Winter Weather Hits Area

Icy Interstate 20 "skidding" through Eastland County appeared to be the new Mason-Dixon line between the "frozen north" and the "not-quite" frozen south.

This entire area was hit Monday evening by the worse winter storm of the season with falling mist and "at freezing" temperatures, which left a thin glaze of ice over most of the area, particularly on bridges and overpasses.

The mail truck didn't make it from Fort Worth into this area until late in the day. Reports of major pileups on Int. 20 and 30 (the Turnpike) were heard as icing conditions appeared to be worse around that area.

Question: Is the conscience a safe guide in spiritual matters? Can a person trust his conscience to guide him in religion and prepare him for eternity?

Answer: The conscience alone cannot be trusted as a safe guide in spiritual matters. A man's conscience is his evaluation, approval, or disapproval of what is right or wrong according to moral judgement. A man's moral judgement, however, is determined by his education and environmental influences. If one's moral judgement has been formed by error or unreliable information, then his conscience will be untrustworthy. In fact, even if a man's moral judgement is based on information which is 100 percent correct, his own opinions and prejudices may cause him to make a wrong decision, and therefore, err in conscience.

The scriptures teach us that a man cannot simply trust his conscience or inner feelings. "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." (Prov. 14:12; 16:25). "He that trusteth in his own heart is a fool" (Prov. 28:26).

"O Jehovah, I know that the way of man is not in himself; it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps" (Jeremiah 10:23).

A very honest, devout, and dedicated person may sometimes be seriously wrong in

matters of conscience. Saul of Tarsus, later known as Paul, is an example of one who although he had a clear conscience, "...laid waste the church, entering into every house, and dragging men and women committed them to prison" (Acts 8:3). After becoming Christian, Saul told the Jews "I persecuted this Way unto the death, binding and delivering into prisons both men and women" (Acts 22:4); "I verily thought with myself that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth" (Acts 26:9). Yet, during all of this Saul maintained "a conscience void of offence toward God and men always" (Acts 24:16). Saul claimed "I have lived before God in all good conscience until this day" (Acts 23:1).

Obviously Saul's conscience was not a safe guide, for he was ignorant of the truth (1 Tim. 1:3). Other people have "made shipwreck" of their conscience by rejecting the truth (1 Tim. 1:19-20). Still others have their conscience "seared with a hot iron" by accepting false doctrine (1 Tim. 4:1-2).

A person must guide his life by the word of God (Ps. 19:7-11, 119:105; 2 Tim. 3:16-17). We must each

be willing to say, "What saith the scriptures?", so that God might direct our lives and guide us in the paths of righteousness.

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GORDON SPOT

The rains during January have pleased most people in Eastland County. The farmers and ranchers see the winter rains as being very important, as this provides the needed moisture for a good planting season in the spring. After the very dry fall, most of us were a little worried about the moisture condition of 1980.

What is this warm weather going to do to our fruit trees? We have heard this question asked several times. If the warm weather continues, we will probably see fruit trees blooming in February and most likely the blooms or small fruit would be killed by a late freeze.

The fruit trees need more cold weather. Not only is this necessary to keep them from blooming early, but fruit trees need a certain number of chilling hours to produce fruit. Chilling hours are hours when the temperature is below 45 degrees Fahrenheit. The number of chilling hours required varies from one variety to another.

Normally we don't have to worry about this in Eastland County, but this year may be an exception. Most peach varieties require from 700 to 900 chilling hours.

Fruit trees usually live longer and produce more fruit when they receive proper pruning.

Larger fruits and better fruit colors result from better light distribution throughout the tree after pruning. Cultivation, spraying and harvesting are also made easier by pruning.

With annual pruning, the growth of a tree can be guided to establish secure branches correctly on the main trunk. By selecting and establishing scaffold branches early, you can avoid many large cuts later on.

First prune dead or dying wood and suckers growing from the trunk and large limbs. Next remove interfering branches.

Prune limbs that grow inward, criss-cross through the tree or lie directly on

over another. Leave only those limbs that radiate outward.

After suckers and interfering branches are removed, thin the remaining terminal growth. Use discrimination and regularity when pruning the tips of branches.

Make all pruning cuts flush with and parallel to the branch structure. When removing the end of a branch, make the cut just beyond a side branch since close cuts heal faster.

Although late winter is the best pruning time, do not prune trees in extremely cold weather as trees may be injured.

If you have young peach or plum trees you will need to train them to an open center system. To do this, select three limbs radiating in 120 degree angles from the uppermost part of the trunk as primary scaffold branches. The lowest scaffold branch should be 18 inches from ground level and pointing southwest to shade the trunk from intense sunlight.

Leave enough trunk space so there are 8 to 12 inches of trunk between primary scaffold branches. If all these branches emerge from the trunk near the same location, the trunk may split from a heavy fruit crop.

The Leon-Bosque project includes Bosque, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Somervell counties and two members from each of the five counties serve on the R.C.&D. Executive Council. Serving from Eastland County are Gene Abbott, Cisco, and Dale Bakker, Eastland.

The Council normally meets Bi-monthly in Stephenville, however, this year the meetings are being rotated among the counties so that the various on-going projects can be observed by the group.

The meeting prior to the tour was held in the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Building. Bosque County Judge C.K. Word, Jr., is Chairman of the council.

Cotton Board

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm today called the appointment of two 17th District men to positions on the national Cotton Board "recognition of the

area as a top cotton producing region and of the depth of leadership ability available within the industry."

Billy Golden of Seymour was named a member of the board, which administers the national cotton research and promotion program. Named as an alternate was Jack Young of Stamford. Young will fill the 2-year alternate's term ending December 31, 1981.

"It is no secret that cotton producers have been looking to Secretary of Agriculture (Bob) Bergland to strengthen the Board," Stenholm said. Producer criticism and recent reports in the media have leveled charges of improper administration by both the Cotton Board and Cotton Inc., which develops and carries out cotton research and promotion under contract with the Board.

"I have always been a strong supporter of

Cotton Inc.," Stenholm said, "and continue to believe in the importance of its role in continued fiber research and promotion. But, I am also aware of the distrust in the program that some producers have developed during the past months."

"Cotton Inc. is solely supported by investments of producers and it is ultimately their own company," Stenholm continued. "As a member of the House Cotton Sub-committee and as a producer, I am particularly interested in seeing to it that the program is administered effectively and that producers are getting the most for their investment."

Stenholm said the Cotton Sub-committee has scheduled hearings on the Cotton Inc. issue in Washington February 26 and 27.

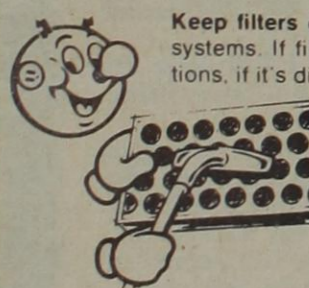

Check your thermostat setting. Recommended temperature setting for winter heating is 68°. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the lower your energy cost.



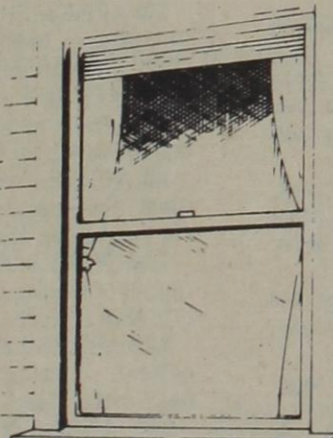
Have your heating system checked regularly! Proper servicing is good preventive maintenance.



Keep filters clean. Check the filter every 30 days on forced-air systems. If filter is permanent, clean it by manufacturer's directions, if it's disposable, replace when dirty.



Have your home properly insulated! Adequate home insulation keeps the warmth in, cuts energy use... can pay for itself by lowering heating (and cooling) costs.



Use the warmth of the sunshine! On sunny days open the drapes. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
