Pump System (WEPS) unit. Financial aid to stretch local support dollars further came from the state forestry agen-

The department was able to obtain an almost new truck for only \$4,000 through the Rural Community Fire Protection (RCFP) program of the Texas Forest Service. The truck, along with several others, had been purchased by the state forestry agency. The forestry agency's fire control department, in turn, has made the trucks available at its cost to the state's VFDs.

The Rising Star VFD also received \$1,250 in RCFP cost-sharing aid toward the purchase of its WEPS unit. Firefighters can vary the output of the unit from wet water to foam to meet the fire situation encountered.

Other VFDs can take advantage of the Service's RCFP cost-sharing program. Qualified VFDs can receive cost-sharing aid of 50 percent -- up to \$4,000-toward truck purchases and up to \$3,000 toward foamproducing Water Expansion Pump System (WEPS) units.

RCFP funds have assisted with the placement of over 1,500 trucks, WEPS units and other fire apparatus since 1973. In addition, several firefighter associations have obtained \$5,000 in financial Plan your hand crafts and aid - plus designing, licensing and purchasing assistance - toward basic

county-wide, high band raido communications systems. Rural firefighters have received training in wildland fire suppression and have taken advantage of discounts of around 30 percent on bunker gear purchased through the TFS RCFP Fire-Safe Fund.

For additional information about assistance available to rural firefighters, contact the Texas Forest Service, Fire Control Department, P.O. Box 310, Lufkin, Texas 75901, phone 409-639-8100. Thanks to two such contacts, **Rising Star firefighters gain**ed financial aid toward the purchase of a truck and WEPS unit.

Paul Hannemann from the Texas Forest Service presented the check for \$1,250 to the Rising Star Rural Fire Department Saturday. He also gave a slide presentation on fighting wildfire and using the new WEPS unit, as well as demonstrating how to use the WEPS unit himself.



10 EXTRA TIPS FOR CUTTING OUT CALO-**RIES AFTER THE HOLI-**DAYS:

Eating to lose weight does not have to be a matter of munching on carrot sticks all day long. Here are some suggestions for lowering calorie intake without feeling deprived.

*** Have a hamburger instead of a cheeseburger. Two slices of American cheese contain 210 calories.

*** Drink one less can of soda a day or switch to dict soda. That will save almost 150 calorics.

*** Bring a 100-caloric banana to the office so that when the urge for a sweet pick me up hits in mid-afternoon you won't buy a 200-300 caloric candy bar.

*** If you must munch, munch on pretzels, a much less fatty snack than potato chips. The difference between pretzels and potato chips, in fact, can be as much as 100 calories an ounce.

*** Buy cupcakes instead of a whole cake. A two-ounce chocolate cupcake has about 165 calories. A two-ounce slice of chocolate cake is an unsatisfying sliver, so you're bound to succumb to eating more.

*** Go easy on tartar sauce. One less tablespoon means 70 fewer calories.

*** To sweeten your French toast, spread a little cinnamon sugar over it rather than maple syrup. Sugar and maple syrup each have about 50 calories a tablespoon, but while sugar gets sprinkled, syrup is usually poured on thick. *** Don't go to a restaurant ravenous. Eating is is an occasion to indulge, and you'll indulge a lot less if you're not overly hungry. Ordering your salad dressing

In the past, Texas prisons have always been built in East Texas, where the state still has available land. But the prisoners come from all over the state and it is often a great

ACP Signup - A signup for ACP cost-sharing will be held January 23 through February 3. The County Committee has determined that the establishment of permanent vegetative cover, critical area shaping, diversion terraces, water impoundment reservoirs, and reorganizing irrigation systems are of high priority during this signup.

Practices that are started prior to approval by the county committe are not eligible for cost-sharing.

Conservation Reserve Signup - The eighth signup for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will be February 6 through 24. Applicants will submit bids stating the rental rate they would accept to convert their highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetative cover for 10 vears.

Land will be determined eligible if the land is highly hardship for the relatives of these prisoners, which the state hopes to rehabilitate before they are returned to Huntsville for release, to travel to East Texas to visit them. And besides, why should East Texas get more than its share of the state's tax money?

The new idea is to spread the prisons out over the state, with the prisoner closer to their relatives, and some of the state tax money returning to its source.

New prison units are under construction near Amarillo and Snyder in West Texas, but we are told that planners say that ideally a new prison unit should be located in North Central Texas about 100 miles west of Dallas-Ft. Worth Metroplex, which produces one-fourth of the state's prison population.

One hundred and fifty of the state's counties want one of the new prison units. Breckenridge has advertised their desire for a state facility and Comanche has shown some interest.

Project Hoos-Gow is seeking a 2,250 prisoner unit for Eastland County. Why? Because it would be the largest industry in Eastland County, employing 826 people with a monthly payroll of \$1.6 million and a yearly payroll of \$19.2 million. That is money and jobs, and it is steady, to

of Corrections are paid from \$11,000 to \$46,800 per year with wardens and professional employees sometimes paid much better. And a check with cities which have prison units reveals that prison employees often become local civic leaders and much of the "backbone" of the community. Hundreds of these state employees are certified police officers who will live in local cities, and who can help local law enforcement officers in a time of need or disaster.

Prison units are surrounded by two 12 ft. high fences, six guard towers, and about 300 acres of open land. If a prisoner should escape, his first concern is to get as far away from those hundreds of armed and certified officers, who might recognize him, as quickly as possible. And when you consider that only 25 per cent of the criminals in our communities are ever caught, and only two percent are ever sent to prison, and parolees regularly walk our streets, we should be more concerned about those on the "outside."

A prison located in central Eastland County could help Brownwood, Clyde, Breckenridge, Stephenville, Comanche, and all points in between. The two local junior colleges are assets to help draw the prison, and the prison could be a big help to them. Colleges in Stephenville, Brownwood, and Abilene could also benefit. We are told that Callahan County is already strongly support Eastland County's effort to acquire a prison unit.


