



But it was done during 1927 by Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Dyuart of Molissa Collin County, and they had everything to eat that you could possibly want-meat, fruit, vegetables and eggs, fresh every day.

Of course they are farmers, But the farmer who can hold his gro cery bill down to 50 cents a week is a marvel. Any farmer will admit it. That the low cost of living with the Dynarts last year wasn't an accident is shown by their grocery bill for 1926 an

The only food items for which the Dysarts paid cash were augar. coffee, flour, spices and the like. They could have held their food bill down still more by having some of the wheat they sold ground into flour for themselves

"It was British tradition," continues the author, "that troops could take a position in frontal attack, carrying material for filling ditches and indilers for scaling walls. "Pakenham died railying the men," explains Raymond, "when they withered under the rifle and artillery fire. Before that fire, in 25 minutes the storm troops of Great Britain disappeared. Washington March 27 .- Anoth r general shifting about of ratadio Commission on the basis of the recently enacted radio law.

In the opinion of the comm ton the law demands a new atcation of wave lengths and pow er among broadcasting establish ments, but while the new s sing worked out the commission will allow all present oper. ting stations to continue service under temporary license.

"To bring the status of broad asting station licenses into strict ompliance with he new legisla tion by Congress," the commission announced Monday. "Providing equitable distribution of licenses, power, frequencies and time of operation the Federal Radie Commission is compiling a new allocation of broadcasting stations and powers, to be put into effect at the earliest possible date following executve approval of the new act.

"Meanwhile, all broadcasting stations licenses in force until April 1, 1928, have been extend ed by the commission to be in

effect until 3 a. m., May 1, 1928." In the new allocation, a considerable number of broadcasting stations might be dropped out but ready to say directly. The com. mission tentatively adopted last winter a plan to reduce materially the total number of broadcasting stations, but no vote indicat ing its present sand has been taken since congressional committees in hearings threshed out arguments on the subject prior to the enactment of the new bill.



### LOST AND FOUND

#### When Chess Was Put Under Churchly Ban

As to how chess was introduced into western and central Europe little is really known, and still less about its advent into this country. Some any that chess was brought into Europe at the time of the Crusades, the theory being that Christian warriors learned to play it at Constantinople, but this has been disproved.

More probable it is that the Spaniards received the game from their Mostem conquerors, who had learned it from the Persians, who in their turn had been initiated into it by the Hindus, while the Italians acquired chess from the Byzantines.

tines.

It seems that chose was known in Italy before the first Crusade, for there is exiant, says Colome! Whitton, in the Nineteenth Century, a curious letter from the cardinal archbishop of Ontia to Pope Alexander II, written about 1061, bearing on the game.

The cardinal had impassed a penance on a bishop whom he had found diverting biaself with chees, and in his letter to the pope the cardinal quotes the innguinge of reproof he had used to his erring authordinate: "Was it right, I say, and consistent with thy duties, to sport away thy evenings amidst the vanities of chess and defile the hand which offers up the body of the Lord, and the longue which mediates between God and man, with the pollution of this sacrilegious game?"

Belivia is probably the most inaccessible country in the world. It
can only be reached by crossing
the Andes or by taking a long and
difficult journey through the Argentine. Thus, although it is four
times as large as Great Britain,

LUXURIOUS PLANE, TO BE-PLACE SPIRIT OF ST. LOUIS

New York, March 22 -- A lux urious new airplane, with a nicked plated motor, self starter and other conveniences lacking in the Spirit of St. Louis, will be ready for Col. Charles A. Lindbergh by April 1.

William Mankey, chief enginbuilders of the Spirit of St. Loueer for the Mahoney Aircraft Co., is, has divulged the details of the new plane which was designed by forbidden by law to plant what the flying colonel himself.

It will have the same wing spread as his famous transatiantic plane and something of the same appearance, but will differ in other details

It will have accommodations for three passengers in addition t othe pilot and will have a speed of 126 miles an hour. The pilot will have a clear view ahead in contrast to the Spirit of St. Louis. The interior finish will be the last word in airplane luxury. The sents will be deep cushioned leather chairs and the instrument board will be of mahogany.

The nickel plated motor pro bably is the most beautiful thing of its kind ever built. It is a Wright whirlwind of 220 horse power and was the gift of its builders. Other parts of the plane also were gifts from their builders to Lindbergh.

Special landing lights are to be chute flares, accessary in emerthe fuselage so they can be released from the cockpit.

The plane has a gas capacity of only 115 gallons. The Spirit of St. Louis was built primarily for long distance flying with little thought for the comfort of the pilot. The only concession Lindbergh ever made to comfort in the Spirit of St Louis was an air cushion which he used in the seat of the plane after his re. turn from France.

#### RYSTERIA PLUS

The Dallas News seems thoroughly convinced that anything short of complete prohibition of cotton growing in the West Texas localities where pink bollworm infestation has been reported in unsafe. With such a conviction he News is able to view with resignation the paralysis of industrial and economic relations in these localities which would certainly ensue if the farmors were is now their most important crop. Such a sacrifice is necessary, the News believes, if the pink bollworm is to be stopped at the present farthest point of its invaion, thus saving the humid section of Texas which, the News points out, still produces "most of

the cotton grown in this State." Yet there is no intention anywhere of failing in this protection. The regulatory measures now being put into effect in the West Texas localities under the specification and supervision of the State Boll Worm Commission have as their purpose nothing other than the prevention of the spread of the pest to the "humid sections," where it is admitted greater ravages would be produced as the insect found climatic conditions more to its liking. It is in the demand for "going the limit" in protection, when the burden of such measures falls directly only on others, that there installed in the wing and para- lies the bysteria which the Star-Telegram referred to, a term to which the News objects,

Along with the hysteria there is a solfishness which is not mitigated by the willingness of those proposing such measures that the cotton growing interests of the West Texas counties shall be indemnified sometime for their losses. The News holds that, in the event of cotton prohibition, the farmers should be "fatrly com pensated." The difficulty is that under present conditions farmers cannot be fairly compensated. The funds for such compensation must come partly from the Federal Government and partly from the State with the State supplying Howard County. We would there- the larger portion. There are no State funds available, and in regular order there is no opportun. to keep prosperity camping in our ity for making state funds available for this purpose until next Winter when the Legislature meets. It is obvious therefore .. inners and other interests de-endent upon the cotton crop would have to wait some time before they could be "fairly com-pensated." The loss to the communities in such a situation would be enormous. Compensa-tion to be "fair" must be not on

If the money were at hand to pay the farmers and others in he non-cotton nones the question would not be such a grave one. But the money is not at hand, and there does not appear any likelihood that will soon be avail-able. It is true that there is a bill in Congress for the taking over by the Federal government of the entire financial burden of fighting the pink bollworm. There also has been a movement for a spe-cial session of the Legislature to make available the State's share of funds require dunder the exsting system of federal and state operation But, in legislative matters, there is often a long spread of time between the proposal and enactment.

In the meantime, the fight against the boll worm must proed. The State Boll Worm Commission has approved a program which calls for strict regulatory measures. The counties where the pest has been found are co-operating. The News admits that regulatory measures are equal at least to the job of preventing the spread of the insect beyond the regulated sones. That should be sufficient to allay hysteria, which is inevitably an accor phenomenon of all organized batties against posts and discus

So long as West Texas is content to continue to raise cotton under regulation, and so long as regulation will prevent the apread eastward of the hollworm it appears that level-headed persons should be content to let mat-ters rest there for the year, con. fident that should any furth measures be necessary, the boil worm commission will see that they are carried out .-- Fort Worth Star Telegram,







Austin, March 22 .- An amendment to the State's petition in its suit against the Texon, Marland and Big Lake Oil Companies and the Reagan County Purchasing Company, to seek cancellation of oil leases worth millions, which the defendants hold on Txas University land is being prepared by Assistant Attorneys General Joe Brown and Allen Clark, Brown said Thursday.

The action now merely demands an accounting for that part of the university's share of oil. (one-eighth) which the State claims was sold to the Reagan County Purchasing Company at less than market price. Brown

The proposed amendment agreed on after a conference with the Saner firm, university counsel, in Dallas would seek to forfeit all the leases in question and recover for the institution all the oil produced on the allegation that they were fraudulently obtained without compliance with the 1917 general permit act.
