22), the Gospel can save (Romans 1: 16, 17) and Obedience saves (Hebrews 5:9).

Now put both hands a few inches apart and build the great truth of God's plan to save. As you call the topic (represented by the finger) bend the finger toward the other. Then call for the truth represented by the opposite finger and they will come together making an apex. When all fingers are together, bring the two thumbs together and your hands will resemble a church house.

Here is how it works. God (first finger of the left hand), by His Grace (first finger of the right hand) sent His Son (second finger on left hand) to shed His Blood (second finger on right hand) so that the Holy Spirit (third finger on left hand) might reveal the Gospel, (third finger of right hand) that Ever Person (last finger of left hand) might obey (last finger of right hand).
