Wheeler reported that the best short-term plan was to build a 12 bed addition to the present jail on the west side of the building. This would take in 2566 Sq. Ft., with an additional 575 Sq. Ft. built for storage on the north side of the Jail. These additions, with renovation inside the present Jail; also site development, equipment and furnishings, professional fees, contingencies and administrative costs would total \$548,110.00.

"How long is that going to be good for?" Asked L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3.

"I wish we could sit like we are until 1990,", said Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, "And then see what we need.'

He had reference to the final pay-off on the current County Jail, which is supposed to take place in 1990. Later Judge Bailey said that the County still owes about \$400,000 on the present building. This building is not obsolete, the Judge said, it is just inadequate.

Time went on and when he enrolled in school the teacher needed to write his name in his Blue Back Speller, asked him for his name. He replied, "I haven't any name, but my brothers and sisters call me Buddy.' The children in their play at school "mustered out" as soldiers at war, and Buddy always played the part of Captain. The teacher replied, "Here's where you get a name." She wrote the name "Captain Buddy Poe" It was the only name he had ever known.

The only schooling he received was in a log schoolhouse with split log seats that had no back rest. and he held his book in his lap. He went to school there three months each summer for several years, and the Blue Back Speller was his only book.

In his early childhood, C.B. Poe had no store-bought clothes, but wore shirt tails that came just below the knees, as was the custom in that day. When he was eleven years old he discarded his shirt tails for his first suit and hat that was woven and made by his mother.

His father gave him eighty acres in Woodland. This he cleared and put into cultivation himself, and built a two room hewned log house and furniture.

On Dec. 20, 1876, when he was twenty-two years old, and Mary Parilee Daugherty, fifteen, were married at her father's home, where a wedding dinner was served to seventy-five guests. They went to their new home by horse back with her riding behind him. In cash money he had seven dollars and fifty cents. Their household furnishings consisted of two beds, two trunks, a wardrobe

They arrived in Eastland County in Dec. 1897 and settled at Long Branch, near his father and three brothers. There were: I.N., Lee and W.J. Poe.

After a few years at Long Branch he moved to Carbon to educate his children. In Carbon he was engaged in the lumber business, and later entering the grocery business.

In 1905 he was elected County Commissioner of Pre. No. 2 and was commissioned by S.W.T. Lanham, Governor of the State of Texas






