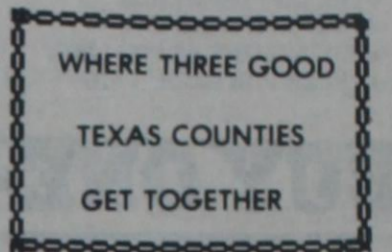

Rising Star School Lunch Program

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Rising Star ISD School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for K-5 .90 cents and 6-12 \$1.00 and breakfast for .60 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced price meals priced at .40 cents for lunch and .30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain complete information on household members and income cannot be used by the school. If information is missing, your child will be denied the meal benefits. Call your school if you need help with the form.

COMPLETE APPLICATION: For an application to be complete, you must provide: the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or state that a household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster

children living with you and wish to apply for free or reduced price benefits for them, please tell the school.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who get meal benefits are treated the same way as children who pay for meals. In the operation of a child feeding program, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Gene Williams, Superintendent, Box 37, Ph. 643-3423.

If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact us. You will be notified of the approval or denial of this application.

Help for Cooling Bills

Austin--Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help with their summer cooling bills, if they haven't already received a Home Energy Assistance payment, a state official said.

"We need to hear from those low-income households which haven't filled out the Home Energy Assistance program questionnaire we mailed to them," said commissioner Marilyn W. Johnston of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Those eligible for the cooling payments include households which received June benefits for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, food stamps, or Supplemental Security Income.

Certain Veterans Administration beneficiaries also may be eligible if they are

"needs tested" and if their gross incomes don't exceed 75 percent of the poverty level as defined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Potentially eligible veterans are those who receive VA payments under 415, 521, 541 or 542 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code or under Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1978.

Most of these persons are widows and children of veterans who died from military service-related causes. Some surviving veterans also receive benefits under these veterans programs.

To qualify for energy assistance a household's gross income limit cannot exceed \$305.49 per month for one person; \$499.49 a month for two persons; \$648.49 monthly for a three-member

household; \$845.59 for a four-member household; \$998.49 for five people, and \$1,166.49 for six people.

Eligible households must be subject to home energy cost increases—because of higher bills or rent due to rising utility costs. Households are eligible if they live in privately owned or rented housing even if the cost of utilities is included in the rent payment, or if the household pays only a portion of its home energy costs.

DHR already is processing cooling bill payments that average \$39 each for 266,000 households under the \$12 million program to relieve the impact of summer cooling bills on needy Texans.

Texas DPS Releases Traffic Accident Reports

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports that for the first six months of 1982, sixty-five persons have been killed in traffic accidents in the Abilene District of the D.P.S. The Abilene District comprises twenty-five counties in this West Texas area including Eastland County. These sixty-five deaths were the result of fifty-three fatal accidents. For

the same period in 1981, records indicate that sixty-six deaths resulted from fifty-six fatal accidents.

In Eastland County for the first six months of 1982, the D.P.S. has recorded five deaths of four fatal accidents and seventy-four injuries as the result of thirty-nine injury accidents. D.P.S. troopers in Eastland County have investigated a total of

one hundred, thirty-four traffic accidents for the first six months of 1982.

For the same period in 1981, in Eastland County, D.P.S. records indicate that three deaths resulted from three fatal accidents and forty-four injury accidents occurred with sixty-four persons injured. A total of one hundred, twenty-nine accidents occurred during the same period

Other major items on the agenda include amending the 1981-82 budget, adopting the 1982-83 budget, setting lunch room rates and filling the remaining bus driver vacancies.

Homemaking Hints

Recently, I have received several telephone inquiries about "Starch Blocker Diets." The following information was printed in the May, 1982 issue of Nutrition Perspectives. The source is the University of California at Davis, Cooperative Extension Service.

A new weight reduction scheme hitting the market is a protein from kidney bean which reportedly blocks the digestion of dietary starch by blocking the starch-digesting enzyme, alpha-amylase (ALPHA-Amylase). The story is that "you can eat the starch food that you love... without gaining the starch calories from these foods" if you take with your meals pills containing the kidney bean protein. Is there a scientific basis for the claims that such products are effective in weight control? Experiment Station research from U.C. Davis indicates that there is no basis for such claims. Present evidence indicates that so called "Starch blockers" are only a very expensive source of dietary protein. It

stomach pains. Persons with diabetes should not depend on starch blockers in calculating their diets.

FDA has been refused specific information by manufacturers about the exact chemical composition of starch blockers. Information supporting claims of safety or effectiveness in weight control or weight reduction has not been provided to FDA. FDA is also concerned about the safety of longterm use of starch blockers, because of the lack of adequate safety testing data. Some manufacturers assert that starch

blockers are special dietary foods. However, because the claimed effect of these products is weight control or reduction by their action to block or interfere with digestion, they may affect the body's normal metabolism function. Under the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, a substance that is offered for a nonfood purpose and THAT alters a function of the body is classified as a drug, rather than a food, even if it is derived from a vegetable product.

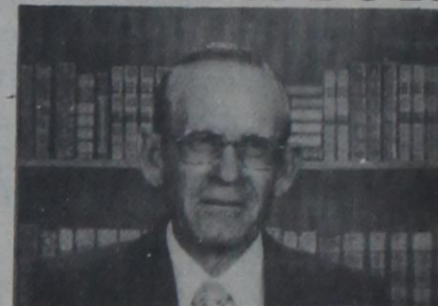

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. It was a pleasure and a privilege to read the "Memoirs" of my neighbor and friend, Ethelle Maybelle King Brown, compiled and edited by her son, James Henry Brown.

We get a glimpse of her as a mother by reading James and Jeannetts' Introductory poem, "For Mother"; the last line expressing for all who know her; "We're glad God gave us you."

First we read of her Dad's birth in Golconda, Ill, in 1859; his exodus to Texas after his mother's death, and his marriage to Emoline Purvis in 1893, Ethel was the second child of this union. The story continues in which we read of her marriage to Richard Coleman Brown, Sept. 3, 1921, her career as a school teacher, and much of the history of Pioneer and Rising Star area. The Pioneer Oil boom of the '20's, during which time the population went from 175 to 25,000. Their career as Postmaster in Pioneer during the Oil Boom.

Throughout the story we read of their happy home life marred only by the death of three of their four children, two after they were grown. There is mention of her husband's and sons' careers in the wars of our country from which they returned safely. There is much more. She writes, "Today, the world is beautiful. Mrs. Brown is a poet as the several poems included in her Memoirs indicate. It was difficult to choose one to pass on to you. There is "The Man I Married", "A Matter of Time", "A Sinner's Vision", "In Retrospect", "One Woman", and "My Dad". I have chosen the last one she wrote: "What Then?"

When my life's curtain has fallen
And my last act has been staged

Will all the thoughts and good intentions
All the vows and promises made;
Be lost and forever forgotten
When this body in the grave is laid?

Or will they be borne on the wings of the morning
To another soul stronger than mine
Who will accomplish what I have promised
In the shortest possible time,

There will be so much work unfinished
That these hands of flesh could do
If only the Master could be persuaded
That my spirit is willing too.

If another chance could be granted
How quickly I'd enter the fray
To do all that His will would bid me
While yet there is light of day.

Twould be sad to stand in the darkness
And see others work in the light
To accomplish what I should have done
To keep the faith and fight a good fight"

So, for strength and guidance I'll pray
And grace to do His will
Love of God first; my neighbor next

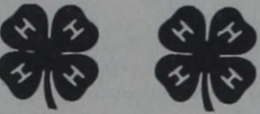
Departures are available from both Dallas/Fort Worth and Houston on the days mentioned. The J.C. Penney Foundation

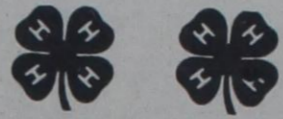
More and More 4-H'ers are coming from urban areas. In Texas, about 49 per cent of the 4-H youth now come larger urban and suburban areas. However, more than half the Texas 4-H'ers live on farms or ranches or in towns of under 10,000 population.

Congressman Jack E. Hightower of Vernon will be the principal speaker at a field day to be held at the USDA Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on August 25, 1982.

Congressman Hightower serves on the conservation, credit, and rural development subcommittee within the Committee on Appropriations. He will speak about 12:30 p.m.

Ron Bailey, district conservationist for SCS at Eastland, said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90-acre center from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Knox City.

A barbeque lunch will be available on a prepaid basis at \$4.50

per plate. Payment should be sent to Ms. Doris Crowover, Chamber of Commerce, Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529 by August 20.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the Knox City Center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions by farmers and ranchers cooperating with local soil and water conservation districts. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Several hundred strains of grasses, legumes, forbs, and woody plants are being tested at Knox City.

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Pest Alert

Euonymus is an evergreen shrub used in landscapes throughout Texas. In recent years the development of dwarf and variegated varieties have increased the use of Euonymus to add color and variety to the landscape. However, this shrub can be troubled by disease and insect pests.

Powdery mildew is the most common and difficult disease to control on Euonymus. It forms a flat, whitish growth on the leaves which can easily be rubbed off. Leaves may yellow slightly and drop off, but heavy defoliation is not a characteristic symptom.

Cultural controls can help in preventing infection. Cultural controls include: 1) planting in a sunny area; 2) not crowding the plants; 3) avoid overhead watering; 4) pruning out and destroying heavily diseased branches; raking and destroying fallen leaves.

Preventing infection of the new growth is important in controlling powdery mildew. Chemical applications should begin before new foliage is infected. Fungicides will protect foliage from infection but will not remove the dense, white fungal growth from infected

leaves. Bonoyml is the recommended fungicide for control of powdery mildew. Adding a wetting to the spray solution will greatly improve coverage. Liquid household detergents make good wetting agents when one teaspoon is added for each gallon of spray solution. Crape myrtle and zinnias are also very susceptible to powdery mildew.

Euonymus is also attacked by many species of scale. The most common and destructive is the euonymus scale. The males are narrow and white, and they cluster in great numbers on the leaves and stems. The females are rather dark brown and shaped somewhat like an oyster shell.

Treat the scale with insecticidal oils during the dormant season and with conventional sprays (including summer oils) in the spring and summer. Chemicals recommended for control of scale include Malathion, Cygon, Metasystox R, and Sevin. Thorough coverage is important for effective control. Applications should cover both sides of the leaves and all twigs and branches.

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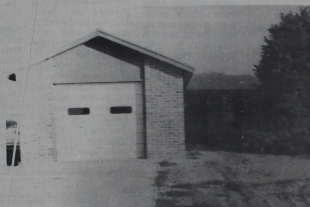
