

Loose Dog Owners May Be Fined

A local city ordinance states that it is unlawful for any person owning or harboring a dog to allow or permit the dog to run, or to be at large, within the city limits.

Any owner permitting a dog to run at large may be cited by the chief of police or animal control officer of the City and, if convicted in municipal court, can be fined up to \$200.00.

A notification to be made by the police chief or animal control officer to the dog's owner that the dog has been seen or reported to be running at large and state states that if the dog is put up, no further legal action will be taken.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Recently my friend requested a recipe that I have enjoyed for years. So, I will include the recipe in today's column, and hope everyone will enjoy. These muffins freeze beautifully and are a real treat for breakfast. A recipe makes 5 dozen mini muffins or about 18-20 large muffins.

ORANGE TEA MUDDINS

1/2 cup Crisco 2 eggs well beaten

2 cups flour

1 cup buttermilk 1 teaspoon soda (mix in buttermilk)

1/2 cup ground raisins 1 cup sugar

1/2 cup orange rind (grate the rind of one orange)

Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs. Alternate flour and buttermilk. Add raisins and orange rind. Bake in small muffin tins. Glaze.

1 cup brown sugar 4 tablespoons orange

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

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

Once neglected, they are no longer neglectible. From fall 1990 to fall 1991 in Texas, the public university enrollment in-

creased from 405,682 students to 407,688, and the public community college enrollment increased from 371,299 or 387,707.

In recent years, Texas community colleges have moved from a supplementary to pivotal educational role in the community for all its citizens. With the rapid enrollment increases, this role is destined to grow and cast an ever brighter light in the lives of thousands more students.



The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

·the value placed on your property ·any exemptions that may apply to you the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal

 the taxable status of your property ·the local governments which should be taxing your property

·any action taken by the appraisal

Informal Review

Contact the Eastland County Appraisal District Staff at 817/629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district reprentative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's

> Deadline for filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.


Special Deadlines

For changes of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.


If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

An end to the 20-yearold lawsuit over crowded and inhumane conditions in Texas prisons "appears to be imminent," Attorney General Dan Morales said last week.

He said he and his staff have reached a settlement. with lawyers representing inmates in the Ruiz suit, which prompted a federal court to supervise the state prisons, limiting their capacities and ordering other reforms.

The settlement, which was presented to Gov. Ann Richards and other state leaders, would stop the early release of violent criminals, Morales said. He said it also would ease the cap on prison capacity and allow the state to house inmates in tents.

Richards said the agreement"appears to be good news."

"It is my hope that this agreement will return our state prisons to state control," Richards said. "We now must get on with our prison building program and making Texas a safe place to live and raise our families."

The settlement would: • Authorize the state to use tents and converted military bases to house prisoners.

· Let the prisons put inmates in 5,300 beds now barred from use.

• Eliminate caps on the capacity of prisons currently under construction or to be constructed in the future.

· Lift all federal Court orders restricting state management of the prison system.

Justice Must Approve

U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler must approve the settlement before it can become final.

As the state's attorney, Morales has the authority to submit the settlement regardless of what other officials think. However, he hopes to get

the support of Richards, key lawmakers and officials of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Morales said the settlement would have been impossible if not for the prison management reforms supported by the governor, passed by the Legislature and enacted by the Texas Board of Criminal Justice.

> **Session Decision** Soon

Meanwhile, Richards said late last week she will decide soon whether to call lawmakers into a special session on public school finance.

Richards earlier said she wanted to call the Legislature into session May 11 to address the Texas Supreme Court ruling that the new school tax system is unconstitutional.

But she said she did not want to call lawmakers to Austin unless a consensus was forming on a plan.

One day after saying she saw no consensus, the governor said, "After talking to some people, I'm feeling more that it is possible." **Utilities Face Penal**ties

About 180 electric and telephone utilities regulated by the Public Utility Commission could face financial penalties for failing to file reports on lobbying costs and other expenditures.

The PUC has warned the companies that they are out of compliance with the annual reporting requirement.

Only Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. and Houston Lighting and Power have kept current with the reporting requirement, the commission said.

Lottery Ticket Sales Texas lottery officials said that lottery players will be able to buy tickets everywhere from banks to tortilla factories when the game begins.

More than 17,000 businesses have sought to sell tickets, and about 14,700 should be licensed before the game begins in late May, said lottery Director Nora Linares.

The top 10 categories of businesses that will be licensed are convenience stores, grocery stores, liquor stores, service stations, general merchandise stores, check cashing and other financial services, miscellaneous retail stores, dining establishments, pharmacies and used-merchandise stores.

Other Highlights The appraised value

of property on Texas school districts' tax rolls rose 2.5 percent in 199 1, to more than \$667 billion, State Comptroller John Sharp reported. He said changes in appraised property values, compared with 1990, differed among Texas' six economic regions. The Gulf Coast region led with a 3.8 percent overall property value increase.

• State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchinson, in an effort to avoid campaign conflicts, is seeking a list of individuals and businesses with interests in the state's lottery. Hutchinson said allegations that she has accepted more than \$3,500 from lotteryrelated interests are "erroneous" and "possibly entrapment." 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

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
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
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The Art Fishers Celebrate 50th Wedding Anniversary
