



During the 18th century, however, interior decorators like Thomas Sheraton did focus on windows. These decorators preferred pale, fairly lightweight fabrics and made their draperies extremely ornate, replete with overlapping swags, extravagant cascades, and elaborate trimmings.

The Victorians overdid draperies just as they overdid everything else. No fewer than three, and often four, layers hung at their windows: a rolled window shade, a pair or sheer or lace curtains that were always closed, a pair of opaque draw curtains to be closed in the evening, and lavish drapery of rich materials that was left open and functioned as an ornamental frame.

In the twentieth century, we are content with one or two layers of curtaining and lean toward tailored effects. We do, however, draw heavily on nineteenth century arrangements of curtains and draperies. A tree too heavily loaded will produce small peaches that measure only 158 to 134 inches in diameter, A large peach with good quality has a strong ready acceptance as a dessert type fruit Besides, it takes less peaches to fill a market container when they are large: for example, it takes only 159 peaches which are 212 inches in diameter to fill a bushel basket. while it takes 293 if the diameter is only 2 inches.

We established a peach thinning demonstration in an orchard owned by Chester Marrs of the Chaney Community last week. A mechanical shaker was used to thin the peaches.
