Open Letter to Residents of Rising Star

We, the volunteer ambulance service personnel, would like to make an appeal for your support. There are three areas that have to be fulfilled for this service to exist. (1)TRANSPORTATI-ON

Presently we have three units. a 1969 Pontiac, a 1971 Oldsmobile and a recently purchased 1978 Ford. Two of these units are at the point of unreliability. Some upgrading had to be done, or the service as you presently know

it would be unable to function. The purchase of the 1978 Ford was a step taken to assure you and us of having dependable transportation when needed. Our intentions for the Pontiac are for it to have some badly needed repairs and to be kept as a back-up, transfer unit. The Oldsmobile will be sold, if possible, and toward the purchase of

the Ford unit. To make all of this possible we must have the support from individuals of this comnot only for themselves but for neighbors and friends. (2) PEOPLE

It takes quite a number of volunteer people to make this service possible. Take this past month, June, as an example. We made 17 ambulance runs at all times of the day and night, some emergency sicknesses, some emergencies of other kinds (wrecks) and some transfers. These were made without charge to the ones in need. Most of these, as in most of our calls, make a donation for which we thank them very much, but still it is without charge and the ones who cannot afford to pay get the same service as the ones who can and will donate.

The ideal number of crew members is three: driver, nurse and attendant. The number of volunteers has declined so that for the most part we are operating with a twoperson crew, and having a difficult time finding this number.

Volunteer Ambulance Service Adds Another Ambulance

Rising Star **REACT's regular mon**thly meeting Tuesday night included an uncommon element, the opportunity for members to familiarize themselves with a newly purchased ambulance.

REACT seized the chance to fulfill a longawaited goal in acquiring the 1978 Ford van from Pafford and Patton, an ambulance service in Eastland. For the past several months the group has known that one of the two ambulances on hand was nearing the stage where it would take major investments in repairs for it to be of any use. The community had been made aware of the need for a replacement for that unit and almost \$3,000 have been donated to that ambulance fund.

The Ford was purchased for \$7,800 and, after the down payment is made, will be paid for in payments of approximately \$158

While many areas have mosquito control districts or local health porgrams for reducing mosquito populations, homeowners should still take measures to prevent infestations, declares Shirer. Homeowners should keep doors and window screens in good repair and make sure they fit tightly to keep mosquitos outside. A commercial spray can eliminate mosquitos which get indoors.
