## County Commissioners

### Answers Sought on Road Funding

A number of citizens met with the Eastland County Commissioners Monday to discuss the completion and financing of widening FM 570 at its intersection with FM 2214 southeast of Eastland. Leo Williams spoke for the group.

Williams said people in the area were concerned about getting that road upgraded, especially since the Commissioners July 13 turned down a plan for borrowing \$500,000 that would have included \$200,000 proposed for improvements, to FM 570.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson said the project was going forward. "There's an overall plan for the complete road to the (Erath) county line," he stated. "This is the first

step.

"On the financing—the bond was voted down last time—but we may have to borrow the money.

"We are not going to do what those people want us to do. We will not spend every dime we have in the General Fund."

Robinson was referring to the meeting July 13, when businessmen Earl Bradley and Jim Moylan spoke against selling bonds for \$500,000. They didn't object to the plans for the money, but to borrowing when the county has \$850,000 in General Funds.

Robinson told the Court Monday that the FM 570 project might not be as expensive as first thought. He said that some land will be donated and some

utilities have agreed to move their own lines.

"I estimated \$200,000, but I still don't know where we stand," Robinson said.

He also indicated that he wished some of the people in favor of the road improvement bonds had been at the Public Hearing July 13, when citizens showed up and spoke against the county borrowing.

"There was not one soul for it—everyone was against it," he remarked.

A few brief remarks followed, with apparently no conclusion on which method of financing to use.

### Rising Star Rural Fire Department Has Special Need

Lightning recently struck in the middle of a 25 acre love grass pasture about eight miles north of Rising Star, setting the pasture on fire. The Rising Star Rural Fire Department was called and they answered the call in good time. The fire department did a good job of containing and putting out the fire.

At least until they ran out of water.

There were numerous full stock ponds on the place which was burning and on the adjacent place. All these were available for the fire department to draw water from. The only problem was that the Rural Fire Department does not have the equipment to draw (pick up) water from a pond.

Consequently, the truck had to come back to Rising Star to be refilled. (This took almost an hour.) Luckily, other trucks from Rising Star had responded to the fire and had it under control when the first truck returned.

This fire could have been threatening someone's home when the truck ran out of water.

There is available what is called a "pick up pump" which is capable of filling a 2,000 gallon fire truck tank in about five minutes. This pump costs less than \$1,500.

Rising Star High School Principal Robby Stuteville has announced the times for school registration for high school and new junior high students.

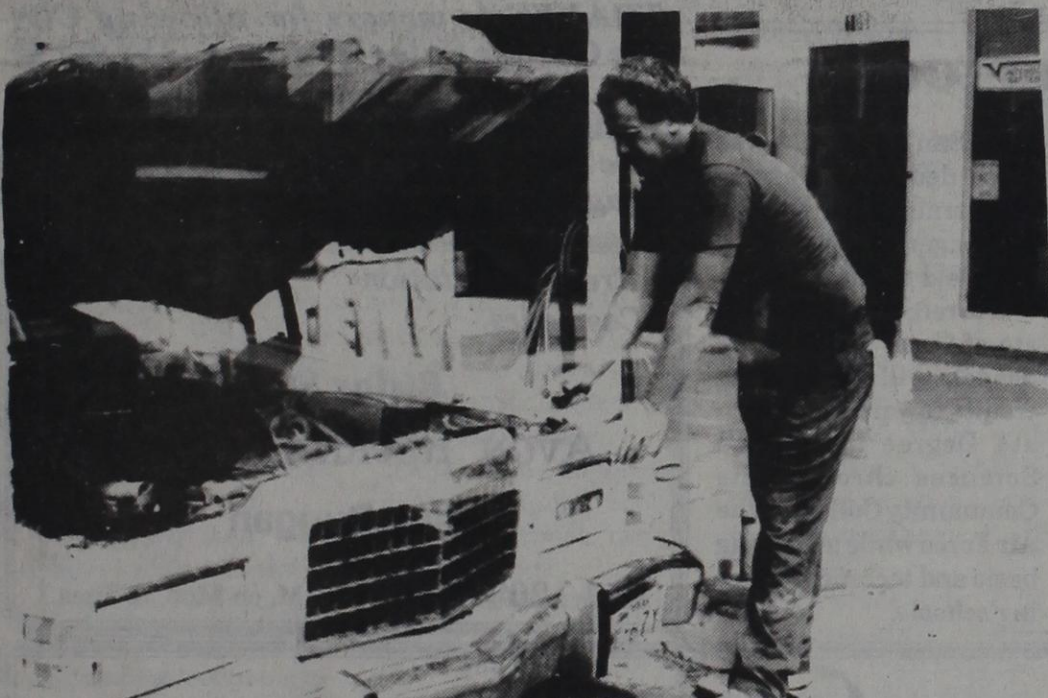
Seniors and juniors will register Monday, August 10, 9:00 to 11:00 a.m.; sophomores and freshmen will register that after-

### Local School Gets Award at Successful Schools Ceremony

Commissioner of Education Lionel "Skip" Meno honored Rising Star Independent School District's Ward (Elementary) School at the Texas Successful Schools Awards Ceremony in Austin Saturday, July 18.

The Texas Successful Schools Awards System (TSSAS) identified schools for performance gain and high perform-

ance. In the ceremony 125 schools received financial awards ranging from \$25,000 to \$175,000 for their high degree of gain (improvement).

Another nine schools received commendations and special honors for high overall performance. Additionally, 588 campuses were recognized for their efforts in gain or performance.

The Texas Legislature created TSSAS to identify and reward schools that demonstrate progress or success in achieving the educational goals of the state. This year, the awards given out at the ceremony totaled \$10 million. The funds, given to schools that demonstrated a high degree of gain, are intended for academic enhancement,

and may not be used for any purpose related to athletics.

The awards ceremony was underwritten by a grant from the Southwestern Bell Foundation.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$70.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

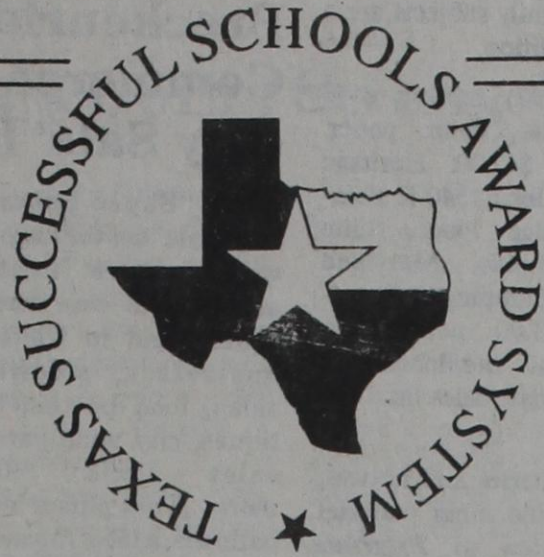

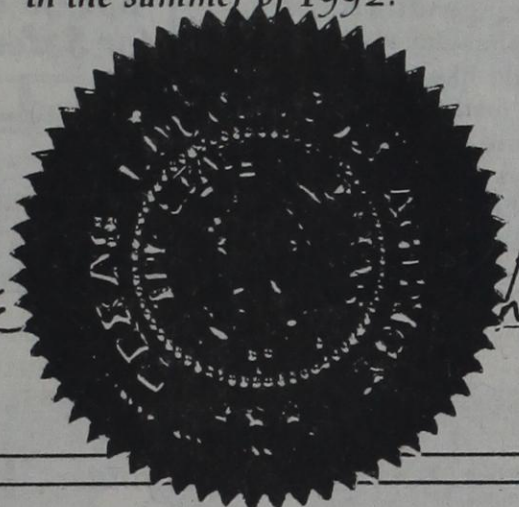

The motion by Wilson, seconded by Harris, to employee Kay Campbell in RSISD subject to assignment and/or reassignment for the 1992-92 school year carried 5-1 with Goldston opposing. A motion by Goldston, seconded by Agnew, to accept the resignation of Christi Dallas as teacher in the school district, effective immediately, carried 6-0.

On a motion by Chambers, seconded by Harris, the board voted 6-0 to adopt a resolution to give notice of potential to terminate the contract with D&D Construction upon proper notification.

Other items under discussion included school prayer, yearbook payoff and dress code.

The board voted unanimously to purchase an LX172 John Deere riding lawn mower with a grass catcher from Clark Implement.

No action was taken on the topic of cheerleaders.

The board authorized the superintendent to obtain bids for the purchase of a 54-passenger Blue Bird bus with a turbo diesel and an automatic transmission.

Special ed rooms and facilities at elementary were discussed.

Wilson left at 12:32; the meeting adjourned at 12:48 a.m., following the reading of the minutes.

## Oil and Gas Report

Texas preliminary April crude oil production averaged 1,655,853 barrels daily, according to the latest reports issued from the Texas Railroad Commission. The total oil production figure for April is 49,975,856.

Natural gas reports for April show that Texas oil and gas wells produced 430,399,124 Mcf (thousand cubic ft.) of gas.

Both oil and gas production is down around 2.08 percent from April 1991.

Eastland County continues to follow the statewide trend of showing slightly lower figures on each monthly report. April 1992 figures for the county are: Crude Oil Production, 62,936 barrels, and total gas production, 816,232 Mcf.

said he had signs to post on County Road 570 but hadn't put them up yet. (This County Road goes to Lone Cedar Country Club.)

Ainsworth made the motion that CR 570 be posted at 35 MPH, with curves posted at 20 MPH. The motion carried unanimously, and the road will be posted.

On another item, T. D. Whitehorn made the request for rural road improvement. He was unable to be present, so County Judge Scott Bailey read this request.

Whitehorn stated that he had been familiar with roads in the Kokomo Community since 1933, and in his opinion they were no better now than they were in 1933.

He suggested that the county should explore the idea of buying equipment

to crush rock, then crush its own rock and fix certain parts of the roads systematically. In the long run this would lead to a permanent type of improvement.

On another agenda item, Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman brought a request that the trailer housing the Eastland County Food Pantry and Clothes Closet (204 N. Lamar, Eastland) be left at the same location for at least two years.

Organizations planning on repairing the building had asked for assurances that the pantry will continue at its same spot near the Old Jail, Pittman said.

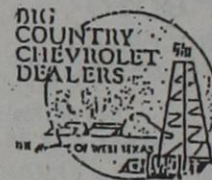
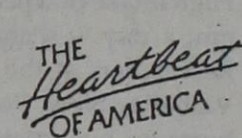



Land records in Pickens County, Alabama shows a Land Grant for Caleb and Ezekial **BARRON** 1835. It is believed this Ezekial **BARRON** is a brother of Caleb.

Goodspeed's **MEMOIRS OF MISSISSIPPI**, Vol I, Chapter XI "Counties of the Third (Final) Choctaw Session,"

Page 220. Names of some of the first or earliest settlers of Winston County, [Mississippi] are given as follows: "...**Caleb Barron, Ezekial Barron...**" Deed records of Winston County, MS also show Land Title in name of Caleb Barron as early as 1836. I would like to find proof this **Caleb BARRON** is in fact my great great grandfather. Also need name of Caleb's wife (possibly Elizabeth?) and to prove parents of Caleb who are believed to be **James and Jemima BARRON** who died and are buried in Cherokee County, Georgia.

Another "believed to be" brother of Caleb was **Joseph BARRON** who married **Hannah McClannahan** and lived in neighboring Choctaw County, MS.

**BARRON** was a very prominent name in this part of MS country. And it has been said many of the family moved to Texas in the 1850s and 1860s.

My great grandfather, **James BARRON** married in 1848 a **Miss Sarah Ann CRAWFORD** in MS and moved to Texas in 1850. He died in Hamilton County 1861. Sarah then married a **Mr. Perry**. She is buried in Robert Lee, Coke County, Texas. My grandfather was **William Caleb** (poss Caleb William), my father was **Walter BARRON**. I don't know brothers and

sisters of great grandfathers **James BARRON** and most sincerely appreciate hearing from anyone who can help me with my family.

**HISTORY OF LITCHFIELD (MAINE) and an Account of its CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION, 1895.** Oliver Barrett Clason, New preface by David Colby Young. Reviewed by Jeane Pruett.

No one person was credited with being the editor of this work for the original printing although all those who participated are well documented in the book. However, Hon. Clason was one of the main authors and was also instrumental in gathering together the genealogies and biographies for this work, providing one of the most complete collections of family records on this, or any Maine town. Several pages are given over to the celebration but most of the text concerns the families and the town's history. Information on the numerous families comprises about one-half of the book; the majority of families are carried through two or three generations. The historical part covers such topics as the town's civil history, its churches and several biographies of the ministers, its soldiers (especially during the Civil War), its schools and its doctors. Dozens of photographs highlight the

text with views of individuals and town scenes. A new name index makes the information in this book easy to find.

Parts of Litchfield were once or are now part of Bowdoin, Bowdoinham, Wales, Webster, Lisbon, and Monmouth Maine. Many families passed through Litchfield on their way to other places such as Ohio, Wisconsin, and Indiana. This reprinting should prove useful to those researching ancestors located in the Maine counties of Androscoggin, Lincoln, Cumberland and York.

The genealogies, given in alphabetical order, make this an easy book to research for a specific family surname. Family information includes in addition to names, the dates of events. The photographs of many of the

main family subjects are a nice addition.

A controversial conclusion from statistics gathered by the National Institute on Aging: The figures suggest that gaining a pound a year is associated with the lowest risk of death in people who began putting on weight when they were slim and healthy. Many doctors will disagree.

High intake of wheat bran -- raising total fiber to 30 gm. a day -- seems to lower levels of estrogen. Researchers at the American Health Foundation, Valhalla, New York, suggest that lowering the hormone may protect against breast cancer.

Even elderly patients with bowel cancer may benefit from surgery, doctors from Strasbourg, France, report. Except for oldsters who had life-threatening complications that required emergency surgery, the over-80 patients responded almost as well as younger ones.

Use enough sunscreen for protection, about an ounce per application, the Skin Cancer Foundation warns. And toss out old sunscreen. Most formulations won't hold up more than two years.



AUSTIN — Trailing in polls everywhere, concerned Texas Republicans last week continued preparing Houston's Astrodome, where they will stage their party's national convention Aug. 17-20.

They expect President Bush to take off the gloves and begin serious campaign warfare.

Democratic nominee Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, meanwhile, was also in Houston at three fundraisers at the homes of Mayor Bob Lanier, former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, and Arthur Schechter.

Clinton ripped Bush's economic plan, but said he too, would take on Saddam Hussein if the United Nations supported military action against Iraq.

Clinton's efforts to strengthen his Texas ties were countered by GOP jobs at his ties with Time Warner Inc., the record company distributing "Cop Killer," the controversial anti-police rap song by Ice-T.

GOP party boss Rich Bond, from his Astrodome base, accused Clinton and Democrats of taking \$400,000 from Time Warner to underwrite the Democratic National Convention in New York.

**Gramm to Keynote**  
Foul play, said some Lone Star Democrats, when Clinton stood up to Jesse Jackson over Sister Souljah's lyrics.

Now, many observers believe that event was the beginning of Clinton's recent surge to frontrunner status.

But Bond, once again, drew attention to the Astrodome, where the convention will siphon an estimated \$25 million into the Texas economy and give Bush an expected bounce back into the polls.

Two Texans will be prominent: U.S. Sen Phil Gramm will give the keynote speech and Texas Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison will serve as the convention's temporary chair, giving her national visibility.

**Economic Indicators**  
With the election likely riding on the state of the economy, the battle of financial news releases continues:

• The Texas Employment Commission said unemployment rates in Texas jumped almost one percent from May to June. Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers, a Democrat, said the trend for job growth is in industries only offering lower-paying jobs.

• Small Business Administration loan demand jumped dramatically in Texas over the past six months with seven cities ranked in the nation's top 10 business loan recipients: El Paso, 101.2 (1st); Lower Rio Grande Valley, 86.3, (2nd); San Antonio, 72.3 (5th); Dallas, 51.5 (6th); Houston, 44.5, (7th); Lubbock, 31.6 (9th); and Corpus Christi, 21.7 (10th).

• Many of the nation's banks, including several in Texas, reported strong gains in second-quarter earnings. The profits were attributed to aggressive cuts in interest rates. It marked the ninth straight quarter of profits posted by the Texas banking industry.

• New Texas Banking Commissioner Catherine Ghiglietti, 39, named by Gov. Ann Richards as the first woman ever on the panel, said she sees improvement in the industry, but is concerned about the lack of lending.

**Redistricting Revisited**  
A controversial figure on the court overseeing Texas redistricting, U.S. District Judge James Nowlin, removed himself from the case last week.

His departure will not affect the current election, but is seen as

a Democratic victory in lawsuits by Attorney General Dan Morales which will affect the 1994 elections.

Morales, a Democrat, wanted Nowlin, a Republican, removed for counseling with state Rep. George Pierce, R-San Antonio, about drawing political boundaries.

**Board Prouds Insurers**

The State Board of Insurance adopted new rules which chairwoman Claire Koriath said cracks down on insurance companies taking too long to settle claims.

The new rules shorten to 15 days the time allowed to approve or reject a claim after receiving all paper work.

An exception is 30 days for extended investigation in suspected arson cases.

**Strauss Has Warning**  
Washington's Texan-at-large Robert Strauss, now U.S. Ambassador to Russia, told a breakfast club his goal is to make Russia look like Abilene, Texas in 1930.

Listing their problems of hunger, unemployment and ethnic warfare, he called it "a dicey situation."

Strauss warned that the U.S. has not won the Cold War until the former Communist regime has a healthy economy.

**Other Highlights**

• Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has proposed improving care in Texas nursing homes by rewarding high-quality care, improving the training of state regulators and preventing proven "bad actors" from owning or operating homes.

• Workers' compensation insurers in Texas could lose their recently won freedom to raise and lower rates without state approval if they don't back off a recent round of increases, state Sen. Bob Glasgow warned. State Insurance Commissioner Georgia Flint also stepped up pressure on insurers to reduce rates.

• GOP chairman Bond joked that he was tempted to make a citizen's arrest of Bill Clinton on two counts: "A misdemeanor for impersonating a moderate, and a felony for impersonating a conservative."

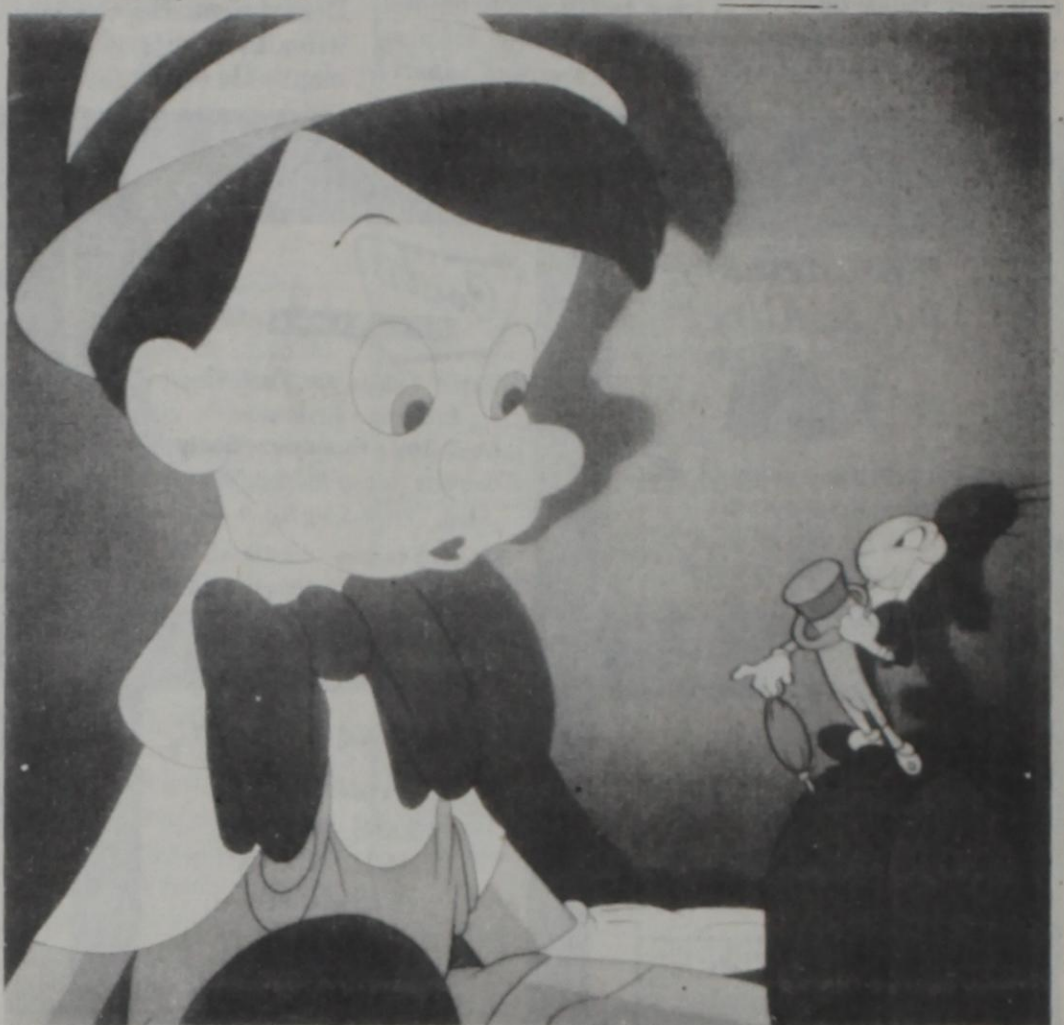

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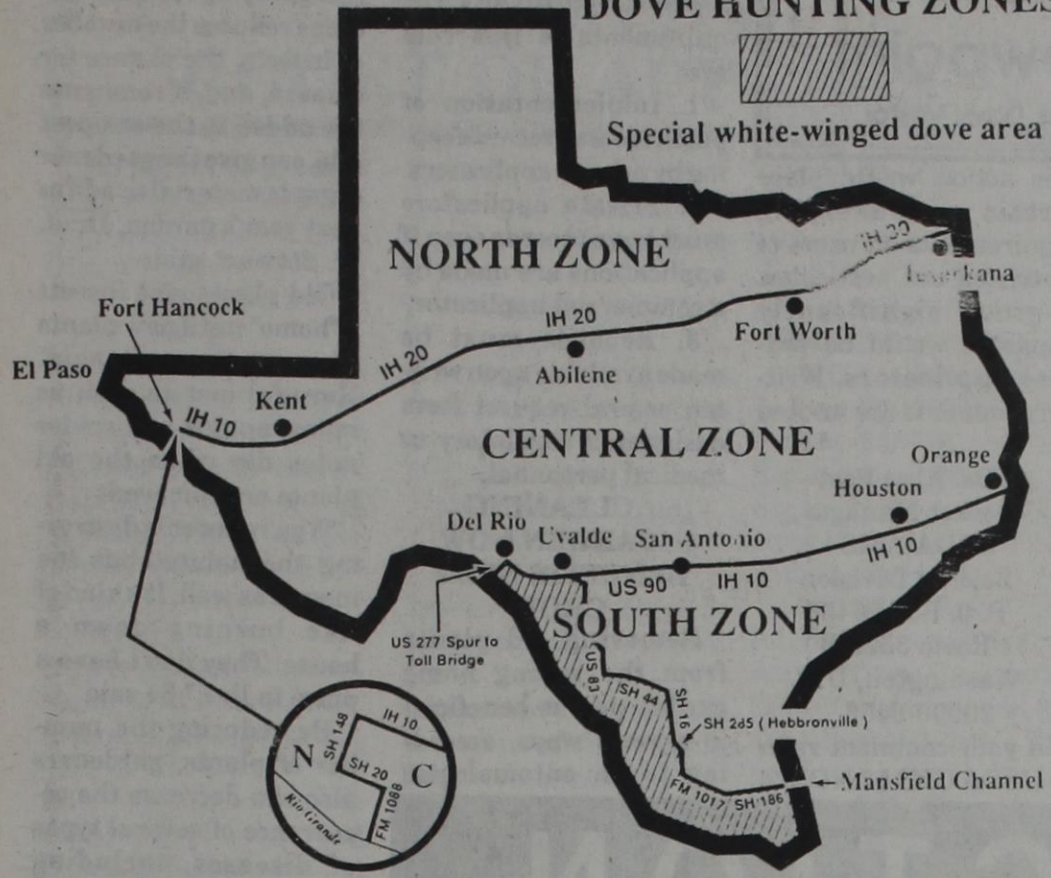

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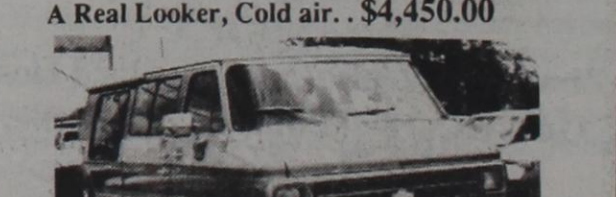

On May 12, 1992 the United States Department of Agriculture published in the Federal Register its proposed rule for Recordkeeping Requirement for Certified Applicators of Restricted Use Pesticides. This comes from the Food, Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act of 1990 better known as the FACT ACT. If established as a final rule

this action would place certain recordkeeping requirements on users of restricted use pesticides. A group significantly impacted would be private applicators. Written comments are invited to:

Some significant requirements of this rule are:

1. Implementation of pesticide use recordkeeping by private applicators.
2. Private applicators must have records even if applications are made by a commercial applicator.
3. Records must be made available upon written or oral request from designated regulatory or medical personnel.

## CLEANING GARDEN NOW BENEFITS NEXT CROP

Removing old plants from the spring home garden now is beneficial in several ways, according to an entomologist

with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Destroying residue from crops reduces the number of insects, the chance for disease, and, if remnants are added to the compost pile, can give the gardener organic material to add to next year's garden, Dr. J. W. Stewart said.

Old plants give insects a "home" until new plants emerge, Stewart said. Harmful insects such as mites, aphids and spider mites die when the old plants are removed.

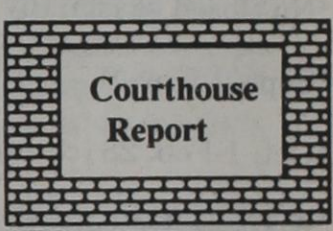
"You're not only destroying the habitat but the insects as well. It's kind of like burning down a house. They don't have a place to live," he said.

By reducing the number of plants, gardeners also can decrease the occurrence of several types of diseases, including some blights and fruit rot that already are existing in the spring garden.

Gardeners can till the old plants under or pull them up, he said.

Pulled plants can be gathered and added to a compost pile. Temperatures in a compost pile can get as high as 150 degrees Fahrenheit, destroying everything - including insects and diseases - inside it, he said.

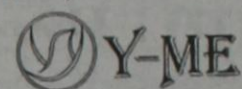
