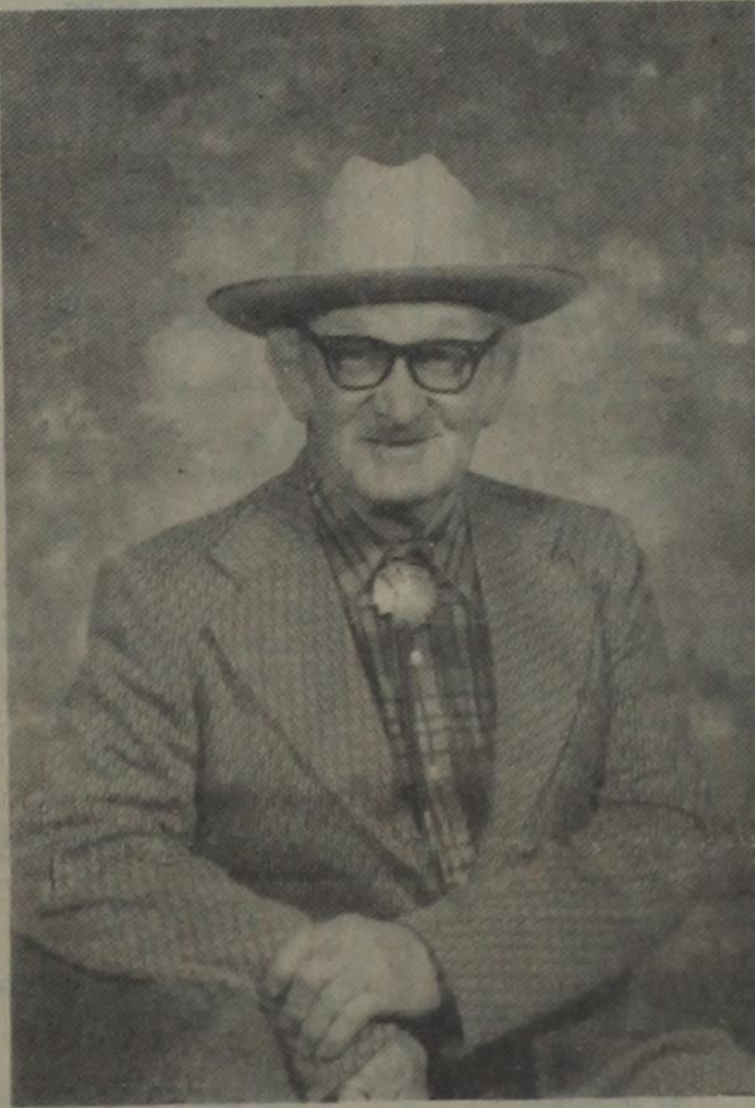

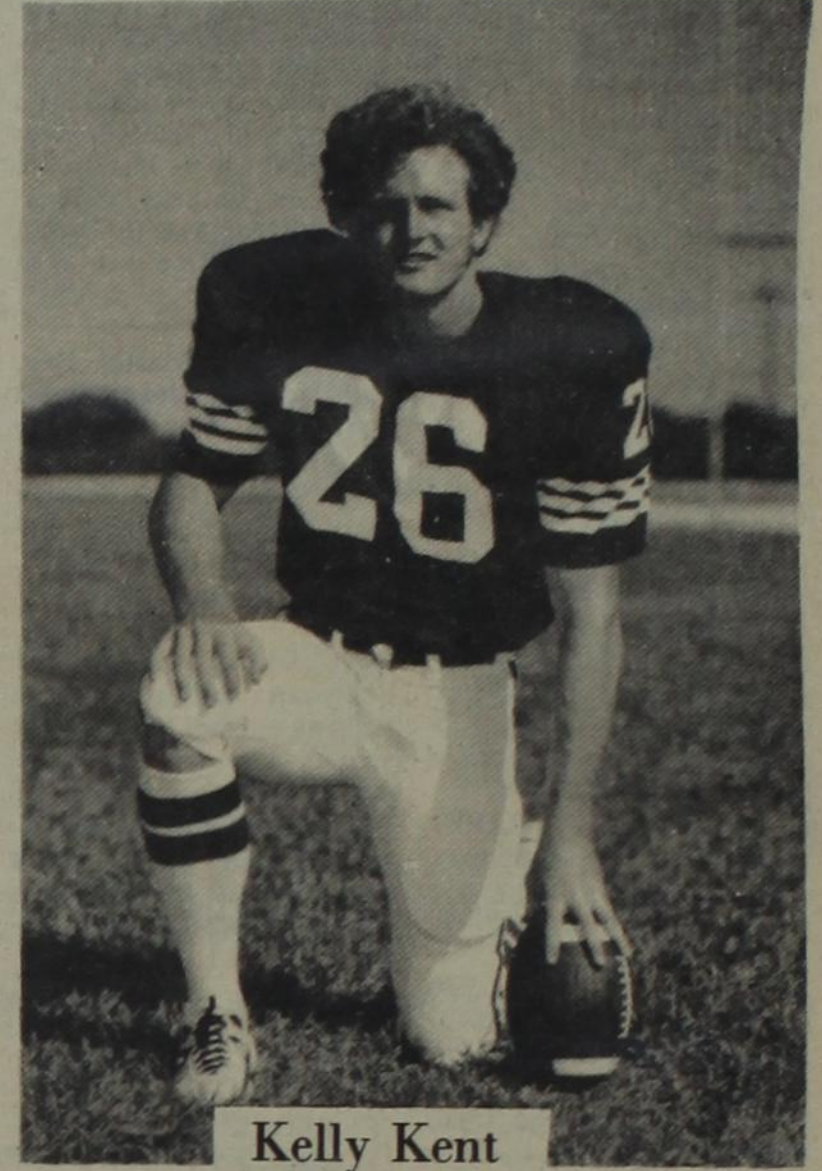
Fire Department Will Burn Lots

Grandson Of Local Dies Of Apparent Heart Attack

Kelly Kent, grandson of Mrs. Sam Jones died early Wednesday from an apparent heart attack.

Kent, 21, of Cisco, reportedly complained of irregular heart beat after an intramural basketball game Tuesday night. He suffered the attack about 3 a.m. and was pronounced dead at Hendrick Medical Center, where he was taken after his wife called for help.

His death was announced by Garvin Beauchamp, vice president for student personnel at the college.

Kent, 6-1 and 190 pounds, was a junior with a long list of football and academic awards.

He was the season rushing leader during the 1977 season, gaining 1,184 yards in 13 games and was named ACU's most valuable player that year, in which ACU won the Lone Star Conference and the NAIC Championship. Kent, who also played basketball and ran track, was also named to the academic all-Lone Star Conference squad in 1977 and 1978.

He was a 1976 graduate of Cisco High School, he was named an all-district and all-

area player three times.

"He worked out yesterday for football spring training, and Coach (Ted) Sitton said he had a good workout," said Beauchamp. "He played an intramural basketball game last night. When he got home his wife said his heart was beating fast and she massaged in his chest. He said it was a little painful but he thought it was from too much exercise."

"He watched a movie and went to bed. Then at about 3 a.m. he woke up with further pains and his wife called an ambulance. He never recovered," Beauchamp said.

"He was strong and healthy, an excellent study and a leader. It's a great loss," said Beauchamp.

He is survived by his wife Kerri, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hershel Kent of Cisco; two brothers, Danny, 25, and Craig, a high school student in Cisco; and two grandmothers, Mrs. Sam Jones of Rising Star and Emma Kent of Cisco.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday at Highland Church of Christ in Abilene, with burial afterward in Rising Star.

William Knope, fruit and vegetable field representative with USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, explains that the Peanut Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement.

It is made up of growers, shellers and the area association managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the Secretary to the entire industry.

The member position to be filled is currently held by Wayne Eaves of Gorman, Texas. His alternate, is E. A. Walker of DeLeon, Texas. Both terms expire in April 30, 1979.

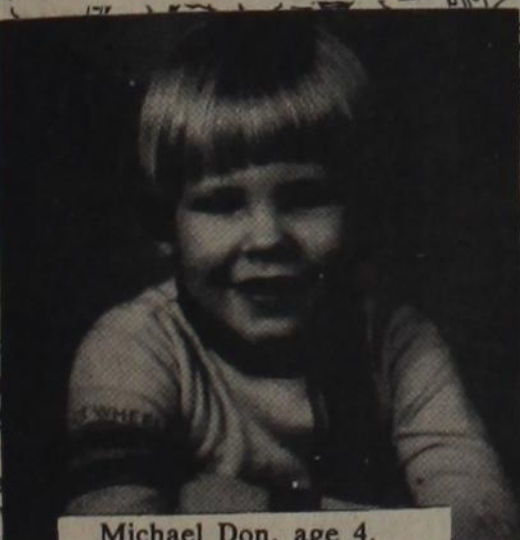
"No one has ever been charged for the benefits provided by St. Jude Hospital," Kirwen said. "And that includes the extremely expensive total medical care provided to

children enrolled in its research studies."

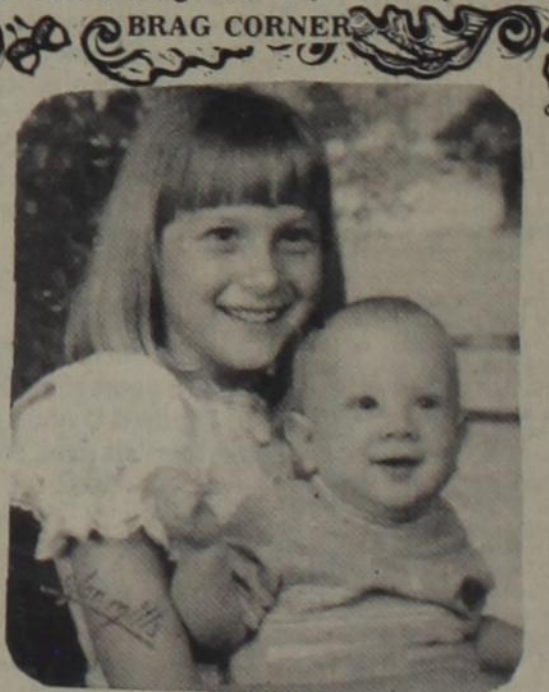
"Over two-thirds of this year's 19 million dollar operating budget came from public support. Each year we rely on events like this to pay for the following year's costs."

Bonnie Buchanan Keeps Going

*The following article is from the Tyler newspaper. Bonnie Buchanan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M.H. Buchanan of May is a student at Tyler Junior College where she is on the basketball team. Tyler Junior College's Apache Ladies break away from Texas Eastern Conference basketball play to tangle with Hill Junior College at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday at Wagstaff Gymnasium.

TJC, still ranked No. 2 nationally in the latest National Junior College Athletic Association cage poll released Tuesday, takes

an 18-2 season mark and 4-0 TEC record into Wednesday's tilt.

Tyler's ladies met Hill's fens earlier in the year and whipped them 87-47 at Hillsboro.

On Hill, TJC coach Herb Richardson had to offer, "They have plenty of size and he carries about 15 girls on the roster."

"We're anxious to play Hill again," Richardson continued. "The girls didn't feel they played very well the last time they played Hill. So, they are looking to improve their game a little bit."

Richardson said he'd start his usual five of Janice Mulford and Dee Dee James at the posts, Bonnie Buchanan and Patsy Roach at the wings and Diane Landriault at a point guard. Linda Henry has missed the past two games due to "health problems" but is expected to return for Thursday's practice, says Richardson.

TJC's gals average 90.6 points a game (tops in the nation) and give up 53.

Buchanan, an all-stater from May, leads the team in scoring and rebounding, averaging 26.2 points and

17.3 rebounds a game.

The sophomore sharpshooter has hit a phenomenal percentage from the floor this season. Buchanan, on the year, has hit 220 shots in 351 attempts for 61 percent. She also has 155 assists for a 7.8 average and she's blocked 59 shots for an average of three a game. Mulford, averaging 23 points and 12 rebounds, has hit 60 percent of her floor shots (196 of 321) and is hitting at a 67 percent clip from the line, canning 44 of 66.

James is averaging 16 points a game and six rebounds, while Roach hits for 5.7 and averages three assists. Diane Landriault hits

at a 6 points per game norm and reserve wing Shaon Fuller 4.3 points and 2.4 assists.

As a team, TJC is hitting 53 percent of its shots from the field.

The Apache Ladies return to TEC play at 5:30 p.m. Saturday against defending national champion Panola Junior College in Wagstaff Gym.

"I've been well pleased with our effort," Richardson said. "I'd call this the best team I've had in four years here."

Richardson has compiled an 80-17 record since TJC began ladies basketball four years ago.

Peanut notices will be mailed on February 15, reflecting the 1979 basic peanut allotment and quota for the farm. An additional notice will be mailed in March to reflect the undermarketings of quota peanuts for the farm. The National quota factor is .7527 reflecting a 24.73 percent cut from the farm base. In 1978 the National quota factor was .7936. This means that a farm must plant 75.27 percent of the effective allotment to be eligible to carry forward any undermarketings of quota. A farm must plant 56.45 percent of the effective allotment to be eligible to transfer quota from the farm during the June 15 to November 30 period.

Transfer of peanut allotments and quota by sale, lease or owner will be accepted beginning February 16. Allotments and quota can be transferred until June 14, 1979.

A Note Of Warning To The Citizens Of Rising Star

SECTION 5: DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND WASTE MATERIALS.

a. Sanitary Regulations. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to place deposit, throw, permit or cause to be placed,

deposited, or thrown any garbage, brush, loose waste, or refuse of any kind on public or private property outside of any house, building, flat, or tenement in the City of Rising Star, Texas, unless the same has been

deposited in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

b. Violations. The following acts, among others, are declared to be unlawful and are deemed to be in violation of this Ordinance, and are declared to be trespasses, and subject to the penalties as provided by this Ordinance, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

1) Throwing, placing, dumping, or depositing of any lawn trimmings, hedge trimmings or weed, flowers, or other vegetation on lots (vacant or occupied), driveways or other private property;

2) Throwing, placing, dumping or depositing of any lawn trimmings, hedge trimmings, or other cuttings or trimmings of weeds, flowers, or other vegetation in any gutter, street, sidewalk, parkway, driveway, curb, alley, or any other public property of the City;

4) Failure of the owner to or occupant of any store or other place of business situated within the City to exercise reasonable diligence at all times to keep his premises clean of waste paper, wrapping paper, paper napkin, cartons, package containers, and other used or waste materials thrown, or left on, said premises by his customers and to take reasonable measures to prevent same from drifting or blowing to adjoining premises;

5) Failure to place on the premises receptacles of sufficient size and number in which the above-referred-to articles of waste may be deposited, and which are

accessible to the customers of such business;

6) Failure of the owner or occupant of every business establishment to place in a conspicuous place, or places, upon his premises in close proximity to the receptable, or receptables referred to above, a sign which shall, in essence, convey to his customers a request that they use such receptacles for the disposal of waste material;

7) The disposal by any customer going upon the premises of another of waste paper, wrapping paper, paper napkins, cartons, package containers, and other used or waste material, except in receptacles provided for such purposes;

8) The disposal of dead animals shall be in a place designated by the operation of the landfill. Domestic livestock will not be dumped at the landfill.

c. Penalty. It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or permit to be or remain in or upon any premises (private or public) any animal or vegetable or mineral matters of any composition or residue thereof, which is in an unsanitary condition or injurious to public health, and after any of such items have remained upon any premises (public or private) for more than seven (7) days, it will be presumed that the same is an unsanitary condition and injurious to public health. A violation of this Subsection shall constitute a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to the penalties provided in this Ordinance.

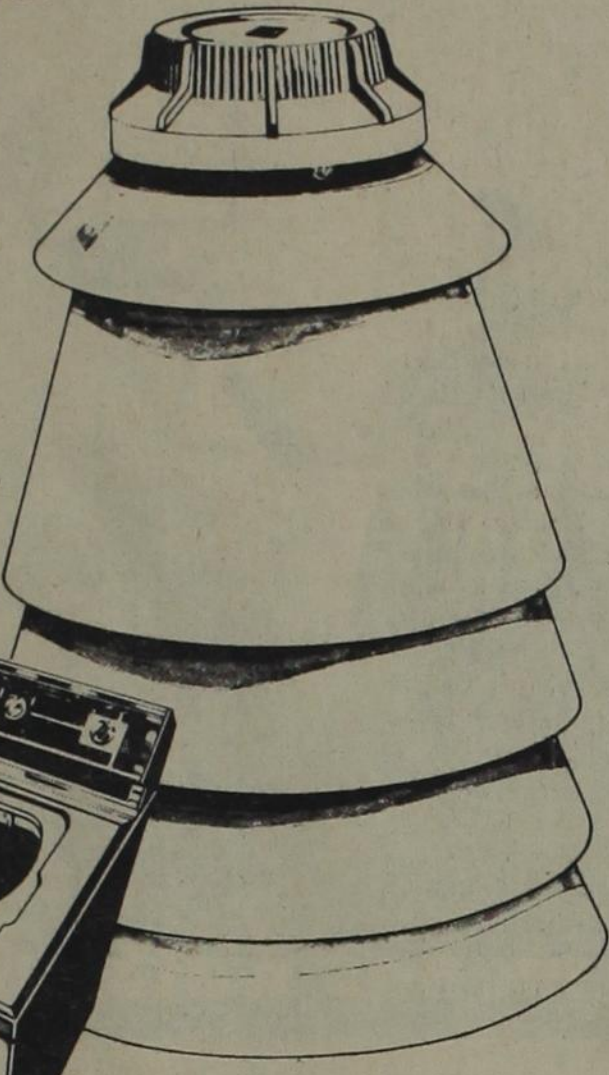

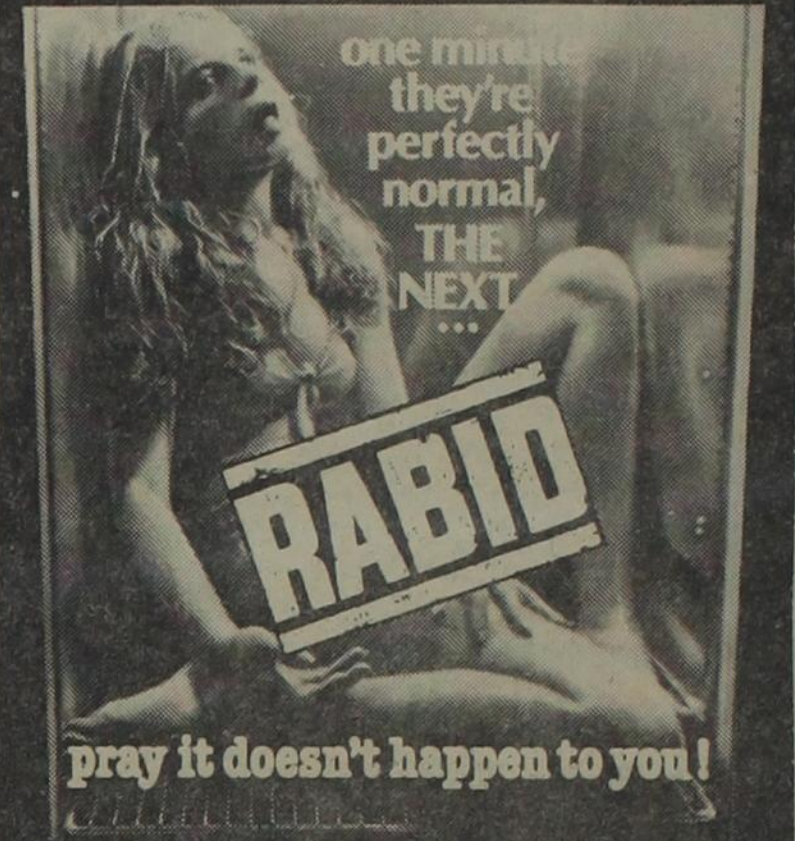

Of course, it's not a perfect church, that's simple to discern, but you and I and all of us could cause the tide to turn. What fools we are to flee our post in that unfruitful search to find at last where problems loom. God proudly builds His church. So let's keep working in our church, until the Resurrection, and then we each will join that Church without imperfection. Danile 4:29-34; Wherefore, O King, let my counsel be acceptable unto thee, and break off thy sins by righteousness, and thine iniquities by shewing mercy to the poor; if it may be a lengthening of thy tranquillity. All this came upon the king Nebuchadnezzar. At the end of twelve months he walked in the palace of the kingdom of Babylon. The king spake, and said, Is not this great Babylon, that I have built for the house of the kingdom by the might of my power, and for the honour of my majesty? While the word was in the king's mouth, there fell a voice from heaven, saying, I king Nebuchadnezzar, to these is spoken; The kingdom is departed from thee. And they shall drive thee from men, and thy dwelling shall be with the beasts of the field; they shall make thee to eat grass as oxen, and seven times shall pass over thee, until thou know that the most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever he will. How much thought do we give to the worship of God from day to day? It is interesting what a quiet time of reading God's word and prayer will do for us as we face the activities of each new day.

Psalms 84 speaks of longing for worship at the temple in Jerusalem. The Temple was to the Jew a lovely dwelling place of God with His people. We are not as the Jews of this Psalm moving toward Jerusalem to worship at the Temple. As Christians we move toward the eternal destiny of all saints, the very presence of God Himself in Heaven. For all who spend time in worship of the Lord there will be much for which we can praise God.

I am encouraged by verses five and seven of this Psalm. So often weariness and exhaustion both mentally and emotionally overtake us. The Christian is blessed for he has strength from the Lord. We are able to go "from strength to strength", that is, as strength is used more strength is there to be used.

Who is the truly happy person to whom such strength is supplied? In the Berkeley version this man is he "in whose heart are Thy ways." We cannot expect God's help in our lives and ignore God's demands for godly living in our lives. The advise of Proverbs 4:18-27 speaks to this point. "My son, attend to my words, incline thine ear unto my sayings. Let them not depart from thine eyes; keep them in the midst of thine heart. Ponder the path of thy feet, and let all thy ways be established. Turn not to the right nor to the left, remove thy foot from evil."

The person who has made such a commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior is the one who knows daily strength from God.

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Church of Christ

I would like to share with you a very handy use of your hands. When you have little ones in a worship service sometimes they like to play. And that is all right (if it is quiet play). But what can you do with the little fellows that is quiet and at the same time teaching them? Here is a little exercise I got from a man named Jack Exum.

On your left hand ask your thumb, "Who saves?" Then answer that using your fingers: the first one to answer back, "God Saves." (I Timothy 1:1), the second finger is to say "Christ saves" (II Timothy 1:10), the third answers back, "The Holy Spirit saves." (through revealing the Gospel, God's power to save, Romans 1:16, 17), and the little finger says that every man has a part in his own salvation, (Acts 2:40). Now on the other hand, ask the question, "What can save?" Going down the fingers they answer, Grace can save (Ephesians 2:5), Blood can save (Hebrews 9:22), the Gospel can save (Romans 1:16, 17) and Obedience saves (Hebrews 5:9).

Now put both hands a few inches apart and build the great truth of God's plan to save. As you call the topic (represented by the finger) bend the finger toward the other. Then call for the truth represented by the opposite finger and they will come together making an apex. When all fingers are together, bring the two thumbs together and your hands will resemble a church house.

Here is how it works. God (first finger of the left hand), by His Grace (first finger of the right hand) sent His Son (second finger on left hand) to shed His Blood (second finger on right hand) so that the Holy Spirit (third finger on left hand) might reveal the Gospel, (third finger of right hand) that Every Person (last finger of left hand) might obey (last finger of right hand). This completes the "house."

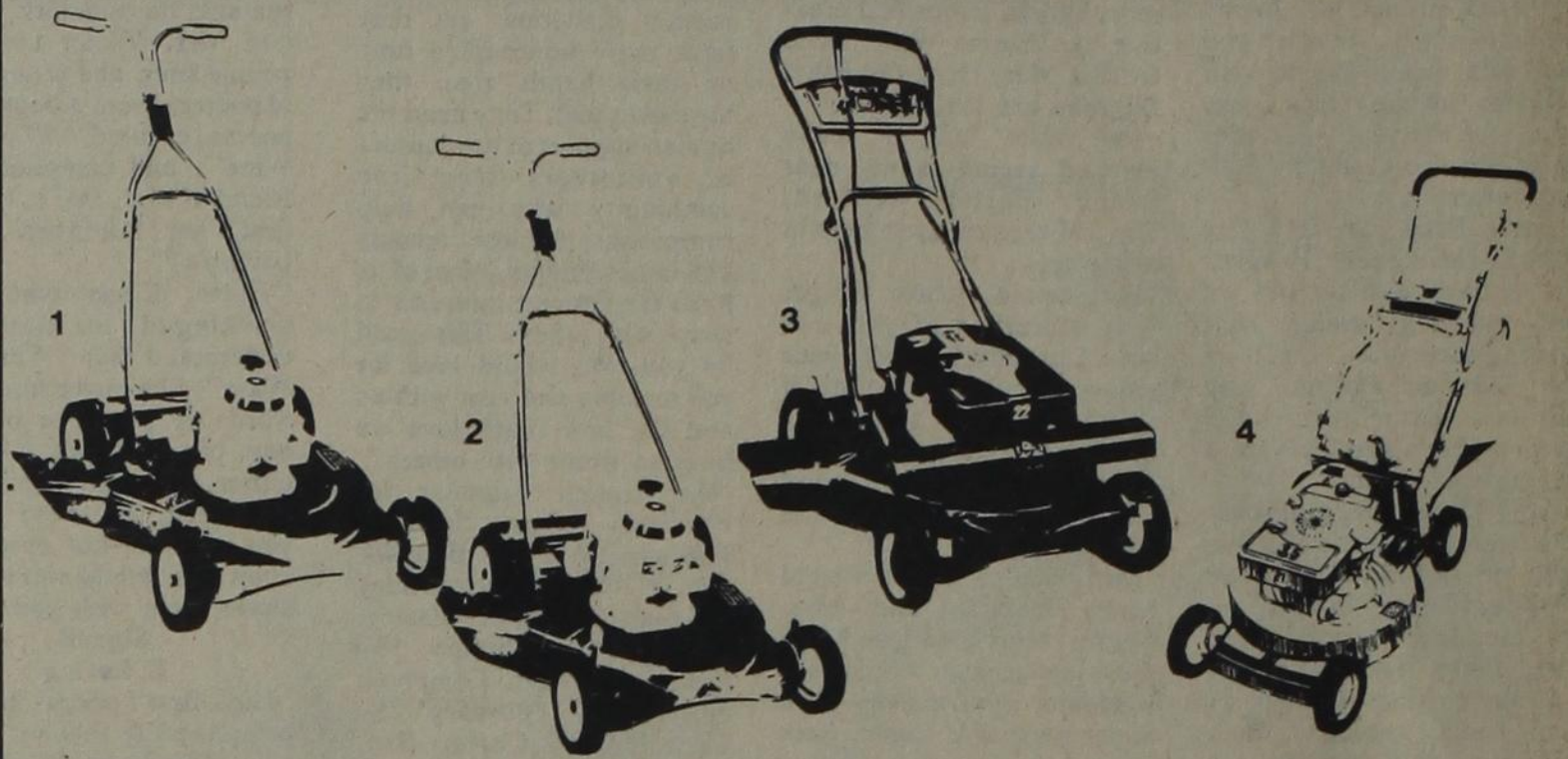

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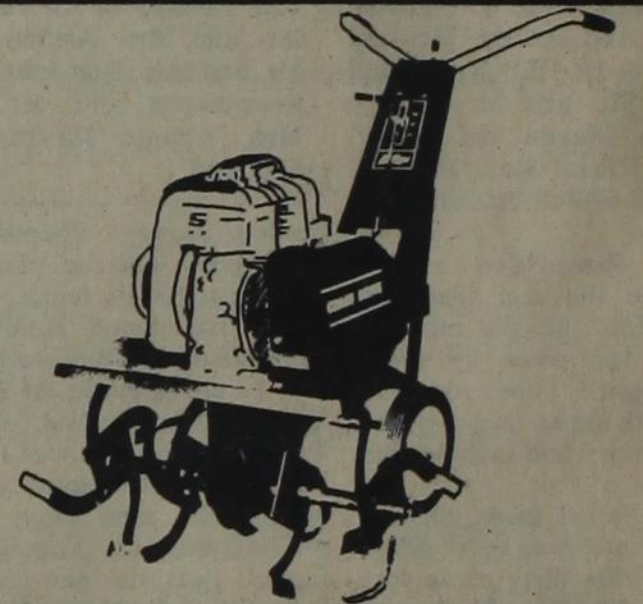
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
