Open Letter to Residents of Rising Star

We, the volunteer ambulance service personnel, would like to make an appeal for your support. There are three areas that have to be fulfilled for this service to exist.

(1) TRANSPORTATION

Presently we have three units, a 1969 Pontiac, a 1971 Oldsmobile and a recently purchased 1978 Ford. Two of these units are at the point of unreliability. Some upgrading had to be done, or the service as you presently know it would be unable to function. The purchase of the 1978 Ford was a step taken to assure you and us of having dependable transportation when needed. Our intentions for the Pontiac are for it to have some badly needed repairs and to be kept as a back-up, transfer unit. The Oldsmobile will be sold, if possible, and the money applied toward the purchase of the Ford unit.

To make all of this possible we must have the support from individuals of this community who have a heartfelt need for an ambulance service,

not only for themselves but for neighbors and friends.

(2) PEOPLE

It takes quite a number of volunteer people to make this service possible. Take this past month, June, as an example. We made 17 ambulance runs at all times of the day and night, some emergency sicknesses, some emergencies of other kinds (wrecks) and some transfers. These were made without charge to the ones in need. Most of these, as in most of our calls, make a donation for which we thank them very much, but still it is without charge and the ones who cannot afford to pay get the same service as the ones who can and will donate.

The ideal number of crew members is three: driver, nurse and attendant. The number of volunteers has declined so that for the most part we are operating with a two-person crew, and having a difficult time finding this number.

We need volunteers, not only as drivers, attendants and, not least, nurses, but for people to do babysitting on a

REACT seized the chance to fulfill a long-awaited goal in acquiring the 1978 Ford van from Pafford and Patton, an ambulance service in Eastland. For the past several months the group has known that one of the two ambulances on hand was nearing the stage where it would take major investments in repairs for it to be of any use. The community had been made aware of the need for a replacement for that unit and almost \$3,000 have been donated to that ambulance fund.

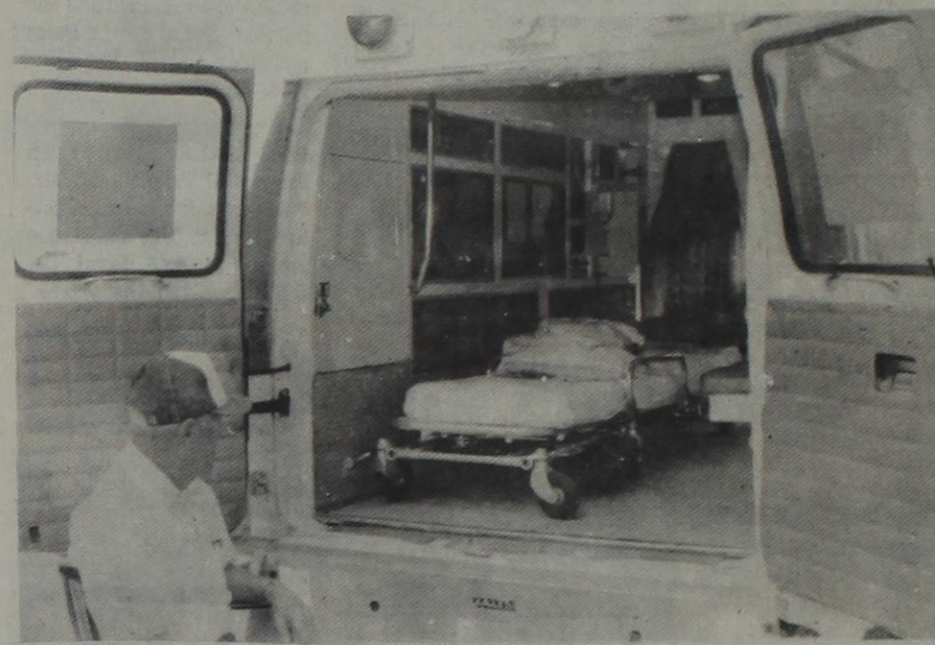

Canusa Energy Prepares To Drill Wildcat

Canusa Energy Inc. of San Antonio is preparing to drill the No. 1 G.D. Dickie Inc., a 4,900-ft. Stephens County oil wildcat 11 miles northwest of Crystal Falls. The location will be in a 275-acre lease in Stephens County's G. Waggoner Survey.

Operating out of Graham, Piranha Productions Inc. has staked drillsite for the No. 12 Corbett, a shallow developmental probe in the Stephens Regular Field three miles northeast of Ivan. Projected total depth is 800 feet. The operation will be in a 240-acre lease in the SPRR Survey.

wildcat for oil or gas is scheduled for spudding five miles west of Strawn. The explorer well will be known as the No. 9 Copeland Ranch. Midcentral Energy Inc. of Graham is the operation. Location is in a 580-acre lease block in the T&PRR Survey.

City Receives Dividends

THURSDAY, JULY 21, 1983

Mayor Doris Griffin announced today that the City of Rising Star has received a \$221.00 dividend from the Texas Municipal League Workers' Compensation Joint Insurance Fund. The dividend represents the City's share of the Fund's annual excess contribution return which this year totaled \$3,433,894.

According to Mayor Griffin, the city is one of only 409 Texas cities to receive a dividend check. She attributes this to the city's employee accident prevention efforts as well as the overall financial and

operating success of the TML Fund.

The Fund is a unique legal arrangement wherein 635 participating members collectively provide workers' compensation insurance protection to their combined 88,000 municipal employees. Marvin Townsend, City Manager of Laredo and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, expressed pride in the fact that the TML Fund cities enjoy a better loss ratio than all Texas commercial policyholders combined.

Avoid Mosquito Hazard

College Station—With Texas' heavy spring and summer rains, homeowners need to be on guard against a "bumper crop" of mosquitos and the health hazards they bring.

Encephalitis is spread by the bite of an infected mosquito, which receives the infection by first biting an infected animal, says Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Texas offers an ideal environment for encephalitis because of its large bird populations which can become infected with the virus and carry it great distances, she adds. So far this year the Texas Department of Health has reported no human cases of mosquito-borne encephalitis. But

last year in Texas, 18 cases of St. Louis encephalitis in humans were reported.

In addition, infection from scratching mosquito bites and allergic reactions causing redness, swelling and itching are other possible health hazards.

While many areas have mosquito control districts or local health programs for reducing mosquito populations, homeowners should still take measures to prevent infestations, declares Shirer. Homeowners should keep doors and window screens in good repair and make sure they fit tightly to keep mosquitos outside. A commercial spray can eliminate mosquitos which get indoors.

The best practice, however is to eliminate standing water, since mosquitos must have

water in which to hatch their eggs. Shirer recommends periodic cleaning of roof gutters and all water holding containers such as bird baths, flower containers and pet's watering dishes.

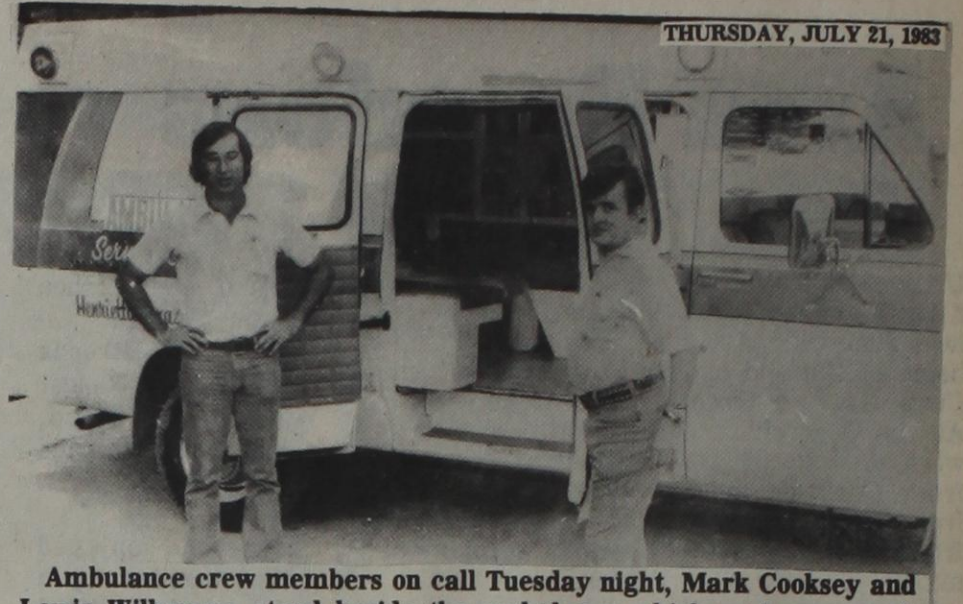
