# Flag Day

The anniversary of the adoption of the Flag of the United States in 1777, is now quite generally observed as Flag Day.

Many clubs and organizations stress the importance of Flag Day and sponsor patriotic programs on June 14. Dr. Bernard J. Cigrand, of Chicago, founded the American Flag Day Association, and promoted the first public observance in 1906. As a young man, he had taught school at Waubeka, Wisconsin, and there he conducted yearly flag ceremonies. The old school house has been restored, and a bronze tablet placed there. honoring Dr. Cigrand.

June 14 was definitely established as Flag Day by a Proclamation of President Wilson, issued May 30, 1916, in which he said in part: "It has, therefore, seemed to me fitting that I should call your attention to the approach of the anniversary of the day upon which the Flag of the United States was adopted by Congress as the emblem of the Union, and to surgest to you that it should this year and in the years to come, be given special significance....I therefore suggest and request that throughout the nation, and, if possible, in every community, the fourteenth day of June be observed as Flag Day, with special patriotic exercises, at which means shall be taken to give significant expression to our thoughtful love of America...our determination to make it greater and

A long hot summer could produce some of the highest electric bills in years, West Texas Utilities Co. officials warned this week.

And according to some weather observers, official and otherwise, a hot summer is long overdue. West Texas, like much of the nation, has enjoyed five relatively cool summers in a row. The law of averages, therefore, would indicate a change.

One of the consequences would be more use of air-conditioning, requiring more electric energy. This could run bills up

sharply. There already are indications that customers may soon be iolted out of their summer lull. During the first 21 days of May, temperatures in Abilene averaged 5.81 degrees above normal and electric usage went up accordingly.

A change back to even the normal weather pattern could bring the impact of higher usage and higher costs, a company spokesman said.

Historically, the four peak months for electric usage in the WTU territory are June-through -September. The peak day usually comes in August. Last year, the system's electric load peaked at 5 p.m. on August 11.

# **TDA To Offer Testing For** Commercial **Pesticide Applicators**

AUSTIN--The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will If the program becomes offer testing for area commercial pesticide applicators beginning at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, June 18, in Stephenville.

"The pesticide tests will be conducted following training sessions being offered June 16-17 by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown explained. Both the training sessions and testing will be conducted at the Tarleton State University, Room

Testing, coordinated by TDA entomologists, will be provided for four categories: (1) general, (2) fruit, nut and vegetable, (3) weed and brush control, and (4) field crop pest control. Applicators wishing to take the tests may sign up during the training session and pay their fees at that time. While there is no charge for the general test, a \$10 fee will be assessed for each other category.

Individuals who pass the tests will then be eligible to make application for licensing as a commercial or non-commercial applicator of restricted use pesticides.

By October 21, 1977, a license will be required for purchasing and using restricted pesticides to be identified by the Environmental Protection Agency. By the October deadline, the EPA plans to have categorized some 1,400 pesticide ingredients for either restricted or non-restric-

# **Cattle Producers** Can Call Toll-Free Hotline

The Texas Beef Development Taskforce (BDT) has established a toll-free "hotline" to answer questions from cattle producers about the Beef Referendum.

Registration for the longawaited Referendum is taking place June 6-17 at nearly 2,000 county ASCS offices across the nation. Cattle producers who wish to vote must register before the June 17 deadline. Actual voting will take place back at the ASCS offices between July 5-15.

"Beef producers who have a question about the program can call 1-800-682-4106 weekdays between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m., ' says Texas BDT Chairman J.D. Sartwelle of

The Referendum, if approved by two-thirds of the cattle producers voting, would authorize the first nationwide self-help program for the beef industry. Using the value-added system, each cattle producer would contribute three-tenths of one percent (30c per \$100) of the value of each animal sold. This rate would raise \$30 million to \$40 million per year for beef research, education and promotion, says Sartwelle.

# **ASCS Will Register Beef Producers June 6-17**

The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the ASCS county office to mail

registration cards.

All persons who produced the beef during calendar 1976 are eligible to register. This includes feedlot operators as well as dairymen. Each production entity-such as a family, partnership, or corporation--is entitled to one vote. A 4-H or FFA member may register, provided he or she produced beef independent of the family

From June 6 through 17., the ASCS county office will daily post a list of producers registered to vote in a conspicuous place. A final list will be posted June 22. Anyone may challenge the eligibility of any producer listed.





### Special One-A-Year Tax Free Sales

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob -Bullock Wednesday reminded religious and other non-profit, tax-exempt organizations they now may hold one sale or auction a year in which they don't have to collect sales taxes.

The special one-a-year, taxfree sales were authorized by the Texas Legislature and apply to tax-exempt religious, educational, charitable and eleemosynary organizations.

The legislation had the support of the Comptroller's

Bullock said the new law, which becomes effective May 24, allows only one tax-free sale or auction during a calendar

If two or more organizations jointly hold a tax-free sale or auction, neither may hold another during the calendar

year, he said. The bill allows the sponsoring organization to pay the auctioneer a "reasonable fee".


Bullock said the loss of revenue to the state and cities will be minimal.

'Many of these tax-exempt organizations depend heavily on annual sales or auctions to raise money for many worthwhile projects," Bullock noted.






