The National Peanut Growers Group joined other industry groups and farm organizations in presenting recommendations for peanut program modifications to a special USDA Peanut Task Force in Washington on February 22


Appearing for National Farmers Union and Oklahoma Farmers Union were Jack Hall of Virginia and Jerry Gray, Carroll Smith, Vincent Coffey and Jim Jarrell- The Farmers Union recommended: (1) No open and production, (2) Competitive bid sales of CCC peanuts, (3) Appropriate acrage adjustments to deal with either long or short stocks, and (4) Support at from 75 to 90 percent of parity

The National Peanut Growers Group recommended that the present basic program be retained but the amendeents be added giving the Secretary of Agriculture authority to reduce farm acrage allotments temporarily not to exceed 5 percent per year. A further provision would require that allotment acrage cannot be reduced below the point required to result in 115 percent of domenstic and export needs anticipated to be marketed at not less than the loan leve. The NPGG proposal calls for a support level in 1978 of 75 percent of net parity to be adjusted thereafter by the index of prices paid. The plan would also include a provision in the law making mandatory the opportunity for growers to transfer allotments within county by sale or lease and requiring the participation of area growers associations in carrying out the price support program.

NPGG commended USDA for permitting competitive bid sales on 1976 crop CCC peanut stocks for domestic crushing but urged that the bid sale method be extended also to peanuts destined for export.

Robert Frederickm Master of The National Grange spoke in favor of retaining the present basic program with reduced acrage and some reduction in the level of support price.

At the conclusion of the Hearing, Chairman P.R. Smith said that prog ram costs must be reduced. With the best USDA program administration possible, he said, the Department cannot reduce costs sufficiently without some legislative adjustments in the program. He urged the various industry groups to consider again a reduced program with costs that will be acceptable to industry, consumers, tax payers and the Congress.

By Mrs. A.C. Halsell We enjoy works of art; sculptures, architecture, paintings, books, and music productions, sometimes without giving thought to the patience and discipline or the artists, in producing them. In many instances, the work becomes an obsession with the

For any of us who have not known th story of Sir Nikolaus Pevsner and his forty- six volumes of "The Buildings in England", we may learn that he used "half of my time and life over the last twenty- five years" (quote) to produce this valuable storehouse of knowledge.

Within those twenty- five years he traveled over all England; eighty thousand miles in all, in car and on foot, to assess the great buildings of England, before he would include them in this half- million word guide. His wife was his driver and his helper until her death fourteen years ago. This library of forty- five volumes is an indispensible source for many artists and architects.

Pevsner was a dauntless scholar, a constant source of lively and original ideas on the arts. He was an exile from Germany in 1933. He purchased a house, Victorian style, on Hampstead, where he brought his wife and three children years later. There he lives,

studies and writes, to this day. Once he and his wife took to the road on his research travels, nothing could stop him, not even for a visit with friends. They stayed at tiny country hotels and pubs, rose at 7 a.m., ate breakfast, made sandwiches and were on their way by 8:30. They crisscrossed the country- side from parish church, to local grand residences, to country library buildings. By 5:30 p.m. they stopped for the night. Then he wrote up what they had seen during the day. Often he wrote well into the night.

------After his wife's death, he continued his travels with the help of post graduates, to drive and to help in his surveys. Thirty- fi ve of the forty- six volumes, of his great work, were written by Pevsner himself. He invited architectural historians to write up some of his surveys to speed up the enterprise.

Pevsner's one ambition left is to encourage some scholar to do for the buildings in United States, what!. buildings of England This is a challenge to some one who wishes to write but simply says, "I don't know what to write

Paul discussed God's back- up system for man's injustice against man. Civil government, says Paul, "...bears not the sword in

vain.." (Romans 13:4)." In longer article, entitled Crime and Punishment, Bert Mercer observes:

"Criminologists have long and recurrently noted that the greatest deterrent to crime is swift capture and conviction: "Because the sentence against an evil deed is not executed quickly, therefore the hearts of the sons of men among them are given fully to do evil." (Ecclesiastes 8:11). Solomon's words read like a prophetic indict ment of our crimeridden nation today.

Our liberal socialogists have made two mistakes: they have supposed that imprisonment and capital punishment are either for the purpose of punishment rehabilitation. But laws and jails will not do what individual and families have not done before them.

No, our jails should be for people who can not govern themselves and to eliminate people who have a habit of eliminating others. Families, churches, businesses and life can not continue unless there is order. Laws are for the purpose of controlling the most disruptive in any social group (1 Timothy 1:9)

Also, the "powers that be" were never meant merely to punich the enemies of those on control. 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
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


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
