Pecan Budding School to Be Held April 25

The third annual Pecan Budding School has been set for April 25th at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco it was announced recently at the County Agents office in Eastland.

The one day school will begin at 9:30 on that date in the conference room of that organization. The morning session will be devoted to demonstrations and lectures on budding, types and kinds of budwood, stock, scion, tying the bud, forcing and the after care of the young buds.

The group attending will go to some nearby native pecan grove after lunch where they will have a chance to practice budding on small pecan trees using the patch bud method.

"We are delighted to have the pecan budding school in Cisco and we cordially invite all interested men and women to attend", Sam Kimmell, Cisco Chamber of Commerce President said.

The school will be taught by J.M. Copper, Eastland County Agricultural Agent who taught similar schools in Eastland in both 1958 and 1959. Several of his pupils have become quite proficient in the art of budding it was said.

Cooper said that out of county people who might be interested would also be welcome and that there would be no charge for participation.

The County Agent is also making arrangements for a supply of dormant budwood of the Burkett, Western Schley and Comanche varieties for those who wish to secure some.

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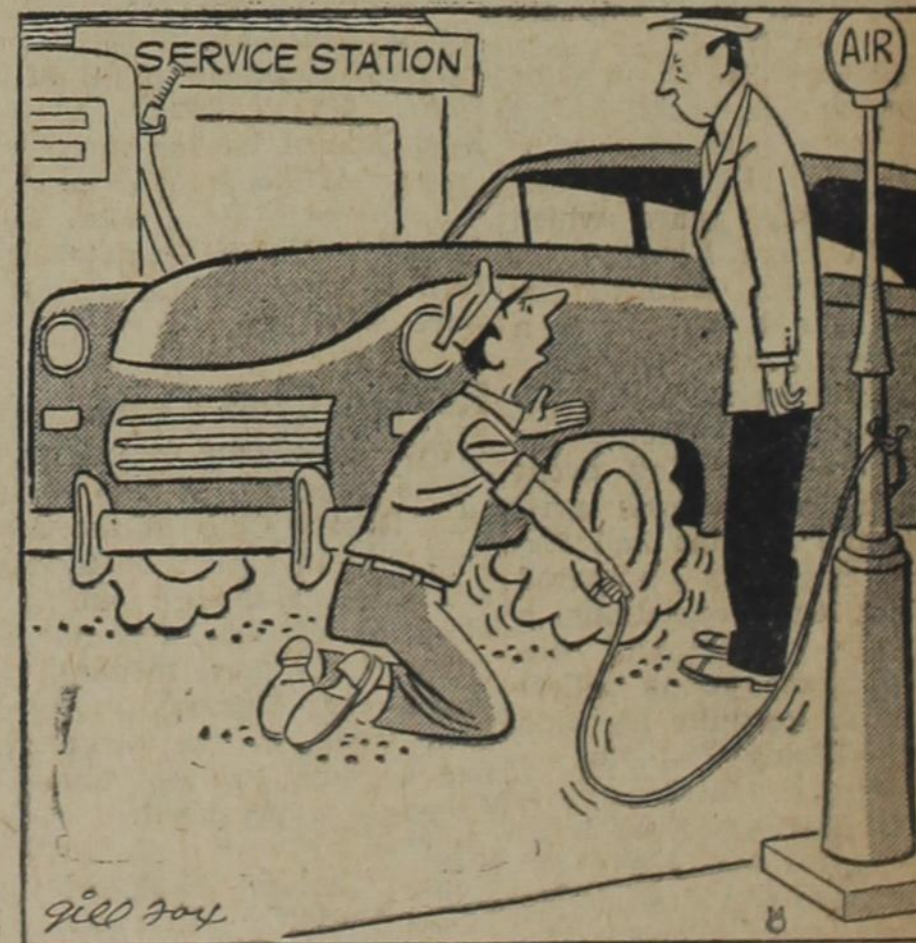
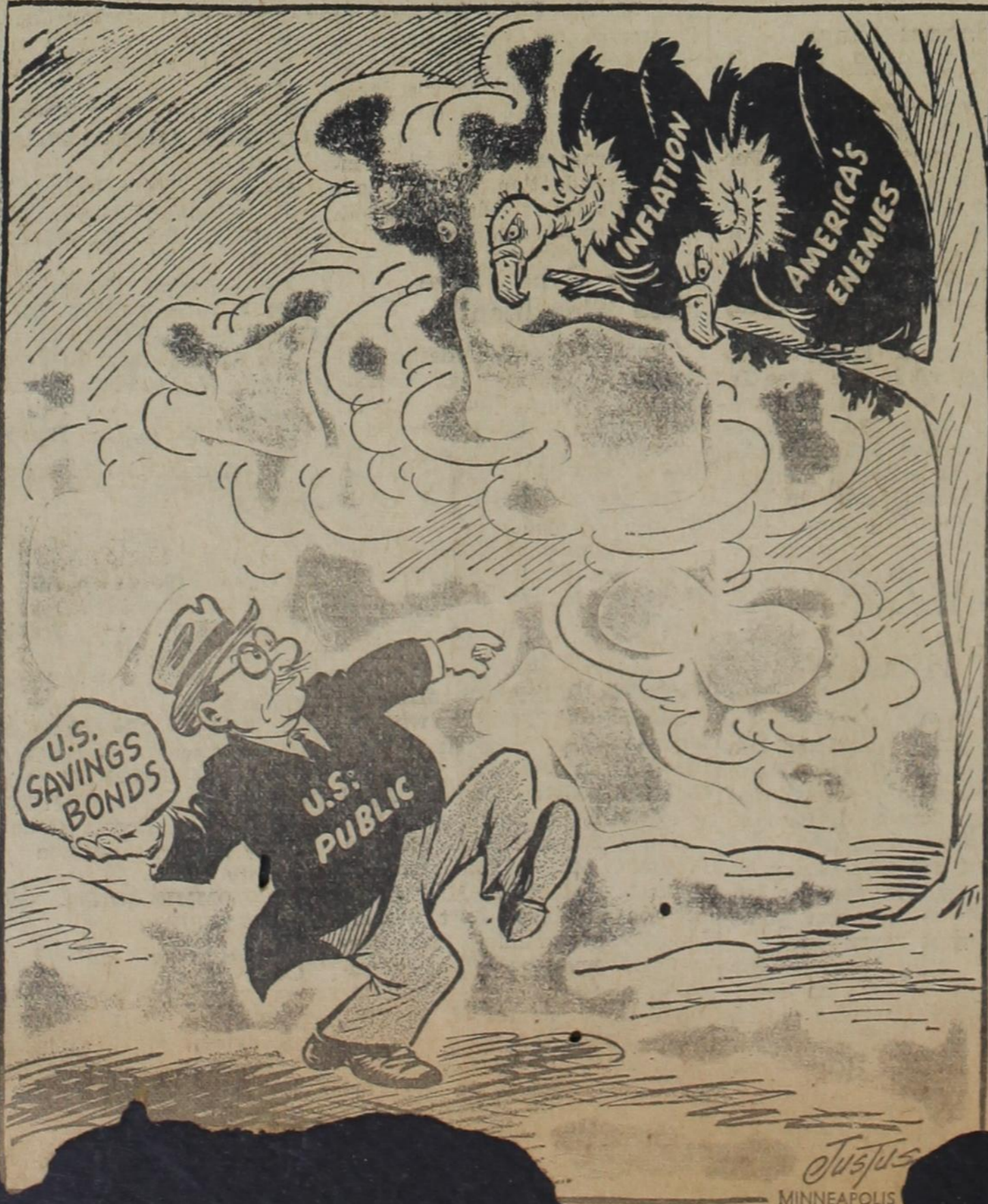
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AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—
SECRETARY OF LABOR Mitchell is practically winning by default his efforts to wreck the Migratory Labor Program. At the same time, he is pressing a demand to bring all farm labor under the Minimum Wage Law, which is now excepted from the Law's provisions.

HE IS winning by default because those of us who oppose his scheme are fearful that, if we bring the issue up for debate, the Congress over the so-called Civil Rights legislation, there are enough votes to completely abolish the arrangement to import Mexican nationals to gather crops and to bring all farm labor under the Fair Labor Standards Act, which is now applicable to industrial workers.

THE FIGHT is between the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Labor. Officials of the Department of Agriculture believe jurisdiction should be in their Department.

CERTAINLY AGRICULTURE itself should have a better understanding of the farmers problems than can the Department of Labor, which is far removed from it.

THE SECRETARY of Labor, by his own decrees, has set up local standards which, in the majority of cases, are practically impossible for the farmer to meet. There are numerous cases to prove the point. There are instances where the farmer and his family have left the farm, but the house and facilities where they had lived fails to come up to the standards required by the Labor Department for Mexican nationals employed to harvest crops.

IT BECOMES apparent that the Labor Department wishes to drastically reduce, if not entirely destroy, the present Program for the importation of braceros from Mexico to augment the domestic farm labor

ed Cisco Junior College and a business college in Austin. He is a Mason, a Legionnaire and a Baptist.

In reviewing some of the major programs of State government, Mr. Brashear said: "I have supported measures for better state employee salaries, realistic benefits for the aged, improved water programs, better education and teacher pay, equitable treatment for veterans and farm groups and other legislation beneficial to my district and in the best interest of the state as a whole. teration of food and drugs.

The Food and Drug Division of the Texas State Department of Health is the responsible agency in Texas for enforcing State food and drug laws. The task has many facets — from checking bread labels to tasting milk.

Hardly any food is not altered in some manner to improve taste, intensify color, keep fresh longer or enrich its food value.

A new pamphlet, published by the Food and Drug Administration of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, entitled "Food Additives" helps to explain some of the complexities of the problem.

Additives are a regular part of modern food merchandising. There are several categories of additives in common use.

Nutrient supplements are the vitamins and minerals added to foods to improve nutritive value, and sometimes to replace those removed in processing. For example, thiamine (vitamin B1), riboflavin (vitamin B2), and niacin (another B vitamin) and iron must be added to bread if the bread is to be called "enriched."

Sugar substitutes or non-nutritive sweeteners are permitted in foods for people who must restrict their intake of ordinary sweets. Saccharin and the calcium and sodium cyclamates (cyclo hexyl sulfamates) are commonly used.

There are many different types of preservatives, each type being best suited to a particular type of product, or more effective against a particular spoilage organism or chemical change.

Smoothness of texture of confectionery, ice cream and other frozen desserts; uniformity of color, flavor and viscosity of chocolate milk; "body" of artificially sweetened beverages—all of these things are controlled through the use of stabilizers and thickeners.

Food and drug authorities must make sure that labels correctly identify the product (including all contents) and test for possible harmful effects on humans. (A weekly feature of Public Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

HIGH STAKES are involved in United States relations with Africa.

SOME SIX or seven years ago this column discussed the emerging change taking place in the great dark continent of Africa, and predicted that in a very few years the world would face problems in this area not dreamed of at the time.

WITHIN LESS than a year ten African nations will have secured their political independence from their former colonial masters. Between now and next October 4, more will move towards complete independence. Twenty new nations on a single continent will become identified in less than a decade.

THE STRIFE now taking place in South Africa, the most highly developed area on the continent, is the result of an awakening of people who have been dormant through the ages.

ASIDE FROM the issue of human rights, what does this mean to American business?

THE AGGREGATE population of these nations is approximate-

ly 230 million people, occupying an area of 30 million square miles. Many are rich in natural resources, and once political stability is achieved, numerous investment opportunities will be afforded business in the more highly developed parts of the world.

WITH THE eyes of the American business turned more and more towards foreign investments, this area will undoubtedly become highly important and of tremendous interest as progress develops.

THE BIG "catch" is when, if ever, social and political stability will be brought about. It is perfectly well to speak in human terms of independence and self-government, but it is another to achieve it by people who are far from qualified to furnish their own leadership.

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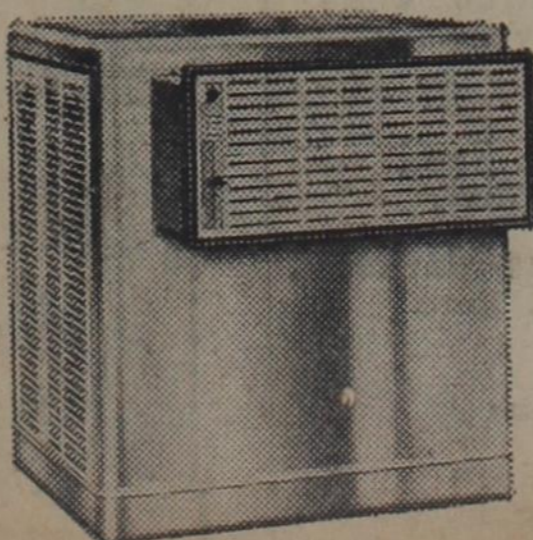
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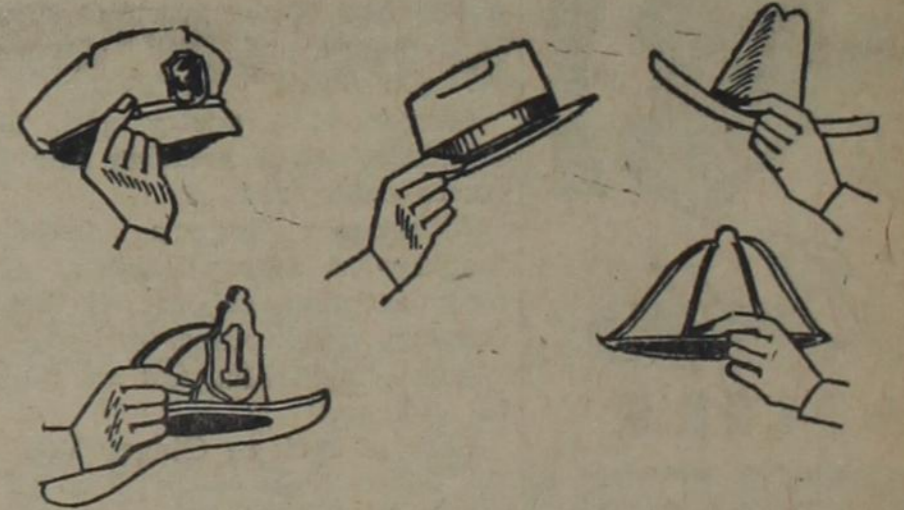
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OUR GIFT TO RSHS

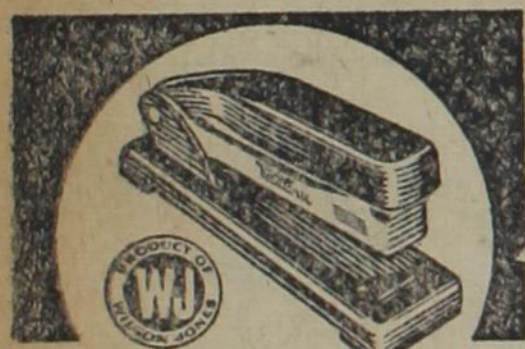

Time Now to Start Adding Fertilizer To Stock Ponds

Now is the time to start adding commercial fertilizer to production and control pond weeds.

Commercial fertilizer should be added at a rate of eight pounds of nitrogen and eight of phosphate, and two pounds of potash or the nearest equivalent available per surface acre. Repeat the application at 7 to 10 day intervals in spring until color of water prevents sight of white object held 18 inches beneath the surface. Make further application only when the white object test shows a need for more fertilizer.

One of the most important factors in fish management is that of providing enough food. In general, people are aware that fish eat smaller fish, crayfish, worms, bugs and other animals large enough to be seen and known, but many people do not know of the thousands of species of plants and animals that are microscopic and slightly larger in size that are just as essential to the daily diet of fish as the larger animals. These small plants and animals constitute a large part of the diet eaten by the young fry of all types of fish and the food eaten by some fish through their lives. These smaller plants and animals are also eaten by larger animal life that fish eat. These smaller plants and animals are called phytoplanktons, animal life.

These are the plants and animals that give the water a green-brown color which is called a bloom. The white object test described above can be used to determine quality of the bloom. The production of fish food is like a chain with its various links, one depending upon the other. The life cycle within a pond runs a definite order from smaller to larger organisms and that each succeeding group is dependent upon the preceding one for the synthesis of its own food supply. The abundance of these organisms is dependent upon the amount of available organic matter in the water. This can be controlled by the use of fertilizers.

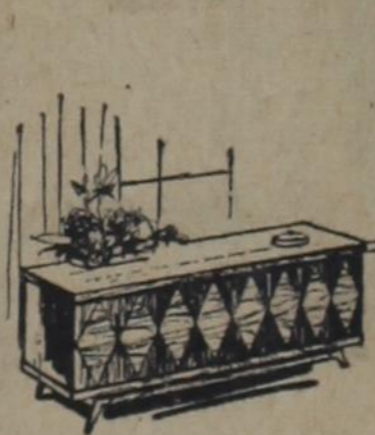

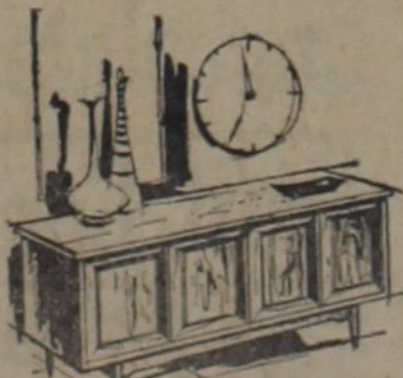

Over 42 Billion In Savings Bonds Are Outstanding

Total E and H Savings Bonds outstanding at the end of February amounted to \$42,613,000,000. This is a huge sum, but it still represents only a slightly larger total than the federal defense budget for the coming year.

There is no direct connection between U. S. Savings Bonds sales and the defense budget because the latter is financed out of current tax receipts. But there is an important connection. If the dollars that people are investing in Savings Bonds were spent in the market place, they would contribute to inflation and thus increase the cost of our defense program.

The Treasury Department currently is stepping up its efforts to sell Savings Bonds. The current of redemptions and the current level of sales indicate that the public has not yet become fully aware of the advantages of buying and holding Savings Bonds at the new 3 1/2 per cent interest rate that became effective last summer.

While much has been made of the greater earning opportunities elsewhere, the fact is that Savings Bonds now pay more than 2 1/2 per cent interest for the first year and a half and 4 per cent thereafter. These rates compare favorably with those earned elsewhere, and, of course, there is nothing speculative about investing in Savings Bonds.

The increase in interest rates to 3 1/2 per cent was the third in the history of the Series E Savings Bond program. The first Series E bonds returned 2.9 per cent when held to their full 10-year maturity. In May, 1952, the rate was increased to 3 per cent by shortening the life of the bond to nine years and eight months. In February 1957, the rate was increased to 3 1/4 per cent by decreasing the life of the bond to eight years and 11 months. And on June 1, 1959, the rate went to 3 3/4 per cent for bonds held to their maturity of seven years and nine months.

At the same time, interest rates of all outstanding Savings Bonds were increased a minimum of 1/2 of one per cent. When put into effect, these new rates marked the first time in the history of the Savings Bond program that outstanding bonds received automatic interest rate increases. The action was taken, of course, to meet the competition offered by higher yields from other securities.
