PEANUTS-DRASTIC CHANGE

NEWS

The measurement rules for peanuts have been drastically changed for the 1981 crop year. Regulations now provide that each farm will certify to its planted acreage of peanuts-THEN, if the measured acreage differs from the certified acreage by more than 5%, the farm is ineligible for quota price support.

AS AN EXAMPLE

Farm A67 has a peanut allotment of 100.0 acres and the farm operator certifies to 85.0 acres of peanuts. On a random spot check, the farm measures 80.0 acres. Since the certified acreage varies from the measured acreage by more than 5%, the farm is not eligible for quota price support. If the farm had measured 90.0 acres, the farm would not be

eligible for quota price support even though the farm had underplanted the 100.0 acre allotment. GRAIN SORGHUM-COTTON It is also important

that the planted acreage of grain sorghum and cotton be reported timely and accurately. Inaccurate reports can result in 8 loss of program benefits such as loans, deficiency payments, disaster payments and price support.

REMEMBER measurements are guaranteed only in the year in which the acreage was determined.

Avocado-'Muy Bueno' for Texas menus

COLLEGE STATION --Avocados, "muy buenos" for Texas menus, serve up fancy or plain on Lone Star State tables - in salads, dips or as accompaniments to meals, according to a Texas food and nutrition specialist.

Avocados have been popular for many centuries and were widely used in Mexico before the Spanish conquistadors arrived in the

16th century, says Mary K. Sweeten. Mayan Indians served them pureed and seasoned with hot red pepper, she

says. Mrs. Sweeten is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. AVOCADOS 'TEXAS STYLE'

Texans like their avocados in salads such as fruit salads with avocado "decked" in a poppyseed dressing.

Another idea focuses simply on avocados sliced in "fingers" and added to fresh crisp salad greens. Avocados also are a

AVOCADO SELECTION, STORAGE

Avocados are not treeripened. Rather they're sent

to market at a stage of maturity which will permit the consumer to select the degree of ripeness he wants.

Then the avocado will ripen in two to seven days if held at room temperature. After it begins to soften, refrigerate until serving time.

Peeled avocados may darken unless you use them immediately. To retard this, add lemon or lime juice, leave the seed in the container with the fruit and store in an air-tight container in the refrigerator. If the avocado should darken in a place or two, cut that area away.


AVOCADO

CHARACTERISTICS

An avocado's center or kernel is about the size of a walnut. The thick, buttery flesh of the fruit spreads like butter and is nutty in taste. This fruit has a slightly

acid flavor. Also, it contains a small amount of protein and up to 20 percent vegetable oil.

One-eighth of an avocado (about four inches in diameter) has about the same number of calories as a teaspoon of butter or margarine - about 45.

Pecan Nut Casebearer Dangerous to Crop

Gordon Woolam The heavy Pecan crop set by area Pecan trees is possibly the best in recent years. Recent rains have helped to increase the size of the nuts. Thus far this season promises to be a good one for Pecan growers.

The first generation Pecan Nut Casebearer infestation was very light locally this year. The first eggs were found in area orchards on May 22nd. The recommended spray date was set for May 25th. But because of the rains spraying was missed by some

loss due to the Pecan Nut Casebearer remained light.

The low level of nut loss was probably due to the weather. Late season cool fronts in early to mid May and rains in late May reduced the Moth activity and prevented a large egg lay.

Two or three days after adult female moths emerge, they deposit from 60 to 150 eggs on the tips of nuts. Larva hatch from eggs in 4 or 5 days and migrate to buds below the nuts to feet. After a day or two they enter

growers. However, nut the nuts, usually at the base. Frequently several or all of the buds are destroyed. Upon reaching maturity. larvae pupate in nuts and emerge as adults approximately 42 to 45 days later. Those Pecan Nut Casebearers which have survived to maturity will be emerging soon (42

days after hatch). These emerging adults will be mating and laying eggs for the second generation. The second generation Pecan Nut Casebearer has historically not been much of a problem in the area. However, they should not be taken lightly. Populations of the first generation may have built up in unmanaged native trees. Local growers should begin inspecting their trees for the second generation Casebearer on about the 4th or 5th of July. This is not a projected spray date but merely an alert to begin watching for the second generation.

Dr. Carl Andserson, marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System, suggests a number of marketing options for cotton producers:

-Establish a selling price by forward contracting or hedging in the futures market and arrange delivery at some future date. -Sell at harvest. -Hold and sell later. -Place cotton under the Commodity Credit Corporation loan pro-

gram and hope the price will go up. "Growers can develop a 'feel' for the cotton market by watching daily and weekly reports on prices and worldwide production and use," says the economist. "Bumper 1980 crops in Russia and China have burdened the market, and U.S. prices have fallen about \$35 per bale since January."

According to Anderson, two developments will bear heavily on the cotton market for the season ahead-low carryover stocks and export demand.

Medicare Medical Insurance Premium Now ⁵11

monthly The premium for the medical insurance part of Medicare increases to \$11 for the 12 month period starting this month (July), Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

In spite of this increase, people should know that they are paying less than a third of the cost of this insurance. More than two-thirds is paid by the U.S. Government from general revenues, not from social security taxes, Hammons said.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, no matter where they are received in the United States, in an office, home, hospital, or elsewhere; for outpatient services; for home health care in a person's home; and for other medical services and supplies not covered by Medicare hospital insurance.

For most covered services, medical insurance pays 80 percent of the approved charges after the patient has incurred \$60 in approved chargesthe annual deductiblefor a year. Because of the way approved charges are figured and because of the rates of inflation in medical care prices, however, approved charges are often less than doctors' or suppliers' actual charges. Medicare is available to nearly

everyone 65 or older, people of any age with permanent kidney failure, and to people who have been getting social security disability checks for 24 months or longer.
