Organize to Confront Drug Problem

An organizational meeting will be held at 7 p.m., Thursday, June 23, at the Eastland National Bank Community Room, to confront the drug problem in this area, it has been announced.

"There are problems here in the area that are making progress on the battle front. There are law enforcement officers who are wholeheartedly striving to make this a better place to live. And there are others who are deeply concerned," organizers say.

The objectives of the individuals involved with initiating this new organization are not to steal the thunder from any existing organizations, or overshadow their accomplishments. Rather, it is a hope to aid their cause in some way. "It is a hope that we may also learn from these people. We want to know what the true picture is from every angle. We want to know what the drug situation is from the viewpoint of

the teachers and school officials. We want to know what the picture is from the law enforcement angle. We want to know how P.A.D.D. sees it. The list goes on and on. We want to know what is really going on in all these areas. We want to know all the problems, prospects, hopes and all else that these responsible people have encountered. We want to meet and put it all on the table to be sorted through, so that, hopefully, a little common ground can be established and the true picture of the drug issue in this area may emerge."

"Which brings us to the most important ingredient for this meeting Thursday. We need people who care about what is happening. Hopefully, these people will be intelligent, sincere, open-minded, caring, optimistic and most importantly, be blessed with a good measure of common sense. However, one does not necessarily have to possess all of these

traits to be an asset to the organization. Any one of these qualities you possess gives you an advantage in dealing with people and solving problems.

"Therefore, the earnest plea is made to all those who have anything to add to the completion of the total picture - Please be present to represent your point of view. And to anyone else who feels that they possess even one of those qualities mentioned before - Please be present to give this organization a foundation that will enable it to overcome one of the most damaging problems facing society today.

"The time has come to make the decision about whether we choose to live with the far reaching effects of the drug problem or to do something about it. Be one of those who believes in himself or herself enough to feel like you do have something to offer. You are needed!" a spokesman said.

Rising Star Fire Insurance Rates Increase 37%

The State Fire Inspector recently found gross deficiencies in the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department's equipment, procedures and required paperwork. As a result, the home owners of Rising Star will have a 37 percent increase in their fire insurance rates. This has been the result of evolving problems over the last several years.

Recent deficiencies cited by the inspector included the city pump truck's failure to work properly, the fire hydrant not opening, and the necessary paperwork had not been filed with the state of Texas. In addition, the state requirements for the volunteer firefighters' monthly meeting have not been fulfilled. The minutes of the monthly meeting of the elected Board of Directors of the Fire Department have not been reported to Austin as required.

Demonstration for Fire, Police, EMS Personnel Is Tuesday

CareFlite, an air ambulance service based at Harris Methodist Hospital in Ft. Worth, will be presenting a program for all area Fire & Police departments, ambulance and other EMS personnel. The program is set for Tuesday, June 21 at 7 p.m. in the conference room at Eastland Memorial

Hospital, and will last about an hour.

CareFlite will be bringing one of their air units. They will also explain how their service operates, and will give a safety talk, and present a slide program on helicopter safety. CareFlite personnel will also demonstrate loading of the

helicopter, and will be more than happy to answer any questions that you may have on their service.

Should CareFlite be out on a run, the program will be rescheduled for a later date. However, the program is still set for June 21 at 7 p.m. in the conference room at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

A breakdown in communications between the City of Rising Star and the Fire Department have caused numerous problems. In an effort to resolve the conflict, a volunteer group of area citizens representing both the rural and city interests were appointed at the last area-wide meeting.

Following two planning meetings, the citizens' committee developed a workable Constitution and By-laws for the Fire Department. The lawyer saw no problems with the approved documents. A version of the Constitution and By-laws was printed in the June 19th edition of "The Rising Star."

McCollums Open Eastland Feed Store

A super feed store for Eastland County is the goal of Joe and Barbara McCollum, who have purchased both Leon River Feed & Seed and Eastland Farm & Ranch Supply. The McCollums are combining the two Eastland feed stores into the new Eastland Farm & Ranch Center, located two blocks north of the courthouse at 301 North Seaman.

An extensive remodeling job at the former C&D Feed building will result in an attractive modern facility to house Eastland and Farm & Ranch Center.

An abundant supply of top quality Purina and Paymaster/ACCO feeds and seeds will be stocked so that the center will have it when you need it.

Coastal and alfalfa hay, garden seeds, pet foods and veterinary supplies will also be stocked, and the Center has public scales.

Plans calls for adding a lawn and garden center and a horse tack shop to the new store and in 1989 fertilizer will be stocked.

McCollum will manage the new store, and he also plans to raise hay to supply the store. John and Betty Kidd, former owners of Leon River Feed & Seed and Lou Carmack, former owner of Eastland Farm & Ranch Supply, along with Joe Don McCollum, will be available to serve you at the new store.

The son of pioneer Okra families, McCollum's dad,

Edgar McCollum, was a lifetime resident and his grandfather, Bob Edwards, was county sheriff in about 1925. Joe McCollum was reared and learned farming and ranching in the Okra community. He graduated from Rising Star High School.

Traveling to Lubbock for an education at Texas Technological College he remained in Lubbock County for 28 years, farming irrigated cotton.

Joe McCollum, with his wife, Barbara, moved back to Eastland County in 1980 to the family's Jo-Bar Farm, which was founded in 1884 by McCollum's great-granddad. They have three children: Joe Don, a Texas

State Technological Institute graduate; Eddie, who lives in Fort Worth where he and his wife have three children; and Connie (Mrs. Bill Dixon), who lives in Wichita Falls.

Bessie McCollum, Joe's mother, has lived on South Seaman Street in Eastland for about the last 25 years.

"We don't want all of the customers, but we want you for a customer," says Joe McCollum, who is president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau and the West-bound Water Corp. and has served on the Rising Star School Board. McCollum says that he has been in agriculture all of his life, and he wants to make a living selling what he knows about.

Tax Rebate

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas cities can expect handsome revenue increases from their local sales taxes as the Texas economic recovery continues to pick up steam.

This month's allocation checks showed a 23.5 percent increase over June 1987, a growth rate too high to attribute to the broadened sales tax base.

Texas' economic outlook will continue to improve, barring a national recession or a collapse in oil prices, according to Bullock.

Since January, the state has sent \$465.9 million in

local taxes to cities across the state, an increase of 10.3 percent over last year's allocations.

"This increase is too great to be attributed to the Legislature's broadening of the sales tax base, which was estimated to bring in an extra 3.5 percent in local revenues," said Bullock.

Bullock projected that local sales tax revenues statewide will continue to increase at an average rate of more than eight percent a year through 1991.

Foreign Farmland

Owners Invest in Texas

How many foreigners own and in the United States, and where?

Reports from the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that foreigners owned more land in Texas than any other state but Maine in 1986.

There are about a million acres owned by foreign investors in Texas, but this is less than one percent of the state's 134 million acres in farm production.

In comparison, the 1.9 million foreign-owned acres in Maine represents one-tenth of all privately owned agricultural land there. Timberland is the attraction in the Maine area.

Most farmland owned in the United States by non-citizens is concentrated in the south and west. In all, 12.4 million acres of U.S. agricultural land is owned either by foreign individuals or corporations, or other organizations with at least 10 percent foreign ownership.

The 1,643 parcels of land in 161 Texas counties owned by foreigners in 1986, had a reported value of \$1.69

billion - roughly \$1,650 an acre.

According to the map, both Eastland and Callahan Counties are in a shaded area designated as from 1-5,000 acres of foreign-owned land. The Big Bend area appears to have the largest foreign-owned tracts, but the most valuable land is in the counties listed below the map.
