

two Best Actress Awards in UIL One Act Play competition. The summer following her graduation, she appeared with the Park Boulevard Players in Godspell & Working.







Texas Veterans have approximately one month to get in bids on more than 270 tracts of state land being offered through the Texas Veterans Land Board. The deadline to receive bids is

August 23 at 1 p.m. Located in 115 counties throughout the state, the tracts are offered exclusively to Texas veterans who are eligible to participate in the Texas Veterans Land Program. The interest rate will be 8.75 percent on a 30-year, assumable, fixed-rate loan.

Tracts range in size from five to 100 acres. No down payment is required and the VLB will finance the full amount of all winning bids.

There is no limit on the amount loaned on winning bids. The buyer will be responsible for the current year's taxes only.

"I'd like to encourage Texas veterans who have been looking for quality land to take advantage of this sale," said Garry Mauro, who chairs the VLB.

"Everybody has an equal shot at winning."

The sale will be by sealed bid only with a minimum bid set by the Board. Winning bidders will be notified by mail within one week of the sale. The VLB may reject any bids for any reason.

Bidders must submit a \$25 non-refundable bid fee for each bid and \$320 to cover closing costs with their bid form. Unsuccessful bidders will have all money refunded except the \$25 bid fee.

To be considered an eligible Texas veteran, the only residency requirements are that a veteran live in Texas for at least five consecutive years immediately prior to filing an application with the Board or must have entered the service while a resident if Texas In addition, the ve erans must be a resident of Texas when filing an ap-

The veteran must have served at least 90 consecutive days of active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, or Coast unless discharged sooner due to a serviceconnected disability. Service must have been after
