

Farm Road Okayed For Eastland Co.

A new section of Farm to Market Road has been approved in Eastland County by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission according to District Engineer Lawrence Schulz of Brownwo-

The road will extend from FM 2214 0.8 miles south of FM 2461, south to the junction of FM 2689 and FM 2563, a distance of 2.3 miles. This road will provide a connection from the Kokomo community to the Lake Leon area.

Estimated construction cost is \$125,000. This project is a joint effort

between Eastland County and the State. Eastland County will furnish the necessary right of way and the State will provide for the construction.

R.P. Haun, Jr., resident engineer at Eastland, will be in charge of the project. Planning should begin later this year and construction could begin in mid





From the perspective of the world, a life of righteousness and respect for Biblical principles seems so useless and ridiculous, but once the line has been crossed and things are viewed from the other side, those making the change often express amazement that the decision was so long in coming and that all others not yet "enlightened" fail to see the need. Satan's deceptive dressing of his unholy ways, plus traditionally acquired prejudices often hinder an honest, objective appraisal of Scriptural ways and principles.

An additional factor, perhaps, which often prevents a move in the direction of righteousness and deep respect for God's Word is the stress that has been laid upon the principle of liberty and especially religious liberty.

No one, particularly in America, would ever dream of questioning the right of each individual to live and worship according to his own conscience, in the CIVIL sence. Our constitution guarantees that right. One may be a Moslem, Jew, Hindoo, Roman Catholic, Baptist, Methodist, or whatever and violate no law of our land. Even the strange and extreme groups find shelter here, as long as their activities do not conflict with the right and well-being of others.

But to transpose this liberty from the civil to the religious area and say that each one has the sacred right to do what he pleases religiously is to ignore resolves must be made. "This openly the very core of Bible one thing I do" reveals the teaching: that God's will is the ardent determination, the ultimate direction, as revealed through His Son Jesus and in turn, through the apostles and writers of the Scriptures. 

They are trying to persuade the Federal Communications Commission to change its rules so that they can lock up rights to movies for pay-cable TV and keep them off free TV. If they succeed, the movies you now enjoy at home for free would be charged to you, plus a separate monthly charge.

About ten million homes now have cable TV service. If only one million of them could afford to pay \$1.50 to see a movie, the pay-cable operators could easily take the movie away from free TV, which can only pay around \$800,000 for a typical hit movie. One million viewers could deprive 70 million families of seeing these mov-

ies for free. In addition, it could bring about the demise of local stations, which show movies paid for by advertisers.
