If you raised your hand you are a person who does not enjoy reinvestment risk. This is the third risk area we are investigating, the others being risk of taxation, risk of inflation, market risk, and risk of theft or catastrophe.

Reinvestment risk simply stated means there may not be as an attractive option tomorrow for your money as there is today. Anyone who had a 14% C.D. can attest to this fact.

your current income as a given. Try to budget your expenses so that you are not caught with monthly bills when interest charges occur. For example, say you have a 2 year C.D. at 10% and you are planning to use the interest to make your car payment. It may be unwise commit to a five year

note expecting to receive that interest rate when your C.D. matures. In 1989, Forbes magazine disqualified an entire mutual-fund management group from its annual fund rankings to introduce a new rating system that included only single-manager funds. Regardless of how outstanding or consistent the performance of a fund, if the spotlight was shared by more than one manager, that fund could not earn a trophy.

This rating system drew enough negative feedback from readers that Forbes' 1990 mutual-fund rankings returned to rating funds solely on performance, regardless of the management technique. The magazine's decision also may have been influenced by the fact that management teams, rather than solo performers, are

mize stock-market movements. The aim is to utilize top-quality managers in all the different areas of portfolio management. The biggest advantage of the team appraoch to portfolio management is consistentinvestment results. U.S. News & World Report expalined one group's ability to hold up well in down markets like this: "If one (manager) fouls up, the others com-

On the other hand, there has been some criticism of collective management systems. It is argued that committees tend to compromise too often, may be wishy-washy about ideas and sometimes produce only

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mostly troop leaders, will be honored for their voluntary contributions to the 2,549 girl members and the communities in which they live.

Today, 80 years after the first Girl Scout troop met in the United States. the Girl Scouts' goal remains unchanged-to help today's girls become tomorrow's leaders. The remarkable thing is that Girl Scout troop leaders make every developmental step along the way fun. The national theme for

Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. is "The Girl Comes First in Girl Scouting." In a recent report released by the American Association of University Women Educational Foundation, titled "How Schools Shortchange Girls," researchers reviewed many research studies and found "girls and boys enter school roughly equal in measured ability." However, as they progress in school, girls are not given equal treatment with the boys. This results in lower self-esteem as girls grow older and may contribute to more girls dropping out of school before graduation and may be part of the more girls attempt suicide. 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


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




THANKS PRIMARILY to the popular PBS Not-So-Mini Series, and also, to the mercifully brief, but intense recent War in the Gulf, interest apparently has never been keener than now in history in general, and the Civil War in particular. We found it true everywhere we went in Dixie.

Among the prize finds from the seemingly-endless gift, curio, book and souvenir shops, two books alone stand out: The Civil War Handbook by William H. Price (mentioned in earlier column), an and the Photographic History of the Civil War, originally published in 1983 three volumes, including Armies in & Leaders, The Cavalry, The Decisive Battles, and republished in 1989 in the single volume. The Handbook was first out in 1961 (centennial year celebration of the War Between the States), and up-dated with new full-color there's covers. So obviously a lot of reprinting and maybe some new material coming out to take advantage of the renewed interest that abounds everywhere.

"The First Modern War," Price says of the War which produced these machine FIRSTS: practical qun,

Infantry at Gettysburg lost 708 of 800 men. The black and white photos in the Handbook are excellent as are the color plates, made from paintings, of the army's uniforms.

Maps, tables and list of sources is good in the little Handbook, and the material is digestible. Who can name the 14 battles fought in Texas?

The 350-page Photographic History has over 600 black and white photos, but the book could use an index. Detailed information is given on individual armies, of how troops were formed, leaders, actions seen and losses.

The Cavalry section paints a picture of this colorful arm, and ultimately led to Gen. Robert E. Lee's surrender, of the Confederate army at Appomattox.

The Unyielding cameras of Matthew Brady and other noted photographers capture the sabotaged rail lines, wastelands of bombarded cities, the bloody aftermath on the battlefields and the face of dying young soldiers. Are other emerging Democracies fated to suffer the same experience?

The meeting began with Robinson reminded the the postal officials requesting clarification on the way the county has been addressed by Jedco Designs of Clyde.

Jedco was paid by the county to number rural roads and residences. These designations will be used by the 9-1-1 Emergency System, and also may be used by the U.S. Postal Service to implement a new system of rural addressing.

Although the 9-1-1 System is set to begin here May 12, the new addresses are not yet operational for the Postal Service, according to Frank Perez.

He listed several problems, including confusion over driveway addressing, the addressing of private roads, and multiple addresses on one road. Homes and roads missed in the addressing were also a factor, Perez said.

Pct. 1 Commissioner **Richard Robinson agreed** there had been some inconsistencies.

"Out at Lake Leon (Pct. 2 Commissioner) Ainsworth has a road designated as a 'Private Road', but it is a county road," Robinson said.
