## New Owners Take Over Jackson's Variety Store

Purchase of the Jackson Variety Store in Rising Star by Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Roan of Breckenridge is being announced this week. The store, now under its new ownership and management, will henceforth be known as Roan's Variety.

Sale was made by Lewis Jackson, former Rising Star business man now of Abilene, where he is employed by the Dyess Air Force Base.

The new owners will move to Rising Star to take personal charge of the store at the end of the current school term at Breckenridge. Until then the business will be in charge of a sister of Mr. Roan, Mrs. Ernie Ford, formerly of Breckenridge and Dallas. Mr. and Mrs. Roan will be here on weekends.

The new owners come to Rising Star after 14 years with the Breckenridge high school where Mr. Roan is director of the Buckaroo Band and Mrs. Roan is registrar of the high school. They went to Breckenridge from Gatesville in 1945 where Mr. Roan was band director for two years. Mrs. Roan has been registrar of the Breckenridge school since '48.

During his stay at Breckenridge Mr. Roan built the Buckaroo band from an organization of about 35 members into one numbering 190 students in Senior and Junior bands. During his directorship the Breckenridge student musicians have won statewide recognition as marching and concert units, and through the stage band organization. Five first places and two third places have been won by the Breckenridge stage band in the 3-A division of the Stage band festival during its eight years of existence, and it has been in continual demand for programs at the various state colleges, at the Gonzales Warm Springs polo foundation, the Kerrville Crippled Children's Camp of the Lions Club, the Kerrville veterans hospital and other places.

The Buckaroo band was chosen as the only band to play for the State High School Coaching school game at Carter Stadium, Fort Worth, one year, and it has been chosen for many other distinctions, proving that Breckenridge High School has been able to produce outstanding performers in fields other than football.

"We have long wished to retire from public work and own and operate a business of our own, and we feel that the variety store here offers us good opportunity to do so. We are glad to be citizens of Rising Star and we shall try to be good citizens and to give the people of this section a five-and-ten-cent center that will be a credit to the community and meet the needs of our customers in a way that will be very satisfactory," said Mr. Roan.

## Track and Field Workouts Begin At High School

Workouts for track and field started in earnest at Rising Star High School this week with the close of the basketball season. Coaches Ray Nunnally and Weldon Hill greeted a field of 33 young hopefuls from which they will seek athletes able to fill the shoes of the four seniors who were the mainstays of last year's district champions - Robert Need burn, Eugene Bishop, Edward Hums and Don Hicks.

Among the youngsters who answered the whistle were a number of good prospects in the mile and half-mile events and in the field events, particularly the pole vault and low hurdles. Last year's crew was strong in the sprints upon which the Wildcats relied to take the district title and also the title the previous year. Whether or not this season's eligibles can supply the lack, if not in sprints, then in the runs and field events, remains to be seen.

Three boys working out for the spring events are showing promise. They are Gerald Green, Rodney Smith and Jerry Alexander. A newcomer to the field, Paul Freeman, may give the team some unexpected strength in the pole vault and low hurdles while Wicky Walker is looking good in the high hurdles.

But it is in the mile run and the half-mile that the 1959 Wildcat team is being counted upon to make some real competition in the district. A flock of runners are available to the coaches in these events, including two veterans from last year, Gary Scott and Don Long. Scott features the mile and Long runs the half-mile. Backing them up are Coy Edmiston and Gary Maynard in the half mile and Berl McKinnerney and Kenneth Ridens in the mile.

The Wildcats will compete in a new district of the B division this year after copping two Class A district titles last year and the previous year. The new district does not coincide with the football B district, however. It includes Gorman, Carbon, Olden, Desdemona, and Rising Star.

While the senior team is not as strong as last year's crew, the turnout for the junior team is causing the coaches to smile hopefully for next year and succeeding years. Several fine prospects have reported for workouts with the gonger crew. They include Johnny Jones, Worley Maynard, Dick Morrow, Larry Harding, and others who show considerable promise.

## Burglars Make Off With Crisp Station Cash Register

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
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

### The Objectives of Public School Week

A school system is vital to a progressive nation, and our public school system, in my opinion, is superior to any that has ever existed. The American taxpayers spend billions of dollars yearly to maintain our schools; yet, very few of them take the opportunity to visit and observe the schools in their community.

The public school system in Texas was established by law in 1854. Since then our state program of education has developed into one of the finest in the nation. As our educational system expanded, it became evident that a program was needed to arouse the interest of every citizen in the schools of his community. 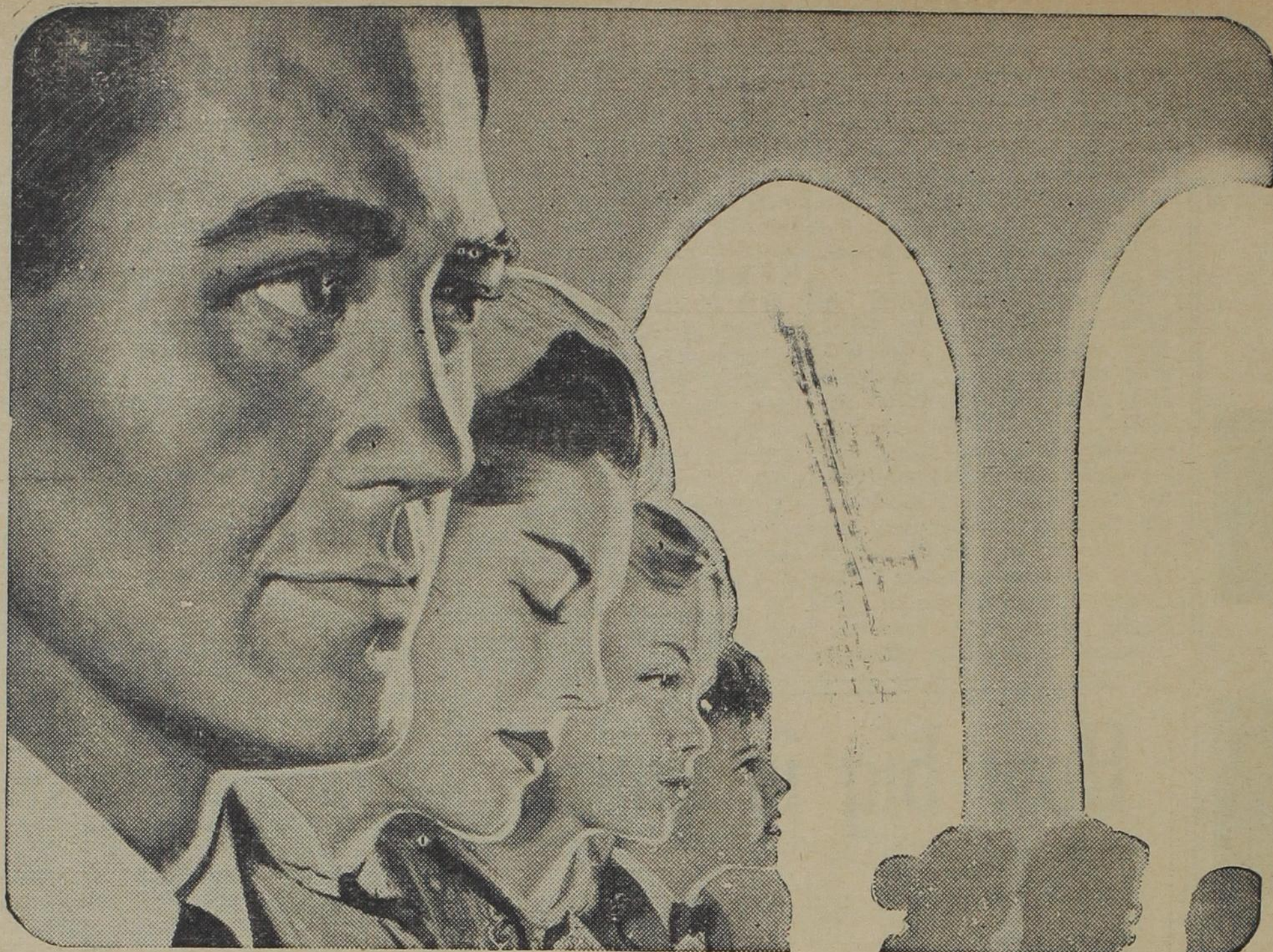
