A. The total amount of money paid into the public till by the motor vehicle owners of the Rising Star area during the recent license-paying period will probably surprise you. Collected at the Tax Collector temporary substitution in Rising Star during that period was a total of \$15,619.19, according to A. D. Jenkins, temporary deputy. This amount is in addition to the money paid in Federal and other State taxes during the year.

In all the sound and fury accompanying the weather alerts of the last week, Rising Star got less than half an inch of rain. As a matter of fact the precipitation Sunday was only .25 of an inch. The total for the month of May, according to the City Hall records was 81 of an inch up to Wednesday, May 13, and the year's total was 2.63 inches—less than a third of normal.

Meanwhile temperatures are acting pretty well according to plan. Tuesday the mercury was knocking near the 90-degree mark with a registered 87. There was a low of 54 degrees Monday.

Two more sections of rural road in the Rising Star precinct will be treated with the oil-asphalt mixture which has proved so successful on the road from Highway 183 east by the Ray Agnew farm and the cemetery road, it was announced this week by Comm'r. Bob Carter. The first road was treated about a year ago and has stood up to expectations, Mr. Carter said.

The new roads to receive the jopping are a section of about three miles from the Criswell store, north of Rising Star, eastward toward the Long Branch community, and another section from Highway 36 west of Rising Star to the Pete Larkin place.

Funeral services for Varah Buchanan, 94, who died at the home of a son at Mission, Texas, Wednesday, May 6, were held at the Church of Christ here Friday of last week at 4 p. m. Burial was in Pioneer Cemetery. The services were conducted by a Baptist minister from Irving, Texas, assisted by Harry A. Tansil, minister of the Rising Star Church of Christ.

Mrs. Buchanan was a long time resident of Pioneer where she lived until 1930 after her husband died there in 1916. She was living with a son, Clarence Buchanan, at Mission and had been in good health until about a week before her death.

## Contract On May Phone Work Due To Be Let Soon

Preliminary engineering work and staking on the May telephone system reconstruction program by the Kizer Telephone Co., has been completed and work on plans and specifications preliminary to letting contract for construction is now under way.

The company hopes to let contract on this work within 45 days. When completed the May system and the Rising Star system will be integrated for direct dialing without toll charge.

Meanwhile engineering work is now being done on extensions of the Rising Star lines to serve new customers. The company, with increase in stations served running well ahead of estimates, is already being pushed to take care of the new customers with existing facilities and is pushing a program of expansion as rapidly as possible.

Next on the program is the installation of extended area service in which the Rising Star and Cross Plains exchanges will be integrated for direct dialing. Installation of this equipment is expected to begin in August.

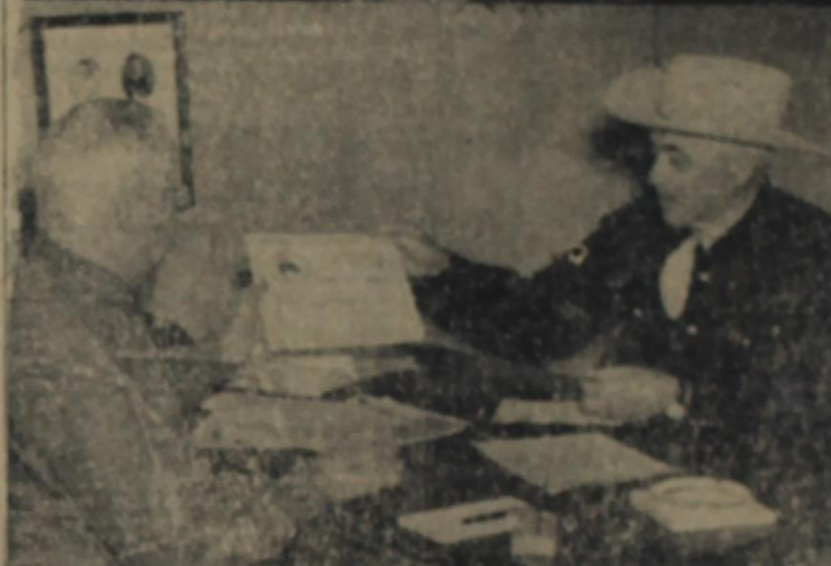
Funds derived from the show will be used to finance projects of the club.

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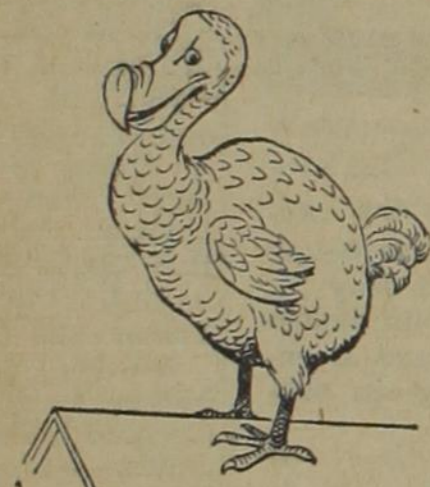
## It's The Law In Texas

The signing of a contract of sale is an extremely important step in the purchase of a home. Once buyer and seller have signed, they are bound by the provisions of the contract. Their respective legal rights in the transaction are thereby set and determined. If the contract is poorly and haphazardly drawn, a harvest of regret may be reaped at a later date. Sales contracts are often called by other names, such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and al-

most without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligation lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understanding as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its contents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appearance of the contract, and perhaps the fact that a partially printed form is used may cause the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a

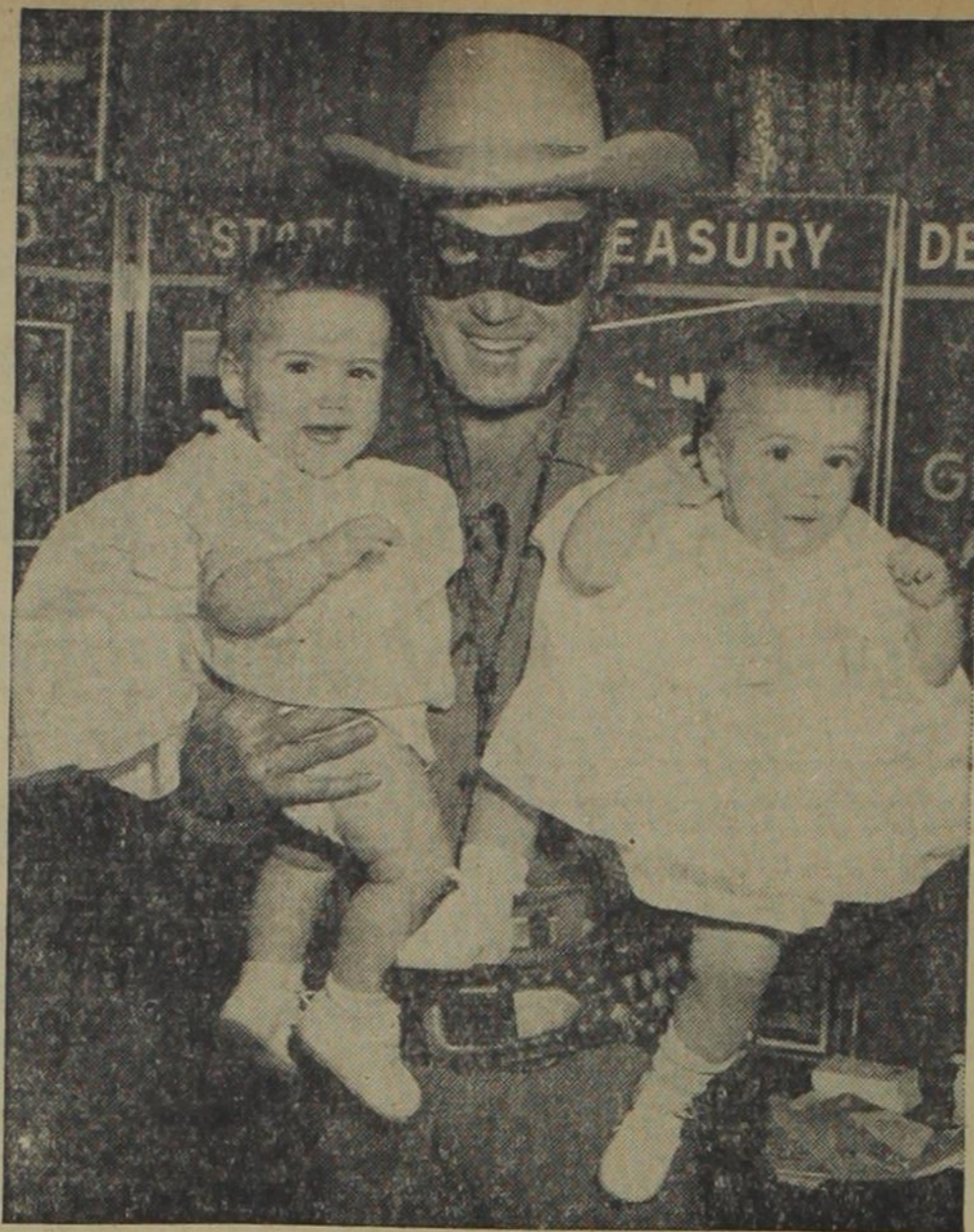

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described. A complete description of the property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds, is a must, the street number being inadequate by itself.

Articles and fixtures included in the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items as venetian blinds, removable floor coverings, draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money

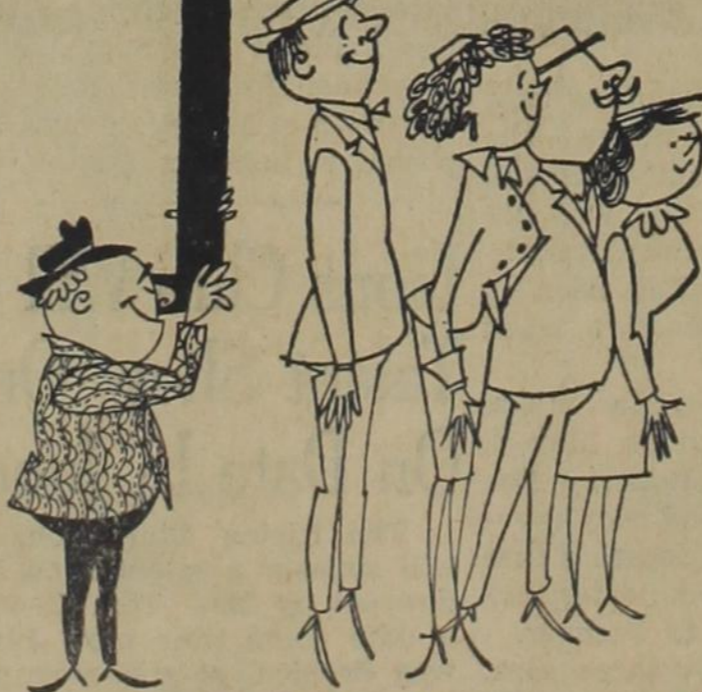

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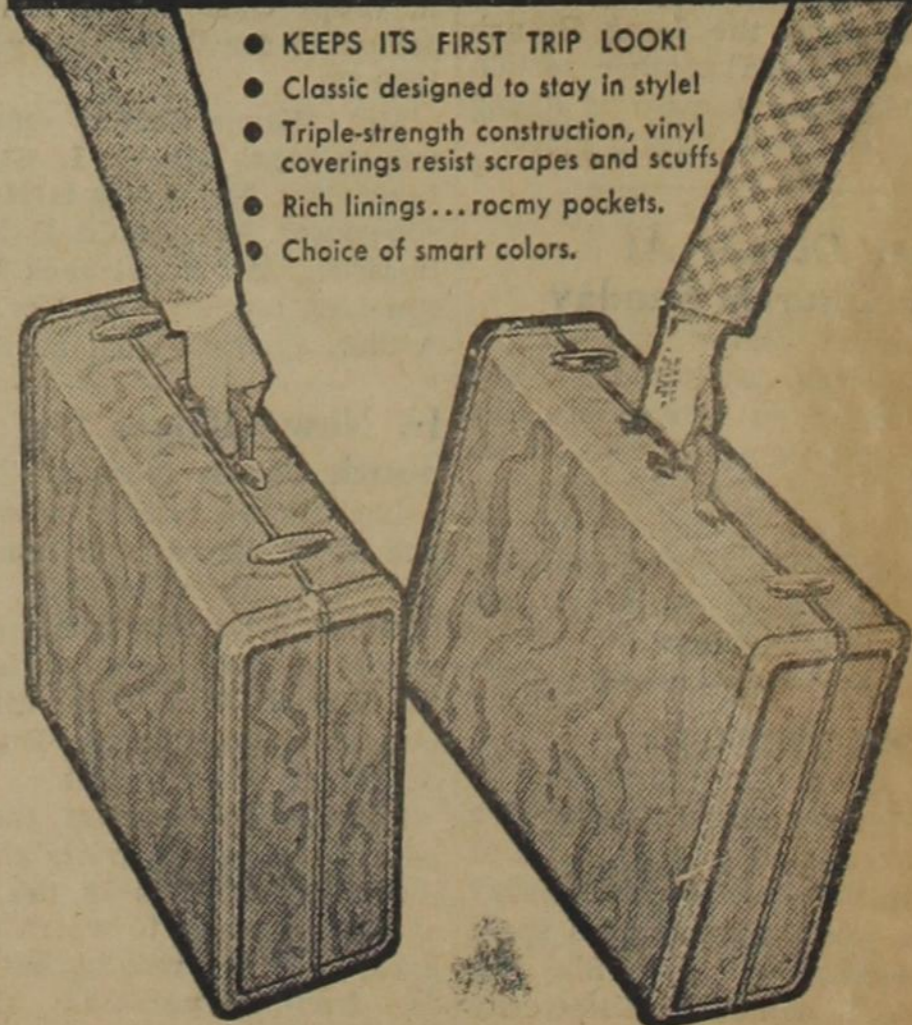

### HOME MAKERS Views and News

Make every penny count when you buy sport shirts. You can, if you will keep some important buying guides in mind, according to extension clothing specialists.

Take fabrics, for instance. They come in many fibers, new blends and with new finishes. Do you know what to expect from dacron, nylon, or even cotton that has been treated with a special finish? Unless you ask for a label that gives this information, or depend upon a sales person you know well, you may be disappointed by the wearing qualities of the shirt.

Quality is not always a matter of price alone. It pays to check construction features, such as pleats or gathers over shoulder blades to give ease; buttonholes, cuff finish and stitching along the front panel.

Color makes a difference, too. Colors appropriate for the individual, the occasion, and the other parts of the ensemble, make for a better appearance.

Perspiration Stains Cool dark cottons are popular for summer wear in many

parts of the State. Many warm weather dress styles are not cut to be worn with dress shields, so perspiration stains and discoloration of dark colored clothing sometimes occur. These suggestions from U. S. Department of Agriculture textile chemists will deal with these stains on washable cottons.

The fresher the stain, the better your chances of removing it. Pressing a dress that is even slightly stained may set the stain and cause more discoloration. First try washing stains thoroughly in warm water, rubbing soap or synthetic detergent well into the stain. If the fabric has discolored, try sponging a fresh stain with a little vinegar and water solution; for an older stain try a little ammonia and water. This may help restore the color. Rinse thoroughly. Save any tags on ready-to-wear and yard goods and read carefully. Some dark cottons carry a label stating that the dye is fast to perspiration. Other labels give facts about both the fabric and its finish that will be helpful when you need to remove a stain at home.

Freeze Spring Vegetables Freezing is a quick, easy way to preserve fresh greens, asparagus, and other vegetables. Freezing keeps the natural color, fresh flavor, and food values of most vegetables and fruits better than other ways of food

preparation. Select fresh, tender vegetables right from the garden. A bulletin "Frozen Foods" may be obtained from the county home demonstration agent office.

Rather, it is to generate public interest in how we in Texas can meet the needs and problems of our youngsters. Responsibility rests upon our homes, our churches and our schools to give training to qualify our children for citizenship."

Governor Daniel has asked that every Texan use time and

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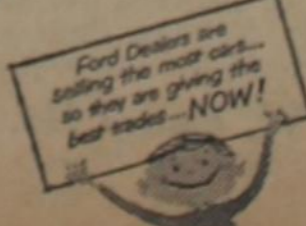
