Pritchard and Abbott, a Fort Worth firm which appraises Eastland County

sent. Pritchard described the service offered to the colunty as "New technology that's proving to be very popular." Under this plan the County Tax Collector's office would be entered into the same data base in Fort Worth as the Eastland County Appraisal District office. According to Prichard, this would enable the office to get data to the public more efficiently. For the rest of 1987 the cost would be \$12,450, and for 1988 it would be \$23,550. This would include IBM equipment: 2 terminals, 2

printers, one modem, information from the data base in Fort Worth, upkeep, all supplies, and training for local personnel.

The Commissioners deferred a decision on the matter until the afternoon meeting. At that time, after considering the current costs of tax collection, the Commissioners voted to approve the new system. During the morning the

I've Been Wrong Before

DOGS have been said to be among the top three causes of men being killed. Fences are another.

"HOW MUCH IS THAT DOGGY IN THE WINDOW' mentions a girl friend needing a dog to protect her. The increasing crime rate underscores the fact that the law may catch and only at times punish but falls short on protecting persons or property. Entangled within the problem are questions of freedom as opposed to security in our persons and posessions.

employer reading this or any person thinking they have paid up insurance should search for those cute little escape clauses. When the state of Texas was considering accident insurance contracts for state employees several years back I wrote my old college class mate, Billy Clayton, and appraised him and the legislative committee of our experience. Also I sent a copy to the insurance company. FOR if the same thing happened because Texas changed insurance companies a great number of people might be


left holding an empty bag. Soon I received a letter

DUSTRY. My reply intorming them that if it were inuniform then deed legislators would be looking for same in other offers and that furthermore if it prevailed throughout then that too should be changed. I got no reply.

But we were "going to the dogs" to begin with. Some think owners of pit bulls should be forced to carry insurance. Enforcing that one would be near impossible. Outlaw pit bulls? 


