

## Kittens Win Over Tolar 22-12

The Rising Star Kittens and the Tolar Rattlers. Kick off time 6:45 with Tolar kicking. No. 62 Calvin Woody traps short kick. No. 36 Jerry Harris rips out 8 yards and No. 32 David Cooper powers thru for 4 or 5 more then on the third down of the Ball game No. 34 Kevin Rims the Kitten Quarter Back flew thru the slot and weaved his way into the open field from the 41 yd. line to a Kitten T.D. The Rattlers stopped the extra Point Drive cold. Kittens kick off and the Rattlers bring the ball back to the 50 yd. line. No. 60 David Watson and No. 32 David Cooper sack the Rattler Q.B. The Rattlers fumble, No. 62 Calvin Woody recovers on the 53 yd. line. The next play gained 3 yds and drew a 5 yd. penalty then the Rattlers seemed to have the Kittens stopped then once again Kevin Rimer swung around the right flat with some fine blocking and raced for another T.D. except the play was called back and the Kittens drew a 15 penalty. Then Kevin Rimer fumbled around with the ball, recovered his own fumble and almost reached the line of scrimmage. The Rattlers took over on the 30 yd. line. No. 22 of Tolar made a fine run around the right end. The Kittens drew a 15 yd. penalty and this put the Rattlers deep into Kitten territory. The Rattlers fumble and the Kittens recover and draw a 5 yd. penalty. The Rattlers just about shut down the Kittens drive and the Kittens kick on 4th down to the 43 yd. line and Kevin Rimer stopped the runner at the 48 yd. line in Kitten territory. The Rattler broke out with a good run and it was brought back and they drew a 5 yd. penalty. The first quarter ended and the Rattlers kick on 4th down. and the Kittens find the Rattlers forward wall

rough and they kick on the 4th down. The kick was blocked by the Rattlers and picked up and the Rattlers took their first T.D. The score at this point is 6-6.

Tolar kicked off and Kevin Rimer returned the Ball to the 28 yd. line, and drew a 15 yd. penalty for holding. The rest of the first Half was played out in rough fashion and No. 34 Kevin Rimer took a hit that put him out of the game for a few downs.

The first half was over. The Kittens kick off and a couple of good plays later by the Rattlers, they fumbled again and the Kittens took over in the 42 yd. line in Rising Star territory. David Cooper found hard going, on the left side as the Rattlers were getting tough. Then from out among those Wildcat Kittens came No. 34 Kevin Rimer thru the slot and out into the secondary for another T.D. No. 36 Jerry Harris run in the 2 points. Once again this showed good team work.

Kittens kick off and the Rattlers begin to move, David Cooper sacked the Quarterback for a good loss and one Tolar player was later down on the field but shortly walked off the field. Tolar drew a 5 yd. penalty and No. 40 Brent Holden takes runner out sling shot-style. Kittens take over ball on 29 yd. line. Substitutes on the defense squad are sent in and gives the hard nose lineman a rest. The Kittens kick on 4th down and one of the Rattlers touched the ball and No. 62 Calvin Woody covered the ball. The Kittens start moving again, Kevin Rimer came up with a twisted ankle and had to have help to leave the field. No. 77 Rickey Bernal traps a runner behind the line, a good solid tackle. 4th quarter finds the Kittens fumbling and recovering same, drawing 5 yd. penalty and a drive from the 40 yd. line all the way with Jerry Harris powering in for 6 points. The 2 points were

tacked up and the Kittens kick off and draw a 15 yd. penalty.

Coach Wood now sent in the other Kitten team. No. 66 Lennard Self stopped a sure T.D. in fine style and No. 22 from Tolar found that running against this Kitten team a total surprise as they came to play. Tolar put a T.D. on the score board by breaking through their right side. Tolar kicks off and the ball is brought back to the 38 yd. line. Jerry Harris run one more play out to the 42 yd. line. No. 12 Derryl Watson took off on a good run but had it called back and 5 yd. penalty on the Kittens.

The Kittens kicked on 4th down to the Rattlers 38 yd. line. Tolar fumbled and the Kittens recovered and begin to move.

Game was over with final score of Kittens-22 and Rattlers-12.

The Kittens squads practiced long and hard for this game and all the boys and their coaches did themselves proud. This game bring win No. 5 home to the Kittens squad. Some mother furnished some fine groceries and chips with tea for the team after the game and yours truly can vouch for it being real good. The Junior High Pep Squad, cheerleaders, and twirlers sure did have winning on their mind, and let the boys know about it. They really had a fine show at half time.

This game had a total of 80 yards in penalty's on the Kittens. A total of 15 yds. on the Tolar Rattler's. The Texas style has a different sequence of movement of the bow-quick, short complicated strokes, with fast fingering. This music is beginning to be recognized and win contests all over the country.

Roy adds that he would like to cut a new record about every two years, featuring more of this Texas fiddling. Those who know him believe that he will do just that, working patiently to get the effect he desires. For there is a mystery about the tone of a violin. It seems to come from the spirit and personality as well as the hand. And the dynamite cap which destroyed Roy Thackerson's fingers was not able to take that inner self away from him.

## 'Fingerless Fiddler' Roy Thackerson

A full moon is rising over the annual Folk Life Festival, at Cisco Junior College.

The crowd in the tin-roofed Agricultural Building is surging around colorful booths. Then clusters of people move forward, as if drawn by a magnet, toward a vacant circle arranged for musicians.

It is time, they murmur, for Roy Thackerson--the "Fingerless Fiddler" from Ranger.

The hum breaks in applause when Thackerson, as tanned and fit as a local rancher, swings through the back door-carrying his violin and its incredible wooden brace and strap.

He is flanked by his guitarists, Raymond Hart and brother Bert Thackerson.

They pull out their Martin and Gibson guitars, while

Roy adjusts a webbed strap around his middle and puts the violin on its brace. Soon the musicians burst into an exuberant tune, and it is easy to see why Thackerson is called a "Crowd pleaser."

In some mysterious way the people are identifying with this fiddle player.

His old Hopf violin, with its fine acoustics, is sending a tone around the mass of people and up against the tin roof. The local people take the sweet, clear sound for granted, as it runs through several ranges of emotion. But strangers notice with amazement that Roy is bringing his left hand over the side of the violin fingerboard, as if he were playing a Dobro guitar. He must do this to produce a sound, for he has no fingers on this hand--only two stubs and the stub of a thumb.

And, as far as anyone

knows, he is the only person in the United States who can play the violin in this manner. But Roy Thackerson has had a lot of compensations since that day in 1944, when he almost blew away his life with his fingers. "I was just six years old," he recalls, "and we were living in Cisco. There were eight children in the family, and my Dad--a blacksmith--was away in the Navy. We never knew where that dynamite cap came from, but I picked it up and stuck a match to it. I didn't know anything else for two weeks."

Roy became the center of attention for Doctors, Nurses, and hospitals, as they fought to save him and patch him up. His major loss was one eye and the fingers, but he soon began to make up for these with a kind of scrappiness and bravado. All his family played musical instruments, with his father on the fiddle, and he didn't aim to be left out. He found he could play a Dobro by pressing down on top of the strings. Then he switched to a regular Stella guitar, and finally to an electric Gibson. He played with bands in the area, and cut a record with "Charlie Brown and the Cisco Kids." During this time he finished High School and a year at Cisco Junior College.

In 1963 he began work for Southern Television Cable Corp. of Ranger, and this has been a happy arrangement. Roy finds his work as Chief Technician interesting, and it leaves him time for his music. "A professional musician has to travel all the time in order to make it," he explains. "That's no way to bring up children."

His work has provided a comfortable family home in Ranger for he and his wife, Barbara, daughter Christy and sons Jeff and Albert. The oldest son, Rex, married recently. The Thackersons take part in the First Christian Church and community affairs.

Attractive, dark-haired Barbara is an enthusiastic fan, and often travels with Roy to far-away fiddling contests. Her father, E. E. Ford, arranged for Roy to make his first trip to Nashville. Roy was twenty eight years old before he began to experiment with fiddle playing. Most people would have decided his case was hopeless, but that didn't take into account his strange fascination for the instrument.

"The fiddle is an instrument of feeling," Roy said.

Before long Raymond Hart was playing with him and encouraging him to keep on trying.

"I was still thinking in chords," Roy explains. "That's the only way I could tackle the fingerboard. I couldn't read notes, so I had to first learn a tune, then memorize it, before I could

5. The main lesson is the love of Christ for the Church and the love of the Church for Christ.

**STUDYING THE BIBLE**  
I had an aunt one time. She lived alone in the woods on a farm. She was 82 she refused to leave her home so someone had to go live with her. She was a religious person in her own way. She read the Bible and often misunderstood what she read. Once, for example, she put salt around her sick pear tree because the Bible had said that Elisha used salt to cure some water (II Kings 2:19-21). Her pear tree died. On another occasion she refused to obey Paul's command to give thanks in everything (Ephesians 5:20) by not allowing a prayer to be said before our meals. Why? Because she had read Paul's instructions in I Corinthians 10:27 about eating what is set before you "asking no questions." She thought it meant don't even ask a blessing on the food.

Many today are like her in a way. They open their Bibles to read with no reasonable system of study. One cannot understand a writing, why that letter is written, to whom it was written, when and for what purpose. Instructions given to a Christian in the Bible are quite different than those given to a person who is not a Christian. Always study your Bible; but study it in a logical way. God told Noah to build an ark; he didn't tell me too. God told Judas to go to what he was to do quickly. Judas went out and hanged himself. Jesus says "go and do thou likewise." But he said that to the people who heard him tell about the good Samaritan, not to get us to be like Judas.

Luther contributed much to the beginning of the Protestant Church; however he made many mistakes and perhaps his greatest was in believing the equality of all men before God applied in spiritual but not in secular matters. In pursuing this belief he made aliens out of the poor and allies out of the wealthy, but the quest for religious freedom could not be stamped out. History is filled with accounts of the lives of those who have carried on the quest for religious freedom. In Oxford, England, the spot can still be seen where in 1555, at the behest of Mary Tudor, the Queen, two Protestant bishops paid with their lives for their loyalty to the ideals of religious freedom. As these two men stood alone in the public square, each chained to a stake, an executioner brought a lighted faggot and threw it down at Bishop Ridley's feet where the wood was piled around him. Bishop Latimer turned to his comrade in martyrdom and said, "Be of good cheer, Brother Ridley. We shall this day light such a candle, by God's grace, in England as I trust shall never be put out." The light that was kindled that day has grown from a candle to a mighty beacon of truth. It is

now in our hands; what will you do with it? May God bless you today and all the days of your life is my prayer.
