The Gulf Prairies remained low again this year. Three of the last four years the count has been 5, down from 12 in 1988. The statewide season runs from Oct. 31-Feb. 28. The daily bag limit is 15 and the possession limit is 45. The lawful possession limit for quail is the maximum number-45that may be in one person's possession after the third day of hunting. On the first day of any open season the possession limit is the same as the daily bag limit. Legal shooting hours for all nonmigratory game birds are one-half hour before sunrise to one-halfhour after sunset.

The Brady **Bill situation epitomizes** the Washington gridlock which is frustrating and infuriating voters this year. It's time to separate the Brady Bill from the anti-crime bill and send it to President Bush.



**The THEAX automobile** went the entire 3,200 mile distance on 100% Ethyl needed!! We could grow vehicles: the gasoline our own alcohol, Farmers in the corn and wheat belt would have a market for grain and reduce or eliminate the need for taxpayer farm subsidies. It would also eliminate some of the need for imported oil. The Theax will run again in Ener-Run III (1994) on home grown alcohol. It averaged 14.8 miles per gallon and that was with a full race engine which was not designed with economy in mind. This may in fact be the first time a 100% alcohol automobile has been driven across the United States. The Ener-Run also had

powered four wheel drive full size 1988 Chevrolet pickup and the diesel powered CJ5 jeep. Without doing any internal engine modifications and using nothing more than add-on items, these two vehicles were outstanding. The Chevy pickup averaged 18.3 miles per gallon or 6.4 cents per mile operating cost, but that is a little bit off in that as the Run progressed, adjustments raised the average to about 22 miles per gallon. This was the vehicle that started at 13 miles per gallon. The guys from Eagle Energy were disappointed at the results because they intended to double the milage. They said they would be back in 1994 to do exactly that.


The CJ5 jeep was the overall winner of ENER-RUN II. It averaged an incredible 27.9 miles per gallon or an operational cost of only 4.4 cents per mile. If you figure the aerodynamics of the jeep body, this is incredible.

This vehicle with its fuel boosting and electronic modifications is available to developing nations for use as a very efficient patrol vehicle.

The Vanion was powered by liquid Propane Gas(LPG) and also turned in a very credible job. This vehicle did 22.1 miles per gallon for an operating cost of 7.3 cents per mile. More importantly, this vehicle drove from Arkansas to Washington, D.C., did the run and then drove back to Arkansas from California for a total 6500 mile trip and found all the fuel it needed on the road. We have a hard time understanding why LPG is not used by more of us in our automobiles.

The last two vehicles did not complete the Run. The **Compressed Natural Gas** vehicle Centaur had an oil; feed problem that caused a complete engine failure very early in the Run. The oil feed problem did not have anything to do with the CNG operating system and we feel that the system is a viable

one. We still have some concerns about the high





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

Make fire safety a "family business" by involving the entire family in a fire safety inspection. Here's a comprehensive checklist to use as a guide

#### FIRE HAZARDS:

Check for fire hazards in your home. Correct any problems NOW.

#### Kitchen

- Matches stored out of reach of children
- No overloaded outlets or extension cords
- No curtains or towel racks close to the range
- Flammable liquids (cleaning fluids, contact adhesives, etc.) or aerosols stored away from the range or other heat source (Remember, even a pilot light can set vapors on fire.)
- No attractive or frequently used items stored above the range where someone could get burned reaching for them (especially small children in search of cookies or other goodies)
- No worn or frayed appliance or extension cords.

#### Living Room, Family Room, Den, Bedrooms

- Matches and lighters stored out of reach of children
- Use only large ashtrays (small ashtrays are too dangerous)
- Empty ashtrays frequently (when all signs of heat and burning are gone)
- Fireplace kept screened and cleaned regularly.
- Replace worn or frayed extension cords or other electrical cords
- No extension cords run under rugs or carpets or looped over nails or other sharp objects that could

  - No gasoline stored in the house or basement (It should be stored away from the house in an outbuilding and only in safety cans that have flame arresters and pressure-relief valves.)

#### **DANGEROUS ACTIONS:**


