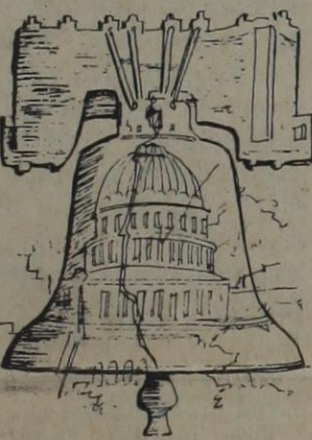
The purpose of Senate Bill 621 and the creation and administration of the Eastland County Appraisal District is to create equal and uniform values for all types of property within Eastland County.

With the help of the propoerty owners of Eastland County, it is hoped that this equalization can be accomplished to the satisfaction of the requirements of Senate Bill 621.

Eastland County Tax Appraisal Board came into existence after the Legislature passed Senate Bill 621 in an effort to create equal and uniform values for property, because all Tax Evaluations was not equal.

Senate Bill 621 makes it possible for all counties to have all property reevaluated at, fair market value, and all property would be re-appraised so the property would be taxed fairly.

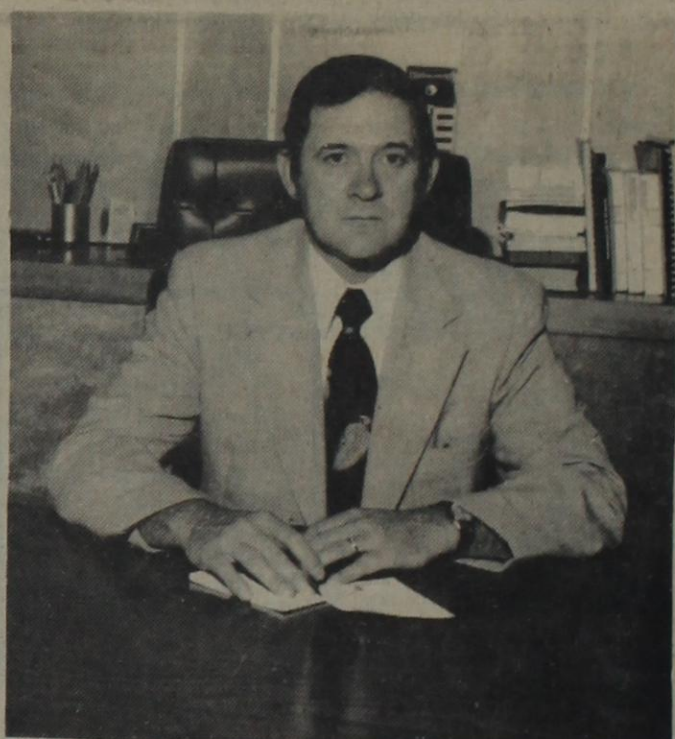
## May 8th Grade Commencement

### City Receives Payment

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said May rebates to Texas cities of the one-percent city sales tax will amount to \$38.7 million.

Bullock said that while most cities will receive a larger check this month compared to the same period last year he doesn't believe it's because the state's economy is growing at a robust pace.

"We've been tinkering around with our processing system to improve it over the past few months and as a result find allocations and rebates have shot up from time because of improved handling of tax accounts," he said.

Bullock said overall sales tax collections from the first of the fiscal year through April are up only 21.5 percent compared to last year.

Dallas will receive \$4.4 million this month, bringing the city's year-to-date total to \$23.5 million.

Houston's check will be \$8.1 million. Payments to Houston for 1980 now total \$42.2 million.

Fort Worth will receive \$1.6 million, boosting that city's yearly total to \$8.1 million.

San Antonio is due a \$2.2 million rebate. San Antonio has received \$11.3 million in city sales tax refunds since the first of the year.

Bullock also announced that the San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authority would receive a \$1.1 million payment and Houston's MTA payment for May would be \$8.6 million.

Total MTA payments to Houston for fiscal 1980 amount to \$89.7 million and San Antonio has received \$11.8 million.

The MTA taxes are collected along with city and state sales taxes by merchants and other businesses and are rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office along with the city sales tax.

The city of Rising Star received total payments of \$1,107.99 bringing the 1980 payments to \$6,985.93 which is a 28 percent gain over 1979.

### Six Flags Over Texas Sets Daily Operation

On the heels of one of the most successful spring seasons in its 20-year history, Six Flags Over Texas will begin daily operation for the summer Saturday, May 17.

Since opening March 1, the Arlington theme park has hosted nearly a half million visitors from throughout the nation.

General Manager Ray Williams said the park's entertainment lineup is being bolstered for the summer months, with particular emphasis on nighttime entertainment.

A nightly fireworks show will begin May 24, and special entertainment will be featured each evening in the park's Music Mill Amphitheater beginning June 1.

Elvis impersonator Raymon Michaels will appear in the open-air theater six nights a week during the month of June. Each Friday night will see a top name entertainer on the Music mill stage. The lineup for June includes Jerry Jeff Walker, Ronne Milsap, Crystal Gayle and Kool and the Gang.

Williams said the park's new, wooden roller coaster, Judge Roy Scream, has carried more than 375,000 thrillseekers since its March opening.

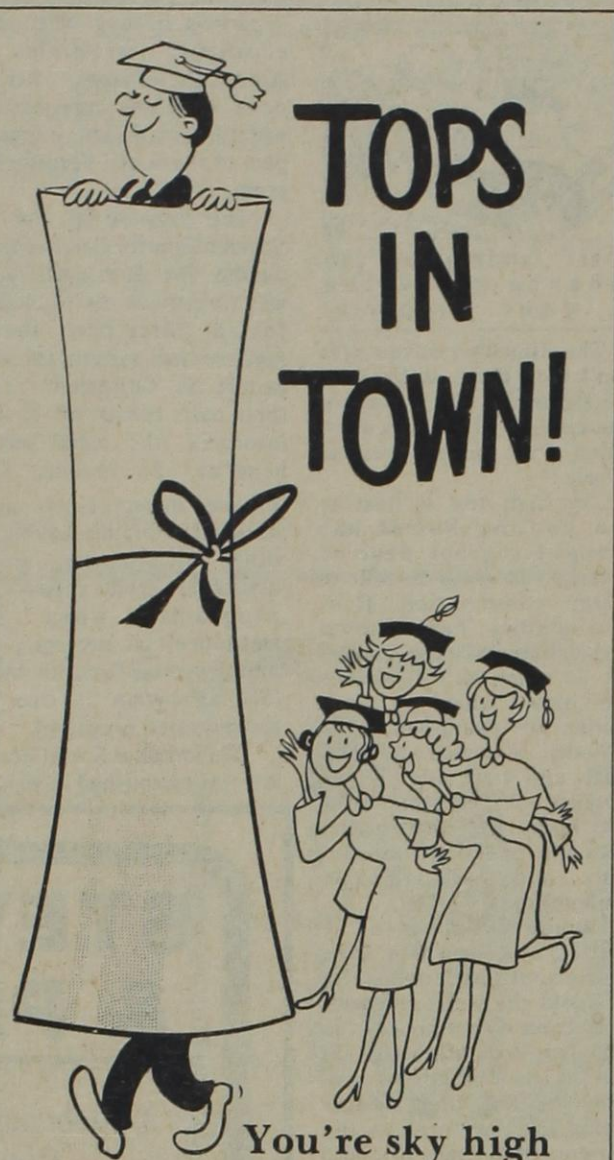

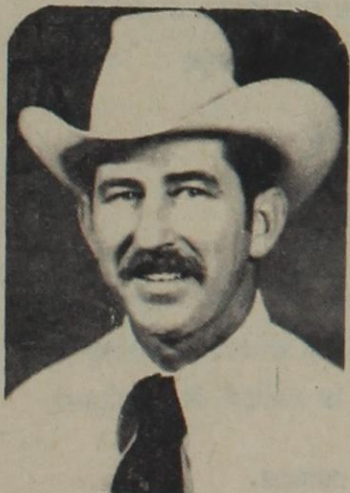

# FROM OUR CHURCHES

## Church of Christ

### WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES?

QUESTION: When was the Church of Christ established and the kingdom of God set upon this earth?

ANSWER: The prophet Daniel predicted the world domination of the Babylonians, Medo-Persian, and Grecian empires (Daniel 2:36-43; 8:1-21). These would in turn be followed by a fourth great kingdom, the Roman empire, and during the days of the kings of that kingdom, God would, "set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed" (Daniel 2:44-45). Isaiah prophesied concerning the coming of this great kingdom that "out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of Jehovah from Jerusalem" (Isa.2:3).

When John the Baptist came to prepare the way for Jesus he said, "Repent ye, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" & Mt.3:2). Jesus himself preached "Repent ye for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Mt.4:17); and "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at

hand: repent ye, and believe in the gospel" (Mk 1:15).

Jesus promised his disciples they would see the kingdom when he said, "verily, I say unto you, There are some here of them that stand by, who shall in no wise taste of death, till they see the kingdom of God come with power" (Mk.9:1). Jesus also promised, "...I will build my church and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it" (Mt. 16:18). The "keys" of this kingdom were entrusted to Peter and the other apostles (Mt.16:19;18:18).

After his death, burial, and resurrection, the church had not yet been established, neither had the kingdom come with power. Jesus then said to the apostles, "Behold, I send forth the promise of my father upon you: but tarry ye in the city, until ye be clothed with power from on high" (Lk.24:49; cf. Acts1:4-5). He promised them, "ye shall receive power, when the Holy spirit is come upon you" (Acts1:8).

The kingdom of God came with power in Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost after Jesus returned to heaven (Acts 2:1-47). On that very day 3000

souls believed and obeyed the gospel of Christ, receiving the forgiveness of their sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:37-41). From that time forth the Lord has added to his church all those who are saved from sin (Acts 2:47).

Following the day of Pentecost, the Church of Christ, the kingdom of God, is spoken of as being a present reality. God has "delivered us out of the power of darkness, and translated us into the kingdom of the Son of his love" (Col. 1:13). Along with the Christians of the first century (Rev. 1:6, 9; 5:10), we are already citizens of "a kingdom that cannot be shaken" (Heb.12:28). As members of the Lord's church we now look forward to the blessings we shall enjoy in the heavenly realm of this eternal kingdom (Mt.25:34; 2 Tim. 4:18).

## Pecan Pest Situation Stable

COLLEGE STATION--This may or may not be the lull before the storm, but the pecan pest situation is currently rather stable.

According to John Cooper, pest management agent for pecans with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, both pecan insect and disease problems are few over the state at the present time.

Low humidity has kept scab disease in tow so far this spring in most areas of Texas. And from an insect standpoint, there have been only minor infestations of spittle bugs, pecan cigar casebearers and yellow aphids in some locations, notes Cooper.

What might be the "storm" on the horizon is the pecan nut casebearer. This costly insect pest makes its appearance about this time of the year in southern sections of Texas then moves northward and westward.

Cooper urges growers to be on the alert for pecan nut casebearers by closely checking clusters of nutlets for tiny eggs. These eggs will hatch in three to five days, and the time to start an insecticide application is the third day after the first egg hatches. This will kill casebearer larvae (worms) before they enter the nutlets. Since the worms may hatch over a week-long period or more, a second spraying may be necessary.

Insecticides recommended for casebearer control include Guthion, Sevin, malathion, Zolone and Torak.

To keep pecan trees in tip-top shape and growing vigorously, producers should have applied two zinc sprays by now, adds Cooper.

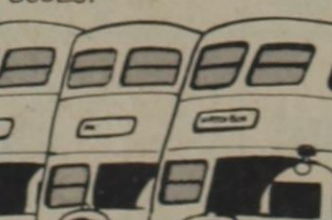

Only peace and happiness.

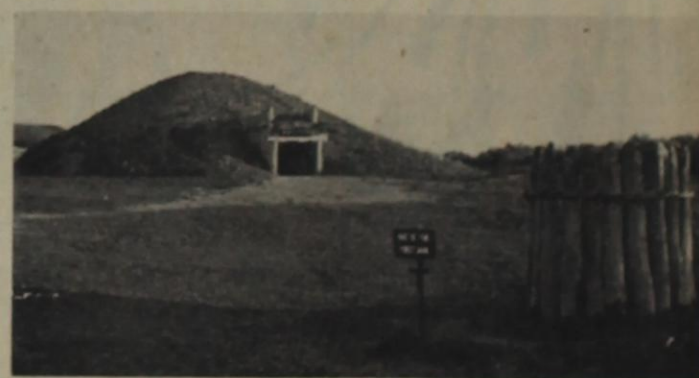
Happiness in all you do;
