

At a recent meeting of the Heritage Cemetery Officers a general financial review was given by Mrs. Glen Henry, treasurer. The report revealed that the cemetery operated with expenses to be greater than the income from grave opening permits and donations. The mowing of plots, weed eating of curbs, and grave fillings came to \$4,746.87; donations \$4,625.14.

Joe Flores has been the caretaker for the past year and has done a good job, despite the problems of rain and even some flooding. Each mowing is contracted for \$500. This does not inlude filling of sunken

Now seems an appropriate time to recommence my Capitol Update column, not simply because I think you want to read one more political writer's column, but because so many strange and quasi-wonderful things are now happening in Austin that your probably ought to get as many viewpoints as possible. Let me start by telling you a little about the unhappy state of affairs in our prison system.

If you break it down to a "good news, bad news" scenario, the bad news is that our prisons are staying closed about as many days per month as they are staying open. They are literally packed to the bursting point and on the 15th of this month we have to, as a state, show the Honorable William Wayne Justice good cause why we should not be assessed \$855,000 per day in fines for failure to comply with

this mandate. As late as last week over 500 inmates were released from TDC simply because there was no room to put them. In one example out in an adjacent county, an inmate who was given a 6 year prison term by a jury, actually served less than 6 months in TDC! That is the bad news. The

good news is that if you ever seriously considered committing a felony crime, now would be a real good time to As with many problems of

the state, there is nothing wrong with TDC that money wouldn't cure. The problem seems to be that the powers that be in Austin are simply not prepared to spend the money to adequately fund our prison system.

The prison problems did not just materialize two weeks ago, two months ago, or even two years ago. The problem with TDC is a problem that knowledgeable observers have watched build and grow for at least the last ten years. One of the first crises that I heard about when I first came to Austin as your shiny, new, take-on-the-world State





County Commissioners Meeting

"We need to bring this jail up to where it will pass inspection no matter what we 5th grader Mary Weise, sixth place in oral reading. have to do later," Billy Bacon, commissioner of Pct. 4, said.

History Volunteers Needed Judge Bailey said this take 20-ft. candlepower lights where the structure now has 12 candlepower, a requirement that was not in effect when the \$1 million building was constructed seven years ago.

The Judge also said that the county had been granted a 30-day extension on the State Jail Standards Commission's order that Eastland County Commissioners bring them a longrange plan for larger jails. This latest extension will ex-

pire on May 31. A wide range of topics occupied the Commissioners during the rest of the morning and afternoon meetings. A group of citizens from the Eastland Memorial Library staff and Friends of the Library group requested that the County increase funding for the library from \$300 per year to \$200 per month or

\$2400 per year.

Larry Vernon spoke for the group, telling of the expansion of the Library services and its programs. Eastland Memorial Library is now a member of the Big Country Library System, Vernon explained. He told how Helen Osburn, librarian, a Green Thumb Worker and a staff of 15 volunteer workers keeps the facility open 31 hours per week. He told of the work of

Hazel Taylor of the Thursday Afternoon Club, which operates the Library. Judge Bailey states that

the Court would try to work something out on the new budget, but indicated that he

felt each Precinct should have an equal share of funds allotted for Libraries, fire

protection and indigent care. In the past this has come from Revenue Sharing - now those funds have been phased out.

Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, said: "I belong to your (Library) organization - I'll try to help you."

Other Commissioners also indicated some support.

In other business, the Commissioners gave unanimous approval of the appointment of Dr. Charles Barnes of Rising Star to fill a vacancy in the Child Welfare Board caused by the resignation of Danny Hughes.

Also approved were all necessary expenditures to activate the Eastland County Court, which is expected to be set up as soon as the bill is signed by the Governor. The measure which recently passed the House and Senate, will give concurrent jurisdiction to county and district courts.

Another item on the agenda was a request that the Commissioners close a road in Pct. 4. This is a one-half section of the old Bankhead Highway just out of the Cisco City Limits N.W. of town. Jamie Fry, who spoke for the closing of the road, said that this area had become almost a public nuisance - it was a dump ground on the north edge of Cisco City Cemetery. People also go through there to spotlight and shoot and drink beer.

Norman C. Gilbert spoke against the closing of the road, stating that although he agreed with the conditions described, the road closing and the extra gate it would cause would make it more difficult for him to get

to the hospital quickly when he became ill. "Sometimes fifteen minutes can mean the difference between life and death for me," he said.

After listening to the comments from both speakers Billy Bacon said that he thought the road needed closing, and made a motion to this effect. Richard Robinson seconded the motion. In the vote which followed Norman Christian, Pct. 2, and L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, abstained from approval, which left the vote a tite.

Judge Bailey broke the tie by voting to close the road. He suggested that some negotiation be made on a cattle guard for Mr. Gilbert, but that this lay outside the relam of the county jurisdic-

Ronnie Ledbetter of Ledbetter Insurance in Cisco discussed the matter of insurance porposals. He said that he was concerned "that we want to hand some business to someone in Austin", meaning the Texas Association of Counties.

Judge Bailey replied that Has the Answer it was his feeling that "we ought to allow the Texas Association of Counties to write any insurance they could." He told how the Association had given \$4800 on rebate in premiums to the county.

Ledbetter replied that his company would have no trouble competing. "Make those people bid on it," he said. "Eastland County has been able to stay in the voluntary market here. The Association is made up of counties who cannot get insurance."

The Court decided to get a hard and fast proposition before making a decision on the matter.

During the meeting Norman Christian reported that he just had one bid on the sale of a Pct. 2 Motor Grader. This was from CDL Construction Co. of Dublin, Texas for \$3500. This sale was approved by the Court. Also approved was a lease-
