

## Enrollment Increases in Rising Star School System

School bells rang for Rising Star students to return to "Readin', Ritin' and 'Rithmetic" August 20, and Superintendent Gene Williams reports a larger number of students enrolling than was in attendance last year.

Kindergarten through 8th grade has

an enrollment of 231 students, up about 17 over last year; high school enrollment dropped about 7 from last year with 86 students in attendance this year. Overall enrollment is 317 with the 7th grade having the largest class, 32 students, and the junior class having the

smallest number, 18 students.

Class by class, this year's enrollment is kindergarten, 28; 1st grade, 28; 2nd grade, 26; 3rd grade, 24; 4th grade, 23; 5th grade, 28; 6th grade, 21; 7th grade, 32; 8th grade, 21; 9th grade, 19; 10th grade, 24; 11th grade, 18; and 12th grade, 24.

## Eastland County Will Be served by MH/MR Center of Brownwood

The Child Development Center of Central Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center in Brownwood has expanded its services to include Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch, Mills and San Saba counties.

A screening service will be provided every 3 months for each county. Children from birth to 5 can be screened when the mobile unit is in your county. Exact dates and times of screening will be published at a future time in your local newspaper.

Children will be tested in the controlled environment of a large "mobile unit." Children who are placed in the Out-County Program will be visited on a weekly schedule by Nancy Burnett, the Out-County Rehabilitation Teacher. She will work closely with the parents to reinforce objectives being taught.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to administer,

evaluates the child's social skills (playing, dressing, eating), fine motor activity (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor activity (running, hopping, jumping, etc.), and language (speech, etc.). Any child who is found to be delayed in one or more areas will be given further tests for possible placement in the Home Bound Program or for referral to appropriate services.

Early intervention has proven beneficial to children, parents and teachers in the detection and treatment of developmental delays in children. The intention of this program is to assist the Central Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center staff in identifying and providing treatment for these children.

There is a \$10.00 screening fee; however, no one will be refused services because of inability to pay.

## Texas DPS Reminds Motorists to Stop for School Buses

Summer vacation is over for thousands of youngsters who have started back to school, many of those for the first time. Captain G.J. Matthews of the Texas Highway Patrol said, "Last year in Texas, the pedestrian death accounted for approximately 16% of our total traffic fatalities with many of those being school age children."

"The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind all motorists that with the start of school, you will be seeing those big yellow school buses where they have not been all summer," said Captain Matthews. He said that all drivers are required to stop for school buses when the bus is stopped to load or unload school children and has its overhead red lights activated. Captain Matthews pointed out that the law concerning stopping for a school bus applies to drivers in the city limits as well as out in the rural areas. He

also stated that drivers must stop from either direction before passing the bus.

The only time a driver can legally pass a stopped school bus is for the flashing red lights to be turned off, the bus driver to motion a vehicle by or for the bus to resume motion. Captain Matthews was careful to point out that in either of these situations, a driver needs to remain alert for school students. They could still dart into the path of your vehicle, he said.

Captain Matthews said, "With the start of school, all drivers need to be extra cautious around our schools." He said, "The children will be excited about a new school year and might not be thinking about all the safety rules in bike riding and crossing streets so it will be left up to the motorist to protect them." "Drive as if you have a child attending that school," he said.

## LeFlore Pleads Guilty To Garcia Murder

In a surprising development, Charles Allen LeFlore 20, pled guilty to murder as his trial for the murder of Debra Jo Garcia, 29, was beginning Monday in 91st District Court.

Prosecuting attorney Emory Walton said LeFlore and his court appointed attorney Don Wilson approached him Sunday evening. Wilson said LeFlore decided "it was the best thing to do."

Judge Jim Wright questioned LeFlore about his understanding of what he had agreed to. LeFlore stated he had not been forced to make this decision and that his attorney had represented him "well" and he was satisfied.

District Attorney Emory Walton questioned him about his treatment while he was jailed and LeFlore stated he had been treated well. Mr. Walton introduced two pieces of evidence. One was a statement signed by LeFlore that he had used a gun to kill Debra Jo Garcia.

The second was an autopsy report that showed Mrs. Garcia died from a gunshot wound.

Judge Wright then asked LeFlore if he understood he had given up his right to appeal or for a new trial. LeFlore said he did. Then, Judge Wright sentenced him to serve sixty-five years in the state penitentiary.

The gag order was lifted as LeFlore was sentenced, but District Attorney Emory Walton said he could not discuss the case until the other defendant, Brenda Gail Andrews 20, has been tried for capital murder in the same offense. He said LeFlore might testify in that trial.

Security was tight as people attempted to enter the courtroom Monday morning. Women's purses were opened and searched and men were

"frisked." Spectators had settled down for a long day, and the jury had gathered to be brought into the courtroom, when the "plea bargain" was announced.

LeFlore, dressed in a white western shirt, jeans and jogging shoes, was free of the ankle shackles he had worn during jury selection. He chewed gum and showed no remorse as he pled guilty to murder.

The dead girl's mother, Mrs. L.E. "Slim" Booth, cried as LeFlore was sentenced.

Because LeFlore used a gun to kill Mrs. Garcia, he will have to serve at least one third of his sixty five year sentence before he can be considered for probation.

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## Strake Talk

**TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH**

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our highways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

days. Several overlapping generations occur each year.

Damage from this pest often does not produce levels which warrant control. Many natural enemies attack this pest. However, if tunneling becomes excessive, photosynthesis can be impaired and yield reduced. If chemical control is elected, diazinon is the most recommended insecticide. Allow at least three days between application and harvest.

Another insect currently attacking tomatoes are tomato pin worms. These are the larval stage of a small gray moth. Larvae invade the stems and fruits. The larvae tunnel through the fruit spoiling it. Sevin is the recommended insecticide. This pest may be difficult to control.

# New Coach Calls Wildcats "Winners" Changes in Student Legislation

## Booster Club Elects New Officers

The Rising Star Wildcats sure looked good at their scrimmage Friday night. The band also sounded good.

New officers for the Booster Club are Caroline Harris, president; Payton Scott, vice-president; Donna Gregg, treasurer; Gerrie Cooper, secretary; and Ann Sessums, reporter.

The next meeting of the Booster Club will be Tuesday, September 7, at 7 p.m. in the High School Library.

The Rising Star Wildcats' new head coach comes here from Andrews and is looking forward to seeing less blowing sand in the air than is experienced on the Plains. His last coaching position was in Round Rock, but Gray began his coaching career in Eden in 1964. He recalls that the Eden Bulldogs played Rising Star for Bi-District Championship here that year. Though no longer in the same district, Eden and Rising Star will play here Friday night at 8:00 p.m.

In addition to his coaching duties, Gray teaches Social Studies

in high school. His wife, Mary, works for Merriman Drilling Co. in Cross Plains, and both their children are in junior high school here. Chip, the Grays' 13-year-old son, plays football and is a manager on the high school football team. Their daughter, Cassi, is 12 years old and a member of the band.

No strangers to this area, Gray was head coach at Cross Plains through the football seasons of 1965 and 1966, and his wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Browning, lived in the Cross Plains-Pioneer area. Mr. Browning has passed away since that time.

Gray is "real pleased" with the Wildcat team thus far. They scrimmaged Santo to a one to one tie August 19 and showed improvement in the offense as they outscored Ranger 2 to 1 in the next week's scrimmage. The team has 23 members on it.

"We feel like we're going to be much better than pre-season predictions have us picked," Coach Gray said. "We've got a winning attitude and we're going to be in the top half of district at the season's end."

Recent legislation made a number of changes in Social Security benefits. One change affects college and other post-secondary students between the ages of 18 and 22 who are receiving benefits on the record of a retired, deceased or disabled parent. A post-secondary school is a college, university or approved vocational school.

Under the old law, these students could receive Social Security benefits as long as they were full-time students, unmarried, and under age 22. The new law is gradually phasing out these benefits. By April, 1985, the only students eligible for benefits

will be those under age 19 in a high school, junior high school or elementary school. Children under age 18 will continue to receive benefits regardless of their student status.

Those student beneficiaries who were entitled to a check for August 1981 and who were in full-time attendance before May 1982 in a post-secondary school will continue to receive benefits until they marry, reach 22 or are no longer in full-time attendance. However, beginning in 1982, no benefits will be paid for May, June, July or August and these students will not receive any cost-of-living increase. In addition, these students' benefits will be reduced by 25% each September when the checks resume.

A student 18 or over who did not receive a Social Security check for August 1981 or who was not in full-time attendance at a college or other post-secondary school before May 1982 will not be entitled to student benefits after July 1982 unless that student is under age 19 and in full-time attendance at a high school, junior high or elementary school. These students will be paid under the old law through July 1982.

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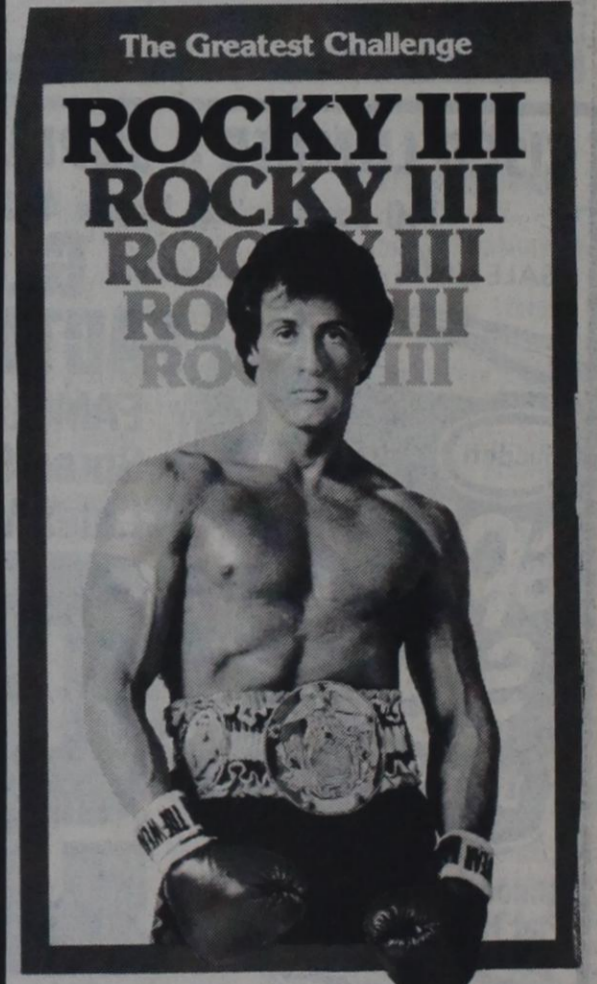

# GORDON SPOT

Whether or not to topdress summer pastures is a commonly shared dilemma at this time of the year. Some producers like to wait for rain before topdressing while others prefer to put fertilizer out first.

First, fertilizer must be in the root zone before a crop can use it. If applied before a rain, it will be carried into the soil and both the fertilizer and

moisture will be more effective than waiting until after the rain to fertilize.

Second, fertilizer will not lose its effectiveness if applied on dry soil during prolonged dry weather except for urea, which undergoes some hydrolysis reactions that can result in a moderate loss of nitrogen.

Phosphorus and potash needed for next year's perennial grasses can be applied this fall. This is a special advantage if cool season grasses or legumes are to be planted.

Late summer or fall fertilization of summer grasses with nitrogen also can produce additional hay and fall grazing once rains come. This can mean improved grazing and less hay needed to get livestock through the winter.

With fertilizer getting more expensive due to rising costs, producers must continue to pay more attention to getting the most out of the fertilizer they apply. Everyone must assess his own situation regarding topdressing of summer grasses for additional forage to get the most from his fertilizer dollar.

Just how "good" is the hay you harvested this year?

It's really hard to tell without a forage test. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save you dollars supplemental feed or livestock condition.

Feeding low quality hay without supplementation can result in livestock weight losses and reduced rebreeding percentages. At the same time, feeding supplement with top quality hay may not always be necessary.

Only when your hay's feeding value is known can you make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement. The hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is slowly starving

without a supplement. A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tests for protein, fiber, nutrient and mineral content can bring samples to the county Extension office where information forms and mailing containers are available. Forage samples will be sent to the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory, Soil and Crop Sciences Dept., Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

We would also like to remind producers that the county hay show will be held at The County Livestock Show Barn on October 1, 1982 and the Texas State Hay Show will be next January 26 at Waco.

Catalina dressing

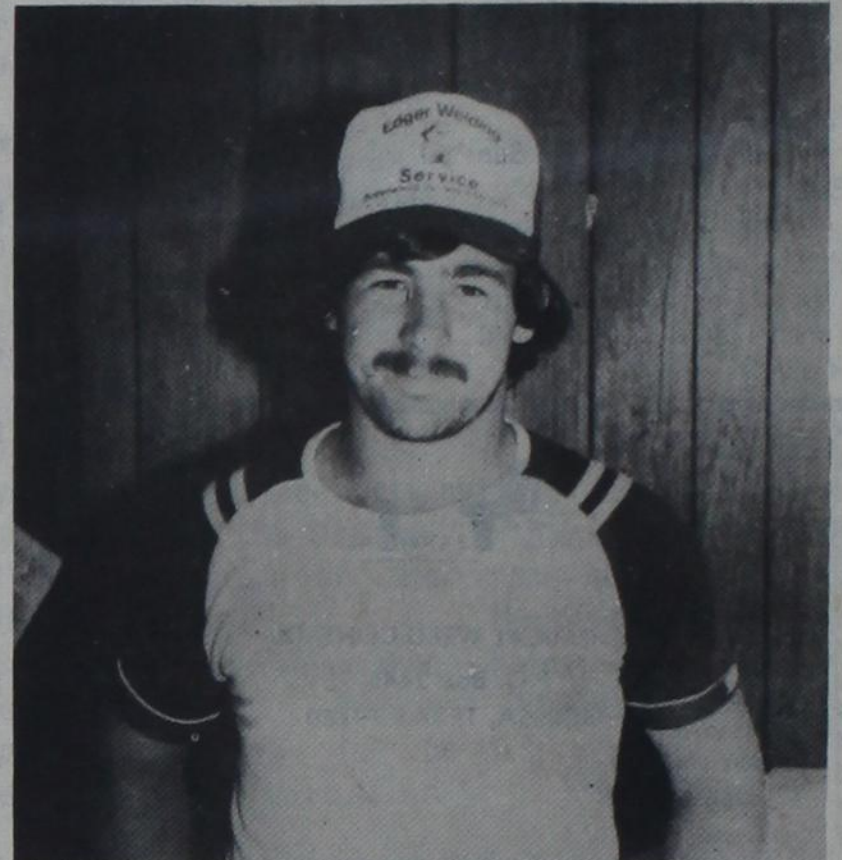
Stir together the first four ingredients. Add just enough Catalina dressing to make of salad consistency

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# Commentary

The most powerful words in the Scriptures are "Thus saith the Lord." Here is the stamp of divine intervention and when we are standing upon the word of God and we are claiming the promises that it contains, we are saying, "Thus saith the Lord." The Bible tells us that "God is not a man, that He should lie; neither the son of man, that He should repent," (Numbers 23:19).

What do we mean when we say, stand upon the Word? Does it mean to take the Bible and place you hand upon it? Of course not! It means that the promises that are written in God's Word are also written in our heart, and only when it is transferred from the parchment to the tablets of our heart and mind does that word become effectual for our lives. We have to know that God in His word said, "or hath He spoken, and shall He not make it good? We have to be able to recall these promises in order for them to be activated in our prayer life. We have to know that, "He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; and with His stripes we are healed," (Isaiah 53:5). We have to know that David the psalmist declared under the inspiration of the holy Spirit, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits: who forgiveth all thine iniquities, who healeth all thy diseases..." (Psalms 103:2-3). It is not enough in your hour of need to look at the Bible sitting on the shelf and say, "Yes, Lord, I believe everything that is written in that book," when you really don't know what is in there. You have never taken the time to find out what is in that precious book. Does this mean that you have to be a Bible scholar to have answered prayer? No!

In fact, here is where the standing comes in. You not only have to know the Word of God, but you have to put it in action. There is another very important reason for standing upon the Word of God as we make our petitions know to our Father in Heaven. We are living in an age of

confusion where people are running about eagerly following any new thing that comes along, and the farther out that it is from the real truth of the gospel, the more ready people are to follow. Sad to say, confusion has taken hold of the hearts and minds of many of God's people. It is the devil's aim to bring confusion to God's people, and it can only come through a real lack of knowledge of what the Bible really says. Sometimes teaching is only considered deep if a person cannot fully understand it—I call that confusing. I know

that there is a teaching that the Holy Spirit wants to bring to every Christian that is beyond the basic foundations of our Christian life. Here is where the problem lies. Spiritual depth is not the acquiring of some doctrine that is far out, and very few people will ever have the Revelation of what it really means. Depth is the degree of power of the Spirit in the life of the believer to live a more victorious, overcoming, meaningful life for the Kingdom of God.

## Open Letter to the Citizens of Rising Star

A few days ago I stood, helplessly, and watched the tragic fire which destroyed the home of George Baker and claimed the life of his wife. I saw the blazing flames leaping to the sky, turning the blue sky a frightening red. Contending with the flames for a place in the sky was the blackest smoke I have ever seen—blindingly concealing the horrible work of destruction the fire was doing there. I know not how much of my tears was caused by the acrid smoke and how much by the heart-breaking tragedy. Fire is such a senseless thing; and, it seems, no one is immune to its terror. Is there one among us who can say, "This will never happen to me?"

But even as I beheld that tragedy, I was seeing something which made my heart swell with pride. The men of the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department were on the scene. Quickly, they were fighting back at the power of the flames. With little thought for their own welfare they formed a precision team, matching strength to strength, determination to determination, and were overcoming. I saw those men, time after time, brace themselves, forcing themselves toward a door or window through which they

hoped to enter the flaming building, striving to save the imperiled human life. Again and again, I saw them driven back by the intense heat, smoke and flames. These men who fought and strove against the fire are our friends, neighbors and loved ones giving freely of themselves in times of danger. I am so very proud of them, as I know you are. Such selfless service inspires a great deal of respect and admiration within me.

Subsequently, I met with Mr. John Bishop to tell him a little of my feelings for the work of these men. I put this question to him: "What is the greatest need of the Rising Star Volunteer F. D.?" To which his instant reply was: "Personnel." More men are needed to man the hoses, work the pumps, drive the trucks, and simply to answer the calls in the times of need.

Mr. Bishop spoke of the fire control training available in Abilene; there the men are taught the techniques of fighting fires under actual flaming conditions. It is not simply study from books, but a "learning by doing situation." The effort is made to set up every type of fire, then teaching the men the best methods of fighting and controlling them. The school is not really costly, but it

does require four or five full days of work, necessitating an early departure from Rising Star and a quite late return.

The Fire Department does not, at this time, have funds to pay for any men to receive this special training; but it is always hoped that some of our men will be able to avail themselves of it. However, the officials of the Department make it quite plain that this training is not a requirement for enlistment in the Fire Department. A willingness to serve at any hour of the day or night, a desire to be of service to his town and community, a hope to keep down the costs to lives and property: these are the first requirements of the volunteers.

There are those who would place themselves in a perilous situation

because they hope to receive higher, hazardous duty pay; doubtless, there are others who would face such danger for his own protection; and others who would face danger and hardship in order to protect loved ones. But, those who deliberately come face to face with danger, heedless of the peril to themselves, simply because of a desire to help others—these are the real heroes of the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department. I have tremendous admiration for these men; I ask for our town, our entire community, to continue to support them in every way.

I close this letter with a heart-felt "thank you" to these men—and a wish for their continued well being.
