

Although that proposal was made by Councilman Johnny Lee at emergency the meeting, the motion died for lack of a second. Councilmen Doug Owen and Mark Cooksey were vehemently opposed to that proposal. When the City bor-

rowed money from FHA to finance the new gas, water and sewer lines, FHA in-sisted that the City set up a separate fund for monies that are taken in from the utilities in order to insure repayment of the loan. From that time, Dec. 1980, street department, police department, administrative department and a few departments with much smaller budgets were to have their expenditures paid from monies taken in from

property taxes, city sales tax, franchise taxes and minor services performed by the City.

The largest of the revenues is property taxes, from which no income was realized from 1978 through 1981, September because of a state law which went into effect in 1979 that stated that cities must hire a tax assessor-collector at a salary of about \$14,000 per year to collect those taxes. Property taxes would have been assessed at about \$16,000 that year. Cities were allowed to forego collecting taxes under that law and Rising Star did just that.

With the implementation of the new centralized appraisal system of taxing properties at market value, the City contracted with the Rising Star Independent School District to collect City taxes and in October, 1981, taxes were again a source of revenue for the City. For several years in-

flation has caused City expenses to escalate, with the rise in natural gas rates being the most severe blow. The City took action to lower the gas expenses by replacing the old lines which were losing at least 65% of the gas. The large debt to the gas company was being effectively reduced after the new line were installed. Dynamic Products began charg-

ing an interest rate of 18% annually about two years ago; they later reduced this to 6%.

A recent large and unexpected expense make further repairs

on the water tower. Previous repairs had been made with fiberglass, which was recently found to be dangerous to the health. That necessitated \$28,000 of repairs to the water tower in March, 1982, which was paid from the general fund rather than the utility fund.

The utility fund also experienced a recent large and unexpected expense when the City received a bill for \$24,000 from the transporter of natural gas, Odessa Natural.

Although expenses have gone up annually, the City Council has been reluctant to raise utility rates. Gas, water and sewer rates were raised in 1978 and were not raised again until March 1982, when the gas rate was in-(Continued inside)

creased. One of the primary reason for the hesitation to raise rates is the large number of elderly people in Rising Star who live on fixed incomes and have found it difficult and sometimes impossible to pay their City utilities, even before the increase in March.

Inflation, lack of tax revenue, large unexpected expenses and failure by the City Council to keep abreast of the City's expenses by raising utility rates and taxes have resulted in the City being in the financial position it is in today. Aggravating the financial problems is the delay of the 1982 tax statements being mailed, causing the City to struggle along without those revenues coming in at a time when they are sorely needed.

The tax roll for 1982 is approximately \$44,000, sales taxes will bring in about \$20,000 and franchise taxes and miscellaneous revenue will be about \$16,600, a total of approximately \$80,600. Proposed budgets for departments supported by the general fund total \$94,046, and the largest of these is the proposed budget of the police department of \$53,000, while the street department budgeted 20,600. For the fiscal year ending 6-30-82, \$30,041.66 was spent on the police department (less than the budgeted amount for that year) and \$41,400.31 was spent on fire the policemen and *****

1

the street department (\$9,629.32 more than was budgeted). The increase in the police department is due primarily to an additional policeman being hired by the City Council.

The City Council has pared the street department budget so that only a minimum of maintenance can be carried out the rest of this fiscal year. Mayor Killion feels the police department budget must be cut in a similar manner in order to avoid a deficit in the general fund. Since the utilities fund was set up, money has been transferred from that fund to meet the expenditures of the general fund and the mayor feels this practice must come to a

halt. When word of the emergency City Council meeting began to circulate through town, strong opposition to the proposal to fire the two men on the police department arose. There was also strong opposition to hiring a man who was planning to retire from public service and who may not be physically able to carry out the duties of a police chief. One citizen, Mary Ann Underwood, began calling townspeople, and the mayor and council were also called, to meet the night of October 13, two nights after the emergency meeting, in order that the citizens might voice a protest of any immediate action to

to offer help to the City Council to find a solution to the budget woes

More than 50 persons met at City Hall to hear directly from the mayor and the council what had taken place at the emergency meeting and what the City's problems are. The mayor explained that there was no money in the general fund to meet the police payroll, due October

This is not the first time the City has not had funds to meet its payrolls. This situation has occurred each summer for the past three or four years.

Offers of donations to meet the current payroll of the police department were made and a collection point was established at the Rainbow Cafe. A suggestion of pledges from citizens of the town and from rural citizens to aid the City in meeting the payroll was also made as a temporary measure to give the residents of Rising Star time to formulate suggestions for a more permanent solution to the City's financial troubles.

A committee was set up to collect donations for the payroll. Committee members are Robin Reeves, Lewis Wilkerson, Debbie Green, Mary Ann Underwood, Garry Duggan, Sybil Parker, Jack Shults and David Harris. Councilmen Doug Owen and Mark Cooksey agreed to work with the committee.

VOTE

A town meeting, voted for by the City Council in its regular meeting of October 4, is scheduled for October 25 at 7 p.m. at the school gymnasium.

The City Council met again October 14 for the sole purpose of receiving the audit report for the fiscal vear ended 6-30-82 from the auditor. Mayor Killion, Doug Owen and Johnny Lee were present at that meeting. Other councilmen are Mark Cooksey, Willie Vandivere and Kelsey (Pete) Starks.

those Since meetings, the mayor has reiterated that the police budget must be cut and he would like to see it cut in half. Mayor Killion states very strongly that the City must balance its budget.

Many citizens, notably those who are deeply concerned with the drug trafficking in Rising Star, maintain that the City must find a way to finance a police department that will make a real effort to deal with the drug problem, a problem that was not present 20 years ago when a city marshal and a night watchman could fill the City's police needs.

On October 19 Garry Duggan, a member of the Citizens' Committee Against Crime, presented checks to **Police Chief Curtis** McGlothlin; citizens had donated \$1074 to pay the salaries of Rising Star's police department.

Child Welfare Board Becomes Active In Anti-Drug Drive

The Eastland County Child Welfare Board met in the County Commissioner's Court on Wednesday, October 13, to discuss its involvement with the current Eastland County Anti-drug Drive.

Judy Phaneuf, **Region IV Child Place**ment Supervisor with headquarters in Abilene, spoke to the local board. "In our work," she said, "we have seen an increase in runaways, ages 13 through 17, who admit to the continuous use of illegal drugs. These are county and out-ofcounty residents who are mixing with your children."

Alice Pritchard, Eastland County Child Placement Worker, stated at the meeting that some of the children under her supervision come from families involved in illegal drugs. "It is established," she said, "that the use of these drugs usually results in the evidence of abused and neglected children."

The Eastland County Child Welfare Board functions to work with the regional and state officers to provide comprehensive community-based services for abused and neglected children. The law provides for removing children from harmful environments to healthy environments.

Board chairman Christine Reich stated, "This Board stands

behind all efforts to work against this drug threat in Eastland County, and it is committed to any cooperative effort to better the situation."
