Christmas. So one day last summer I took a walk, as I do every day, but this day I walked down toward the old home place where we lived when the boys were born and growing up.

As I walked by where the old house stood, my thoughts went back so many years ago. The thought struck me that I've got to get a picture of the windmill and storage tank before the old tank falls down. "Oh, that's what I'll get the boys for Christmas." They were all so proud of them.

When they looked at their pictures, one would say to the other, "Remember how Dad and us boys would come in after working at the field and siphon water out of the storage tank and take a shower?" Another said,

"Remember getting icicles off the storage tank in the winter time and Mama would make us ice cream in a syrup bucket?"

One of the little boys I've been talking about is none other than my middle son Roy. He is the Texas Farm Bureau state Director from District 7.

IRS Tax Notes

TAXPAYERS CAN EXTEND THEIR FILING DEADLINES

Taxpayers who need extra time to file their federal tax return may receive an automatic two-month extension, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The application for an extension beyond the April 15, 1982 deadline is filed on Form 4868, "Application for Automatic extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return." The IRS stresses that this is an extension of time to file, not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. The taxpayer must compute the tax expected to be owed for 1981 and send that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

Taxpayers eligible to file the shorter Form 1040A are allowed the automatic extension, but must use the Form 1040 instead of the 1040A when filing after April 15.

U.S. citizens outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their tax deadlines can receive an automatic two-month extension of the filing deadline without filing Form 4868. Taxpayers who qualify for this type of extension must attach a state-

ment to their tax return when they file, explaining that they were outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the filing deadline. Interest will be charged on any unpaid tax from the due date to the date the tax is paid, and a penalty may be imposed if the unpaid tax exceeds 10% of the amount due.

Taxpayers who expect to file Form 2555, "Deduction from, or Exclusion of, Income Earned Abroad," can obtain an extension of time until 30 days after the end of their qualifi-

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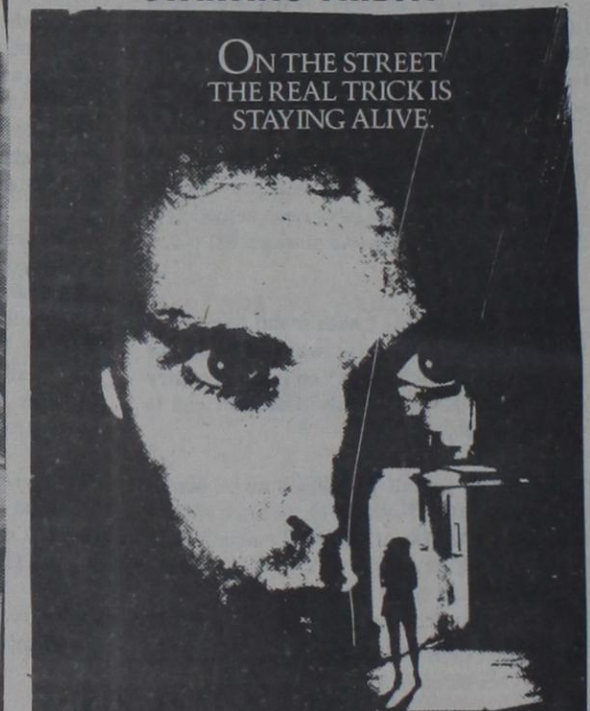

At the conclusion of the ceremonies, an honor guard of HSU ROTC students will present a 21-gun salute and taps will be played.

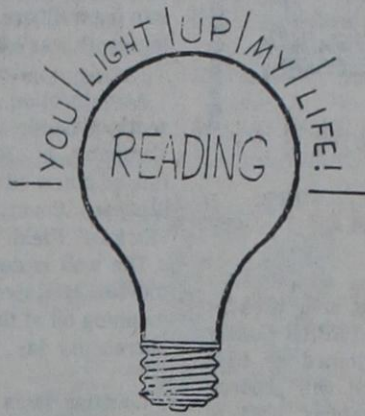

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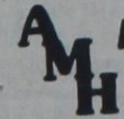

County Oil Report Thursday, April 1, 1982

At a location 12 miles northeast of Breckenridge, Timm Oil Company of Denver City has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's Hela Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Whitfield, pumping oil at the rate of 38 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 70,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per

day.

CAPITOL UPDATE

In 1978, when Congress last debated the subject of natural gas price decontrol, artificially low federally imposed prices on interstate gas had caused critical supply disruptions. Texans, whose gas came from the unregulated intrastate market, were paying several times more for their own supplies than out-of-state consumers.

The "compromise" solution adopted was the Natural Gas Policy Act, which provided for partial lifting of controls over a six-year period ending in 1985. Some of us warned then that this legislation contained serious defects, and could lead to further problems in future years. These prophesies have been fulfilled.

Let us for a moment look at some of the major problems we face, so that we can then see a logical solution to them.

The price levels set for the gradual decontrol of prices for some categories of gas were premised on the assumption that crude oil would cost approximately \$15 a barrel in 1984. Of course oil is now selling at more than \$30 a barrel. This means that when the controls expire in 1985, and the price rises to an actual but equivalent market price, we will see a drastic, traumatic rise in the cost of natural gas to business and individual consumers.

Secondly, we now are seeing distortions in supplies. The effect of partial deregulation already in place has been to give pipeline companies with large reserves of cheap, regulated gas an advantage in competing for expensive, uncontrolled "new" gas. They are able to bid at prices above the market value because they can average the cost of the new and old gas and sell at a competitive level. Companies without access to these artificially cheap supplies are not able to compete for these new reserves.

Since most intrastate pipelines do not control cheap, regulated gas, Texas and other producing states already are beginning to experience shortages. We cannot be expected to watch our resources being pumped to other states in vast quantities while we are unable to obtain sufficient amounts for our own needs.

Phased-in, complete decontrol of gas prices would solve these supply problems; allow the increased cost of gas to be absorbed by the economy and individual consumers gradually, and set us on a course of realistic, efficient use of our gas resources. Studies indicate that the longterm price to consumers will not be significantly greater with complete decontrol than with the currently scheduled partial decontrol. Further, with gradual decontrol, consumers will not face the burden of supply shortages ending in an abrupt price increase.

The President shares these views, but has concluded that this Congress is unlikely to act favorably on the issue. For that reason, he has decided not to press for action this year. I am extremely disappointed in this decision, though I understand the reasons for it. However, I will continue to urge the Administration to work to develop and prepare a feasible decontrol plan for submission to Congress as soon as is practical.

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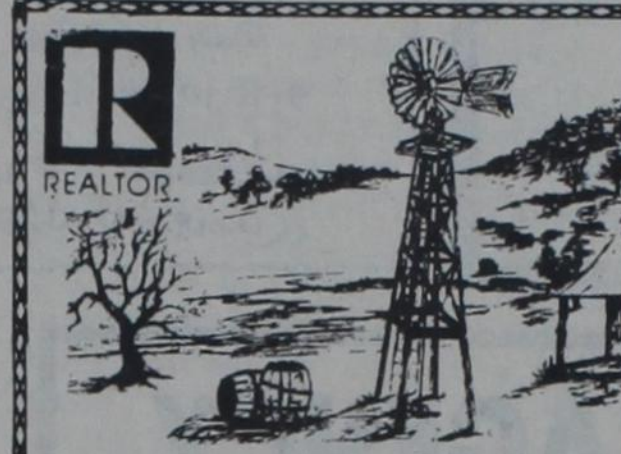

Texas Commission Approves Assistance For Import Victims

The Texas Employment Commission stated that an application filed in 1980 by former employees of Munsingwear, Inc. (Vassarette of Eastland) for assistance under the Trade Act of 1974 had been approved.

A.K. Ashley, Manager of the Texas Employment Commission Office in Mineral Wells stated that representatives from his office will be in Eastland at the County Courthouse on Tuesday, March 30, 1982, to assist individuals in preparing claims for Trade Readjustment Assistance.

Ashley said that applications such as this are submitted by employees or employers to the International Labor Affairs Bureau (ILAB) and when the application is approved the actual claimstaking is performed by the Texas Employment Commission.

In broad terms this type of unemployment assistance requires that an individual be separated from his work because of the importation of foreign goods in competition with the firm where he worked. In addition, such workers must have been employed by the affected firm for 26 of the 52 weeks preceding the week in which they were laid off because of the effect of the imported goods.

Ashley stated further that packets of material had been mailed to former employees of Vassarette along with a schedule for reporting to the claimstaking point. Persons desiring further information may call the Mineral Wells TEC Office at (817) 325-2595.

Is the amount you will owe the Internal Revenue Service this year large? Do you expect to receive income not subject to withholding in 1982 (i.e., interest income, royalty income, rental income, etc.). If so, you may have to file a declaration of estimated tax for 1982, says the Internal Revenue Service.

Whether you must file a declaration of estimated tax, Form 1040ES, for any year depends on how much you estimate your income will be for that year and how much of it you estimate will be subject to withholding. Do not include income exempt from tax in deciding whether you must file a declaration.

Further information is detailed in IRS Publication 505, "Estimated Tax and Tax Withholding," which can be obtained by using the order form in the tax package.
