## Commissioners Meet Rising Star ISD Board Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners Monday reported on damage to rural roads and bridges caused by floods during the last two months. Even as they talked to a cold rain was pouring outside the courtroom, adding to difficulties they faced.

Eastland County has been declared a disaster area, and application has been made for funds to make repairs. But all the Commissioners reported no assistance as yet.

Judge Scott Bailey said that "Individual Precinct budgets are going to be stretched" if the County has to pay for all these repairs.

Pct. 1 Commissioner, Richard Robinson said he had carried government officials to view three sites that need repair.

"Two of these are half-way passable," he said. The other place has water running down the center of the road for about a thousand feet," Robinson added.

The other Commissioners also reported trouble spots, Pct. 2 Commissioner Ainsworth reported .27; Pct. 3 Commissioner Owen .19; and Pct. 4 Commissioner Pittman .28.

Pittman said there were a number of places he still couldn't get in to look at. He said he still had roads that were under the water the whole time.

He suggested that people should write to the President and try to get more help.

All the Commissioners said they had some temporary repairs so traffic could get through. But all reported they did not have the money to do the type of rebuilding the roads needed.

Attention turned to difficulties on the installation of the 9-1-1 Emergency Medical System in the County.

A caller's name is supposed to appear on a computer screen in the County Dispatch when 9-1-1 is dialed.

"Nearly every rural address on the computer is wrong," Commissioner Robinson said.

The telephone Company was reported to have put that information into

the computer. County Judge Bailey said that some of the house addresses are correct, but the town was wrong.

Then there were the matters of road numbering and addressing of rural dwellings, which the Commissioners said was incomplete.

To add to the confusion, State Highway numbers have recently been changed in some of the County, causing new addresses to be needed.

Robinson reported that 4,000 cards had recently been mailed from the Commissioners Court, listing new addresses that would eventually become mailing addresses as well as 9-1-1 addresses.

Of this number, Secretary Jean White reported that 91 cards had been returned as undeliverable.

Robinson said that also the Postal Service had mailed out a number of cards to people in various Precincts, listing new addresses.

Robinson said his name and phone number were also printed on the cards, and he received about 400-500 calls, with people wanting to know what was going on! Other Commissioners also reported some anger and confusion over the cards.

The Commissioner said the public is advised to continue to use regular mailing addresses until notification of change appears in newspapers and radio at some future date.

The 9-1-1 System is not in operation yet, and it is going to take some time to iron out problems.

On other matters, the Commissioners decided to hold a public hearing on the County's parking ordinance (around the Courthouse) before beginning to enforce it. The hearing will be at 2:00 p.m. Monday, March 2, 1992.

Commissioner Reggie Pittman reported good news that the jail popula-

tion had fallen to 12. Two of these are scheduled for TDC, seven are awaiting trial, one is being held on a bench warrant and two on blue warrants.

The Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees met February 10 at 7 p.m. in the board room. Present were David Harris, Tony Long, Larry Chambers, Gary Wilson, Frances Agnew and Dale Wolf.

School personnel present were Dr. Donald E. Bryan, Robby Stuteville, Randy Mohundro, Dan Goodman, Gene Smith, Penni Mohundro, Linda Webb, Kathy Bush, Shelly Bailey, Pam Cook, Sue Janes and Cindy Wood.

Others present were Debbie White, Judi Butler, Michael Butler, Nannette Goldston, Mackey Elliott, Stella Ware and Billy Bush.

The minutes of the January 13 meeting were accepted as read.

Tony Long arrived at 7:10 p.m.

Dr. Bryan presented the Academic Excellence Indicator System Report for the 1990-91 school year and it was discussed.

Stuteville reported 115 students at the high school level. Academic events are being scheduled for spring activities. TENET is now in use at the high school.

Mohundro reported 112 students enrolled at elementary. Open house will be March 3 and the theme will be "Ecology." Elementary did not receive the PSI program.

The Lunch and Breakfast Program for January was presented by Mohundro.

Webb presented information on Vocational Home Economics courses; she presented statistics, course offerings and common essential elements.

Smith presented information on agriculture science and technology courses; he presented course offerings and information on sample courses. This was discussed.

Bryan presented the Industrial Technology courses offered.

He also discussed the County Education Districts that were in a lawsuit. He said that Mohundro was appointed to the State Committee for TAAS Test in grade 9 social studies. He reported receipt of \$100 from KTXS Channel 12 for participating in the Quiz Bowl.

Dr. Bryan presented the balance sheet for cash in bank, a list of all checks written for January and a comparison of revenue and expenditures to budget. The motion to pay the January bills presented carried 4-2; Chambers and Wilson opposed because of the city gas bill when the meter was not working.

The board entered executive session at 9 p.m. to discuss personnel and returned to regular session at 12:40 a.m. A motion by Agnew, seconded by Wilson, to extend the

contract of Mohundro for one year through the 1992-93 school year as elementary principal carried 6-0.

Due to previous board action two-year contracts are awarded to superintendents only. Because of the current two-year contracts that the principal and athletic director have, a renewal of contract is not necessary, but the board wishes to express support for Stuteville and Goodman for the 1992-93 school year.

The board unanimously accepted the resignation of Bryan as superintendent of the school system effective at the end of the 1991-92 school year.

Board president Harris opened the three bids submitted on the repairing the roof of the junior high building. They were: Smith Roofing, gravel roof \$9,248.00, alternate \$6,493.00; Barr Roofing, reroof \$8,097.00, alternate \$6,984.00; and Larry Wilson, pitched metal roof, \$18,000.00.

The motion by Long, seconded by Wilson to accept the bid from Barr Roofing for reroofing the junior high building in the amount of \$8,097.00 carried 6-0.

A motion by Chambers, seconded by Harris, to lease an automobile from Fullen Motors at \$8.00 per day plus \$.10 per mile after the first 6,000 miles carried 6-0.

A motion by Chambers, seconded by Harris, to charge \$160.00 per student for drivers education training carried 6-0.

A motion by Harris, seconded by Agnew, to enter into a TASB Participation agreement for a term of Feb. 8, 1992 to Feb. 8, 1993 and an Interlocal Agreement for the same period of time carried 6-0.

A motion by Wolf, seconded by Wilson, to appoint Faye Medley as judge and Kathy Herring as early voting clerk for the election of two board members to three-year terms in a joint election with the City of Rising Star Saturday, May 2, 1992 carried 6-0. They adopted a resolution for a run-off election to be held no later than 30 days after May 2 should it become necessary.

Meeting adjourned at 1:31 a.m.

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK Sugarless Fruitbars

1 cup raisins  
1 t. baking powder  
1 cup chopped dates  
1 t. cinnamon  
1 cup chopped prunes  
1 egg or egg substitute  
1 cup flour  
1 stick butter  
1-1/2 cup water  
Coconut or chopped nuts (optional)

First, put raisins, dates and prunes that have been chopped, into the water and boil together. Stir while mixing. After boiling, add butter, flour, baking powder, and cinnamon. Stir completely. Spray a 9x13x2" pan with Pam and pour all of mixture into pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. Let cool before cutting and serving.

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## Cook's Fish Barn 'Lots Of Work and Lots Of Fun'

It's a busy Sunday afternoon at Cook's Fish Barn, located 12 miles southeast of Rising Star on Highway 36.

Cars are parked outside the long, low building, built something like the deck of a ship. People are going up the ramp into the entrance, while inside the owners J.C. and Katie Cook and family members greet customers, seat them at rustic tables, and cook, serve and visit.

The scene is colorful—wide plank floors, fish nets hanging from the ceilings. And floating through the hum of conversation is vintage country-western music, part of a collection of tapes and records owned by the Cooks.

Gene Autry at the beginning of his career, Marty Robbins with classic cowboy songs, the Sons of the Pioneers and Hank Williams at his best make a background for the family-reunion atmosphere.

The music also fits with old cowboy prints and

western decor on the walls—decorations which somehow blend with the nautical look.

But people are concentrating on the food. The "All U can eat" specials feature Freshwater Catfish and Southern Style Cod, chicken planks, or smaller versions of these plates.

Ordinners have a choice of a meal from the ample salad bar, or a huge seafood plate, also shrimp, oysters, steak and various side orders.

The printed menu hardly does justice to what comes with the main dishes—savory hush puppies, slaw and crisp fries. Servings are generous on everything.

Several people order plates to take out, and another person mentions that Cook is equipped for real good catering for large groups anywhere in the area. Someone says that the restaurant is always doing community benefits, stock shows, and for the Rising Star and Sipes Springs Fire Departments.

Toward the Sunday

closing time, 3:00 p.m., J.C. Cook gives the last of the customers a special treat. He carries his guitar to the bandstand at one end of the big room and sings a few songs.

This bandstand is a focal point-centered with a set of drums, the are lit by cylinders of lights in green and fushia. Sometimes Cook's band comes up from Sidney to play here: Norman Chandler, Gary Clark, and Tommy Connally.

But today it's just Cook, joined soon by dark-haired daughter Connie Cook Howard and two year old grandson, Trevor Howard. Jeff Howard, Connie's husband, carries the last of the trays to the kitchen.

Their well-modulated voices blend. Little Trevor decides to sing with his granddad, probably just as Cook had done with his family long ago.

Raised right here where the restaurant is located, J.C. Cook comes from a family where music is a way of life. When he was a child his aunts, uncles and mother all sang and played with several bands.

Today Cook winds up his music with "The Way I Am." He puts down his guitar and walks across to where his wife, Katie, is closing out the kitchen.

The Fish Barn will open next Thursday and run from 4:30-10:00 p.m. Thursday-Saturday, and then be open 11:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. Sunday.

"But it's actually a seven day per week job," Cook declares. He motions toward his attractive wife. "You're looking at the brains of this business right now. She is our CPA, secretary, cook, dishwasher and in charge of personnel."

"But this is actually a family business. Our daughter Connie and husband, Jeff Howard, another daughter Christy and husband, Dean Holland—they all work hard here too. Our other daughter, Rebecca, and her husband Doug Caffey live in Abilene."

The Cooks note that Connie, Jeff and Dean are honor students at Cisco Junior College, in addition to their work at the Fish Barn.

"Another hard worker here is Marsha Ditrack, who helps the family out with whatever needs to be done," Katie Cook says.

Cook remarks that he started the business here in 1984 with one little room. He worked at other things before—driving a truck, and running a big greenhouse on the family farm.

"People thought I was kind of crazy, trying to have a restaurant out here so far from town," he remarks.

But he had an idea that people would come a long way for good food and a chance to enjoy themselves.

"We started with barbeque and worked with that for two years. We still fix it now and then—especially if someone wants it for a benefit."

"But we found out we like working with fish the best, using a batter like Katie cooked at home."

He says that the family, referring to himself and his sons-in-law, literally constructed the place as business expanded, adding on a porch and finally the big room. Now the Fish Barn will seat around 250 people, and serves 1200-1500 people weekly.

"It's lots of work, but a lot of fun!" Cook declares.

One of the interesting things is how far people will drive to eat here. J.C. and Katie name over some of the places customers come from: Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Dublin, Stephenville, Granbury, Abilene, Comanche, Coleman, Brownwood and of course many from Rising Star, De Leon, and Gorman.

The Cooks remark that they were pretty easy-going on most things—but on one subject they are really set in their ways.

They say you have to be especially careful about fish products, and they won't serve anything that does not come from U.S.

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## Fishing Outdoors

**O. H. Ivie, West Texas Future Fork**  
West Texas Anglers have for years longed for a well stocked, managed and located big lake. Nearing the full pool level of 554,000 acre feet Ivie stands a mere 9 vertical feet from this level.

Located just east of the junction of the Colorado & Concho rivers in Concho, Coleman, and Runnels counties this huge impoundment will be the premiere lake west of the Fort Worth area. In anticipation of this the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has placed an 18 inch-minimum length limit for large-mouth bass. Having began stocking the proposed area prior to the lake filling with Florida strain bass should give Ivie a fair number of legal fish by this fall. The stocking program was doubled above the proposed goals once the lake began filling in such a short time. 12 to 16 inch fish are numerous at this time with a few keeper fish being taken.

The few trips I have been able to make to Ivie have been amazing in the

shear numbers of bass available. In the right areas anglers are reporting catching and releasing near 100 fish a day. A poor day may see a handful of bites as with any lake.

The current lake record I show is just over 9 pounds, probably a native of the river's prior to the impoundment. Heavy cover is the rule for the most part with mesquite trees, pecan, and cactus as primary cover. If planning a trip in the near future, spool on some Trilene Big Game for this dense cover. Spinnerbaits and worms are producing some good catches off the secondary points in the mid-lake area.

The Angler's Choice Draw Tournaments for 1992 kicked off with a bang at Lake Sam Rayburn Feb. 6-9. One hundred and sixty-seven contestants gathered for some excellent fishing, but catching was less than desirable.

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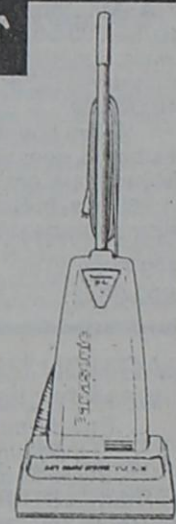

## ASCS News

Signup for the 1990-1991 Disaster Assistance Program continues through March 13. There are no provisions for a late filed application. Producers are encouraged to file early in order that all forms and signatures can be obtained by the deadline. The week of March 9-13 will be needed by county office personnel for completion of forms and your cooperation in filing early is appreciated.

Signup for participating in the 1992 Wheat, Feed Grain, and Cotton Programs continues through April 17. Advance Payments equal to 40% of the estimated deficiency payments can be requested at signup. In order to better meet the needs of the county, the nongrazing date for ACR and CU for PAY has been changed to June 1 through

October 31. Estimated deficiency payments are as follows: Wheat, \$0.65 per bu; grain sorghum, 0.46 per bu.; corn, 0.58 per bu.; oats, 0.15 per bu.; barley, 0.35 per bu.; cotton, 0.15 per bu.

The PAY 92 provisions are applicable for 1992 but the winter wheat option offered in 1991 in not.

The 1992 state poundage quota for Texas is 405,030,219 pounds which is 2,630,066 pounds less than the 1991 state poundage quota. Initial notice of individual farm quotas are scheduled to be mailed on March 20. Individual farm notification of the national under-markertings are scheduled to be mailed on March 30. Transfers of quota by sale or lease will be accepted after this notification.

Program participants must meet the highly erodible land conservation requirements to be eligible for


USDA benefits. Producers who have rented, leased, purchased, or otherwise acquired new land for 1992 must be certain of the erodibility classification of the soil before planting any annual crop including hay and grazing crops.

The 12th Signup for the 10 year Conservation Reserve Program will be held June 15-26. Contracts accepted during this signup will be effective for the 1993 crop year.

# The Making Of A Missionary

After going to Belize last June, I felt that the Lord wanted me to make another trip to the English speaking Central American country this winter, and that it was very important that I go. And since the Lord does not call without providing a way, the needed money for airfare and expenses was given to me by Christian brothers and sisters.

One of my objectives was to get acquainted with or become familiar with this third world country of about 180 thousand people. This objective was accomplished as I traveled to every town in the country, except one in the northernmost district of the independent nation. I got to know the Southern Baptist missionaries in the country and became friends with those whom I worked. I also became friends with a number of national pastors and church leaders. I now feel completely at home in the country rather than like a foreigner. And I have learned to love the people.

This knowledge of the country, its people, and its needs should also enable me to be able to lead teams of volunteer missionaries into the country for short trips. The Christians of Belize need the help of such teams as churches are established and buildings are built. The nationals are often poor and lacking in skills, but work hard when given some guidance and help.

As I prepared to leave Tyler with a medical team that included 3 doctors and an evangelist, the flu struck. Fourteen of us arrived at our destination of Big Falls, a village near Punta Gorda in the southernmost part of the country, with only one doctor and no preacher. I started to get suspicious about what God had in mind. I also had a problem with my return ticket that left a question about my ability to return, but the Lord took care of it while I was in Belize. All I had to do was to trust Him.

After traveling for hundreds of miles in badly worn school type buses over some of the muddiest and roughest one lane roads in the world, we

ended up staying in a house on top of a hill. It was awesomely beautiful as we looked out over the jungle and at the mountains in the distance. But since the neighbors had been using the house for a chicken house, it was not clean and the floors were hard to sleep on. An American family living in Belize helped us prepare meals, often from native plants.

A medical clinic we operated treated more than 180 sick people. Some of the people only spoke Indian languages or Spanish, but we managed to find translators and the doctor, a young lady, also spoke Spanish. The people could not afford the expense required to travel to a hospital, and some were very serious cases.

We divided up and held two Vacation Bible Schools at the same time with more than 75 children in each. One was in the Community Center and one was in the Nazarene Church. The Baptist Church there is quite small.

But we had services each night in the Baptist church, and guess who started preaching? Candles were used for light at the night services and I used a flashlight to read my small bible. The people like to sing but rarely have a musical instrument.

Finishing the project at Big Falls, we went to Punta Gorda for New Year's Day. Taking a long boat ride to Snake Key, a small jungle island with a beach, we went swimming. We waded around the island looking for sea shells and found a large quantity of cocaine, which we destroyed. We stayed in a hotel before taking the long bus ride back north.

Finding something to eat and drink was a problem since everything closes on holidays and Sundays. A preacher from Louisiana was holding revival services at the Baptist church in Punta Gorda.

I left the team at Belmopan as they returned to Texas. I did not know what to expect, but I knew that I was doing what God wanted me to

do. Cliff Scarbrough and Otis Brady are the two ranking missionaries who direct the Baptist work in Belize. I hadn't met Cliff but I had talked with him on the telephone, and I knew the way to his house. Cliff and Bettie, his wife, welcomed and fed me. We soon became acquainted and "hit it off well" together. Cliff explained that they were to start building a retreat center or church camp, and that my contribution to the effort was needed.

We cleared jungle with machetes on five acres of land near the village of Camelote. It rained almost daily and the mud is extremely sticky. Though cool at night, it gets warm and humid in the day. Fast breathing is the only way to cool down as sweating does no good. And there were rocks and boulders to be moved as we horse-shoed a road through the property. We had a small tractor with a plow and blade. The rocks had to be moved and the road graded so that the rainwater would drain off. I was amazed that such rocky ground could grow so much jungle.

I was provided a rent house and a travel trailer to live in. Vehicles are very expensive and difficult to maintain in Belize and transportation is often a problem. But deciding that they could trust me and depend on me, I was provided a pickup to drive. I would carry national preachers to churches on Sunday to preach. I would encourage them and often teach the Sunday School lesson at the church.

One Friday I packed a

duffle bag backpack and caught a bus back down south to the Indian villages. We had worked with the Indians in June and we learned to love them, especially the children, who nicknamed me Gringo. I wondered how I would be accepted this time and if the children would remember me. I was prepared for the worst. But I couldn't have been accepted any better.

The people invited me into their homes, called me "brother" and insisted that I eat with them. The children were not around when I walked into the small village store. One of the girls walked in and seeing me shouted "Gringo" and ran to hug me. The other children reacted the same way. The boys wanted me to be with them and the girls had to hug me. There were comments from the men about how much the children love me, and it became evident to all.

British soldiers help defend the small country and some were camped nearby. They seemed to wonder why the children love and trust me so much. I told them that I was a Baptist missionary. And anytime the girls got a little scared, they would run to me.

The Indians shared with me about their culture and prospects for the future. The government has plans to eventually extend electric lines to even the jungle villages. Children were already watching cartoons on a small battery powered television set. The Indians were getting deeds to their land and learning to farm, and the T.V. will

soon erode their culture. The Christian boys in the village shared with me one night, and I was proud of the boys who were saved during our June visit to the village. They were being Christian examples to others in the area.

Living in dirt floored, thatched roofed homes made of poles, the Indians eat animals killed in the jungle along with beans, rice and corn. And there is always fresh fruit. Pigs and chickens are also kept.

I felt honored to get to preach both the morning and evening services at the village church. But all too soon it was time for me to return to Belmopan. And I couldn't hold back the tears as I had to say "bye" to the children and catch a bus.

Back at the retreat center, we built the first structure and it was named in my honor. It was the Richard Kurklin Memorial Outhouse, and it had Mahogany rafters. It was also quite essential. As you can see, we were having fun. A house for a caretaker is now under construction and a small hotel building will be next. It can house mission teams from the United States, and a camp staff during camp sessions. A kitchen/dinning hall, worship shelter, and two dorms for the children or young people will be added as money and labor are donated.

I went to the airport to meet another mission

team which was arriving. I was to work with them during my last week in Belize, and return to Tyler, Texas with them. We went back down south to a beautiful fruit growing mountain valley on the Hummingbird Highway.

With a single team of four men and two women, our task seemed impossible. The framework of the village's combination church, school, and storm shelter had been eaten up by termites and the roof was in danger of falling in. The church members had purchased lumber, but they just did not have the skills to make the repairs. We had four days to get the job done while the women attended to villagers who needed medical care. One of the church ladies cooked for us and we slept in the homes of villagers. After working each day, we would bathe in the creek, then conduct nightly revival services. We often walked for miles between the church and homes, sometimes accompanied by children. And we quickly became friends with the people. With the help of God and an "Aggie" engineer, we were able to jack up the roof intact, then replace the rafters and framework under it. We not only repaired the building, but made it much stronger. And it only took three and one half days. We also had fun teasing with our "Aggie", who was a good sport and encouraged the

fun. We were able to visit the area's town that last afternoon before returning north to Belize City.

A mattress and some bedding were given to the Christian mother of eight children. Their un-Christian father had abandoned them, taking everything with him. They had only boards to sleep on and their income from washing clothes would barely buy food. Bedding is expensive there but the lady wanted to wash our clothes for free. We had a better idea, and they hugged us with tears in their eyes.

As we waited for the bus, a crowd of villagers gathered, and they all hugged us before we left. We had saved their church, and we had come to love each other.

We attended church services and ate in Belize City and took a shopping trip to the resort town of San Pedro. Spending the last night in a hotel, we flew back to Texas.

Now that God has trained me, I wonder how soon I will return to Belize and if I will be able to take a volunteer mission team from this area. I feel that I am to get a job for now and wait for God to work out the future. The missionaries say that they would like for me to

work with them full time in Belize, but living there is expensive and no support money is available. They also say that it would be better if I were married.

I feel that God eventually wants me to work full time in Belize. That seems like an impossibility at the present, but if that is God's will, He will make a way. He continues to answer prayers, work miracles, and He enables me to do what He asks of me. I have seen Him do so many wonderful things, and since He loves us, He will do even more. There is nothing more fun than serving Jesus Christ, and I can hardly wait to see what He will do next. And since I am a Christian, I have Christian brothers and sisters among the various countries and races of people, and we share the love of Jesus.

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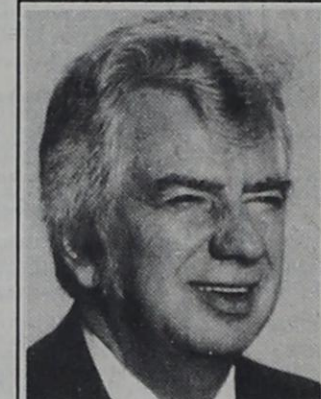

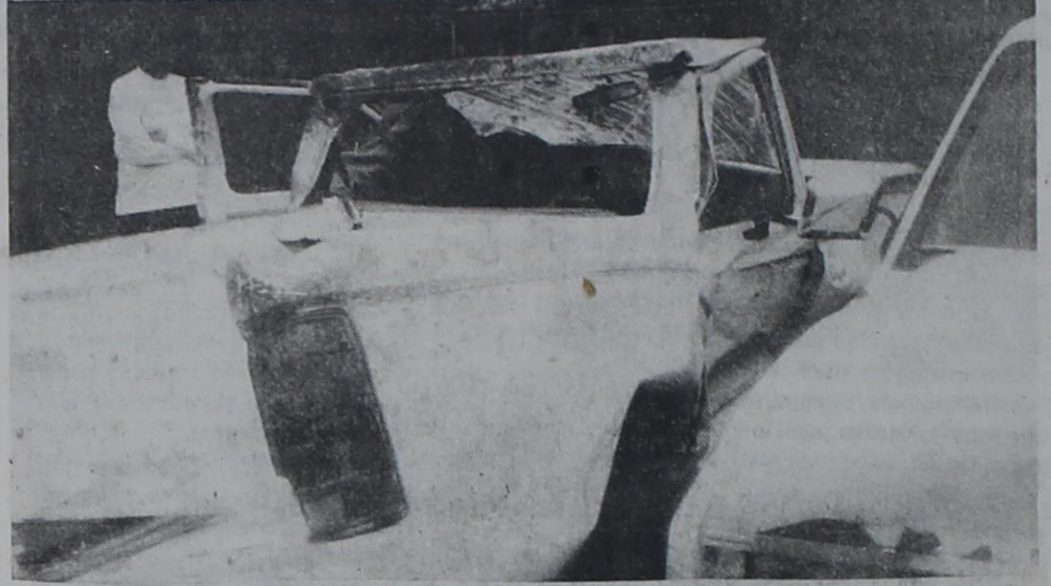

Robert also noted that there is no excuse for drinking and driving. "Those two men will have this on their records and consciences for the rest of their lives. They could have had to deal with causing a wife and 3 small children to lose their husband and father," Robert said.

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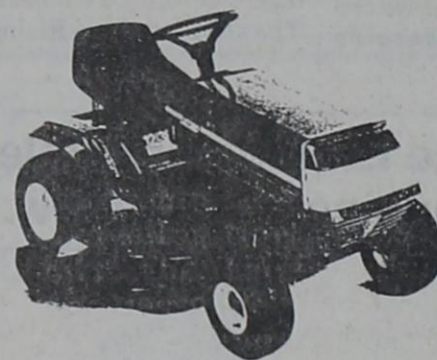
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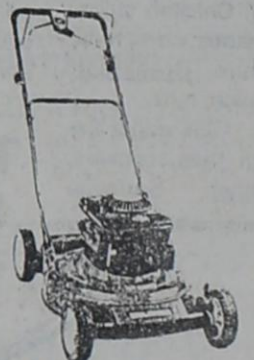


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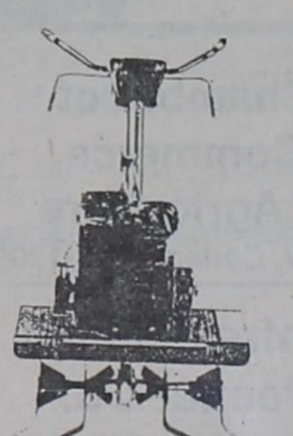
